# **17 CHARGES LAID AGAINST 2 MEN IN STOLEN VEHICLES**

Entwistle, Alberta – Evansburg RCMP have laid 17 charges against two men following suspicious vehicle complaints in the rural area near Entwistle.

On April 30, Evansburg RCMP responded to a complaint of suspicious vehicles and a collision on Range Road 110. A witness reported that two vehicles were blocking a driveway to a rural property and that the vehicles were driven in a dangerous manner that resulted in a collision with a witness's vehicle. The witness was treated for a minor injury sustained in the collision. Both vehicles sustained minor damage. The suspect vehicles fled prior to police arrival and were not located that night.

On May 1, 2017 Evansburg RCMP were called to another report of suspicious vehicles blocking the driveway of a rural property on Township Road 534. RCMP members responded and located two separate vehicles with drivers inside. RCMP members determined both vehicles, a black 2005 Ford F-250 and a black 2006 Ford F-250 were stolen. Two adult males were arrested without incident.

Through the course of the investigation, it was determined that the two men and the stolen vehicles were also responsible for the incident on April 30th.

## NEW PROJECTS IN THE STONY PLAIN AREA TO SPUR JOB CREATION

• \$25,000 to the Village of Warburg to implement a Regional Economic Development Strategy

The projects will deliver workshops and webinars to engage Alberta entrepreneurs and expand the capacity of Alberta businesses, help diversify the local industrial base and design a roadmap to a net-zero energy future.

Such initiatives are designed to drive economic development, tourism and job-creation opportunities.

Following the first CARES application intake in 2016, the program evaluated 88 applications from regions and communities, representing approximately \$10.5 million in requested grants. These projects are among many throughout the province receiving support through the first intake of the CARES program.

# **PARKLAND COUNTY PASSES** 2017 TAX RATE BYLAW

#### Submitted by Parkland County

Parkland County Council has passed the 2017 Tax Rate Bylaw, which included a 2.61% increase in total property taxes for the average resident. Included in this increase are the education taxes collected on behalf of the Province. The Provincial Education Requisition for Parkland County's residential homeowner has increased by 2.95% over 2016; non-residential has increased by 15.83%.

"Our aim is to provide the highest service levels possible, while keeping the tax increases as low as we can manage," said Mayor Rod Shaigec. "We are proud to have one of the lowest tax increases in the Capital Region," he added.

"Keeping tax increases as low as possible allows for minimal impact on our residents while maximizing the service levels we are able to offer as we work towards our vision of One Parkland: Powerfully Connected," said Mike Heck, CAO.

Property taxes are calculated based on assessment values, which means properties

Seniors have spent their lives helping to make Alberta the wonderful province it is today, and they deserve a government that works to make their lives better. That's why our government is supporting seniors to stay in their homes for longer, making practical changes that make life more affordable, and protecting the programs and services that they count on.

Last summer, I met Mary in Stony Plain who wanted to stay living in her family home as she aged. Mary has mobility issues, and her home needed repairs if she was to stay. With the help of the Seniors Home Adaptation and Repair Program (SHARP), launched in July 2016, she was able to make home repairs and adaptations so she could live in her home longer. She was able to repair her roof, improve her washroom and make other necessary improvements to keep her home in good condition.

Through low-interest loans, SHARP helps eligible seniors access up to \$40,000 from the equity in their home, to be paid back when the home is sold, or at any time of the senior's choosing. Since the program was launched in July 2016, the Seniors and Housing ministry has received more than 970 applications and has provided about \$6 million in loans. SHARP is just one way our government is working to make life better for Alberta seniors like Mary.

Affordable housing for seniors is a priority for us, and so we are continuing our \$1.2 billion investment over five years, four times what the previous government had budgeted. We are beginning to address the massive maintenance deficit in seniors facilities left behind by the former government. Further, there are now over 40 major construction projects across Alberta that are building new and renovating existing seniors' housing. We have also chosen to keep the Alberta Seniors Benefit steady, because in spite of this tough economy, our government knows thousands of seniors relv on it.

