ALBERTA SUPPORTS B.C. WILDFIRE RESPONSE

The Government of Alberta is providing support as British Columbia deals with wildfires. It is also encouraging Albertans to stay safe by being aware of air-quality advisories. And it is advising people to make financial donations to a recognized non-profit organization of their choice instead of providing material donations.

Air quality

- Air quality is expected to vary across the Central, Edmonton and North Zones of Alberta Health Services.
- Alberta Health Services has issued precautionary air-quality advisories for the following areas:
- Jasper, Hinton and Edson areas of the North Zone
- All of Edmonton Zone and Central Zone
- Because air quality is expected to be variable, this advisory will remain in effect until further notice.
- Residents of, and visitors to,

these areas are advised to be aware of air conditions and to take precautions against potential health concerns that can be associated with smoky air.

PRECAUTIONARY AIR QUALITY ADVISORY ISSUED FOR EDMONTON ZONE OF ALBERTA HEALTH SERVICES

EDMONTON – Due to wildfires burning in British Columbia, air quality is expected to be variable across much of the Edmonton Zone of Alberta Health Services (AHS) over the coming days and potentially, weeks.

As such, AHS is issuing a precautionary air quality advisory for the entire Edmonton Zone of AHS. Residents of the Edmonton Zone of AHS, and visitors to the Edmonton Zone of AHS, are advised to be aware of air conditions and take precautions against potential health concerns that can be associated with smoky air conditions.

Although minor smoke conditions do not typically cause health concerns in healthy individuals, if smoke conditions become more severe, even healthy individuals may experience

temporary irritation of eyes and throat, and possibly shortness of breath.

If you can taste and/or smell smoke in the air:

- Monitor your symptoms.
- Minimize physical activity
- Remain indoors with windows, doors and air circulation fans/vents closed.

• If you drive to another location, keep windows and vents closed. Run your car fan on re-circulate mode to avoid drawing in outdoor air.

Individuals with respiratory conditions (such as COPD and asthma), and individuals with existing cardio-

vascular conditions (such as angina, previous heart attack and congestive heart failure), may notice a worsening of symptoms in smoky air conditions. These individuals should monitor for worsening of symptoms and take the precautions routinely recommended by their physicians if a worsening of symptoms occurs.

Individuals experiencing symp-

toms can also call Health Link 24 hours a day, seven days a week, toll-free at 811, to speak to a registered nurse.

Air quality can and will vary with weather conditions and prevailing winds. Because air quality is expected to be variable, this advisory will remain in effect until further notice.




Alberta assistance

- Agriculture and Forestry has deployed 125 firefighters and support staff, five air tankers, two birddog planes and 3,000 lengths of hose to British Columbia.
- Alberta is responding to a request for help from British Columbia RCMP by sending 40 Alberta members from the Special Tactical Operations unit. More information: https://www.alberta.ca/release.cfm?x-ID=48259FD713886-DFA4-7661-C7CC0C0E7DEF7DEF
- The Alberta Emergency Management Agency has elevated the Provincial Operations Centre to Level 2 to enhance monitoring of the B.C. wildfire and, at the request of Emergency Management British Columbia, has deployed four emergency management and communications professionals to provide assistance.
- Albertans are encouraged not to travel to British Columbia on their own to provide wildfire response. All response efforts are being coordinated through Emergency Management British Co-

umbia.

Fire restrictions in Alberta

- After a prolonged period of hot, dry weather, a fire restriction has been put in place in the forested parts of Alberta south of Highway 532.
- Campfires within campgrounds in designated fire rings in this area are still permitted. Gas or propane stoves/barbecues and portable propane fire pits are also allowed.
- The best way for Albertans to find out if there is a fire ban, restriction or advisory in their area is to visit AlbertaFireBans.ca.

MP JIM EGLINSKI QUESTIONS THE MINISTER ON THE MOUNTAIN PINE BEETLE

OTTAWA: On June 16th, Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, asked the following question on what the Liberal government's plans are to stop the Mountain Pine Beetle from spreading in Jasper National Park:

"Mr. Speaker, Jasper National Park, one of Canada's major tourist destinations, has been devastated by the pine beetle infestation. Much of the forest is dead or dying. The dead trees are a tremendous fuel load and present a significant risk to the community of Jasper.

Residents are concerned for their own safety and that of visitors, and the security of their homes. There is a high risk of wildfire fuelled by a forest, devastated by the pine beetle.

Have the Liberals put a plan in place to protect this park?"

