CONTAMINATED WATER ADVISORY ISSUED FOR HASSE LAKE

Submitted by Alberta **Health Services**

Due to elevated levels of fecal coliforms currently present in the water of Hasse Lake (located within the Edmonton Zone of Alberta Health Services (AHS)), AHS is advising the public not to swim or wade in the lake, effective immediately.

The public is also advised not to

drink this contaminated lake water, as water-borne organisms, including fecal coliforms, can cause vomiting and diarrhea

Elevated levels of fecal coliforms were detected via testing of the lake water. At current levels, skin, ear and eve infections can result from any contact with Hasse Lake water.

AHS Environmental Public Health officers will continue to monitor the

Parliament was down this week and I had the opportunity to spend time in the riding with constituents and business groups on Monday and Wednesday.

On Tuesday, I prepared a couple of radio messages in recognition of Environment Week (June 5-11); Senior's Week (June 6-12); a congratulatory message to all our 2016 high school graduates, and Canada's upcom-

ing149th birthday (July 1). Later that evening, I was present at the Mayerthorpe Town Council meeting.

The latter part of the week, I attended the 'Conservative Party of Canada National Convention 2016' in Vancouver. The convention was open to all members of the party who wished to attend and was a chance for our grassroots to bring forward policy resolutions and amendments.

The candidates running for party leadership also had the opportunity to speak and gain prospective supporters for their campaigns. The vote to select our next party leader will take place in exactly one year.

I look forward to returning to Ottawa, as Parliament will be sitting next week. I will take part in the debate on Bill C-7 (regarding RCMP unionization) on May 30 and on Bill C-10 (regarding Air Canada) on June 1. The historic final vote on physician-assisted dying is also expected to take place early next week. My next update will be on Friday, June 3, informing you of the happenings in Parliament.

RETURNING HOME: CRITICAL STEPS TO RESTORE NATURAL GAS AND ELECTRICITY IN FORT MCMURRAY

CALGARY, Alberta - More than 400 ATCO employees have been working around the clock to restore essential services to the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo in preparation for the return of residents.

For those residents who wish to return home beginning June 1, ATCO has published its Utility Restoration Map, which reflects the latest information on natural gas and electricity service in the Fort McMurray area. The map is updated daily and allows residents to determine whether electricity and natural gas is available in their neighbourhood.

Once residents have returned to their homes, ATCO is requesting that they

take the following important steps in order to fully restore electricity and natural gas service: 1. Restore Natural Gas: After returning home, residents should visit ATCOresponds.com and submit the Natural Gas Service Request Form, which will arrange for an ATCO representative to visit homes to restore service, perform a natural gas safety inspection, relight natural gas appliances and ensure they are working properly. If residents don't have internet access, they can visit a Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo Information Centre to speak with an ATCO representative or call ATCO's Customer Assistance Centre at 310-5678. Once restoration has been requested, residents should place the orange placard included in their re-entry information package in the window of their home or business. This will allow ATCO crews to respond earlier if they are already in the area.

2. Check Their Electricity: If residents do not have electricity, they should check their electric panel and breaker to determine if a blown fuse

or tripped breaker is the cause. If they cannot restore electricity by moving any tripped switches to the 'on' position, they are encouraged to call the Electricity 24/7 emergency outage line at 1-800-668-5506.

3. Contact Their Retailer: For customers who have contacted their retailer to end electricity or natural gas service, please call them to reactivate the account. For customers who have not contacted their electricity or natural gas retailer, no further action is required.

Further information on the steps residents should take to restore their service after returning to the community is available at ATCOresponds.com. The website also includes updates on ATCO's progress in restoring essential services and important contact information. Additionally, ATCO will have representatives available at the Information Centres in the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo and has extended its call centre hours to accommodate questions from area residents

MEN AND DEPRESSION

It's not a sign of weakness, it's a fact. Guys get depressed. Depression affects 840,000 men every year in Canada, and is the second leading cause of disability worldwide.

Men's Mental Health Awareness Day, June 14, aims to raise awareness of signs and symptoms of mental health conditions helping reduce the stigma that often prevents men from seeking help, which includes a number of misconceptions about depression.

Although there are still many misconceptions when it comes to depression, people's ideas about it have changed over the years. New technology and research show that depression is a illness based which impacts how a person's brain and body function, just like asthma or heart failure. Symptoms of depression

Changes in the levels of certain

brain chemicals and activity of some areas in the brain are associated with depression. No one thing causes this. Many things, including your genes, stressful events, illness, and abusing drugs, or taking some types of medicine are all involved in developing depression.

Some misconceptions include:

• Depression only happens if something bad happens. The reality is that depression may start after a stressful event, but other things also may trigger it. Sometimes depression happens with no identified cause, particularly in people who have been depressed before.

• If you can't get over depression, you're weak. Depression is not about your character, it is an illness. You can't force yourself to get over it any more than you can make asthma or a heart attack go away.

• Depression always will get better by itself and doesn't need treatment. Although a few people get over depression on their own, most people need treatment. People with depression can be treated and return to work and home routines, however without treatment, depression can last for months or even years. Do you have a man in your life who you think may be depressed? If you're worried about a loved one or a friend, you probably want to talk to him about your concerns. Here are some things you can do:

Tell the person about depression and why you are concerned

• Depression is not about laziness or weakness. It is more common than people realize, and is nothing to be embarrassed about.

