BRETON RCMP ISSUE WARNING OF MAIL THEFTS

The Breton RCMP is currently investigating theft of mail from the Buck Creek area that occurred between December 8 and December 11, 2017.

The RCMP recommends you do the following:

- Collect your mail daily.

- If you will be away, use Post Canada's "Hold Mail" service to suspend delivery until you return. - If you move, file a change of address with Post Canada and advise your banks and other companies of your new address.

- Never send cash in the mail. Use postal money orders available at every post office.

- Deposit mail items containing sensitive or financial information at your local post office, as well as large quantities of mail.

- If possible, use electronic billing services.

- If you see suspicious activity at your mailbox, report immediately to the RCMP.

- If you suspect that mail had

been stolen from your mailbox, notify the RCMP.

FREE ADMISSION TO PARKS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH STARTING IN 2018

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents of a recent announcement by Parks Canada. Beginning in 2018, admission for youth 17 and under will be free for all national parks, historic sites, and marine conservation areas.

In celebration of Canada's 150th anniversary, the federal government offered free admission for everyone visiting national parks in 2017. Starting in 2018, admission fees will return, but only for visitors over 18 years of age. The change is intended to encourage Canadian families and their children, youth, and school groups to experience the outdoors and learn more about our environment and history.

Fees for campsites and other amenities offered by Parks Canada are not included in the exemption.

"By making our national parks more accessible to our youth and families, they will have more opportunities to learn about the environment and how to protect it for future generations," stated MP Eglinski. "Our youth can also see first-hand the local issues facing Jasper National Park, such as the ongoing pine beetle infestation, as well as gain an appreciation for the outdoors through activities such as hiking at Edith Cavell or skiing at Marmot Basin".

When the federal government

announced free admission in 2017, many constituents in Yellowhead expressed concern over the impact that an increase in visitors could have on the Parks. With the government now permanently waiving fees for children and youth, the same concern remains.

"It is up to Parks Canada to manage and maintain the quality of the parks. Even with a record number of visitors in 2017, the impact by these visitors on the ecological integrity of Jasper National Park was minimal," concluded MP Eglinski.

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PARLIAMENT UPDATE – WEEK OF DECEMBER 11, 2017

This was a short week due to Parliament adjourning for the winter. It was a busy fall session and I look forward to spending some time in the riding.

The House of Commons debated the following:

• Bill C-24 – An Act to amend the Salaries Act and to make a consequential amendment to the Financial Administration Act (Third Reading)

• Bill C-51 – An Act to amend the Criminal Code and the Department of Justice Act and to make consequential amendments to another Act (Third Reading)

• Bill C-66 – Expungement of Historically Unjust Convictions Act (Third Reading)

• Bill S-228 – Child Health Protection Act (Second Reading)

• Bill S-236 – Recognition of Charlottetown as the Birthplace of Confederation Act (Third Reading) • Bill C-374 – An Act to amend the Historic Sites and Monuments Act (composition of the Board) (Second Reading)

In the Standing Committee on Industry, Science and Technology (INDU), we concluded and tabled a report on Canada's Anti-Spam Laws (CASL).

Also in Committee, we discussed two motions by MP Maxime Bernier. One requested a study of the Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act and protecting workers' pensions, which was voted down by the Liberal Members of the Committee. The other motion requested a review of Canadian Standards Association (CSA) and will be discussed in the New Year before a decision is made.

I also want to remind residents that the Committee is still accepting submissions on our study on broadband connectivity in rural Canada.

This week, I attended ¬three meetings and two events, as well as recorded a message.

I visited the students at David Thompson High School in Condor on December 18, and talked about what the job of a Parliamentarian entails and how Canadian government works. After speaking with the students, I headed to Caroline Community Hub where I met with constituents on Community Crime Awareness.

On December 19, I co-hosted an Open House with MLA Jason Nixon in my Rocky Mountain House office, and then headed to the James River area for a meeting with constituents to discuss broadband issues.

On December 21st I hosted a second Open House in my Edson office.

As Parliament adjourned for winter break on Wednesday evening, I want to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas, Happy New Year, and a safe holiday season.

ARREST WARRANT ISSUED FOR ARMED ROBBERY SUSPECT

On January 3, 2018 the Rocky Mountain House RCMP responded to a complaint of an armed robbery at the Sunchild Store. Investigation led to the identification of a suspect and an arrest warrant has been issued for 28-year-old Evan Ernest Foureyes.

Just prior to 8:00 p.m., three males arrived at the store on two quads, one of the males wearing a balaclava. The male removed his balaclava, and following a conversation with the store clerk, he made an attempt to deploy what appears to be bear spray. The canister malfunctioned and consequently no spray was deployed.

The male grabbed some product off the counter and fled the store without paying. He departed on one quad, while the other two males who had no involvement in the incident, departed on a second quad.

RCMP responded and located the quad which the suspect had fled on. It was abandoned, running, and stuck in a ditch. The RCMP determined that the quad had been reported stolen. It was recovered by the RCMP, but the males, including Foureyes, were not located.

As a result of this incident, Evan Foureyes is facing five criminal code charges: Robbery with a weapon, assault with a weapon, disguised with intent to commit an offence, possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose and drive while disqualified. A warrant has been issued for his arrest.

Foureyes is described as:

- First Nations
- Brown hair / brown eyes
- Approx 5'10" tall / 170 lbs.

• Several tattoos on his arms, including sleeves on both arms that extend to his chest and neck

Why should I get a screening mammogram?

