RCMP INVESTIGATING FATAL COLLISION

Mayerthorpe, Alberta – On May 1, the Mayerthorpe RCMP responded to a serious two vehicle collision on Highway 43 at the intersection of Highway 22. Two adult females were declared deceased on scene and one male was not injured.

At 1:09 p.m., RCMP were dis-

patched to attend the collision scene. Initial investigation indicates that a northbound car was crossing Highway 43 and collided with a semi tractor trailer travelling eastbound.

The 67-year-old driver and 46-year-old passenger of the car succumbed to injuries received as a result of the collision.

The 57-year-old driver of the semi was not injured.

The RCMP collision analyst attended the scene to conduct an investigation, which remains ongoing. Traffic on the highway was diverted for four hours while the RCMP worked to clear the scene. Although the investigation remains ongoing, it is not anticipated that charges will be laid. No further updates will be provided about this incident.

UPDATE ON ICE JAM ALONG THE ATHABASCA RIVER

Overland flooding continues to impact areas near the Athabasca River east of Whitecourt. The localized flooding has not impacted properties within Whitecourt.

Review of the Alberta River Basins' flow range report as of early Tuesday, May 1 indicates that the Athabasca River near Windfall has gradually fallen over the last several days, and information collected at Riverboat Park and Spur #9 along the Athabasca River have also shown a drop in water levels. Town officials will continue to monitor the situation; however, no increase in water levels is expected based on the information currently available.

A creek that runs through Ro-

tary Park that had previously overflowed has now receded. Pritchard Trail and Riverside Trail near Rotary Park have reopened for public use. The Off Leash Dog Park parking lot, located along Flats Road, has also been reopened for public use.

As a result of localized flooding east of Whitecourt, areas of Flats Road are impassable and have been closed. For updates regarding this closures please visit Woodlands County's website at www.woodlands.ab.ca.

Residents are still urged to use caution around the Athabasca and McLeod Rivers, associated tributaries, and any standing water ponds.

The Town of Whitecourt will continue to monitor the situation, and will inform the community as updates become available.

Whitecourt Town Council passed the Tax Rate Bylaw 1539 at the April 23 Regular Meeting of Council. Property owners can expect to receive combined assessment and taxation notices in mid-May, well ahead of the Friday, June 29 deadline. The 2018 Budget required a 2.34% increase to the municipal tax rate. For the average single family home, property owners can expect an annual increase of \$44.47 for municipal taxes, and seniors and school requisitions. The 2018 Budget Report will be published next week, and will provide details on the budget, how property taxes are calculated, and how tax dollars have been allocated for 2018. If you have questions about your tax notice, or the 2018 Budget, please contact the Town Office.

Whitecourt Town Council approved the 2017 Financial Statement for the year end of December 31, 2017. A presentation was made by the Town's auditor, Curtis Friesen from Metrix Group, who reported that the consolidated financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the consolidated financial position of the Town of Whitecourt as of December 31, 2017.

Whitecourt awarded over \$28,000 in funding to local community groups as part of the 2018 Enhancement Grant Program. The grant offers community arts, culture, and recreation organizations assistance to start up or develop new community events or enhance existing facilities and programs. The following groups will receive support for their local projects:

A review of fees at the Allan & Jean Millar Centre was recently completed, and rates at the facility will be changing as of September 10, 2018. The Community Services Advisory Board conducts a review of fees every two years, and based on comparables a 4% increase was recommended to ensure facility fees remain equitable to other multiplexes throughout the province, and to support the facility's vision. Letters will be provided to all facility members that pay for memberships through electronic funds transfer (EFT), and advertisements will be posted at the facility, online, and in the Community Spectrum leading up to September.

Whitecourt and Woodlands County will be conducting joint community tours in the coming weeks to provide members of both Councils the opportunity to visit areas and facilities of joint interest. The municipalities will also be scheduling a joint planning session in the summer to review issues of mutual benefit.

SELECT THE RIGHT FERTILIZER FOR YOUR NEEDS

For plants to truly flourish, the right growing conditions and soil that offers the right nutrients is of paramount importance. Fertilizer enhances soil so that plants and flowers can thrive. However, fertilizer is not a one-size-fits-all mix.

Choosing fertilizer can be a little overwhelming thanks to the variety of formulations available at neighborhood lawn and garden centers. Shelves contain all-purpose products, such as those billed as vegetable fertilizer, and even formulations geared toward specific flower varieties. Others may feature buzz words like "all-natural" or "organic," and consumers may not be sure just what they need to keep plants healthy. The following guidelines can help any would-be gardener or landscaper grow more vibrant plants.

