## NUTTY NEIGHBOURS

In addition to Parkland County's resident population, there is also a sizable squirrel population. Here are some quick facts about our cute, but pesky friends.

- The red squirrel is native to Alberta.
- Squirrels can run 30 kms per hour.
- A squirrel can survive a jump from 30 metres because of its padded feet.

• Squirrels will shed their tail when threatened as a defense mechanism and a way to get away from danger.

• Squirrels will typically have four or five young born in late May or early June.

• They are very territorial.

• During cold spells they will stay in their nest and eat the food they have stored there.

• They eat mainly seeds and nuts but also eat mushrooms, flowers, fruits, insects and bird seed.

• They are active during the

day and do not hibernate.

• Squirrel-proofing your house or shed is recommended to prevent damage.

• Live traps are available to rent from Agricultural Services but if you are planning on re-locating a squirrel the best timing is after the young are weaned at approximately 10-12 weeks and before the winter storage collection begins.

## VOLUNTEER TAX PROGRAM FOR LOWER INCOME RESIDENTS

"The Volunteer Tax Program offered by Yellowhead County is an excellent program designed to assist lower income residents of all ages to have their income tax prepared for free," says Family and Community Support Services Outreach Coordinator Valerie Smith. "You don't have to be paying \$100 to \$200 to get your taxes prepared."

The program has been very successful in previous years and Yellowhead County is happy to be able to offer it again thanks to volunteers that participate in the training provided by Canada Revenue Agency.

Tax returns can be dropped off

at the Wildwood County office with no appointment is necessary. Volunteers will process the tax returns and most of them will be electronically filed and clients will be called when they are completed. Whether you're new to the area or a returning client you can access this service. Clients will be asked to sign an authorization form in order for one of the volunteers to complete your tax return.

To determine if you qualify to have your taxes done for free through this program, your tax return needs to fit within the following guidelines:

- The tax return must not be complex ( eg. no farm or business taxes)
- Single income is \$30,000 or

less.

• Couples income is \$40,000 or less.

• Family income for one Adult with one child is 35,000 or less.

- o \$2,500.00 added for each additional child

Even if you don't have to pay any taxes, a current tax return is required for government subsidies to continue without disruption i.e. child tax credit, government pensions.

This service is available for Yellowhead County and Parkland County residents.

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# PARLIAMENT UPDATE – WEEK OF FEBRUARY 22, 2016

This week in Parliament, we covered topics from ISIS, to employment insurance and labour.

- The Liberal Government's Motion against ISIS was debated for most of this week. My comments in the House regarding this Motion can be found at: <http://www.parl.gc.ca/content/hoc/House/421/Debates/022/HAN022-E.PDF>

- A Motion introduced by our Conservative Party was voted by a wide margin to condemn the growing international Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) campaign being waged against Israel.

- The report by the Special Joint Committee on Physician-Assisted Dying was released this week and can be found at: <http://www.parl.gc.ca/HousePublications/Publication.aspx?Language=e&Mode=1&Parl=42&Ses=1&DocId=8120006> (the dissenting report can

be found on page 51).

- The NDP put forward a Motion on Employment Insurance, calling for the House to recognize mounting job loss and lack of access to E.I. They are also calling on the Government to strengthen the E.I. system and calling for repeals of the reforms the Conservative Government made in 2012-2013.

- Private Members' Bills (PMB) were introduced by my Conservative Colleagues during the week. Four of them deal with the Criminal Code, from protecting preborn children, to clarifying definitions dealing with firearms, and the Life Means Life Act (life sentences). A fifth PMB deals with respecting a national strategy for Alzheimer's disease and other dementias. I look forward to reading these bills.

- At second reading, Bill C-4 – an Act to amend the Canada Labour Code, the Parliamentary Employment and Staff Relations Act, the Public Service Labour Relations Act and the Income Tax Act – ended the week.

Over the course of the week, I attended 11 meetings and two events. The House will be down the week of February 29, and my next update will be on my travels in the riding before my return to Ottawa on March 7.

