# **A BRIEF HISTORY OF** THE DARWELL CEMETERY

In late 1939 or early 1940, a son was born to Mr. and Mrs. Lysle McDonald of Darwell. Unfortunately the baby did not live. As there was no cemetery in Darwell, the child had to be buried in the Rexboro cemetery. That is when Mr. McDonald decided that should be remedied. He donated an acre of land for this purpose. It was fenced and

kept as best it could with little available for that job.

When the Darwell Women's Institute was formed in 1945. they took on the job of seeing that the cemetery was cleaned up once a year. They advertised the day when it was to be done. People came and helped by raking and trimming to make it look cared for.

The job of advertising clean up day is still done by the Women's Institute, and many people come and help. We are very fortunate that Kathy Yeoman looks after the cemetery all summer, and it always looks trim and neat. We have been told many times that our cemetery is the best kept cemetery around.

There have been many people who have done more than their share of keeping all aspects of the in order.

There used to be no charge for plots, but now it has become necessary to charge for them.

The Lac Ste. Anne County purchased an acre of land next to the original cemetery, as it was getting crowded. In the original place there was no restriction on headstones etc. but in the new part headstones must be flat.

The Cemetery Clean up this year will be May 27, 2017 from 10 to 12 am if it rains we will try again on June 3/2017.

# HOW TO HELP KIDS GET INTO GOLF

Golf is a game of skill that can take years, if not decades, to master. Many golfers find their time on the golf course both rewarding and relaxing, even on those days when the fairways seem impossible to find.

Though many players never swing a golf club until they reach adulthood, it's never too early to hit the links. Some of the world's most accomplished golfers, including four-time Masters champion Tiger Woods, began playing as toddlers, and many feel that getting an early start can lead to a more successful game down the road.

Getting kids into golf is a great way for parents to bond with their children while enjoying the great outdoors. Golf can also be used to teach kids humility, sportsmanship and the importance of hard work. Thanks to the often frustrating nature of golf, parents may find it somewhat challenging to instill a love of the game in their youngsters. But there are ways to introduce kids to this wonderful game that kids might just play for the rest of their lives.

Focus on having fun. Few, if any, golfers at your local golf course on a given weekend could say with certainty that golf has never frustrated them. The challenge of golf may be its most appealing characteristic to older players, but young kids can be easily overwhelmed by the challenges golf presents. By focusing on having fun instead of perfecting techniques, parents can get kids to look forward to their time on the links. The more fun kids have, the more likely they will be to embrace the game and its many challenges. Don't put pressure on youngsters as they develop their games, but encourage them through

their struggles and reassure them that you faced the same obstacles when you started playing.

Hire an instructor with experience teaching children. Instructors with experience teaching children will understand the basics of the game and how learning those basics provides a great foundation for future enjoyment and success on the course. Instructors who have taught kids in the past also know that teaching youngsters the finer points of golf requires patience and encouragement. Ask a fellow parent or an employee at the club where you play to recommend an instructor for your child. And take advantage of any kids' courses your club offers.

• Purchase the correct equipment. Even the best golfers are bound to struggle when using the wrong equipment. While it might be unwise to invest in especially expensive equipment for youngsters likely to grow out of it in a few months' time, deals can be found on used kids' equipment. Used kids' equipment is typically subjected to less wear and tear than used equipment for adults, as kids tend to play less often and fewer holes than adults when they do play. But make sure to find correctly sized equipment that kids feel comfortable using.

• Play some holes. Instructors may teach kids the differences between the types of clubs and how to swing and putt. But golf is most fun when players are out on the links going from hole to hole. Instruction is important, but don't forget to play a few holes with your child each week as well.

Golf is a challenging game, but it's one that can be enjoyed by athletes of all ages.





# **ADJUSTING GOLF SWING GETS EASIER**

Golfers rejoice! Those dreaded slices or hooks could become a thing of the distant past thanks to adjustable clubs and drivers. In addition to helping improve accuracy, adjustable clubs also lighten the load in your golf bag.

With a few twists of a wrench or even turning the shaft of the driver itself, golfers can adjust the face angle, loft and lie angle of the driver to hit the ball farther and straighter. Golfers can make small adjustments to create the right loft and improve distance without having to purchase a new club or visit a club fitter.