Start with a soil test

It's difficult to determine what plants need without an accurate picture of what's going on in the ground. A soil test can paint a picture of what's going on and indicate if any nutrients are lacking. A common misconception is that gardeners fertilize plants. But fertilizer amends the soil that feeds plants, according to the soil-testing lab professionals at Virginia Tech. Soil types vary by region, and conditions may even vary between spots on a landscape. Testing where the plants will be placed can yield the most accurate results. Soil tests are available at gardening centers and online. Otherwise, landscaping professionals can conduct tests.

Know the N-P-K ratio

Most fertilizers will come with information concerning the nutrients within. Most notably it will have a breakdown of how much nitrogen (N), phosphorous (P) and potassium (K) is in the mix. Judging by the soil test, gardeners can choose a product that will give them the right ratio to amend the soil for the type of plant they are hoping to grow. Complete fertilizers often have NPK in the formulation. Incomplete fertilizers may have only one or two nutrients. This allows a person to customize fertilizer even more without overdoing it with a particular nutrient.

Grow plant knowledge

A cursory knowledge of the plants being planted in the garden also can be helpful. Gardeners must recognize that some plants will not tolerate excess amounts of a particular fertilizer component, while some may need more. Checking books out of the library, seeking information online and consulting with landscaping experts will help expand homeowners' knowledge about plant types and the needs of each particular plant they hope to grow.

Solid and liquid fertilizer

Fertilizers are generally sold in pellets, spikes and liquid forms. Pellets or granules are dispersed over large areas and will gradually offer nutrients when the soil is watered. Liquid fertilizer is concentrated and fast-acting. These may be used for container plants or smaller areas. Spikes usually are placed in houseplants or to feed individual trees or shrubs. Depending on the formulation, fertilizer may need to be reapplied once a month or more. Consult the product packaging for the correct application advice.

Fertilizer amends soil to grow stronger, more resilient plants.



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PREPARING GARDEN BEDS FOR SPRING & BEYOND

Gardening enthusiasts may have been thinking about their landscape plans throughout the winter, eager to once again get their hands dirty with soil. Whether a home gardener is making preparations for edible crops or beautiful flowers, he or she must take time to make the soil amenable to planting. To establish hearty, durable plants, gardeners can focus on three main areas: addressing soil composition, cultivating and adding nutrients.

Soil composition

Many gardeners prefer growing a variety of plants in their gardens. Such an approach requires taking inventory of the type of soil in one's garden and making the necessary modifications so that the types of vegetables, herbs, shrubs, or flowers that will be planted can grow in strongly. In fact, according to the plant company Proven Winners, the most important step to developing good roots is preparing the soil.

Take a sample of the soil and examine it to see what is present. If the soil is too full of clay, too sandy, too dense, or too loose, that can lead to problems where plants cannot grow in strong. Work with a garden center to add the right soil amendments to make a rich soil. This may include organic compost or manure, which will also add nutrients to the soil.

Cultivation

Cultivating the soil can involve different steps. Removal of weeds, errant rocks, roots, and other items will help prepare the soil. Mother Earth News suggests working on garden soil when the soil is damp but never wet; otherwise, garden soil can become messy and clumpy. Use a digging fork or shovel to lightly turn the soil when it's mostly dry. Gentle tillings also can open up the soil to incorporate the nutritional amendments and relieve compaction that likely occurred from freezing temps and snow pressure. Tilling also helps with drainage and oxygen delivery to roots. The DIY Network suggests turning over soil at a depth of 12 inches to work the soil - about the length of a shovel spade. However, the resource Earth Easy says that existing garden beds have a complex soil ecosystem and simply top-dressing with compost or manure can be enough preparation for planting. Gardeners can experiment with the methods that work best for their gardens.

Nutrition

Testing the pH and the levels of certain nutrients in the soil, namely nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium, will give gardeners an idea of other soil additions that may be needed. Soils with a pH below 6.2 often can benefit from the addition of lime several weeks before planting. Soil tests will determine just how much fertilizer to add to the soil. Complete fertilizers will have equal amounts of nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium. Individual fertilizers can amend the soil with only these nutritional elements that are needed.

Top-dressing empty beds with a layer of mulch or compost can prevent weed growth and preserve moisture until it is time to plant. If existing shrubs or plants are in garden beds, use more care so as not to disturb roots or dig too deeply.

Preparing garden beds takes some effort initially, but can be well worth the work when plants flourish throughout the growing season.

Know the risks

· Know the risks in your community. Contact your municipality to learn about its emergency plan and for advice on identifying risks in your area.

Make a plan

· Make a plan for what your family will do, who they will contact and where they will go during an emergency. Practice the plan regularly. If you have a pet, make sure you have a plan for them as well.