# NOT GETTING YOUR FIRE PERMIT FOR EXISTING OR NEW BURNS MAY COME AT A COST

Starting March 1, all burning activities in Yellowhead County, excluding campfires and burn barrels, will require a fire permit. Yellowhead County residents are reminded to take extra care while burning this spring, as dry conditions and strong winds can fuel fast burning grassfires.

“Fire permits will be required for any new or existing burn in the Yellowhead County,” says Yellowhead County Deputy Fire Chief Cory Chegwyn. “And we’re reminding everyone to take all the necessary precautions during any type of burn on their property.”

If you burn without a permit and accidentally start a wildfire – or even if firefighters are sent to check your burn – you may be held responsible for any firefighting or other costs. Agricultural producers and other businesses, as well as property owners should ensure their fire preparedness plans are in place to quickly respond to potential wildfire situations.

The Yellowhead County fire permit area covers the area north of Highway 16 and east of High-

way 22. Yellowhead County fire permits for this area are free and available through Fire Guardians at either Yellowhead County office. Campground fires and burn barrels within this area do not require a permit but may be restricted later in the season if fire levels reach a fire ban. Fire permits for the rest of the county can be obtained by contacting Alberta’s Agriculture & Forestry department.

Fire permits lets Yellowhead County know where authorized

fires are planned and they help us to notify you if conditions change. There are a variety of reasons why the fire hazard in your area might go up – and you might not be aware that they’re happening. When we have your permit information, we can notify you so you can put out your fire – and avoid starting a bigger one and steer clear of potential charges and monetary costs.

Tips & Info on new burns and existing winter burns:

- Permits are required

for brush piles, transfer sites, and field, grass or stubble burns.

- Fire incidents can be reduced by keeping burns small and by always having firefighting equipment on hand.

- Fires that are not completely extinguished can smolder underground during the winter months and resurface in the spring as a wildfire.

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# DEPRESSION NOW EQUAL TO HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE AS A TOP REASON CANADIANS SEE PHYSICIANS

TORONTO, Jan. 26, 2016 / CNW/ - New research announced today by Morneau Shepell found that depression is now equal to high blood pressure as a top reason Canadians see physicians. Depression was the top-ranked condition by 24 per cent of physician re-

spondents, equal to high blood pressure, which was the top-ranked condition by a different 24 per cent of physician respondents. The results of the national survey, which polled physicians, employees and employers across Canada, will be presented January 27 at the Company's 5th annual Employers Connect event.

Comparatively, musculoskeletal disorders were the top-ranked

condition by 11 per cent of physician respondents. Furthermore, 63 per cent of physicians reported that depression, anxiety disorders or stress-related issues had the fastest increase in cases they had seen over the last two to three years.

The national survey, also found that a large majority (82 per cent) of employees who reported struggling with men-

tal health issues and two thirds (67 per cent) of employees who reported struggling with stress symptoms said it impacts their work. Comparatively, only half (53 per cent) of employees who reported struggling with physical health issues said it impacts their work.

"Each year, we see an increase in employees seeking support for stress and anxiety - conditions that are attributable to everything from the uncertainty of an unstable economy to difficulties in a personal relationship," said Alan Torrie, President and CEO, Morneau Shepell. "These concerns often have a negative effect on workplace productivity. On the other hand, employers who offer mental wellness support often see a strong relationship between mental health and engagement at work."

Workplace engagement levels are strongly correlated with mental health issues

The survey found that more than two thirds (67 per cent) of highly engaged employees reported excellent or very good mental health, compared to less than half (35 per cent) who are not engaged. Additionally, workplace stress has been found to have a higher impact on engagement than personal stress.

Nearly half (47 per cent) of employees who are not engaged reported extreme workplace stress but less than one in five (18 per cent) of employees who are not engaged reported extreme personal stress.