The Minister of Environment and Climate Change, the Honourable Catherine McKenna replied:

"Mr. Speaker, our government is absolutely committed to the ecological integrity of our national parks. That is my first priority as a minister.

We are working very hard in all of our parks, including Jasper National Park. I look forward to talking to the member further about this and seeing how we can move forward."

MP JIM EGLINSKI PUTS FORWARD A QUESTION DURING DEBATE ON THE TRANSPORTATION MODERNIZATION ACT

On June 16th, Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead. during debate on C-49 Transportation Modernization Act, asked the following question:

"Mr. Speaker, I was very interested in a lot of what the hon. member had to say. I totally agree with him that 13 Acts on three modes of transportation is ridiculous. One would think the Liberals do not care at all

about Parliament and just want to ram this bill through. It is absolutely disgusting to see what is happening on such an important matter, whether it is air, rail, or whatever.

The member made some good points on safety. There has been no opportunity for good debate in this place, and that is what we are here for, to talk about the safety of rail transportation, but I am more interested in the safety of the communities the railways go through and safety of the people working on the

railways. We are not being given the opportunity to speak. I will give a quick example and then ask my hon. friend to comment.

In my community, there are super trains, large trains with grain bins, oil tankers, and containers. They go into small communities from one end of Canada to the other. They block crossings, and people cannot

get to and from their communities, cannot get to hospitals, and cannot get to work, sometimes for hours on end, because the trains sit while waiting for another train going east or west. I wonder if the member would comment on that situation. I know it is happening in his and all members' ridings in this country, and it is a danger to Canadians."

"Please be assured that I will be following up on this issue with the minister. There must be a plan

to protect Jasper National Park, the community, residents and visitors, in the event of a possible wildfire fuelled and intensified by trees killed by the Pine Beetle," concluded MP Eglinski.

be showing the G rated Smurf's The Lost Village starting at 7PM. The cost of admission is \$ 2.50 and a concession will be available.




class, on a cost recovery basis, in the fall.

I am pleased to be home with my constituents where I will be spending my time in communities across this beautiful riding of Yellowhead. Returning home allows me the opportunity to meet face-to-face with you, attend events, catch up on phone calls, and answer correspondence. Meetings, events, phone calls and responding to your letters will help me represent you better when Parliament resumes in September.

The spring parliamentary session concluded on June 21, 2017. Below is a summary of hot topics:

- 1. Interesting how the federal government can quickly produce \$10.5 million to pay Omar Khadr, who fought against Canada, but can't seem to provide enough funding in the Veterans Affairs budget to make sure our elderly veterans are properly cared for. Mr. Trudeau was wrong to compensate Omar Khadr, and wrong to do it in a secret deal.
- 2. Métis commissioner, Marilyn Poitras stepped down from the five-member commission, citing issues with the "current structure" of the inquiry into Murdered and Missing Indigenous Women and Girls.
- 3. Prime Minister Trudeau promised to borrow only \$10 billion, and balance the budget by 2019. The Finance Department's report shows a different story. It says the deficit won't be eliminated for at least 35 years! His borrowing and spending is out of control. So much for a 'modest deficit'.
- 4. Thanks to this Liberal government, we won't have a softwood lumber deal anytime soon. This is one of the main industries in our riding of which I have repeatedly brought to the Government's attention.
- 5. The Liberal government must immediately act on the Mountain Pine Beetle infestation before it is too late. This is another issue I have repeatedly brought to the Government's attention.
- 6. The Trudeau Liberals have scrapped important tax credits for kids' sports and arts programs; slashed the Tax-Free Savings Account; put tax hikes

on public transit, beer and wine; and applied GST to ridesharing services like Uber.

- 7. Their proposed national carbon tax will increase the price of gasoline by 11 cents by 2022, costing the average family \$1,250 to \$2,500 per year.
- 8. Their payroll tax hikes will make it harder for companies to hire young people. So much for our farmers and our youth! This must be stopped!
- 9. The taxpayer-funded Infrastructure Bank has been widely criticized by industry professionals for putting tax dollars

on the line to cover risky investments made by private companies. This bank will only help a lot of well-connected insiders and lobbyists. What about building the roads and bridges communities need?

10. What about the status of the Kinder Morgan Pipeline? After all, Canadians can have jobs and a clean environment.


Trudeau's "Sunny Ways" is leading us to "Gloomy Days" as his government becomes even less transparent, less accountable, and less cooperative.
