"CANADIAN REVENUE AGENCY" FRAUD, STRIKES AGAIN

St. Albert, AB -On Thursday, September 8th, 2016, St. Albert RCMP received report of a fraud that cost the victim thousands of dollars. The victim was contacted via the telephone, by a male caller who identified himself as a Canadian Revenue Agency representative. The caller advised that the victim owed over \$4000.00 from past taxes. The caller stated that if the victim didn't pay the money, he would be arrested. The caller told the victim to purchase gift cards to pay for the debt and then to inform the caller of all the information concerning the gift cards. This interaction was completed solely over the phone.

"No legitimate businesses request gift cards for payments" Advised Cst. FRASER from the St. Albert RCMP Community Policing Unit, " If you receive a call from any agency, organization, or charity asking for money, you should always decline to send any money immediately and tell them you will call them back. This will allow you time to do some research before deciding if they are who they say they are, or if they are scammers."

People from all around the country are well-aware of the dust-up between Lac Ste Anne County and many of the independent municipalities within it regarding fire service delivery. While governments duke it out over turf and pride, the taxpayers get fleeced and the lawvers and public relations spin-doctors get rich. It makes me wonder just how much of my money has been spent fighting with another government about something that really isn't our business? I for one don't really care who shows up when my house is on fire much less how they get paid - so long as they show up and do the job. So the question begs to be asked, when will all of this pettiness stop? If not for the good of the people, then to let the cheque-book cool off.

Still on the topic of Lac Ste Anne

County Fire Service finances and the county's spending problems; while other locals and I were inquiring into exactly how much this dispute as cost us and how much more it is likely to cost, I ran across some shocking financial numbers. Through reviewing the County of Lace Ste. Anne's financial statements (available on line) the following highlights were noteworthy:

- The county now spends \$1,278,752.00 per year in debt servicing.

- In 2015 & 2016 alone the county has committed to \$2,051,00 in debt directly related to fire services

- In that same period fire revenues from other municipalities have dropped by 800%

- Over the past 2-years the average deficit to run the fire department is \$1,524,705.00

In a nutshell what this means is that the county has never been in more debt and the fire department is running up serious debt on top of a million and a half per year loss... on top of whatever the legal cost to fight the vendetta against the neighbouring municipalities in the area.

There have been debates all over the media about the merits of the new fire department servicing the communities that it does, but it seems to me they are doing a good job. They are highly visible, the response statistics they share are impressive, and it is my understanding that they are highly trained with additional fulltime members. So, this leads to the question, what would it cost to have this fire department protect county residents and guests? Would we actually save money while getting the same or better service? Is there the political will in Sangudo to put aside egos and petty differences to safe money and possibly lives?

Its hard to get info on the new A

fire department's contract, but it is my understanding that the change to their service didn't cost the towns and villages much more - if anything more. It is also my understanding they own their equipment, so there's no debt to the municipalities and rent back the fire stations actually creating revenue for the towns and villages. What if the new fire department would offer the same deal to the county? What if this saved our money (taxpayer money) each year and didn't run us into millions of dollars in debt? Has anyone asked them? I think it's time our elected representatives do so. If you agree, contact your councillor today and let him know that you want service delivery want options instead of a pubic relations war. If they do not listen, this should become an election issue... Next election October 16, 2017.

Clothes washed in hard water may not be fully clean and may appear dingy. Hard water can cause a film on surfaces, such as bath tiles and tubs. 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Packaged water softeners are chemicals that bond with the calcium and magnesium ions in the water so that they cannot interfere with cleaning efficiency. These chemicals fall into two categories: precipitating and nonprecipitating. Precipitating softeners are borax and washing soda and can affect pH levels of water and make water cloudy. Nonprecipitating softeners use phosphates. Alkalinity won't be increased, and usually there is no cloudiness or buildup. These products are typically added to laundry loads and the like and are not recommended for drink-

Large eat-in-kitchens function well for family meals and even for entertaining friends in a relaxing way.

Thanks to the advent of wireless

In addition, the concept of devoting one space as a media-free zone (traditional formal living or sitting rooms tend to be tech-free) may seem antiquated to this plugged-in generation. Rooms that are comfortable and serve various purposes better suit today's homeowners. The rules that once governed the traditional home floor plan are more fluid than ever. Homeowners' preferences are having a greater impact over which rooms are now being included in new homes and which ones are soon to be history.

Now that the summer holidays are officially over the horticultural club will get back into its regular routine. The club meets the 4th Monday of the month at 7:00 pm at the Sangudo Golden Age Club (4927-50th ave Sangudo). Our next meeting is Sept 26 and it is about sharing. Sharing the extra produce we may have in our gardens, a dish made with something we grew, a new recipe we found out about, new ideas we learned over the growing year, the results of our plant of the year that we received in the spring, bringing in photographs of your garden and sharing what we did over the summer with each other.

There were three tours that happened in July or August. We partnered with the Westlock Pembina Garden Club on July 22nd for a tour of the Gablehouse Daylily farm near Sylvan Lake. This farm sells over 400 varieties of daylilies that are all suitable for growing in the Zone 2 and higher range. The daylily is regarded as one of the most versatile of the perennials and comes in an abundance of colors.

We also partnered with the Magnolia Horticultural Club with their Fruit Orchard Tour on August 10th. We were fortunate enough to hear the expertise from some of the members of Alberta's fruit growers association. Bernie Nikolai, Jo Granger and Joyce Moss gave us valuable information at our first stop at an apple orchard, while Tony



Voon was informative at our next stop at his plum orchard. We also got to sample lots of different types of fruit at Tony's orchard as quite a few varieties of fruit were ready to eat. By the looks of Tony's yard I'm sure he has tried to grow every type of fruit. We even got to sample some goji berries and some dried apple rings made from some of his own apples.

Our third tour was the Edmonton Waterworks Pond tour on August 13th. There was a map with 14 different locations to see ponds that the Waterworks Pond Co. had put in. We were fortunate enough to see the yard that the Edmonton Journal had featured in one of its articles. There was a water feature in the front as well as the back of that house. The bridge over the pond in the back had glass panels you could walk across and see the koi floating below you. My own personal tip in a tour this big is, if you know you can not see everything and are unable to tour around the second day, is that the older sections of the city usually have more established ponds and plants, and may be more worthwhile visiting.

The Sangudo Horticultural Club is always open to new members. I hope everyone had a pleasant summer.