Upon looking further into the reasons for stress at work, employees reported that the sources of workplace stress are due primarily to emotional or interpersonal issues (e.g., office culture, communication, conflict), as indicated by 60 per cent of employees.

# Depression Now Equal To High Blood Pressure As A Top Reason Canadians See Physicians

Comparatively, nearly half (43 per cent) of employees reported that job-related issues (e.g., deadlines) are the source of workplace stress and only 14 per cent of employees reported that physical work-related (e.g., lifting heavy objects) issues are the source of workplace stress.

Half (51 per cent) of managers surveyed believe they have employees with mental health issues

The survey also found that among managers, 37 per cent believe they have employees with significant stress symptoms, and 27 per cent of employees indicated that they have significant stress issues. Meanwhile, nearly one in four (22 per cent) of managers surveyed believe at least one of their employees has a substance abuse issue. Less than one in 10 (7 per cent) of employees reported substance abuse issues.

“It’s clear that a large number of managers are seeing behaviours such as lowered productivity, increased absences, anxious behaviour or a disheveled appearance that would lead them to this belief,” said Paula Allen, Vice President, Research and Integrative Solutions. “This shows how important it is for managers to know how to respond appropriately.”

The stigma around mental health issues remains apparent in the workplace

Though conversations around mental health are continuing to evolve and become more commonplace, employees are not completely comfortable acknowledging the problems at work. Two thirds (66 per cent) of employees who took time off work for a mental health issue did not report it and, as such, the days were not recorded as an official absence. “Unrecorded absences affect employee morale, workplace productivity and the

company’s bottom line,” said Adam Kelly, Vice President, Absence Management Solutions.

Almost one third (31 per cent) of employers said support for mental wellness in their organization has improved over the last two to three years, compared to 62 per cent who said it stayed the same.

“It is encouraging to see that Canadian employers are reducing stigma and increasing their

focus on mental health issues,” said President and CEO, Alan Torrie. “Support for workplace mental health is improving but there is still more to be done.”

About the Survey

The purpose of the survey by Morneau Shepell, conducted in October 2015, was to provide insights into workplace mental health from the perspectives of employees, employers and physicians, with 1,223 respondents

in total. The margins of error for the survey are +/- 3.1 per cent for employees, +/- 9.8 per cent for employers and +/- 9.8 per cent for physicians; valid 19 times out of 20.

The Company is presenting the initial survey findings at Employers Connect, its 5th annual summit on workplace mental health being held in five cities across Canada on Wednesday, January 27, 2016.

# ALBERTA RCMP CHARGE SHERIFF WITH DANGEROUS DRIVING

The RCMP have charged an Alberta Traffic Sheriff with four counts of Dangerous Driving under the Criminal Code of Canada, and two counts of Driving at an Unreasonable Rate of Speed under the province's Traffic Safety Act. The charges relate to six separate on-duty driving offences occurring between May and October 2015 on highways in the Edson and Jasper area.

The charges result from an Oc-

tober 2015 internal review of operations by Alberta Traffic Sheriff Operations. Irregularities noted in that review were forwarded to the RCMP for investigation. No accidents or injuries arose from any of the alleged offences. The Traffic Sheriff was working out of Edson at the time of the offences as part of an integrated traffic enforcement unit with the RCMP.

Charged is Sean Myher, of Edson, Alberta with:

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# ENERGY EAST DESERVES SUPPORT

On January 28th a motion by our Conservative Caucus was presented in the House of Commons to recognize the importance of the energy sector to the Canadian economy and support

its development by supporting the Energy East pipeline. The project is backed by the governments of Alberta, Saskatchewan, Ontario and New Brunswick and would dramatically cut the amount of oil traveling by rail each day and scale back our dependence on foreign oil.

Thousands of Canadians contribute to our economy through the natural resource sector. At a time when our economy is struggling, the Liberal government needs to stand up for these Canadians and take a clear position in favour of Energy East. The oil and gas sector directly and

indirectly employs over 360,000 people in Canada, accounting for almost 8% of GDP in 2013, while Energy East alone is expected to generate \$10 billion in taxes for all levels of government. Our country ranks third in the world for proven crude oil reserves, and 73,000 existing kilometers of pipeline carry over \$100 billion of natural gas, oil and petroleum products safely every year.

