EVANSBURG RCMP LAY CHARGES OF KIDNAPPING AND FORCIBLE CONFINEMENT

Wildwood, Alberta - On April 25, 2016 at approximately 5:00 PM the RCMP responded to a call in the rural area of Evansburg. The caller stated a women had been taken from a home, at gunpoint. The suspect left the area in a vehicle.

The caller provided details of the suspect vehicle and RCMP located the vehicle near Spruce Grove, Alberta. The officer activated emergency equipment and the suspect continued travelling at a high rate of speed. The RCMP in Stony Plain were able to deploy a Tire Deflation Device and the vehicle was eventually stopped without further incident.

The female victim was treated for minor injuries and the suspect was taken into police custody after a brief foot chase.

No one else was injured in the incident.

As a result of this investigation, RCMP have charged 40 year old, Collin Hughes of Devon, Alberta with the following offences:

Hughes has been held in custody and will make his first court appearance on Wednesday, April 27 2016 at the Stony Plain Provincial Court House.

What do a can of sardines, avocado oil from the health store, and seaweed from the beach have in common? They all contain omega-3 fats. Omega-3 fats are important for long-term health, and our bodies can't make them, so we need to eat food that contains them.

We've known for a while that omega-3 fats are important for

lowering your risk of heart disease—by reducing blood pressure and inflammation, helping to keep blood vessels from stiffening, preventing blood clots, and lowering triglycerides (a type of fat in your blood). They're also important for brain and eye development during pregnancy and infancy. More studies are needed to know if omega-3 fats might help rheumatoid arthritis, mental health, or other diseases. Where can you get omega-3 fats?

The best place to get omega-3 fats is from food. Fatty fish have the highest amounts of EPA and DHA, the omega-3 fats most important for health. Fatty fish include salmon, mackerel, sardines, trout Arctic char, and herring. Try to eat at least 2 servings of fish a week to get the recommended intake of 0.5 g per day.

If you don't eat fish, try kelp and seaweed. (Instead of comb-



ing beaches for it, you can buy seaweed as wakame.)

Some people may have trouble meeting their EPA and DHA needs from food. If you're thinking about taking a supplement, talk to your doctor, pharmacist, or a dietitian before you begin. They can tell you about what type of supplement to take and how much would be best for you. If you decide to take a supplement, choose one that contains EPA and DHA, not other fats (like ALA). Also, look for one with a Drug Identification Number (DIN) or a Natural Product Number (NPN) on the bottle

Some yogurt and eggs contain EPA and DHA; read package labels to find out which brands. Nuts and oils like walnuts, canola oil, and flaxseed oil can add to your intake of omega-3 fats. Keep in mind that nuts and oils are high in calories; choose small amounts of them (30 to 45 grams a day).

A male was reporting that his credit card had been used that morning at the Onoway Feed and Seed to purchase numerous ranch supplies. RCMP obtained a description of the male suspect who had used the card and the vehicle with trailer that he was driving at the time.

Later that day a vehicle and trailer matching the description of the suspect vehicle was stopped by police near a rural residence, both the truck and trailer were found to be stolen. THE PROVINCE INTRODUCES COVERAGE FOR SPECIAL INFANT FORMULA

The Alberta government has listened to the concerns of families and will provide coverage for medically required, specialized infant formula beginning May 1.

Government-sponsored benefit programs will provide coverage for Neocate infant formula when an infant is unable to tolerate common infant formula because of a complex food allergy or a specific medical condition. The average cost of Neocate is about \$690 each month.

"Some babies have to rely on specialized infant formulas to meet their nutritional needs. But these formulas are costly, medically necessary and, in many cases, cause families considerable financial hardship. After speaking with these parents and hearing about the financial strain they are under, our government decided this coverage should be provided. It's the right thing to do."

Brandy Payne, Associate Minister of Health

Some children have serious gastrointestinal medical conditions or suffer from malabsorption and cannot eat typical foods. These children usually require expensive, specialized formulas.

To be eligible for coverage, Neocate must be prescribed by, or in consultation with, a pediatrician, a neonatologist or a pediatric gastroenterologist. Families must apply for government's non-group coverage to get this benefit. A monthly premium ranging from \$82 to \$118 and a co-payment of up to \$25 per prescription will also be required.

Below are a few simple stretching techniques that can help prevent or reduce the impact of injuries:

Side bending stretch

1. Stand with feet shoulder-width apart.

2. Hold the golf club above your head with your arms straight.

3. Slowly bend to one side, without rotating, until you feel a stretch in the side of your back.

4. Hold for 15 seconds and repeat twice for each side.

Shoulder stretch

1. Hold the shaft of a golf club vertically behind your back.

2. Gently pull the club up with your top hand until you feel a slight stretch in the shoulder of your lower arm. Hold for 15 seconds.

