MP EGLINSKI WELCOME PACIFIC NORTHWEST LNG PROJECT APPROVAL

OTTAWA: On September 27th Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, welcomed the approval of the Pacific Northwest Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) project on British Columbia's coast.

The Federal Liberal Government conditionally approved the construction of an \$11.4B terminal to export liquefied natural gas from northern British Columbia, subject to over 190 legally binding conditions.

"I am pleased that the Pacific Northwest LNG met the science-and evidence-based regulatory process the previous Conservative Government put in place. This week's decision proves that the Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency, (CEAA) 2012 process works and that LNG facilities can operate in an environmentally sustainable way," said MP Eglinski.

The LNG will create an estimated 4,500 jobs during construction and an additional 630 direct and indirect jobs during the operation of the facility.

"Our Conservative party has been a strong supporter of Canada's LNG industry. This approval was a long-awaited decision that was inundated with uncertainty, and approval delays from the Liberal federal government. The announcement will ensure that Canada's natural gas industry can maximize its returns by getting its resources to foreign markets beyond North America. The decision will create thousands of Canadian jobs," concluded MP Eglinski.

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TURKEY TIPS: SAFETY AT EVERY STEP

'Tis the season for turkey dinners. From grocery store to leftovers, safe food handling practices are key to preventing the spread of harmful bacteria and keeping your feast free of food-borne illness.

Sound like a lot to digest? With these essential turkey tips, we're making it easy to serve up safely.

At the Grocery Store:

- Double check the "best before" date to ensure expiration date has not passed.
- Place the turkey at the bottom of the cart away from other food
- Ask for the turkey to be bagged separately from all other food
- Keep turkey separate from other bags when transporting from store to home

Pre-cooking storage:

- Freeze your turkey immediately after returning home from the grocery store if you will be cooking it more than three days after bringing it home.
- Refrigerate your turkey immediately upon arriving home from the grocery store if you will be cooking it

within three days.

- Prevent raw turkey or turkey juices from contaminating other items in your fridge or freezer by ensuring it is stored in a clean plastic container or plastic bag that will hold in any leaking juices and placing the turkey on a platter to catch any leaking juices. Always place the turkey on the bottom shelf of the fridge or freezer.

Thawing:

- Always thaw your turkey in the fridge or by fully immersing it in a sink of cold water. If thawing in the sink, keep the turkey in its original plastic wrap and change the water every 30 minutes to ensure the surface of the turkey remains cold.

- Do not thaw turkey at room temperature – it is not safe and could result in the growth of dangerous bacteria.

- Cook turkey immediately after it has thawed.

Cooking:

- Turkey must be cooked thoroughly, in the oven, until the meat reaches a minimum internal temperature of 85 degrees centigrade or 185 degrees fahrenheit.

- To ensure the turkey is properly

cooked, always use a meat thermometer according to the manufacturer's instructions. Insert the thermometer into the fleshiest part of the thigh, ensuring it is not touching any bones.

- Never slowcook a turkey
- Prepare and cook stuffing separately from the turkey.

Serving:

- Serve the turkey within 30 minutes of removing from the oven.

- Keep hot food hot: hot foods should be kept at a temperature of at least 60 degrees centigrade or 140 degrees fahrenheit.

- Keep cold food cold: cold foods should be kept at a temperature of 4 degrees celcius or 40 degrees fahrenheit or lower.

- Do not serve food that has been sitting at room temperature for more than two hours.

Leftovers:

- Refrigerate all leftovers within two hours of serving.

- Leftover meat, stuffing or gravy should be eaten within two or three days of cooking. Any food that will not be consumed within three days should be immediately frozen after cooking.




Will the minister do her job and ensure that the deal is signed with the United States by the deadline of October 12?"



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
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ITEMS TO INCLUDE IN YOUR AUTOMOTIVE EMERGENCY KIT

Road trips can make for great weekend getaways or even more lengthy vacations for those who can't get enough of the open road. But before embarking on any road trips, motorists should replenish their automotive emergency kits with the following items so they are fully prepared in the event of an accident or an injury.

- **First-aid kit:** A first-aid kit can treat cuts and abrasions suffered while you are out of the car and even some minor injuries that may result if you are in a car accident. Include essential items like adhesive tape, antibiotic ointment, antiseptic wipes, aspirin, bandages, a cold compress, gauze, and scissors. Visit www.redcross.org for a

more extensive list of items to include in your first-aid kit, which should be kept in your car at all times.

- **Tools:** It's important to include tools in your automotive emergency kit. While a full toolbox might be unnecessary, bring along an adjustable wrench, a flat head and Phillips screwdriver, a pair of pliers, a tire jack and crow bar, an ice scraper, and a flashlight. Extra roadside flares and reflectors also should be packed should you need to pull over and address an automotive problem, such as a flat tire. Keep a tire pressure gauge in your glove compartment or with your other tools so you can check tire pressure if you feel your car is not operating as smoothly as it

normally does.

- **Fluids:** While it's best to check all of your vehicle's fluids before beginning a road trip, it does not hurt to bring along some extra fluids just in case you start to run low while out on the road. Fluids to pack include motor oil, antifreeze, brake fluid, and windshield washer fluid. Include a funnel with these items so you can easily pour them in should you be running low. Pack an empty spray bottle as well so you have something to spray washer fluid from if a problem arises with your wiper blades.

- **Wiper blades:** Include an extra set of wiper blades in your automotive emergency kit. Maintaining wiper blades is an oft-overlooked component of

vehicle maintenance, so bring along an extra set of blades should your existing blades succumb to wear and tear while you're on the road.

- **Miscellaneous items:** Some items that may not seem synonymous with road trips can come in handy should you find yourself in an emergency. Pack a blanket so you and your passengers can stay warm should your car break down at night. In addition, pack some energy bars and bottled water so no one gets too hungry or thirsty while waiting for help to arrive. It's also good to keep a pair of work gloves in your car so you can still use your tools or change a tire when the temperatures dip or your hands get sweaty on hot days.