From 2008 to 2013 more than 99.99 percent of oil transported by federally regulated pipelines was done so safely, and thanks to the previous Conservative government, companies are liable for up to \$1 billion of costs and damages, irrespective of fault. Pipelines are the most environmentally responsible way to transport our oil, and Energy East will displace the equivalent of over 1,500 rail cars traveling the same route each day.

Approximately 700,000 barrels of oil are imported every day to refineries in Eastern Canada, coming from countries such as Saudi Arabia, Venezuela and Nigeria. The Energy East project would strengthen Canada's energy security by decreasing our dependence on authoritarian regimes with poor human rights records, rampant corruption and deficient environmental controls. Most of Western Canada's oil production is exported to the United States, and 97% of our oil exports went there in 2013. Energy East will create access to higher value international markets which will further support the Canadian economy.

In my view, it makes no sense to import foreign oil while Canada is blessed with an abundance of natural resources here at home. Instead of turning his back on the thousands of hard-working Canadians who keep our economy moving, many of whom are now struggling to find work, Prime Minister Trudeau must show leadership and unwavering support for this project.

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# GYPSD POLICY DEVELOPMENT FOR LGBTQ+ STUDENTS, PARENTS/GUARDIANS AND STAFF, AND ALL SCHOOL COMMUNITY MEMBERS

Over the last few weeks, there has been a lot of conversation and discussion about the need for school divisions to draft up new policies recognizing the specific need for protection of the LGBTQ+ population in schools. The following document has been developed with the

intent of providing some answers to frequently asked questions asked within our communities about the reasons why there is a specific need and in the hopes of building understanding of the unique challenges they face on a daily basis. Grande Yellowhead Public School Division's Board of Trustees encourages all stakeholders to forward feed-

back on the draft policy to board@gypsd.ca for their consideration. The draft policy can be viewed on the division's website at www.gypsd.ca.

At Grande Yellowhead Public School Division, we believe that all members of the school community have the right to learn and work in an environment free of discrimina-

tion, prejudice, and harassment.

These rights are protected under the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, Alberta Human Rights Act, and Alberta School Act.

These rights are reflected in our policies and administrative procedures:

- AP 175 Harassment and Abuse of Students and Staff;
- AP 215 Inclusive Education;
- AP 310 Safe and Caring Schools;
- AP 315 Student Threat Assessment;
- AP 316 Division-Wide Bullying Prevention;
- AP 350 Student Conduct;
- Policy 23 Health and Wellness

Together with our commitment of providing an inclusive environment where all students, staff and community members feel respected, we all share the responsibility for cultivating environments that welcome everyone inclusive of:

- Physical or mental ability
- Sexual orientation
- Gender identity and gender expression
- Cultural and linguistic diversity
- Race, ancestry or gender
- Religious beliefs
- Socio-economic status or
- Family composition

Did you know?

While many individuals identify as LGBTQ+, approximately only 0.3% of the population identify as transgender or gender non-conforming.

According to the nobullying.com website (as of Dec 2015):

- 86% of LGBTQ+ youth report being harassed at school compared to 27% of all students being bullied;
- 64% felt unsafe at school due to sexual orientation;
- 32% did not go to school for at least one day because of feeling unsafe and are 5 times more likely to miss school due to bullying;
- 44% experienced physical harassment & 22% experienced stronger violence HOWEVER 61% never reported the attacks;

• 42% have experienced cyber bullying which is 3 times higher than other students and 33% have received sexual harassment online which is 4 times higher than other students;

• LGBTQ+ youth are 2-3 times more likely to attempt suicide than other teens and 8 times more likely if they do not receive family support;

• 50% experience a negative environment at home if they tell their parents with 26% forced out of their homes;

• Up to 50% of the youth that are homeless are LGBTQ+ youth;

• 42% live in a hostile environment where they are not accepted.