Almost half of seniors in Alberta have received a rebate on the carbon levy. Further, for those seniors who live independently, they can now register for the Residential No-Charge Energy Savings Program. Starting in April, seniors will be able to have qualified agents visit and install practical, no-charge efficiency products like LED lights, high-efficiency shower heads, advanced power bars, and self-adjusting thermostats in their homes.

We have also increased funding for home and community care by \$200 million to a total of over \$2 billion annually, which will support hundreds more home-care clients receiving personal care. This helps seniors access the services they need in order to continue to live and participate in their communities.

Our government stands by our commitment to creating 2,000 new long-term care beds across Alberta. We are well on our way to fulfilling this promise. Budget 2017 funds the expansion of the Norwood Capital Care centre in Edmonton and the construction of a whole new facility in the Bridgeland community of Calgary. These two fully public facilities will create hundreds more spaces for seniors to access longterm care.

Any seniors who have experienced the aggressive, misleading sales pitches for furnaces or energy contracts can rest assured now that door-to-door sales of energy products is now against the law. No one should feel pressured or tricked into making a purchase on the spot. Banning these door-to-door sales is a practical change so that scammers at your doors can be charged.

These are just some of the ways that our government is working for Alberta's seniors. Through programs like SHARP and the Residential No-Charge Energy Savings Program, we are making sure seniors stay in their homes and communities longer. \* Have fun. Golf is a fun game; it just takes time to hone your skills. But even if you aren't ready for the professional tour after your first few rounds, you can still have fun. Don't let some beginner's frustration, which every golfer experiences, ruin the fun of the game. Take note of your surroundings when you hit the links, and appreciate the time you're spending with your group. If the game becomes more a source of frustration than fun, then take a break and put in some more work away from the course, be it at the driving range or studying at home.





# ADJUSTING GOLF SWING GETS EASIER

Golfers rejoice! Those dreaded slices or hooks could become a thing of the distant past thanks to adjustable clubs and drivers. In addition to helping improve accuracy, adjustable clubs also lighten the load in your golf bag.

With a few twists of a wrench or even turning the shaft of the driver itself, golfers can adjust the face angle, loft and lie angle of the driver to hit the ball farther and straighter. Golfers can make small adjustments to create the right loft and improve distance without having to purchase a new club or visit a club fitter.

Many club manufacturers now offer adjustable drivers and other

clubs. According to an informal poll on Golf.com, 34 percent of the 2,337 respondents owned an adjustable driver by the end of 2011. The ability to upgrade shafts has also become popular as golfers respond to what the pros are doing.

Adjustable golf clubs enable golfers to walk out onto the course with one driver and a few different shafts. With a couple of clicks from a wrench, a person can have an entirely new driver. That cuts down on the equipment that needs to be carried and can fine tune a golfer's accuracy. These high-tech clubs are corresponding to changes being made to golf balls. En-

gineers have reduced the spin on golf balls to help the balls travel farther. To do so, golf experts advise that the ball needs to be hit higher into the air. Adjustable drivers can give players the edge they need to produce the right height and trajectory.

According to data from golf club manufacturer TaylorMade, 70 percent of consumers who use the company's adjustable drivers adjust their club at least once to get the desired shot. Afterward, 10 to 15 percent of adjustable driver users report further adjustments as they become comfortable with the features.

Although golfers can now put

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adjustments into their own hands, it is still adviseable to get a professional fitting regardless of which clubs are chosen. A certified club fitter can help a person sort through the myriad options available and make recommendations based on various factors, including the golf ball used.

Those who are not fans of adjustable drivers say that the adjustment mechanisms add weight to the drivers, which can compromise efficiency. However, that isn't stopping larger numbers of golf fans from taking adjustable drivers for a trial run in an effort to improve their game.

## SMART WATERING CONSERVES WATER AND SAVES MONEY

Summer heat can be harmful in various ways. People and pets can quickly succumb to the summer sun, which can cause sunburn, heat exhaustion and heat stroke when people and their animals spend too much time outdoors without adequate protection.

Landscapes are also vulnerable to summer heat, which can quickly spoil the most lush lawns and robust gardens. Effective watering can help lawns and gardens withstand summer heat, but improper watering can deprive landscapes of the water they need to survive. Homeowners concerned about their lawns and gardens surviving the summer can take the following approach to conserve water, save money and maintain their landscapes.

