WOODLANDS COUNTY AND WHITECOURT LEADING THE WAY FOR MUNICIPAL COLLABORATION ACROSS ALBERTA

Woodlands County and Whitecourt have been selected by the Province of Alberta to complete an intermunicipal collaboration pilot project. Woodlands County and Whitecourt will develop an Intermunicipal Collaboration Framework, and the process and resulting documents will be used to create a template and guide for municipalities across Alberta. The Government of Alberta, as part of its review of the Municipal Government Act, will be requiring all municipalities to prepare Intermunicipal Collaboration Frameworks (ICF). The frameworks will formalize how municipalities that share borders will manage growth, coordinate service delivery, and optimize resources for citizens. Funding has been awarded to Woodlands County through the Alberta Community Partnership Grant to manage and complete the project.

"Our Council is proud to have been selected for this grant as it acknowledges the hard work of both the Town and County to work collaboratively on so many projects that benefit our residents," stated Woodlands County Mayor Jim Rennie. "While I know of many other communities who are dreading the work needed to complete the ICF project, we look forward to it, and believe many others will follow our lead on how to best make it work!"

Woodlands County and Whitecourt were selected because of their long and respected history of partnership projects and initiatives.

inee and about 100 for the dinner theatre. Mr. Galliford and his crew catered the dinner portion of the evening with a delicious roast beef and salmon supper.



WHITECOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

The 2017 Budget Report is now available online. The report provides details on the budget, how property taxes are calculated, and how tax dollars have been allocated for 2017. Property owners can expect to receive combined assessment and taxation notices in mid-May. If you have questions about your tax notice, or the 2017 Budget, please contact the Town Office.

Whitecourt Town Council approved the 2016 Financial Statement for the year end of December 31, 2016. A presentation was made by the Town's auditor, Curtis Friesen from Hawkings Epp Dumont LLP, who reported that the consolidated financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the consolidated financial position of the Town of Whitecourt as of December 31, 2016.

Whitecourt will be conducting FireSmart activities in the hilltop area near Chickadee Drive, Feero Drive and Baxter Crescent this summer. The work is funded by the Forest Resource Improvement Association of Alberta (FRIAA) and the project will treat more than 53 hectares of land. The project, which has been awarded to Wide Open Slashing, has come in under budget, and Council has authorized additional work up to the approved grant amount at the per hectare rate. Whitecourt is also working to update the FireSmart Mitigation Strategy. The draft document was presented for Council's information, and will be finalized later this

The Town of Whitecourt is preparing for the upcoming October 2017 Municipal Election. Similar to previous elections, Whitecourt will be offering special ballots, an advance vote and institutional voting. Information on the 2017 Municipal Election can be found online at www.whitecourt.ca. Amendments have also been made to Bylaw 1487 – Automated Vote Counting System.

Council has renewed the contract for skate sharpening services at the Scott Safety Centre with Raw Edge Pro Shop for two years, and has also entered into a two year agreement for the Scott Safety Centre Restaurant/Concession with QK3 Holdings and Catering by Mama Gray's Kitchen.

Based on feedback received from local developers, Whitecourt has amended Policy 61-003 Development Agreement. The changes to the security requirements will not only protect the Town, but will also allow developers flexibility with cash flow. Feedback on the policy was received at an open house held in March 2017.

Whitecourt will be participating in the 35th Annual Whitecourt Trade Fair hosted by the Whitecourt & District Chamber of Commerce. Whitecourt will be encouraging residents to prepare a 72-hour emergency kit, and will also be promoting FireSmart activities. Be sure to stop by our booth in the Scott Safety Centre on May 12, 13 and 14.

Councillor Bill McAree has been appointed Deputy Mayor from May 1 to August 31, 2017.

Budget 2017 needs to empower communities like Whitecourt.

Whitecourt Mayor Maryann Chichak joined municipal leaders from across the country last week to cap a historic effort to show the federal government that the key to building a better Canada with Budget 2017 lies in empowering cities and communities of all sizes.

