Further to the previous (below) media release the subjects have been arrested.

A Calmar-area couple are facing charges for passing over 40 bad cheques throughout the province. The total dollar amount of goods obtained by this couple is in excess of \$33,000.

As a result of these arrests,

and the couple being identified, more reports are coming to various police agencies across the province. This is occurring as cheques are being returned to numerous businesses across Alberta as there are insufficient funds in the account on which they were written. It is expected that the number of offences reported and the total dollar amount of the fraudulent transactions will continue to grow.

Virginia and Daryl WALLIS of Leduc County have been arrested and charged in this matter. At this time, they remain in custody. First appearance in court for both will be in Leduc Provincial Court on Wednesday February 4, 2016.

RCMP would like to thank the public for the information received. RCMP would also like to remind businesses across the province to take the appropriate precautions to ensure they are protected from being victimized in similar offences in the future.

The completed surveys gave the City of Leduc a snapshot of how businesses manage their waste, recycling and organics collection. This information will be used to help the city develop options to increase waste diversion from Leduc's business sector.

• Session 2 for junior high students: Feb. 18, (two opportunities) 9 - 10 a.m., and 10:30 - 11:30 a.m., at the Maclab Centre for the Performing Arts (4308 50th Str., Leduc). O'Sullivan will be talking to the students about his life, experiences, and the effects of bullying.

• Session 3 for parents and social services professionals: Feb. 22, 6:30 – 7:30 p.m., Canadian Western Bank Room at the Leduc Recreation Centre (4330 Black Gold Drive, Leduc). Karen Kondor, public speaker on bullying prevention education, will provide a high-level overview on the issue of bullying.

Ottawa, Ontario -The RCMP and the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) are warning Canadians about an ongoing scam in which taxpayers across the country receive phone calls or emails from individuals impersonating CRA employees. These people are scammers.

The scammers tell taxpayers that

they either owe money to the CRA or have a tax refund. Taxpayers are threatened with arrest or jail time if they do not take immediate action and provide money or personal or financial information.

"The CRA takes these matters very seriously and provides substantial information to Canadians about how to protect themselves from scams undertaken using the CRA's name. Informing yourself



ty, tbeck@coronacustom.com www.coronacustom.com is particularly important during the tax filing season, when such scams peak," said the Honourable Diane Lebouthillier, Minister of National Revenue. This information, including examples of real scam telephone calls and e-mails, can be easily found on the CRA web site.

"Scammers are always looking for new ways to get your money or your personal information," warns Assistant Commissioner Todd Shean, who leads the RC-MP's Federal Policing Special Services. "The RCMP works every day to track down fraudsters and bring them to justice, but raising awareness about fraud is also important as it is one of the most effective ways of protecting Canadians from scammers. The more you know about a specific fraud, the less likely you'll be a victim of that fraud."

The RCMP plays a crucial role in educating the public about scams, and has a number of programs in place to track fraud, including one run by the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC). The CAFC monitors all types of scams, and warns Canadians to be on the lookout for scammers during the upcoming tax season. The RCMP also works closely with the CRA to raise awareness about tax-related scams.

When CRA employees call taxpayers, they follow established procedures to ensure personal information is protected. To confirm the authenticity of a call, contact the CRA by using its official telephone number for individual tax enquiries: 1-800-959-8281. You can also verify your individual tax account through a secure CRA portal: My Account.

If you believe you may be the victim of fraud or have given personal or financial information in error, contact your local police service and your financial institution.

Vegreville, Alberta

In December 2015 the Vegreville RCMP received at least 3 complaints of bad cheques being uttered in Vegreville, Alberta.

Investigation revealed that the suspects in all 3 events are identified as Virginia Josephine WALLIS (38 years old) and Daryl George WALLIS (40 years old). The pair would enter retail stores and purchase \$200-\$700 worth of merchandise and then write Cheques from accounts with insufficient funds.

Further investigation shows that the pair are suspected of the same offences in 23 seperate and similar occurrences all accross central Alberta since October 2015. Occurrences have been reported in towns from Olds to St Paul, AB and numerous stops in between.

In the most recent occurrence in Two Hills, Alberta the pair were seen departing in a white 2002 Dodge Ram truck displaying Alberta license plate BSN-0943.

RCMP would like businesses in Alberta to be aware of these suspects, their behaviours and to protect themselves from being taken advantage of by these individuals.

Charges have been laid and they are wanted on arrest warrants for these offences. If you know the whereabouts of these suspects please call Crimestoppers at 1-800-222-8477 or your local police agency. They are not believed to be violent. However RCMP advise the public not to approach the pair, and to dial 911 if spotted.

WEDDING RINGS ARE SYMBOLIC GESTURES OF COMMITMENT

Couples adhere to many traditions on their wedding days, including the exchange of wedding rings. Wedding rings symbolize the union of two people and their pledge to remain faithful to each other.

No one is exactly sure just when the tradition of exchanging wedding rings originated, but some say it can be traced back to ancient Egypt, when the oldest recorded exchange of wedding rings was made. Reeds growing along the Nile were twisted and braided into rings and given during betrothal ceremonies. The round ring symbolized eternity, and the hole within the center meant a gateway to things unknown. Since reeds were not very durable, soon ivory, leather and bone were used to create wedding rings.

As new lands were explored and territories expanded, traditions from

one culture were adopted and modified by other cultures. The same is true with wedding rings. According to the Diamond Source, wedding rings were adopted by Romans and incorporated into Western wedding ceremonies. Romans' rings were highly decorated, and some historians believe wedding rings were given to represent ownership over brides instead of symbolizing love. These rings were made of iron and called "Anulus Pronubus," or "betrothal ring."


Rings have been simplified since those days and ultimately made of many materials. Throughout history, wedding rings were worn on various fingers and even both hands, whereas many married people in Western cultures now wear their wedding rings on the left hand and on the fourth finger. Romans once believed that this finger contained a vein, called the "Vena Amoris," that ran directly to the heart. Though that is not true, the tradition has prevailed.

Other legends say that, when blessing a Christian marriage, priests would bind the marriage by saying, "In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit," simultaneously touching the ring to the recipient's thumb, index finger and middle finger, before slipping it on the fourth finger while saying, "Amen."

Another theory on ring placement is that wedding rings are worn on the ring finger because that finger isn't used as much as the rest of the hand, ensuring delicate ring materials won't be damaged.

Ross Simmons Jewelry states that gold is still the most popular metal choice for wedding rings, but couples are opting for some other metals that are more durable. Platinum is popular not only because it is long-wearing, but it also tends to be the most expensive. It's also a dense metal and can feel heavy in hand. Tungsten carbide is another durable metal that has grown in popularity in recent years. These rings cannot be cut and resoldered, which means it's important to size the rings correctly the first time. Titanium is both lightweight and durable, and it's popular because it is hypo-allergenic, making it practical for those with allergies to other metals.

Wedding rings continue to serve as symbols of a couple's vows and union. Much like the marriage itself, they are designed to last the test of time.