Many club manufacturers now offer adjustable drivers and other clubs. According to an informal poll on Golf.com, 34 percent of the 2,337 respondents owned an adjustable driver by the end of 2011. The ability to upgrade shafts has also become popular as golfers respond to what the pros are doing.

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Adjustable golf clubs enable golfers to walk out onto the course with one driver and a few different shafts. With a couple of clicks from a wrench, a person can have an entirely new driver. That cuts down on the equipment that needs to be carried and can fine tune a golfer's accuracy. These high-tech clubs are corresponding to changes being made to golf balls. Engineers have reduced the spin on golf balls to help the balls travel farther. To do so, golf experts advise that the ball needs to be hit higher into the air. Adjustable drivers

can give players the edge they need to produce the right height and trajectory.

According to data from golf club manufacturer TaylorMade, 70 percent of consumers who use the company's adjustable drivers adjust their club at least once to get the desired shot. Afterward, 10 to 15 percent of adjustable driver users report further adjustments as they become comfortable with the features.

Although golfers can now put adjustments into their own hands, it is still adviseable to get a professional fitting regardless of which clubs are chosen. A certified club fitter can help a person sort through the myriad options available and make recommendations based on various factors, including the golf ball used.

Those who are not fans of adjustable drivers say that the adjustment mechanisms add weight to the drivers, which can compromise efficiency. However, that isn't stopping larger numbers of golf fans from taking adjustable drivers for a trial run in an effort to improve their game.

# PARLIAMENT UPDATE

Week of May 1, 2017

This week in Parliament, we discussed topics including government spending, drug overdose, and Remembrance Day. We also discussed an incident where two Conservative MPs were blocked from accessing the House of Commons by the Prime Minister's motorcade and, as a result, missed an important vote.

The following was debated in the House:

• Bill C-4 – An Act to amend the Canada Labour Code, the Parliamentary Employment and Staff Relations Act, the Public Service Labour Relations Act and the Income Tax Act (Consideration of Senate Amendments)

• Bill C-44 – Budget Implementation Act, 2017, No. 1 (Second Reading)

• Bill C-224 – Good Samaritan Drug Overdose Act (Consideration of Senate

#### Amendments)

• Bill C-305 – An Act to amend the Criminal Code (mischief) (Report Stage)

• Bill C-311 – An Act to amend the Holidays Act (Remembrance Day) (Report Stage)

• Bill S-208 – National Seal Products Day Act (Third Reading)

• Question of privilege (denial of access of Members to the Parliamentary Precinct raised on March 22, 2017)

On Monday in the Standing Committee on Environment and Sustainable Development (ENVI), the Minister of Environment and Climate Change attended the meeting as a witness to discuss Report 6, which was presented to the House of Commons on May 2. The President of the Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency, the Deputy Minister, and the Chief Executive Officer of Parks Canada were also in attendance.

On Tuesday, I attended the official

launch of the Arctic Aviation Tour 2017, which will take-off from Rocky Mountain House on June 1. The tour will be performing at 97 airshows across the arctic, flying 31,000 km. I want to encourage constituents in the area to come out and see the record-breaking show!

Also on Tuesday, I briefly met with students from Edson after they visited the War Museum in Ottawa.

• Bill C-7 – An Act to amend the Public Service Labour Relations Act, the Public Service Labour Relations and Employment Board Act and other Acts and to provide for certain other measures (Consideration of Senate amendments)

• Bill C-322 – An Act to amend the Railway Safety Act (road crossings) (Second Reading)

On Tuesday, I was extremely disappointed to learn that six Liberal Members used their majority in the Standing Committee on Justice and Human Rights to vote against Bill S-217, effectively defeating it without a vote by the House of Commons. This bill, also known as Wynn's Law, would have closed a fatal loophole in the Criminal Code, a loophole that cost Const. Wynn his life when he was murdered by a career criminal who was out on bail.

## **DESIGN A GARDEN FOR ALL SENSES**

Gardens add visual appeal to a yard, but gardens also can appeal to individuals' senses of smell, taste, touch, and sound. Gardeners who want to create gardens that appeal to various senses can do so in the following ways.