Mayor Chichak met with fellow Board members from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) in Whistler, BC, to discuss the federal budget which will be released today. Their meeting follows two years of unprecedented dialogue between FCM and senior federal officials, cabinet ministers and the Prime Minister. At every step, the FCM Board of Directors has delivered a clear message: municipal leaders are ready to deliver cost-effective local solutions to national challenges—including jobs, growth and emission reductions.

"The road to a better Canada runs through our communities," said Mayor Chichak. "It's in our communities where we can build more affordable housing and spur economic growth - if this budget delivers the right tools."

FCM's recommendations for Budget 2017 include predictable, long-term allocations to launch the next era of public transit—with reasonable cost-sharing so local fiscal limits don't hamper progress. FCM is also calling for major investments to tackle Canada's housing crisis by protecting social housing and building new affordable homes. Lastly, the municipal leaders are calling on the federal government to support local green innovation and to implement a plan to spark economic growth in rural, remote and northern communities.

"When municipal leaders have a seat at the nation-building table, it's Canadians who benefit," said Mayor Chichak. The Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) is the national

voice of municipal government, with nearly 2,000 members repre-

senting 91 per cent of the Canadian population.

Drivers who are impaired by fatigue, drugs, alcohol or other distractions such as cell phones, are a danger not only to themselves, but also to the innocent drivers around them. If you witness any of the behaviors below, call 911 and tell the operator that you are calling to report an impaired driver. Be prepared to describe the make, model, color and license plate number of the vehicle, and provide its exact location.

Signs of impaired driving include:

• Failure to turn on headlights at night. • Illegal or sudden turning. • Turning within an unusually wide radius. • Nearly striking other cars or objects. • Sudden or erratic braking. • Drifting, swerving or weaving. • Driving with the face close to the windshield. • Drinking alcohol in the vehicle. • Driving much slower than the posted speed limit. • Rapidly accelerating. • Tailgating. • Driving in the middle of the road, or with the left tires on the center line. • Responding slowly to traffic signals

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BULLYING Tips for Dealing With Bullying

1) Take complaints of bullying seriously. Do not dismiss your child or expect your child to work through the situation alone.

 Praise your child for reporting bullying situations to you and assure your child you will take action.

3) Talk to your child's teacher, counselor, or other caregiver about reports of bullying.

4) Work together to address the bullying situation. Don't confront the parents of the bully directly.

5) Ask your child specific questions about how your child is treated by peers, who he or she eats lunch with, and how other children are treated.

6) Teach your child to be assertive. Your child should be able to express feelings and needs clearly, without shouting or other aggressive behavior.



7) Provide opportunities for your child to make friends. Identify some of your child's interests and encourage your child to pursue them through sports, clubs, or other group activities.

8) Teach your child to identify bullying behaviors. These include hitting, damaging possessions, threatening, name calling, & excluding someone



URAL CRIME AWAR

Protect machinery from theft by leaving valuables locked in a shed or storage facility and by marking equipment with your drivers licence and province of issue (an engraver can be borrowed free of charge from most local police detachments).

Protect livestock by checking herds regularly and keeping accurate records of livestock born, sold or purchased.



"Grain Fette" or "Grain Guard" is a unique approach to identifying your crops. Small bits of paper, each one imprinted with your special code number, are mixed with grain as grain is being augered into the storage shed. This is approved by the Canadian Grain Commission. The paper used is also digestable in animal feed.

Utilize the Report-A-Poacher Program. Their toll free number is 1-800-642-3800.

Rural Crime Watch Members are concerned citizens who are watchful for unusual activity in their community. They record information on suspicious people and vehicles and pass it along to local police. Join together with your neighbours to install a crime watch program in your area.Do not approach suspicious individuals on your own.