• Point out the symptoms of depression that you have noticed in your family member or friend, and say why these symptoms worry you. Use a supportive and caring tone of voice while you are doing this.

Explain why the person needs to see a health professional

• Explain that very few people get over depression on their own. Most people need some type of treatment. The sooner someone gets treatment, the sooner he will feel better.

• Point out that there are many types of professionals who treat depression and many types of treatment. Just because a person is depressed doesn't mean that he needs to see a psychologist or take medicine. A family doctor or a counsellor may be able to help.

• Point out that depression might be caused by another problem. For example, genetic vulnerability, stress, medical problems, and medications all can cause symptoms of depression. A doctor can help diagnose this and provide the person with treatment options.

FIVE TOP GOLF TIPS TO HELP BOOST YOUR GAME

(NC) When it comes to golf, it's the little things that can have the biggest impact on your game. Whether it's your first attempt, or 10th season, golf expert Bob Weeks has got you covered at the links this summer with these five tips:

Choose the right clubs: Regardless of your experience or skill level, choosing the right equipment can be the difference between duffing it and striking the ball straight down the fairway. It's important to work with a professional to get the clubs best-suited to your game and then, to have them custom fit. You should be fit for the length, loft, lie angle, shaft flex and even the grip size. If your clubs aren't custom fit, it will be like walking around in shoes that are the wrong size.

Get on the ball: Choose the right kind of golf ball for your game. While golf balls all look the same, it's what's inside that determines if it's right for you. Golf balls fall into two categories: distance or control. Distance balls are generally twopiece balls with a large core and a cover. They are harder and better suited for higher handicappers or beginners. Control balls, usually three- or fourpiece balls, are softer and spin more meaning they will land on the green and stop. More skillful players should use these.

Consider the elements: Weather is always a factor in golf and dealing with it must always be considered. For instance, in cold temperatures, the ball will travel shorter distances, so take more club. The opposite is true for warmer temperatures. If you're playing into the wind, swing easy as that will keep the ball from spinning too much and rising up into the breezes. And downwind, make sure to judge the intensity of the breezes so you can choose the proper club. Your ball will roll further than normal on a downwind shot so take that into account.

Putting and chipping is priority: Lots of players like to boom their drives and will spend a lot of time on the range hitting their drivers. But if you want to improve your scores, you should spend more time working on your putting and chipping. Since most average players miss a lot of greens, the best way to save strokes is by chipping it close and making more putts. Focus more on your short game than your drive and you will improve.

Play the 19th hole: Win or lose, there's no better way to celebrate than hitting the 19th hole. Less is often more in golf and the same applies when considering what to eat and drink after a round. DON'T LET GOLFING PAIN BE PAR FOR THE COURSE

(NC) A little know-how can help golfers avoid unnecessary injury. Considering the number of times a swing is repeated during a game, it's not surprising that the season often ends early for those who are not physically prepared.

Below are a few simple stretching techniques that can help prevent or reduce the impact of injuries:

Side bending stretch

1. Stand with feet shoul-

der-width apart.

2. Hold the golf club above your head with your arms straight.

3. Slowly bend to one side, without rotating, until you feel a stretch in the side of your back.

4. Hold for 15 seconds and repeat twice for each side.

Shoulder stretch

1. Hold the shaft of a golf club vertically behind your back.

2. Gently pull the club up with

your top hand until you feel a DRIVE HOME A WINNING

slight stretch in the shoulder of vour lower arm. Hold for 15 seconds.

3. Gently pull the club down with your bottom hand until you feel a stretch in the top shoulder and arm.

4. Hold for 15 seconds.

5. Reverse hand positions and repeat.

STONY PLAIN/SPRUCE GROVE/ENOCH RCMP INVESTIGATE ARMED ROBBERY

Wabamun, Alta. – Early this morning shortly after 6:00 a.m., the Shell Station on Highway 16 near Range Road 44 was robbed. The suspects were armed with a pellet rifle and with bear spray. Cash and other items were stolen and the suspects have fled in a newer black truck with a lift kit.

A crime spree began early this morning. It started with a breakin at a cabin in Moonlight Bay. A residence had a picture window, and door windows smashed and several items were left strewn on the front lawn of the residence. It is believed that a high powered pellet rifle was taken during that break in. No one was home at the time.



Then, at 5:17 a.m. RCMP received a report of break in to vehicles at a different residence in Moonlight Bay in Wabamun. Male suspects were seen rifling through the homeowner's vehicles and when the homeowner confronted the suspects, he was sprayed with bear spray. The suspects then fled. The homeowner did not sustain injuries.

Shortly after, at 6:06 a.m., the RCMP were dispatched to an armed robbery that just occurred at the Shell. Two male suspects entered the Shell, one armed with a pellet rifle. The employees and one customer were directed to lay on the floor while the suspects took several items from the store. Before fleeing the store, bear spray was sprayed at the individuals on the floor. None of the people in the store sustained injuries as a result of this incident. The truck is believed to have fled

westbound after leaving the Shell. All occurrences are considered related.
