TELEVISION SERVICE PROVIDER CODE TAKES EFFECT

OTTAWA: MP Eglinski is pleased to inform residents that, as of September 1, 2017, the Television Service Provider Code will come into effect. The Code was created to help Canadians make informed choices about their television service provider and resolve disputes in a fair and effective manner.

“During last year’s Let’s Talk TV proceedings, many people expressed their frustrations over television

service providers not providing adequate information about service packages and pricing,” stated MP Eglinski. “Now, consumers will not only have access to that information, but they will also have access to an effective platform to make complaints about the delivery of service.”

Starting in September, television service providers must:

- Provide customers with a Critical Information Summary and a copy of the agreement which includes a list of channels or packages they subscribe to, their monthly charges for

services, the commitment period and how to file complaints.

- Clearly set out the duration of promotional offers, the regular price once any discounts end, and any obligations placed on a consumer if they accept the offer, such as a minimum commitment period.

- Provide customers with a time-frame and information on any potential charges regarding service calls for installations and repairs.

- Give thirty days’ notice to consumers in the event of a change in price of channels, bundles of chan-

nels or rental equipment.

The Commission for Complaints for Telecom-television Services (CCTS) will administer the Code. Complaints can be filed using an interactive questionnaire at www.cts-cprst.ca.

“When it comes to television services, Canadians should have flexibility and choice in their programming – programming with reasonably priced services that meet the diverse interests of Canadians and protect Canadian jobs,” concluded MP Eglinski.

now, it appears, there is a problem with water under the atrium! Oh my, now who would have thought that that might be possible???



OLD AGE SECURITY REPORT

The old age security program: should it be revised in order to keep it sustainable? OAS is funded through annual tax revenues whereas CPP is paid through payroll deductions.

The chief actuary's report forecasts spending to hit about \$247 billion by 2060 — five times what it is slated to be this year — due to an impending re-

irement wave of baby boomer workers and people living longer.

Our previous Conservative government raised the age of eligibility for OAS to 67 from 65 to save on costs by encouraging people to work longer. The Liberals reversed the decision in their first budget, saying the Tories had made the change without any data to support it.

A February presentation to a group of deputy ministers said “younger

generations may be required to pay higher taxes” to cover a shortfall between tax revenues and OAS spending if the retirement age remains at 65, Canadians live longer and there aren't enough new workers to replace the ones who are going to retire.

The actuarial report suggests that spending as a percentage of the overall economy would rise by 2030 and fall through to 2060 as economic growth and resulting tax revenues offset rising

costs.

Costs to the program are also expected to be offset by an expansion to CPP that the chief actuary estimates will mean \$3 billion less in spending on the Guaranteed Income Supplement in 2060 and reduce overall spending on OAS benefits, which are scaled back above \$75,000 in annual income.





CHANGES COMING TO IMPAIRED DRIVING LAWS

The Government of Alberta will look at implementing changes to impaired driving legislation to save lives and reduce injuries.

Recently, the Alberta Court of Appeal ruled that part of Alberta's current impaired driving sanctions are unconstitutional.

Specifically, the ruling stated that suspending licences until a matter is resolved in court infringes on an individual's Charter rights.

The Government of Alberta is not appealing the court's decision in *R. v Sahaluk* and will be exploring other legislative models and strategies across Canada.

"The safety of Albertans in communities and on our roads is our top priority. Deaths caused by impaired driving are senseless,

tragic and 100 percent preventable. We will be looking at other legislative models across the country to see which initiatives have been most effective in saving lives. We want to ensure that our laws reduce impaired driving and are also upheld in court."

"Impaired driving is a crime that claims nearly twice as many lives each year in Canada as all

forms of homicide combined. We are pleased to see the Government of Alberta moving forward to explore a more effective model to deter and reduce impaired driving in that province. We look forward to working with them to ensure this happens." - Andrew Murie, CEO, MADD Canada

"We support the action of the government on this matter. Impaired drivers threaten the safety of every other person on the road with potential death or serious injury, and administrative licence suspensions were an immediate way to address the threat. We are optimistic that the government will find a legally acceptable resolution to this issue in the very near future." - Chief Const. Roger Chaffin, representative, Alberta Association of Chiefs of Police

The court is allowing the current sanctions to remain in place until May 2018, which means police officers are still able to suspend licences in impaired driving situations.

