File number: 2017-598740 During the afternoon of May 18th, 2017, the Thorsby/Breton RCMP responded to a complaint of a robbery with firearm that occurred at a residence located just south of Winfield.

Three Caucasian males, including two wearing masks, entered the unlocked residence with intention to steal from it. They were surprised to see that a female was in the residence. The female was threaten with the firearms but was not harmed. The suspects stole various objects, including two firearms, and then left in a white truck.

The suspects were described as Caucasian males, medium built in their 20s or early 30s. The female was able to notice that one of them had a tattoo on his right jaw.

Investigation continues into this occurrence.

Every Leduc household will receive a letter in the mail with their unique personal identification number (PIN) required to participate in the online Census, which starts Saturday, April 1, 2017.

"The online option is such a convenient way for residents

to complete their Census," says Sandra Davis, City of Leduc City Clerk. "It can be done any time of the day, without leaving the house."

Households that have not completed their census online will receive a visit from a City of Leduc Census Worker between April 22 and May 31, 2017. In addition to wearing City employee badges, Census Workers are required to clear a criminal record check.

The City is partnering with the Leduc Public Library to offer residents secure access to the online Census from April 1 – May 30. To participate, citizens must bring their letter with their PIN.

May 31: Census ends

In 2016, 39 per cent of citizens participated in the secure, online Census.

The City of Leduc has conducted an annual municipal census since 2008 to ensure the City receives provincial funding proportionate with Leduc's fast growing population. Leduc relies on provincial funding to help offset the costs of many important services, including infrastructure improvements and maintenance, public library, Family & Community Support Services, and RCMP.

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LEDUC LARGE ITEM PICKUP IS WEEK OF MAY 22 - 26

Again this year, the City of Leduc is helping residents effectively manage large items they want to dispose of by offering the large item pickup, scheduled for the week of May 22-26.

Residents are invited to place a maximum of two large items at the curb with their regular carts on their scheduled collection

day. Items eligible for this special service include appliances (other than fridges and freezers), water heaters, furniture, doors and lawn mowers. Lawn mowers must have oil and gas removed from them before pickup.

Items must be a maximum of 60 inches wide (five feet) and 150 pounds (68 kilograms) to be eligible for pickup.

Fridges and freezers can be taken to the Leduc and District

Regional Waste Management Facility for proper disposal. A fee of \$25 applies.

In 2016, Leduc residents disposed of 16 tonnes of material during the large item pickup.

DRAYTON VALLEY RCMP WARN RESIDENTS TO LOCK VEHICLES

Drayton Valley RCMP received several complaints of Thefts of Motor Vehicles and Thefts from Motor Vehicles over the past month. They would like to remind residents to be vigilant in order to prevent vehicle thefts. Thieves are known as opportunistic offenders and tend to look for easy targets like unlocked and unattended vehicles. Leaving your unlocked vehicle running, leaving a spare key inside the vehicle and having valuables visible are all risks and could result in vehicle thefts and thefts from vehicles.

Thieves are searching residential neighbourhoods and parking lots looking for unlocked vehicles, vehicles left running and visible valuables. "Don't make yourself a victim" says Sgt. Erin Matthews of the Drayton Valley RCMP. "If you leave your vehicle unlocked and running, your chances of becoming a victim are increased as it only takes a few seconds for an opportunistic thief to jump in and drive

away"

'Plan. Prepare. Be Aware.' act as common sense reminders for Albertans who are looking to venture outdoors this spring to enjoy day-use and/or camping areas, according to Leduc Fire Services.

"Outdoor fire safety is paramount for outdoor enthusiasts," says Deputy Fire Chief Gerry Kelly with Leduc Fire Services. "And with any outdoor activity, it's extremely important to be prepared for any emergencies that may arise. Having your own 72-hour emergency kit is the easiest method to be prepared, whether it's for in your home or when out camping with family and friends."

Being safe outdoors covers a variety of activities, from campfires and recreational vehicle use to overall safety for children. Some helpful tips include:

• Know your location in case of an emergency and confirm that 911

service is available

• Always be aware of area/regional fire bans before starting a campfire and model campfire safety practices • Develop, practice and know your

fire escape plan for your RV

• Ensure children/youth tell adults where they are going. Review the 'Hug-a-Tree and Survive' safety plan with youth before your scheduled trip

"It's better to be prepared than to be caught off guard not knowing what to do in an emergency," says Kelly. "Having and practicing an escape plan, preparing a 72-hour kit and reviewing safety tips with loved ones puts you in the best situation where you hopefully will never have to use it."

This bill, also known as Wynn's Law, would have closed a fatal loophole in the Criminal Code, a loophole that cost Const. Wynn his life when he was murdered by a career criminal who was out on bail.

Leduc City Council is pleased to announce its unanimous decision to become the first shareholder in a proposed regional economic development initiative created by the Capital Region Board.

"We're excited to be a part of this new Economic Development organization that will further enhance the long-term growth and sustainability of the metro region," says Mayor Greg Krischke. "We're eager to begin and look forward to working with our fellow shareholders come May 24."

The new initiative, the Edmonton Metropolitan Region Economic Development Entity (EMREDE), will develop a regional economic development strategy to market the metro region on a global scale, as well as attract businesses and talent from around the world. Member municipalities of the Capital Region Board will have an opportunity to join the EMREDE by May 24, 2017.