Frequently Asked Questions for Parents/Guardians

FAQ#1 Why are there special guidelines for this one particular group?

Sexual orientation, gender identity

and gender expression are protected rights under the Alberta Human Rights Act. Additionally, Bill 10 and the new Provincial Guidelines released on January 13, 2016, direct school boards to have policies and practices in place to protect the rights of LGBTQ+ students, families and staff, and to enhance the safety of and learning conditions for LGBTQ+ students.

FAQ#2 What are the new Guidelines for Best Practices: Creating Learning Environments that Respect Diverse Sexual Orientations, Gender Identities and Gender Expressions?

In January, 2016, Alberta Education released new guidelines for school boards to use in creating their own policies/guidelines to support lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer/questioning (LGBTQ+) students, families and staff. All school boards in Alberta are directed to use these guidelines to inform their own policies/guidelines by March 31, 2016. Note: If you have

specific questions/concerns about the provincial guidelines, please contact Alberta Education directly.

FAQ# 3 What will the new guidelines and a new GYPSPD policy mean for my school and my child?

The provincial guidelines share best practices for boards to consider when drafting specific policies and/or procedures for their school communities. Although our Board felt it important to draft a specific policy to support LGBTQ+ youth in light of the real challenges they experience, we will continue to support all our students, families and staff in a manner consistent with building safe, respecting, welcoming and caring environments for all. In particular, to acknowledge the right of students to self-identify, the right to form Gay-Straight Alliances in schools as mandated per the Guidelines, and to have access to a gender-neutral space, identify a safe contact at the school for those youth at risk, and have their confidentiality and privacy protected.

FAQ#4 What information will be shared when a student makes a disclosure?

Grande Yellowhead always encourages our staff to engage in open communication with parents/guardians about the education, health and well-being of their children. We firmly believe that learning is enhanced by parents/guardians and school staff communicating and working together thus we encourage collaboration between the school and home as much as possible.

Some LGBTQ+ students are not open about their sexual or gender identity. Given the sensitivity related to one's gender identity and sexual orientation, GYPSPD staff members will engage in thoughtful and considerate discussions with the students identifying as LGBTQ+ to provide resources and supports that may be needed for them and their families.

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


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# Auto TUNE-UP

## WAXING 101: WHAT TO KNOW BEFORE WAXING YOUR CAR

Waxing a car is a great way to maintain its exterior. Including waxing as part of your routine vehicle maintenance can protect the car or truck from some natural hazards, including sun damage, pollen and the dirt and grime that can accumulate on a car over time.

Motorists unfamiliar with waxing may be intimidated by the sheer volume of waxes on the shelves at their local automotive supply stores, which will no doubt offer an array of both liquid and paste waxes as well as many spray waxes. When testing waxes in 2013, Consumer Reports found that liquid and paste waxes were relatively equal with regard to their effectiveness, while spray waxes were very convenient though not very durable.

Waxing a vehicle is no small task,

and drivers should learn as much as they can about car wax and the different types of waxes before attempting the job themselves.

The differences between waxes

In their study of liquid, paste and spray waxes, Consumer Reports found that paste waxes were easier to apply than liquid waxes, but that the overall performance of paste waxes fell short of liquid waxes. Liquid waxes were very durable and provided the gloss many motorists look for when waxing their vehicles. But liquid waxes were difficult to apply evenly, something first timers should consider when choosing a wax. Spray waxes were convenient and easy to use, and many can be wiped off without drying. But Consumer Reports found spray waxes were not as durable as

liquid or paste waxes, so they may need to be applied more frequently.

Because waxing is done to protect a car and improve its appearance, it's important that drivers waxing their vehicles for the first time test the wax on an area of their vehicles that is not easily seen to the naked eye. This affords some room for error as you learn the waxing ropes while also allowing you to test out different waxes until you find the right fit.