The Government of Alberta plans to have ongoing conversations with key stakeholders before bringing any new impaired driving legislation forward.

Quick facts

Impaired driving fatalities in Alberta:

- In 2012, the Government of Alberta amended the Traffic Safety Act so that drivers with a blood alcohol concentration over 0.08 or those who refuse to provide a breath sample would have their driver's licence suspended until the criminal charge is resolved.
- In 2011, there were 78 alcohol-related motor vehicle fatalities.
- In 2012, there were 78 alcohol-related motor vehicle fatalities.
- In 2013, there were 80 alcohol-related motor vehicle fatalities.
- In 2014, there were 68 alcohol-related motor vehicle fatalities.
- In 2015, there were 85 alcohol-related motor vehicle fatalities.



COMPOSITE DECKING CAN BE A SMART CHOICE

Decks add character and functionality to a home, increasing outdoor entertaining space and oftentimes improving the resale value of a home. Homeowners have various options when choosing decking materials, but one such option, composite decking, is growing in popularity.

Decks used to primarily be made from pressure-treated lumber. While lumber remains a popular material, more and more homeowners are opting for composite decking products. As anyone who has pressure-washed, stained and sealed wood decks can attest, such spaces

require lots of upkeep to look new year after year. Composite decks require much less maintenance, making them highly attractive to homeowners who would rather spend time using their decks instead of maintaining them.

Composite decking is any type of

decking material that is formulated from different recycled materials. The majority of these materials include hard plastic and wood shavings of pulp. Unlike wood, which can fade, crack and rot, composite decking, which has been available for roughly a decade, does not degrade quickly and requires very little upkeep.

Available in a variety of wood colors to match outdoor decor, composite decks also can feature artificial wood grains to make them look similar to wood planks. Although composite decks are not completely impervious to the elements, with some occasional washing to impede mold growth and new technology that has improved stain-resistance, many of the pitfalls of other materials can be avoided with composite decks.

Composite decking fits in with eco-friendly lifestyles. The planks are made from recycled materials that would normally end up in landfills. Products from Trex, a popular composite decking manufacturer, are made from 1.5 million shopping bags and wood mill waste. As composite decks do not rot away and are long-lasting, they will not need to be replaced frequently, which is another eco-friendly benefit.

When comparing composite decking brands, look mainly at the colors, materials used in the composition and the fastening systems. Many are fastened with regular deck screws, offers This Old House. The newer systems have channels for hidden fastening, and the composite deck tiles snap into place.

Composite decks do have a few drawbacks. They can be expensive and nearly double the initial cost of wood decks. And although they don't rot, composite planks can scratch. Without refinishing, damaged boards will need to be replaced. Harsh chemicals may fade color and damage the composite materials, so caution is needed.

Composite decking remains an in-demand choice for outdoor spaces. Low-maintenance and long-lasting, these decks have quickly become favorites among homeowners.

- Reevaluate your lighting. Lighting a space is more than just flipping on a switch. Finding the right balance of lighting fixtures can instantly transform the feel of a room. Create more warmth and a cozy feel by switching out bulbs from cooler shades to warmer ones. Those that give off yellow and pink hues rather than cool blues. Accent lighting helps establish a comfortable space for curling up and reading a good book. NEW GRAIN TESTING PROGRAM AVAILABLE

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform local farmers of an alternative service delivery program from the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) for grain testing.

The REGAL (Recognition of Export Grain Analysis by Au-

thorized Laboratories) program will provide exporters the option of having their grain shipments to certain countries tested for phytosanitary purposes by authorized private laboratories.

The new program will initially be focused primarily on grain exports to India and China because these countries represent the highest export volumes from Canada. Strong oversight mech-

anisms will provide assurance to importing countries that Canada remains committed to the highest standards for grain exports.

The CFIA will remain solely responsible for issuing phytosanitary certificates for export shipments of grain.

“Canadian grain is in demand and trusted around the world. This new testing program will provide farmers with more op-

tions to ensure the integrity, health and safety of our food system,” conclude MP Eglinski.




