Operated by the dedication of many volunteers who oversee all the many functions of the Heritage Village Park from fundraising, project overviews, construction, restoration, hosting a table at the Farmers Markets, running a Meat Draw Raffle at the Alberta Beach Hotel every Saturday, Collection and Curating, preservation and reports and general cleanup and maintenance of the buildings. The Heritage Village Park is open to the public from July 1 to the September long weekend, 6 days a week. While closed for the winter, the members busy themselves with what lies ahead to ensure our position in the community as a valued tourist attraction and historical learning facility. There were two raffle draws. (Thanks Frieda's daughter Delores for her ongoing support of decorating and putting the baskets together) The Museum had a table and presence at the Farmers Market every Sunday (thanks Mildred, Frieda, Vivian and Maxine who gave up their Sundays May through October and one in December). When you are committed to every week, that is more than a Volunteer, that's unpaid labour! We also hosted a School tour in June.

Our Scavenger Hunt has been very well received by the kids that visit us. It is a lot of fun for them to find historical items listed that are spread amongst each building and be rewarded with a penny for each item they found correctly. They then spend their pennies on Jar Candies!!! So it also teaches a bit of Math as well as getting them involved in the history of the area and the artifacts.

Overall, we were very busy this year and we should be proud of all that we have accomplished. There was a total of 1095 recorded visitors (those that signed the guest book) and we had \$1469 in cash donations. Some other donations were made by CN Rail on behalf of retired employees or their families. A grant was received from CLSA for \$1000 to help offset some of the utility costs. Most all of our operating funds come from the sales of articles either on site or at the farmers markets, the money made on the weekly meat draws, donations from visitors and members and grants and casino's when available.

We hosted a volunteer Dinner in December as a token of our appreciation for all that the volunteers do for us. Some of the meal was donated by Momma's Restaurant so we thank them for that.

Another example of community support is the Donated Labour and Materials from Dave's Painting. He has taken it upon himself to pick a project every year and work on it. His support is so appreciated.

While we recognize ALL members play a significant part of keeping the Museum vibrant, there are those that dedicate a lot of their time in the everyday maintenance and operation, cleaning and polishing, flowers and yard work, (Thanks Les for your hours in keeping the grass cut). The maintenance checkups on our utilities and the condition of the buildings was also ongoing and thanks to Bill Nicols for managing that. We would really like to take this opportunity to thank ALL those members of our organization and the members of our community and to let them know that all of

their efforts do not go unnoticed. The organization and community as a whole is indebted.

Looking forward to next year we will hopefully be hosting the Silent Auction and Art Exhibit, Compile Seniors stories, host an event for our 40th Anniversary of Incorporation, finish the Red & White Store, landscaping and community awareness.

We all look forward to 2016 and hope for more Community Awareness and Support.

free Savings Account (TFSA) contribution. MONTHLY UPDATE OF THE GROWTH ALBERTA BOARD

The following report provides a brief overview of the Board meeting of the Grizzly Regional Economic Alliance Society held February 29, 2016.

BROADBAND DELEGATION:

There was a presentation about a broadband project by Rick Bastow from Alberta Economic Development and Trade, Regional Economic Development Branch. He outlined a project the branch is undertaking and collaborating with REDAs and the University of Alberta to develop a "broadband toolkit". The product with provide a general information resource for stakeholders such as Municipal politicians to get an understanding of broadband and its importance to economic development. Timing of the development is in the 2016-2017 fiscal year ending March 31, 2017.

GROWTH ALBERTA STRATE-GIC THEME & INITIATIVE RE-VIEW

Youth Retention (Growing Opportunities School Expo)

Administration is still working to secure community and region-

al stakeholders to lead the project so that the Growing Opportunities School Expo will continue.

Business Awards of Excellence

April 1, 2016 we will begin to accept Business of Excellence Nominations for 2016.

Tourism Development

An arrangement was made with Great West News that will enable the WILD Tourism guide to be published and distributed again this year. The project will see the project cost reduced, number of units refined to 15,000 and Great West News assisting with distribution channels.

The new WILD Alberta website



design with Strong Coffee has begun. Strong Coffee will be writing new content for the website as well. The new website will be launched in May, 2016. Tourism operators and stakeholders will be consulted during the re-development of the site to ensure enhanced functionality and that the new site meets their needs.