3. Gently pull the club down with your bottom hand until you feel a

stretch in the top shoulder and arm. 4. Hold for 15 seconds. 5. Reverse hand positions and re-

tributed \$1,032,282 to 650 volunteer organizations as 16,245 volunteers helped clean up more than 11,400 kilometres of Alberta roadways.

Volunteer organizations include 4-H clubs, Scouts, Girl Guides, Rotary clubs, sports teams and various non-profit groups. Groups must register with the province as non-profit organizations to participate. Organizations can earn between \$81 and \$101 per kilometre cleaned, with the higher amount going to those groups cleaning highways closer to urban centres, which tend to have more trash accumulated.

Anyone over the age of nine is welcome to participate in the cleanup and more information can be received by calling 310-0000 toll-free or by visiting the Annual Highway Cleanup website.

Motorists are asked to slow down, obey signs and be cautious when passing cleanup crews. Pedestrians are discouraged from randomly walking the highways, and anyone involved in the cleanup is asked to be aware, make sure they are visible, and obey all traffic signs.

Volunteers will be wearing bright orange safety vests and will be out from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. They must attend a safety training program and be under adult supervision.

BULLYING Tips for Dealing With Bullying

1) Take complaints of bullying seriously. Do not dismiss your child or expect your child to work through the situation alone.

2) Praise your child for reporting bullying situations to you and assure your child you will take action.

3) Talk to your child's teacher, counselor, or other caregiver about reports of bullying.

4) Work together to address the bullying situation. Don't confront the parents of the bully directly.

5) Ask your child specific questions about how your child is treated by peers, who he or she eats lunch with, and how other children are treated.

6) Teach your child to be assertive. Your child should be able to express feelings and needs clearly, without shouting or other aggressive behavior.



7) Provide opportunities for your child to make friends. Identify some of your child's interests and encourage your child to pursue them through sports, clubs, or other group activities.

8) Teach your child to identify bullying behaviors. These include hitting, damaging possessions, threatening, name calling, & excluding someone

SEEING GREEN: HOW TO HELP YOUR LAWN BOUNCE BACK FROM WINTER

Lawns are exposed to the elements throughout the year, and each season brings its own unique set of challenges. Summer heat waves can make it hard for lawns to maintain their lush green appeal, while the falling leaves of autumn can threaten root systems if not handled properly. Winter frost and snow also can pose a threat to lawns, leaving homeowners with some work to do when spring arrives.

Spring is a season of revival, and that spirit of rejuvenation extends to lawns. When the last vestiges of winter begin to disappear, homeowners can dust off their gardening gloves and start taking steps to revitalize their lawns for the months ahead.

· Look for signs of damage. Winter can be hard on lawns, so it's important for homeowners to look for signs of damage before they begin planning any springtime land-

scaping projects. Salt damage can occur in areas that received heavy snowfall over the winter. Many communities use rock salt to de-ice snow- and ice-covered roads, and that rock salt is largely made up of sodium chloride, which can draw moisture from grass and cause it to brown. Salt trucks used during winter storms often spit salt out onto lawns, so don't be surprised if you notice brown spots on your grass, especially in those areas closest to the road. Winter lawn damage may also be caused by voles, burrowing mouse-like rodents that make paths beneath the snow to hide from predators and feed on grass blades and roots. Lawns with distinctly matted areas may also have been damaged by snow mold that can weaken turf.

· Consult a professional landscaper. Homeowners with considerable experience tending to damaged lawns can no doubt identify and ad-

dress problems on their own. That's because many problems are a result of the weather, which tends to be similar and produce similar problems from one year to the next. But inexperienced homeowners should consult professional landscapers before attempting to address problems on their own. Winter lawn damage may be caused by a variety of factors that can produce similar symptoms, and professional landscapers can identify the culprits behind such damage and provide the most effective solutions to restore the lawn.

Remove debris. A light raking can help remove any debris that accumulated over the winter. Such debris, which may include fallen branches and fallen leaves left behind from the final days of fall, can prevent lawns from getting the sun and water they need to thrive. Remove this debris, but make sure the grass is not frozen when you do, as walking on frozen grass can cause further damage.

Let the grass grow. Mowing the lawn is a chore that's reserved for spring, summer and maybe early fall, but it's important that homeowners don't jump the gun and mow too early after winter. A patient approach allows the grass to reestablish itself, so let it grow a little higher than you normally would before the first cut. When the grass is roughly 4.5 inches high, you can cut it down to three inches and then maintain your normal mowing routine throughout the rest of spring and summer.

Revitalizing lawns in springtime is a priority for many homeowners, who should always consult landscaping professionals if they feel uncertain about addressing any damage they discover during their post-winter lawn inspections.

2016 Budget Passed The Yellowhead

The Yellowhead County 2016 final budget was adopted by Council in the amount of \$142,212,459.