· Start early. Homeowners may

feel that the hottest times of the day are when lawns and gardens will be most in need of water, so that's the best time to set sprinklers or grab the hose and get to work. But in many areas, watering between the hours of 11 a.m. and 3 p.m., when summer temperatures tend to peak, can be both wasteful and ineffective. That's because watering between those hours will cause much of the water to quickly evaporate, robbing lawns and gardens of the water they need to withstand the heat. Homeowners who water when water is most likely to evaporate may feel they need to water more, and that only wastes water.

It's best to consult a local landscaping professional in your area to determine the best time to water each day, but in many regions the best time to water is between 6 a.m. and 10 a.m., when temperatures are generally lower, the sun is not at its peak and winds are not as strong.

· Place sprinklers correctly. If you do not have an in-ground irrigation system and don't intend to install one, you will likely use lawn sprinklers to water the lawn. When placing these sprinklers, turn them on and then document their trajectory before moving on to the next area. You want to make sure the water from the sprinklers is not landing on sidewalks, patios or streets, especially if your community typically institutes drought restrictions that limit how much you can water. In such instances, you'll need to make the best use of the water you're allowed to use, so make sure none of it is watering the driveway.

· Let well-fed lawns go dormant during drought. Lengthy droughts tend to be accompanied by water restrictions, and such restrictions can frustrate homeowners who don't want to see all of the hard work they've put in to this point go to waste. But grass that has thus far been well cared for can withstand drought and still recover when rains once again fall and temperatures cool come autumn. If you plan to let the lawn go dormant, keep kids, pets and visitors off the grass, as dormant lawns are highly susceptible to damage.

Summer is an enjoyable time of year, but lawn and garden enthusiasts may be concerned for their properties when summer heat sets in. A few simple strategies can help lawns make it through the season unscathed.





# BREAK GROUND WITH THE RIGHT TOOLS

The right tools for the job can be the difference between an interminable landscaping project and one that goes smoothly and efficiently. Aspiring landscapers probably have a few shovels and rakes hanging in their garages and sheds for basic landscaping work. But while such tools are effective for certain projects, when it comes to churning soil for garden beds or digging holes for outdoor structures, additional tools come in handy. It may be well worth a trip to a nearby home center to purchase or rent one of these tools ideal for breaking ground.

Rototiller

A rototiller, sometimes called just a "tiller," is a powered garden tool designed to loosen soil prior to planting. A rototiller also can help aerate soil during the growing season. Because they reduce the need for manual spade digging or hoeing, tillers can be useful landscaping tools, particularly for homeowners who want to work efficiently.

Rototillers will break through tough soil and any plant roots. They come in a variety of sizes, and it's best to match the tool to the size of the job. Many homeowners can get by with smaller, less powerful models, especially if the tiller is only necessary at the beginning of planting season. Professional landscapers or those with large swatches of property may benefit from larger models. Auger

Augers, both mechanical and manual, are essentially large drill bits that help move materials from one location to another. Augers are typically used to cut holes in landscapes, and they are good

for post-hole drilling, which is part of the process of installing deck footings, fencing posts or other structures. Augers come in a variety of sizes, and homeowners can choose how much power they prefer. Augers can be heavy and cumbersome, and many do-ityourselfers will find that one-person augers are more than adequate for their projects.

Augers dig deep holes, so it is always smart to have the property surveyed prior to use. This way pipes, gas lines, buried electrical lines, and any other obstructions are clearly identified prior to drilling.

Cultivator

Cultivators are similar to tillers in that they loosen soil. Cultivators are effective during the growth period of plants, when they can be used to aerate the soil and remove

weeds. Cultivators come in handheld versions and push models, and some are even motorized. Cultivators get close to plants to remove weeds without disturbing the plant. They also are used to stir in compost or fertilizer.

While many people think cultivators and tillers are the same, that is not the case. The former is less powerful and will mix the soil or stir up the top layer, while the latter can break up moderately hard ground and loosen firm soil.

When using any tools around the garden, wear the proper protection. This includes devices to protect hearing when power tools are in use as well as gloves and safety goggles. Tillers, augers and cultivators have the potential to toss soil and rocks into the air, so make sure others keep their distance while work is in progress.