Investment Readiness Collateral Package

The Alberta HUB Investment Readiness Collateral package was put together by administration for members to look over and decide if this project has value for GROWTH Alberta.

Broadband Readiness Initiative

GROWTH Alberta is collaborating with 5 northern Alberta REDAs, the Northern Alberta Development Council and Community Futures Yellowhead East to develop a broadband inventory, gap identification and potential internet strategies for all of Northern Alberta. Alberta Economic Development & Trade has made a 1:1 funding model available up to \$20,000 per REDA to complete the project. The end result will entail a finite summary of broadband inventory for Northern Alberta and also specific to the GROWTH Alberta region. GROWTH Alberta will sit on the project steering committee to ensure any specific member questions and needs are brought forward for inclusion in the project. Timing of the development is in the 2016-2017 fiscal year ending March 31, 2017.

PRIVATE MEMBERS' BILL C-246

Submitted by Jim Eglinski, MP – Yellowhead

Liberal MP Nathaniel Erskine-Smith tabled Bill C-246, 'An Act to amend the Criminal Code, the Fisheries Act, the Textile Labelling Act, the Wild Animal and Plant Protection and Regulation of International and Interprovincial Trade Act and the Canada Consumer Product Safety Act (animal protection).'

I believe in the importance of the humane treatment of animals. However, this bill goes far beyond what could be considered a reasonable strengthening of animal protection laws. The implications of this bill are significant to many Canadians, including farmers, ranchers, anglers, and hunters. If passed, this bill could also have significant effects on Canada's economy and impact the way of life of millions of Canadians.

Bill C-246 appears to criminalize the following activities:

• A person waiting too long to put their animal down (in someone else's opinion) [182.2 (1)(a)]

• Any animal being killed by a human for any reason – "brutally or viciously, regardless of whether the animal dies immediately" appears to apply to all methods of killing an animal other than veterinarian chemical cocktails. This has implications for hunting, fishing, trapping and possibly livestock production. [182.2 (1)(b)]

• Accidental poisoning is not explicitly excluded, so failure to attend to a leak or spill of a toxic substance such as antifreeze could be a criminal act [182.2 (1) (d)]

• Training a dog to protect livestock or humans from predators. [182.2 (1)(e)

• Accidentally killing an animal with a vehicle if the driver was negligent in some way [182.3 (1) (a) and (c)]

This bill is fundamentally flawed and dangerous. I intend to review it carefully and ensure that the implications do not endanger the farmers, hunters and meat producers within the riding.

TYPES OF SUNROOFS

Today's vehicles are equipped with more amenities than ever before. Drivers willing to spend a little extra can now cruise down the highways in vehicles equipped with built-in WiFi and cameras that allow drivers to see everything around their cars and trucks. While new gadgets attract drivers' attention, sunroofs, which have been around since 1937, remain very popular as well. Drivers who like to allow a little light and fresh air into their vehicles may be surprised to learn that there are many different types of sunroofs. The following are a just a handful of sunroof options drivers may want to consider when buying their next vehicle.

Top-mount: Drivers who want a top-mount sliding sunroof may be able to find both manual and electric sliding options. In a top-mount sunroof, a large glass slides on tracks on top of the roof, and many feature integral wind deflectors that eliminate noise from the wind no matter how fast the car is traveling.

Panoramic roof systems: Like their name implies, panoramic roof systems provide a wider view than other sunroofs. That view is available whether the sunroof is open or closed, and panoramic systems are typically made of glass. Passengers in both the front and rear seats can enjoy the view through panoramic roof systems.

Spoiler: Spoiler sunroofs are also known as tilt-and-slide, and these sunroofs are a popular builtin factory option. The view through a spoiler sunroof is not as wide as that of a panoramic system, but they tilt to vent and slide open, so passenger headroom is not typically affected by their presence.

Inbuilt: Inbuilt sunroofs are common in luxury vehicles. With an inbuilt sunroof, the panel slides open between the metal roof and interior headliner. That creates a full opening, but it takes away some headroom. Unlike imported models that use painted steel, American-made inbuilt sunroofs typically use a glass slider, which provides a view whether the sunroof is open or closed.

Pop-up: Pop-up sunroofs are

compatible with many vehicles, and they are among the least expensive options to install. Pop-up sunroofs are manually operated tilting panels that typically are made of glass. Panels must be stored when removed, but they also can be tilted to provide a venting effect.