There are some additional tricks drivers can employ when waxing their vehicles that can make the job easier and the wax that much more effective.

• Wash first, then wax. Make sure you give your car or truck a good wash before you apply any wax. Allow the car to dry completely be-

fore applying any wax.

• Avoid sunlight. Consumer Reports notes that sunlight can soften paint and make it susceptible to scratching, so avoid washing and waxing your car in direct sunlight.

• Use microfiber towels. Microfiber towels were found to be more effective than cloth rags at removing residue. In addition, cloth rags can trap dirt and scratch finishes, so opt for lamb's wool mitts instead.

• Go from top to bottom. The bottom of a vehicle is more susceptible to grime, so work your way down when waxing so you are not contaminating your towels. A contaminated towel increases the risk of scratching your vehicle's exterior.

When waxing your vehicle, the right wax and technique can make all the difference.

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# Auto TUNE-UP

## SIMPLE WAYS TO TRIM AUTO INSURANCE COSTS

The cost of owning an automobile extends beyond maintenance and fueling costs. One of the biggest expenses motorists must plan for is auto insurance, the cost of which can vary greatly depending on geography and driver history.

But no matter where drivers live or what their histories are, there are some simple ways for drivers to save money on their monthly insurance premiums.

- Reassess your driving habits. Auto insurance companies consider how many miles drivers drive per year when determining the cost

of an insurance policy. Many drivers provide this information when opening a policy, but then never update it when renewing or extending their policies. If you drive less now than you did when you opened your policy, notify your insurance company and you might end up paying less each month, especially if your daily commute is considerably shorter than it used to be.

- Check your credit rating. Another way to save money on your auto insurance is to check your credit rating and, if necessary, take

steps to improve your credit score. Credit rating is another variable insurance companies use to determine drivers' premiums, and a good credit rating can save drivers a substantial amount of money on their policies. If your credit rating has improved since you opened your policy, contact your insurance company and you might see the cost of your insurance reduced dramatically. It's also good to periodically view your credit report to determine if there are any errors that are negatively affecting your rating. Such errors may be inflat-

ing your auto insurance premiums.

- Hit the books. No matter how many years you have behind the wheel, your auto insurance company may offer you discounts if you periodically take defensive driving courses. Such classes are inexpensive, but they may save you as much as 10 percent on the cost of your auto insurance policy. Young, inexperienced drivers and seniors tend to benefit from defensive driving courses more than other drivers.

- Change your policy. Drivers also can save money by making changes to their policies. Raising your deductible is perhaps the easiest way to save money without affecting your coverage, and such a decision can save you as much as 15 percent depending on how high a deductible you're willing to pay. Drivers whose cars are older and completely paid off might want to drop their collision insurance, which pays you if your car is damaged or destroyed in an accident. Such insurance won't yield much in return if your car is not worth much money, and dropping it from your policy can save you between 10 and 15 percent.

Auto insurance is a necessity for drivers of all ages, but there are several ways to cut the costs of insurance premiums without affecting coverage.

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
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# YELLOWHEAD COUNTY COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

New Wildwood Legion Bus – Council had an opportunity to view the new Wildwood Community Connector Bus that will be formally unveiled on May 6 at the Grand Opening of the new Wildwood Veteran’s Park. Yellowhead County contributed \$42,000 to Wildwood’s Royal Canadian Legion Branch No. 149 through a capital funding grant towards the new \$90,000 bus that is replacing the older twenty-four year old bus.

Amended Fire Services Bylaw – Yellowhead County’s amended Fire Services Bylaw 3.16 was passed by Council. Changes include new and updated definitions; detailed information on department membership processes; and now defines the Yellowhead Coun-

ty Fire Department as a combined entity encompassing all the fire stations across the county. It also includes a fee schedule for motor vehicle incidents that reflects Alberta Transportation’s current fee schedule.