"Important to the council's decision was the understanding that available funding from the provincial and federal governments for regional economic development will be more accessible to meet growing demands of this metro region," says Mayor Krischke.

Once all new municipal shareholders are in place, the EMRE-DE will appoint a chief executive officer and board of directors.

"We're very pleased to see the

City of Leduc become an early adopter in joining this exciting and new economic development opportunity to help bring further prosperity to the metro region," says Mary Cameron, interim chair of the EMREDE. "I expect the start-up process of this new entity will take a number of months as the shareholders will make any refinements to agreements and details of association," said Mary Cameron.

LEDUC COUNTY COUNCIL APPROVES 2017 BUDGET, SETS TAX RATES

Leduc County council approved the final 2017 budget and set the 2017 tax rates at its regular council meeting this afternoon.

Council approved an \$81.4 million operating budget and \$36.1 million capital budget, which represents a zero per cent municipal tax dollar budget increase over 2016.

It's been an economically challenging year for many people in the region. As a council, we wanted to help our residents by keeping Leduc County's tax rates consistent. Ninety per cent of property owners will see a property tax increase of less than one-hundred dollars this year, which is substantial, especially when you take into account the provincial education property tax increase, which the County has no control over.

The 2017 capital budget includes \$9.4 million for the annual road surfacing program, \$3.0 million for a new fire station in the Calmar fire district, \$3.0 million for capital equipment and vehicle purchases for protective services, \$2.4 million for bridge rehabilitation and \$543,000 for parks and recreation purposes.

2017 tax rates

The zero per cent tax dollar budget increase resulted in a minimal tax increase for most land owners. Approximately 90 per cent of Leduc County property owners can expect a property tax increase of less than \$100 over 2016. Five per cent of property owners can expect an increase between \$101 and \$250 and the remaining five per cent can expect an increase of more than \$250.

Property taxes are comprised of municipal taxes, other requisitions and the provincial education tax. Leduc County is obligated to collect the provincial education tax, as set by the Government of Alberta, as part of its property taxes. Leduc County's total 2017 education property tax is \$24.2 million, which represents an approximately 7.7 per cent, or \$1.7 million, increase over 2016.

Tax notices will be mailed to residents no later than the last week of May 2017. Taxes are due by June 30, 2017.

CITY OF LEDUC INVITES CITIZENS TO PROVIDE INSIGHT INTO ANNUAL BUDGET

"It is important that the budget aligns with citizen expectations," says Jennifer Cannon, director of Finance with the City of Leduc. "The feedback from the survey helps shape the direction and future of the City."

Citizen engagement is a major component of the City's budget planning process. The budget survey provides a month-long opportunity for residents to help identify community priorities, in addition to input on desired service levels. It also offers participants a better understanding and awareness of the City's annual budget process and pressures the City faces.

"Participation levels in last year's budget survey were remarkable," says Jennifer Cannon. "It's wonderful to connect with the community and provide a comfortable channel for them to identify which projects and programs are important."

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DESIGN A GARDEN FOR ALL SENSES

Gardens add visual appeal to a yard, but gardens also can appeal to individuals' senses of smell, taste, touch, and sound. Gardeners who want to create gardens that appeal to various senses can do so in the following ways.

Sight

Aesthetic appeal is one of the most sought-after benefits of gardening. However, many homeowners put in so much effort planting for one particular season that they may not give thought to ensuring the garden looks vibrant no matter the time of year.

Gardeners can research planting zones to find plants that will blossom at different times of the year so they can enjoy impressive, aesthetically appealing gardens year-round. Spring bulbs can bloom early on, while annual and perennial summer favorites will thrive under the summer sun. Beautyberry and caryopteris will fill out in the autumn, while holly or mahonia can look lovely in the winter.

Smell

Gardeners can dot their landscapes with aromatic trees, shrubs and flowers that will make stepping out into the garden that much more special. Some of the more fragrant plants include gardenia, dianthus, calendula, lavender, and jasmine. Shrubs such as fragrant pineapple broom, Anne Russell viburnum and Christmas box can add fragrance as well.

Sound

The lively sounds of the garden are created by the wildlife

that come to pollinate and enjoy the environment gardeners have created. By choosing indigenous plants, gardeners can be sure that insects and small critters will seek refuge within the foliage.

Songbirds also will add character to a yard. The Audubon Society suggests including a water source and a songbird border of shrubs along your property's edge. Provide food sources and make sure they are located a fair distance from the main action of the yard so as not to scare off birds. Wait for musical chickadees, goldfinches, orioles, and cardinals to arrive and enjoy the accommodations.

Taste

Gardeners can expand their gardens to include fruit-bearing trees and rows of vegetables.

Produce can be harvested from early spring through late fall depending on the crops planted. Touch

Apart from including trees and shrubs of various textures in the garden, look for other ways to stimulate a tactile response. Water features add relaxing sound and beauty. Stones, moss, mulch, and other accents have varied textures that can stimulate the sense of touch in various ways. Don't forget to include a sitting area so that you can immerse yourself fully in the garden.

Go beyond visual appeal when designing a garden. When gardeners tap into all five senses, they can enjoy their landscapes even more than they already do.