SANGUDO HORTICULTURAL CLUB NEWS

Submitted by Brenda Ogden | Sangudo Horticultural Club

At our April 24th meeting Amy Kremeniuk from Greenthumb Greenhouse, north of Evansburg, showed us how to plant succulents in containers:

It's good to have drainage eg. holes in pots or line with a layer of sand (1.5" deep, coarse sand best.) She uses ordinary potting mix, can add some sand to the mix. Succulents are pretty forgiving, they take a long

time to outgrow a pot. When arranging them in a pot plant the biggest one first. Add moss, rocks, or sand to give the pot a finished look. Succulents like to be on dry side, water once a month, don't put in full sun, they can thrive in indirect sun. It is easy to propagate new plants from succulent leaves by putting a fallen leaf of one sideways on top of some moist potting soil. The leaf will take some time to grow roots. You would then plant it into the soil. And voila, you have increased your number.

Amy orders from many suppliers, in order for her to have a wide variety, they come from many places including BC, Ontario, and Morinville (High Q).

New in petunias- There are many types of petunias beyond the Wave series which are well marketed. Amy has 20 different colours of petunias in greenhouse. She never deadheads them (does not have time!) and the new cultivars rarely set seed. Her recommendation is to fertilize well for good results. Amy has used Nature's Source for 4 years with good results. She applies it every time she waters. "We have a short window of time for blooms, if you want full vigour you have to fertilize." If you find your plants have few flowers in the centre pinch back the outside shoots.

'Citrus Twist', from Crazytuniatend to get taller rather than spread out, in a 12" hanging basket uses 3 plants

'Blackberry Cheesecake', same growth as Citrus Twist

'Miss Marvel' from Sweetunia, trail & mound like the 'Bubblegum' petunia in the Vista series. Amy recommends using 3 plants for a whisky-barrel sized planter, only 1 in a 12" pot. Good in a pot or a bed, has

lots of fill & spill, but not a lot of height.

'Sweet Flash' from Sweetunia –a nice orange colour which has been hard to get in petunias.

-'Night Sky' and 'Pink Sky' from Selecta, have speckles.

-Calibrachoa; sold as Million Bells, Mini-Famous and other suppliers. Can be trailing or mounding. Amy likes the compact and mounding types. No deadlheading is needed. Aphids love them.

Amy had several cultuvars to display, including 'Pink Strike' and a new double for 2018 'Orange Strike' which looks very nice in combination with red flowers.

-6 upright geraniums, 2 ivy geraniums.

-verbenas have to be pinched back. 'Vintage' from GoldFisch is an upright cultivar.

- 'Black & Bloom' salvia has the elusive true blue colour. Smells

nice, pinch once finished blooming.

-Container plantings usually have accent plants (thrillers) and trailing plants (spillers). For the plants to fill (fillers) pots Amy recommends buying the less expensive sixpacks to add colour and texture eg. aster, verbena, and petunia.

-Amy starts all of the vegetable transplants she sells. She has a good selection of herbs

-pineberry- an old type of strawberry. Has white flesh and red seeds. It needs 2 plants to bear fruit, Amy has not had it overwinter.

-Delosperma is a great drought tolerant, low-growing plant.

-Amy carries more than your regular annual plants in her greenhouse. She brought in some Venus flytrap plants, some mushrooms in a grow bag and some air plants. Air plants are a slow growing plant that doesn't require soil to grow in. They do need moisture however, and the

whole plant must be soaked for four hours a week in untreated water, preferably rain or snow melted water.

The Horticulture Club's trial plant of the year is the Tomatillo. Two plants are needed to cross pollinate each other to produce fruit. They are related to tomatoes. They can be buried deep when planted. Used to make green salsa.

Our next meeting at the Sangudo Golden Age Club (4927-50ave) address will not be until September 25 2017. We have our May cleanup on the 22nd. The meeting place is at the tourist information booth in Sangudo at 630pm. In June we are going to have a Solstice Day Party and July will see our tour dates start up. There are no meetings scheduled for the months of July and August. Some other dates that were mentioned during the meeting that may be of interest to gardeners were:

INVESTMENT FRAUD

Tips on how to avoid investment fraud:

1) Investigate before you invest. Ask a lot of questions. Make sure there is a market for your investment. Ask the seller for references and accounting statements. Find out if a government or industry regulatory body supervise the seller. 2) Be wary of unexpected phone calls, letters or visits from strangers who offer get-rich schemes. 3) Be wary of exaggerated claims of profit in a short period of time. Ask about how you can sell your investment when you decide to seek your investment return. 4) Be cautious when someone offers you a time-limited investment opportunity and demands that you invest on the spot. Don't make snap decisions. If it's good now, it will be there tomorrow. 5) Beware of claims that there is little or no risk. All investment opportunities involve some risk. Never invest money you cannot afford to lose. 6) Beware if you are told you were chosen as one of only a few potential investors. 7) Beware when someone hesitates about promptly delivering the goods or services in which you invest. 8) Beware if you are given only a glossy brochure about the company. Always ask for a prospectus and other professionally prepared disclosure documents, especially wheninvesting in securities, such as stock in a company. And make sure you read the small print. Some stocks cannot be resold without the permission of the directors of the company. The information you are given should tell you about the stock and the company issuing it. 9) Before making a commitment, get a professional opinion. Ask about your advisor's qualifications. If necessary, phone the government department or industry association that licenses or registers him or her. Confirm that the individual is qualified to advise you. 10) When in doubt, don't make promises or commitments. It's better to be safe than sorry! Remember, the golden rule to investing: If it sounds too good to be true - it probably is!



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TIPS TO STOP SCHOOLYARD BULLYING

- Take it seriously. It's easy to say, "Kids will be kids" and assume it will pass. But if your child is coming home upset and is suddenly anxious about school because of the way a kid (or kids) are treating him, you should pay attention.
- Drop your kid off at school or stand on the sidelines during recess. Bullying tends to occur when adult supervision is lacking, so before school or on the playground at recess.
- Talk to other parents. Young kids are talkers. If you're friendly with a parent in your kid's class, ask them if their child has mentioned anything about kids being picked on at school.
- Tell the teacher. It's really important to let your child's teacher know what your kid is telling you -- especially if someone is getting hit.
- Empower your children. Let your kids know that it's not their fault that they are being bullied. Teach your kids to focus on their own behavior.


Tips about Strangers

A stranger is anyone you don't know. There is no way to tell by the way a person looks if they are dangerous or not. A dangerous person does not always look mean or scary, so judging by the way people look is a mistake. It's not so easy to tell who is okay and who is not. Just because someone looks nasty doesn't mean that they would hurt you and just because someone looks nice, doesn't mean that they are a nice person.

There is only one person that is with you all the time and can be responsible for keeping you safe at all times. THAT PERSON IS YOU! Safety rules need to apply ALL THE TIME, not just when someone who looks bad or scary is around. One of the most common ways that kids get hurt by strangers is when being friendly and helpful to adults who pretend to need help. When you are without your parents or other adult you know, it is your job to protect yourself. It is not your job to offer help to any adults, even if they ask! A grownup who needs help should get help from another adult, not a child. So remember, looking out for yourself is your biggest job when you are not with your parents or another adult, so you have permission without your parents' permission. You should learn whose to ignore or refuse adult requests for help

Stranger Tips:

- · Walk and play with others and use the buddy system. If you walk somewhere, walk with other children.
- · Adults do not usually ask children for directions or help, they should be asking other adults. If someone in a car should stop to ask for directions, you should not go near the car.
- Stay an arms reach or more away from strangers. Stand up, back up and run to someone who can help you if you feel afraid.
- · If someone is following you on foot or in a car, go to a place where there are other people--to a neighbor's home or into a store, a police station or even a library for instance--and ask for help.
- No one should ask you to look for lost items such as a "lost puppy" or tell you that either of your parents is in trouble and that he or she will take you to mom or dad. If someone tells you this, run the other way immediately and find help with an adult you know or run into a safe place you know.
- Never go near a car with someone in it or get into a car

HOW TO AVOID INJURIES ON THE GOLF COURSE THIS SUMMER

Everyone's swing is different, but it is important to work with a swing that benefits our game and body. Consulting with a professional before hitting the links will help develop our game and avoid injury

The right equipment: Wearing

Wearing soft spike golf shoes gives you greater shock absorption and cushioning. This helps your back in both the short and long term.