This includes:

Cost & Revenue Sharing with municipal partners: \$11.7 million Seniors Requisition: \$3.7 million

School Requisition: \$23.8 million

Municipal Operations: \$36.7 million

Capital Funding: \$66 million

There will be no tax increase in the MUNICIPAL mill rate. It remains at 2.4585 for residential and farmland; and at 6.3658 for non-residential.

The Seniors Foundation requisition and the Provincial School requisitions have both increased. The Seniors Requisition mill rate is .3939; and the School Requisition is at 2.532 for residential and 3.7061 for nonresidential.

Public Hearing for Bylaw 7.16 – A public hearing was held for Bylaw 7.16 for the closure of a portion of road adjacent to Highway 16 near Jasper Park gates. The closure allows the property to be consolidated with the landowner's surrounding properties. The landowner would be respon-

Alberta Northern Rockies -Morgan Roberts, the Destination Management Facilitator for the Alberta Northern Rockies Tourism Alliance (ANRTA) made a presentation to Council highlighting their proposed three year Destination Management Plan that covers strategic planning, marketing initiatives, and budget plans. A request was made to have Yellowhead County join as a municipal partner and financially commit funds over the next three years as the organization transitions into a self funding entity. Funds would be used to cover a number of different projects that promote recreational and tourism activities in the area.

Leaman Road Train Whistle -Council is not moving ahead with an initiative to stop train whistles from blowing at the Leaman Road railway crossing near Chip Lake. Yellowhead County has gone through this process previously in a more populated area at a cost of half a million dollars that took over 10 years to complete. While this location may not be as expensive, there are still significant dollars and time associated with this process with no guarantee that CN will stop the use of train whistles for safety purposes at this crossing.

Rezoning For Industrial Development – Bylaw 05.16 was passed by Council and will rezone an area near Evansburg (SW of 19-53-07-W5M) from Rural District to Rural Industrial District. This rezoning allows for the expansion of current industrial developments and aligns with the Evansburg Area Structure Plan. A Public Hearing was held on April 12, 2016. No concerns were received from the public.

The next Council meetings are May 10 & 24, 2016. The next Committee of the Whole Council Meeting is May 16, 2016. All meetings start at 9:30 a.m. in the Council Chambers.

2. Be very careful to whom you give your credit card. Don't give out your account number over the phone unless you initiate the call and you know the company is reputable. Never give your credit card info out when you receive a phone call. (For example, if you're told there has been a 'computer problem' and the caller needs you to verify information.)

 Never respond to emails that request you provide your credit card info via email -- and don't ever respond to emails that ask you to go to a website to verify personal information.
 Never provide your credit card information on a website that is not a secure site.

- 5. Sign your credit cards as soon as you receive them.
- 6. Shred all credit card applications you receive.
- 7. Never leave your credit cards or receipts lying around.

 Don't write your PIN number on your credit card -- or have it anywhere near your credit card (in the event that your wallet gets stolen).

Shield your credit card number so that others around you can't copy it or capture it on a cell phone or other camera.
 Keep a list in a secure place with all of your account numbers and expiration dates, as well as the phone number and address of each bank that has issued you a credit card.
 Only carry around credit cards that you absolutely need. Don't carry around extra credit cards that you rarely use.

12. Open credit card bills promptly and make sure there are no bogus charges. Treat your credit card bill like your checking account -- reconcile it monthly. Save your receipts so you compare.

If you find any charges that you don't have a receipt for
 or that you don't recognize -- report these charges promptly (and in writing) to the credit card issuer.
 Always void and destroy incorrect receipts.



INVESTMENT FRAUD Tips on how to avoid investment fraud:

1) Investigate before you invest. Ask a lot of questions. Make sure there is a market for your investment. Ask the seller for references and accounting statements. Find out if a government or industry regulatory body supervise the seller. 2) Be wary of unexpected phone calls, letters or visits from strangers who offer get-rich schemes. 3) Be wary of exaggerated claims of profit in a short period of time. Ask about how you can sell your investment when you decide to seek your investment return. 4) Be cautious when someone offers you a time-limited investment opportunity and demands that you invest on the spot. Don't make snap decisions. If it's good now, it will be there tomorrow. 5) Beware of claims that there is little or no risk. All investment opportunities involve some risk. Never invest money you cannot afford to lose. 6) Beware if you are told you were chosen as one of only a few potential investors. 7) Beware when someone hesitates about promptly delivering the goods or services in which you invest. 8) Beware if you are given only a glossy brochure about the company. Always ask for a prospectus and other professionally prepared disclosure documents, especially wheninvesting in securities. such as stock in a company. And make sure you read the small print. Some stocks cannot be resold without the permission of the directors of the company. The information you are given should tell you about the stock and the company issuing it. 9) Before making a commitment, get a professional opinion. Ask about your advisor's qualifications. If necessary, phone the government department or industry association that licenses or registers him or her. Confirm that the individual is qualified to advise you. 10) When in doubt, don't make promises or commitments. It's better to be safe than sorry! Remember, the golden rule to investing: If it sounds too good to be true - it probably is!