Sight

Aesthetic appeal is one of the most sought-after benefits of gardening. However, many homeowners put in so much effort planting for one particular season that they may not give thought to ensuring the garden looks vibrant no matter the time of year.

Gardeners can research planting zones to find plants that will blossom at different times of the year so they can enjoy impressive, aesthetically appealing gardens year-round. Spring bulbs can bloom early on, while annual and perennial summer favorites will thrive under the summer sun. Beautyberry and caryopteris will fill out in the autumn, while holly or mahonia can look lovely in the winter.

Smell

Gardeners can dot their landscapes with aromatic trees, shrubs and flowers that will make stepping out into the garden that much more special. Some of the more fragrant plants include gardenia, dianthus, calendula, lavender, and jasmine. Shrubs such as fragrant pineapple broom, Anne Russell viburnum and Christmas box can add fragrance as well.

Sound

The lively sounds of the garden are created by the wildlife that come to pollinate and enjoy the environment gardeners have created. By choosing indigenous plants, gardeners can be sure that insects and small critters will seek refuge within the foliage.

Songbirds also will add character to a yard. The Audubon Society suggests including a water source and a songbird border of shrubs along your property's edge. Provide food sources and make sure they are located a fair distance from the main action of the yard so as not to scare off birds. Wait for musical chickadees, goldfinches, orioles, and cardinals to arrive and enjoy the accommodations.

Taste

Gardeners can expand their gardens to include fruit-bearing trees and rows of vegetables.

Produce can be harvested from early spring through late fall depending on the crops planted. Touch

Apart from including trees and shrubs of various textures in the garden, look for other ways to

stimulate a tactile response. Water features add relaxing sound and beauty. Stones, moss, mulch, and other accents have varied textures that can stimulate the sense of touch in various ways. Don't forget to include a sitting area so that you can immerse yourself fully in the garden.

Go beyond visual appeal when designing a garden. When gardeners tap into all five senses, they can enjoy their landscapes even more than they already do.





## **HOW TO KEEP ANIMALS OUT OF YOUR GARDEN**

Many gardeners understand the frustration that stems from seeing a garden destroyed by wildlife. While protecting wildlife is a cause that's near and dear to many gardening enthusiasts, even the most ardent wildlife supporter does not want to see his or her garden trampled, eaten or adversely affected by animals.

Safeguarding gardens from local wildlife can require some trial and error. Animals may find ways to circumvent gardeners' initial efforts to protect their gardens, but the following methods might just do the trick the first time around.

• Erect physical barriers around gardens. Barriers may not be gardeners' first choices, as some people feel barriers such as wire cages or mesh coverings make it more difficult to tend to gardens and rob gardens of some of their aesthetic appeal. But coverings and wire cages can effectively prevent wildlife from trampling or eating plants while still allowing the gardens to get adequate sunlight. Make sure barriers extend to the ground so animals cannot access gardens by entering beneath the barricades.

• Fight intruders with odor. Stray cats may mistake gardens for litter boxes and enter them to relieve themselves. Preventing such intrusions can be as simple as placing items around the garden to reduce the likelihood that gardens will be mistaken for litter boxes. Peels from oranges and lemons or coffee grounds can be placed in the garden and can emit odors strong enough to deter cats.

Install motion detecting lights around gardens. Motion detection technology might be enough to deter nocturnal wildlife from trampling or eating gardens. Animals might be spooked and run away when lights suddenly turn on. A similar approach can be taken using noise instead of lights. Gardeners who hope to avoid erecting barriers around their gardens can put up posts instead, attaching aluminum cans or wind chimes to the posts that will make noise when animals come near. Much like light, noise can be enough to deter animals.

• Consider raised garden beds. When small critters, such as moles, are the main problem, then raised garden beds with wood or plastic bottoms and sides can be enough to safeguard gardens. Raised garden beds might not be accessible to small critters, though such beds likely won't deter larger animals from getting into gardens that are not barricaded.

• Erect fencing around the yard. Though fencing is expensive, fencing in a backyard or side yard where gardens are located can deter wildlife big and small from trampling or eating gardens.

Wildlife is worth protecting, but gardeners must also take steps to protect their gardens from animals looking for something to eat.