When kids move on from preschool to elementary school, some might want to tag along with Mom or Dad to the driving range. You should try to avoid overwhelming kids with too much instruction or information.

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2017 BUDGET APPROVED

Whitecourt Town Council approved the final 2017 Budget. The budget, valued at just over \$55.1 million, requires a 2.47% change to municipal mill rates for both residential and business properties.

"Preparation of this budget involved balancing the need to increase our efficiencies while at the same time meeting the demand for enhanced programs and services," remarked Whitecourt Mayor Maryann Chichak. "With input from various stakeholders, I believe we have found that balance in the 2017 budget that allows us to maintain and enhance service levels for today, as well as plan and prepare for growth in the future."

Budget highlights include:

- The 2017 Capital Budget totals \$17,587,419.
- The 2016 Operating Budget totals \$37,571,483.
- Revenue from taxation totals \$13,235,497; accounting for 24%

of the municipality's total revenue.

The 2017 Budget was guided by public input, and the Town of Whitecourt worked to actively engage residents, business owners and Committee Members throughout the budget process. Whitecourt appreciates the feedback provided by the public during the online budget survey and at the budget information open house event.

The opinions received were incorporated into the deliberation process.

"During budget preparations our residents and business owners remained, as always, the top priority," added Mayor Chichak.

The Town of Whitecourt publishes an annual budget report to help increase local understanding of projects and initiatives planned for the year, and residents' knowledge of where municipal tax dollars are spent. The report will be available on www.whitecourt.ca and municipal social media sites at the beginning of May after the Tax Rate Bylaw has been adopted by Town Council.

SPRING IS HERE



The Town of Whitecourt's Water Treatment Plant is dealing with an unusually high amount of organic materials in the water due to increased spring runoff into the McLeod River.

Spring runoff refers to the high water flows encountered when warmer temperatures cause snow in the watershed to melt. This melt-water will carry with it organic material, such as leaves and grasses, as well as mud and silt that is stirred up by increased stream flows. Each spring is different, but on average, runoff conditions will last for between three and six weeks, depending on ambient temperatures.

Whitecourt's water undergoes rigorous testing to detect organic and inorganic substances that occur naturally in our river systems. The treatment process removes most of the colour, but residents may notice a slight discolouration in the water. Colour in the water can occasionally give our water temporary earthy or musty flavours or odours, however the taste/odour has no health impacts. The water that leaves the Whitecourt Water Treatment Plant meets and exceeds all Provincial standards, and the water is safe for all to use and enjoy.

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

Tips to Protect your Real Estate Investment Dollars

- * Consult public real estate websites to review property listings in the community where the property is located. Compare features, size & locations to establish if the asking price seems reasonable.
- * Get independent representation for your purchase. If the seller objects, consider it a red flag.
- * Check to make sure your representative is a licensed real estate agent. Contact your local Real Estate Board or the Real Estate Council of Alberta. Using a licensed real estate agent does not cost anything from a purchaser's standpoint. Usually all commissions are paid by the seller.
- *Beware of a real estate agent or mortgage broker who has a financial interest in the transaction.
- * Ask your independent representative to provide you with a comparative market analysis of the property.

Red Flags to Watch for Mortgage Fraud

- * Someone offers you a fee to use your name and credit information to obtain a mortgage
- *You are encouraged to include false information to a loan application
- * You are asked to leave signature lines or other important areas on a loan application blank
- * The loan amount on the mortgage is significantly higher than the value of the property
- * The mortgage has been refinanced several times and each instance, the amount of the mortgage has increased
- * The seller or investment advisor discourages you from seeing or inspecting the property you are offering to purchase

- Do not use login names or nicknames that will reveal age or gender.
- 2. Never give out personal identification including friends, addresses, school activities, passwords or real names
- 3. Everyone is a stranger, Identifies can be hijacked or passwords compromised so even your "best friend" online might not be who they say they are.