AB Transportation Request for Support –A letter of Support from Yellowhead County Council will be sent to Alberta Transportation in support of a proposed speed limit reduction for an 800 metre section adjacent to Fulham School on Highway 32 on either side of the existing pedestrian activated crosswalk. The proposed speed limit would be 70 km/h instead of the current 100 km/hr and would be in effect from September 1 to June 30 between 8:00 AM and 4:30 PM. This area is not deemed a school zone by Alberta Transportation.

Intermunicipal Meeting Proposed – Yellowhead County Council has agreed

to a tentative intermunicipal meeting with the Town of Edson Council to discuss various issues of importance between the two municipalities in order to work towards better regional cooperation on matters that affect both municipalities.

Elk River Road Grader Beat Tender –Council awarded a five year tender for the supply and operation of a motor grader for the Elk River Road grader beat to RodeCo in the amount of: \$115/hr for the first and second year; and \$119/hr for the third, fourth, and fifth year.

Frac Sand Company Requires Rezoning – Council passed Bylaw 27.15, for the rezoning of leased crown land west of Marlboro on Hwy 16 that was previously used as an Alberta Transportation gravel pit. The rezoning of this area from Forestry District to a Rural Industrial District would facilitate a proposed frac

sand loading facility at that location. Sil Industrial Materials had submitted an application to change the zoning of this property as part of their development application.

Land Leased for Grazing Purposes – Council approved a five year lease to Jean Wright at the agricultural rate of \$18.00 per year (\$90.00 for the five year term) for a period of March 1, 2016 to February 28, 2021 for 0.5 acres adjacent to the landowner’s property. The approved lease will provide the landowner with additional land for the grazing of their animals. As a requirement of the lease, the landowner would be responsible for fencing the entire property.

The next Council Meetings are March 8 & 22, 2016. The next Committee of the Whole Council Meeting is March 21, 2016. All meetings start at 9:30 a.m. in the Council Chambers.

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# TIPPLE PARK MUSEUM GRAND OPENING

On Friday February 19, 2016 over 130 members of the public and dignitaries attended the Grand Opening of the new Evansburg museum to officially open its doors to the community.

The Tipple Park Museum, a purpose-built building, is centrally located in the Hamlet of Evansburg where the Pembina Lobstick Historical Society can showcase their local history and welcome visitors and tourists to the area. It will also provide a place for community group meetings and various other community events.

**Budget and Cost:**

Funding was provided by Yellowhead County in the amount of \$2,370,253 for the planning, design, and construction of the new building and lot, as well as contributions made by the Provincial Government through a CFEP grant for interior furniture and window coverings and through fundraising done by the Pembina Lobstick Historical Society.

**Features:**

- Museum areas for artifact display, museum storage, and archival storage,
- A workshop for museum staff to repair objects and to prepare exhibits for display,
- A tourist information area,
- A multi-purpose room, reception area, office, kitchen, washrooms, and meeting room.

Alastair Cockburn Architect Ltd. was retained by Yellowhead County to pro-

vide consulting services to prepare a building concept plan for a museum/park amenities building in Evansburg. These were then reviewed with Yellowhead County and the Pembina Lobstick Historical Society, with revisions being made to reflect that input.

The building was designed by Barr Ryder Architects and Interior Designers, with construction of the building completed by Theirman Construction Ltd.; both of Edmonton, Alberta.

The museum will be operated by the Pembina Lobstick Historical Society and will feature rotating temporary displays, with both seasonal and travelling exhibits.

All rooms associated with the museum (archive, display room, storage room and work room) feature humidity controlled climates to assist in the proper storage of artifacts.

The archive room will be available by appointment for members of the public to complete historical research with the society's help and resources.

The location and orientation of the new facility essentially mirrors that of the old Station House. The new facility is also orientated to provide access to the washrooms from Tipple Park. The design of the new facility was developed in accordance with the Evansburg Streetscape Plan that is part of Yellowhead County's Area Structure Plan for the hamlet.

The multi-purpose area, kitchen and meeting room will be available for event rentals and will be the future home of the Evansburg Farmers' Market.



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
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