HOW TO HANDLE CAR TROUBLE WHILE DRIVING

Sudden car trouble is something no driver wants to experience, but many a driver has been driving down the highway only to feel his or her vehicle start to sputter. Such sputtering might indicate a car is running low on fuel, or it could be a sign of something more serious that requires motorists to think as quickly and safely as possible.

When car trouble strikes while a vehicle is on the road, the first thing many drivers do is check



their fuel gauges. A car that runs out of gas is certainly inconvenient, but if you can pull over to the shoulder or make it to the nearest filling station, then this unfortunate situation can be remedied rather easily. But when a car's tank is full and it is still showing signs of trouble, drivers must take steps to protect themselves, their passengers and their vehicles. The following are a few simple tips motorists should keep in mind so they can safely handle any car trouble that may arise while they are out on the road.

• Keep a first-aid kit, spare tire and tire jack in the car at all times. Flat tires are no fun, but they are even more of a nuisance when drivers are not prepared to address them. Always keep a jack and spare tire in your car, even if the spare is a donut you can temporarily use to replace a flat tire until you make it to a filling station or automotive supply store. As an added safety measure, keep a fully stocked first aid kit in your vehicle in case you cut yourself while changing the tire or need to address another medical situation. Visit www.redcross.org for a list of items to include in your automotive emergency kit. Keep a blanket in the trunk as well so your passengers can stay warm should you experience car trouble on a cold day or night.

• Make note of your surroundings. Some car troubles can only be fixed by the professionals, so pay careful attention to your surroundings in case

an issue arises and forces you to pull over and call for help. Always pay attention to mile markers and any landmarks that might help you describe where you are. Car troubles can strike at any time and anywhere, so be sure to pay special attention to your surroundings when driving in unfamiliar areas.

Pull over. Don't panic if an issue arises suddenly. Remain calm and pull over onto the shoulder. The right shoulder is the area for pulling over on most roads, but you may also use the left shoulder on multilane highways with medians. Try to get as far away from traffic as possible without driving off of level ground, and always use your signals when pulling onto the shoulder. If the vehicle can't make it to the median, put your emergency flashers on and get out of the car, moving away from both the vehicle and traffic. Immediately call for emergency roadside assistance, alerting the authorities if need be.

Use flares or triangles to alert other drivers. So long as you are not risking your well-being, you can place flares and/or warning triangles behind your vehicle so oncoming traffic knows to drive around it. The popular not-for-profit motor club AAA recommends placing the first flare or triangle 10 feet directly behind the side of the vehicle that is closest to the road. The second should be placed between 30 and 60 feet (increase the distances as the posted speed limit increases) behind the middle of the bumper, while the third flare or triangle should be placed between 120 and 360 feet behind the vehicle's right side.

Once you have called for help and set up flares or triangles, stay with the vehicle, though do so at a safe enough distance so you are not in harm's way.

PARLIAMENT UPDATE – WEEK OF MARCH 7

This week in Parliament, we covered topics from income tax, to citizenship and immigration.

• The Liberal Government's Motion on Canada's contribution to the effort to combat ISIL was passed in Parliament. This officially confirmed the recall of our fighter jets.

• Bill C-2, An Act to amend the Income Tax Act, was debated this week. This bill will adjust tax rates and reduce the annual contribution limit for tax-free savings accounts from \$10,000 to only \$5,500.

• As well, Bill C-6, An Act to

amend the Citizenship Act and to make consequential amendments to another Act, was debated. This bill will make several changes, including removing the grounds for the revocation of Canadian citizenship that relate to national security.

• A new Government bill was introduced -- Bill C-7, An Act to amend the Public Service Labour Relations Act, the Public Service Labour Relations and Employment Board Act and other Acts and to provide for certain other measures. Under this bill, more than 17,000 Mounties will be permitted to form a national union but will not have the right to strike. • Conservative MP Arnold Viersen tabled his Motion (M-47) regarding online violent and degrading sexually explicit material.

• The Government tabled their 2016 Immigration Levels Plan which includes massive cuts to immigration streams vital to our economic growth. For more information, please see: http://news.gc.ca/ web/article-en.do?nid=1038699

• This week, the Environment and Sustainable Development Committee (ENVI) began a review of the Canadian Environmental Protection Act, 1999. We heard from senior officials from Health Canada, Environment Canada, Ecojustice Canada, Environmental Defence Canada, and the Chemistry Industry Association of Canada.