A screening mammogram is a special X-ray of your breast. Once you're over 50, it is the best way to find breast cancer early. Screening mammograms can help find breast

cancer when it is very small, 2-3 years before you or your doctor can feel it. The earlier breast cancer is found the better treatment can be. In fact most women (about 90%) are now surviving breast cancer 5 years after diagnosis.

Who should get a screening mammogram?

Women 50 and over should plan to have a mammogram every 2 years and may self-refer. Women 40-49 should discuss the risks and benefits of screening with their doctor, and require a referral for their first appointment. There is no cost for this service. Here are some common myths and facts about breast cancer screening:

Myth #1: Breast cancer isn't very common.

In fact, 1 in 8 Alberta women will develop breast cancer in their lifetime.

Myth #2: Only women with a family history of breast cancer will get it.

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The truth is, 80% of women who develop breast cancer have no family history. So it's important to understand that you are still at risk for breast cancer even if no one in your family has ever had the disease.

Myth #3: Regular mammograms can't find small tumours any sooner than women could find them themselves.

Screening mammograms can find small tumours about 2-3 years before they can be felt. That's why screening is so important - it can find cancer before it has a chance to become more serious.

Myth #4: Having a mammogram can cause breast cancer or can cause an already existing cancer to spread.

Mammograms use a very small dose of radiation. Research confirms that the risk of harm from radiation from mammography is very low. The benefits of finding and treating breast cancer early far outweigh the risk of the small dose of radiation.

Myth #5: There is nothing a woman can do to lower her risk of developing breast cancer.

While it's true that there are some things you can't control, there are some things you can do:

• Physical Activity - Be physically active throughout your life and exercise every day.

• Weight - Try to reach or stay at a healthy body weight. This becomes even more important after menopause.

• Alcohol - Limit the amount of alcohol you drink to no more than one drink per day.

• Smoking - Don't smoke and avoid second-hand smoke. If you're currently a smoker, talk to your healthcare provider about options for quitting or cutting back. You can also get support at AlbertaQuits.ca or call 1-866-710-QUIT.

· Long-term Hormone Replacement Therapies (HRT) - Limit using the combination of estrogen and progestin menopausal hormone replacement therapy to no more than 5 years; long-term use (beyond 5 years) increases a woman's risk of breast cancer. But within 2 years of stopping, a woman's risk of breast cancer returns to average.

Drayton Valley, Alberta – RCMP have concluded their investigation into the sudden death of two local teens on December 21, 2017.

A mechanical inspection was completed on the vehicle on De-

cember 27, 2017 and determined that a faulty exhaust system component may have caused exhaust to enter into the vehicle cabin. It is unknown whether or not this was an existing problem or a recent occurrence.

Our thoughts continue to be with the community of Drayton Valley and the involved families during this difficult time. No further updates will be provided.

BACKGROUND:

On December 21, 2017 at approximately 3:30 a.m., RCMP were responding to an unrelated call for service in the area of 54 Street and 24 Avenue. While patrolling the perimeter of the building the responding member observed a parked vehicle with

the engine running.

Upon checking the vehicle, a 16 year old female passenger and 17 year old male driver were discovered unconscious. Fire and EMS were dispatched and attended the scene. The responding member noted a strong odour of exhaust fumes from inside the vehicle.

Page 12 Community Voice January 16, 2018 CHANGES MADE TO THE CANADA SUMMER JOBS PROGRAM FOR 2018

I have serious concerns over an issue that has recently come to light regarding the Canada Summer Jobs Program (CSJ). For years, the CSJ Program has provided funding to employers across Canada to hire young Canadians for summer job placements. Students benefit by gaining valuable employment and work experience, and communities benefit from the important services provided by these organizations. This has always been done in a non-partisan fashion.

I have learned that the Liberals have tried to quietly, without any consultation with Members of Parliament or Canadian employers, change the process through which employers apply for funding through the CSJ Program. The Government is now requiring those who apply for funding to sign the form that the employer agrees to uphold certain "values"-values that align with the Liberal Party's own ideology. This is unacceptable and, I would argue, is inconsistent with the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. This is a deeply concerning development

and Canadians should be extremely skeptical of a government that is basing funding decisions on whether or not you hold the same beliefs and values as they do.

There are numerous churches and religiously motivated organizations that receive annual funding through the CSJ Program and have received this funding for years. Typically, these funds are used to run summer camps and programs. Many young people who work at these programs gain valuable work experience over the course of the summer.

In no way are the funds used for any unlawful purpose as this Gov-



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ernment seems to suggest. This new requirement would leave these institutions two choices. Choice #1 would be to sign the form against their own beliefs and religion – which for most is not an option. Choice #2 would be to lose the funding and cancel their programs. Religious institutions should never be treated this way by their own Government.

The Charter of Rights and Freedoms explicitly protects the freedom of conscience and religion, freedom of belief, freedom of expression, and freedom of opinion. To punish employers applying for non-partisan funding simply because they have different views and ideology than the Government of the day is unacceptable.

If the Prime Minister were to apply this same process to eligibility for Old Age Security (OAS), I am sure that there would be a number of seniors that would either be forced to lie on the form or be forced to live without benefits that they are entitled to.

As a diverse society, Canada allows for diverse opinions and protects those who may think differently than those in positions of power. In fact, the right to freedom of belief and opinion is guaranteed by the Charter.

If your organization is effected by this discriminatory Liberal change, I urge you to submit your application anyway with a brief note explaining that in good conscience you are unable to sign the form.

I will be pressuring the Government to remove this ridiculous requirement in the application process for the CSJ Program and will be watching closely to ensure that employers in my riding are not rejected for refusing to swear to abide by this Government's priorities.