Build a kit

· Alberta families should be prepared to take care of themselves for a minimum of 72 hours during a disaster or emergency. Assemble a 72-hour kit with non-perishable food, water, medication, warm clothing and comfort items. This kit should be prepared in case you need to evacuate quickly. Every vehicle should also be equipped with an emergency kit.

All Albertans are encouraged to download the Alberta Emergency Alert app to their smartphones. Alberta Emergency Alerts are issued to provide critical information about an immediate disaster, where it is occurring and what action you need to take to stay safe.

Starting this year, Albertans will also receive messages about life threatening emergencies, such as tornadoes, wildfires, floods or Amber Alerts, directly to their compatible cellphones, through a national alerting system. This national system complements the Alberta Emergency Alert system, which issues alerts through radio, television, social media and cellphones for critical and emerging issues in Alberta.

Keep yourself informed before and during an emergency by learning where to access local information about your community.

DON'T LET GOLFING PAIN BE PAR FOR THE COURSE

(NC) A little know-how can help golfers avoid unnecessary injury. Considering the number of times a swing is repeated during a game, it's not surprising that the season often ends early for those who are not physically prepared.

Below are a few simple stretching techniques that can

help prevent or reduce the impact of injuries:

Side bending stretch

1. Stand with feet shoulder-width apart.

2. Hold the golf club above your head with your arms straight.

3. Slowly bend to one side, without rotating, until you feel a

stretch in the side of your back.4. Hold for 15 seconds and re-

peat twice for each side. Shoulder stretch

1. Hold the shaft of a golf club vertically behind your back.

2. Gently pull the club up with your top hand until you feel a slight stretch in the shoulder of your lower arm. Hold for 15 seconds.

3. Gently pull the club down with your bottom hand until you feel a stretch in the top shoulder and arm.

4. Hold for 15 seconds.

5. Reverse hand positions and repeat.

fleets that Natural Resources Canada has launched the new Green Freight Assessment Program (GFAP).

This program offers contributions of up to \$10,000 for Canadian companies to review the state of their fleets to help make informed decisions to reduce their fuel costs, and their greenhouse gas emissions.

"Industry consultations have identified financial challenges and lack of information as the main barrier for implementing emission-reducing strategies. This program aims to help eliminate these barriers," stated MP Eglinski.

The assessment will determine the company's performance baseline and build scenarios to test strategies to identify solutions for poor performing areas of their fleet and operations. This assessment will not only look at the fleet portrait as a whole, but also identify behavioural and operational opportunities that may be available to optimize business operations.

Successful program applicants who complete an assessment will be considered for participation in a Pilot Implementation Project, providing additional funding to help finance solutions as outlined in the assessment.

"The recommendations that come out of theses assessments will help business owners and operators make informed decisions to ultimately reduce operating costs and increase profits while having a positive impact on the environment," concluded MP Eglinski.

ENABLING ACCESSIBILITY FUND – MID-SIZED PROJECTS

The call is open to not-for-profit and Indigenous organizations, municipalities and territorial governments.

The EAF mid-sized CFC provides contribution funding to organizations for projects that help improve and make Canadian facilities and venues more accessible for people with disabilities. As a result of the projects, eligible organizations must offer or plan to offer services and programs that support the social and labour market integration needs of people with disabilities. Financial contributions between \$350,000 and \$1 million will be provided through the current CFC for each successful retrofit, renovation or construction project.

The CFC follows a two-step application approach. First, applicants are invited to submit their project concepts. Then, applicants whose project concepts are successful will be asked to submit a detailed proposal at a later date. The deadline to apply is May

24, 2018.

"This call for proposals provides an important opportunity to make sure that all residents in our riding of Yellowhead, regardless of their abilities, feel welcome in their workplaces and communities. RCMP MAKE SIGNIFICANT FIREARM SEIZURE

Parkland County, Alberta- Following a thorough investigation that spanned three months and continued intelligence gathering, search warrants were executed and the RCMP have seized dangerous weapons from targeted offenders.

On April 21, 2018 Stony Plain/ Spruce Grove/Enoch RCMP Drug Section with the assistance of the Crime Reduction Unit (CRU) and the General Duty members executed two search warrants. One for a residence in Val Quentin and the other was for a storage locker in the area of Parkland County.

In the course of this search, RCMP seized firearms, suppressors, high capacity magazines, hundreds of rounds of ammunition, cocaine/ meth/GHB, \$10 000 cash, and stolen vehicles.

As a result, 34-year-old Jeffery RUSSELL and 27-year-old Quincey MILES were arrested and charged.

RUSSELL was charged with 50 charges, including:

• Possession of a stolen firearm

• Possession of a loaded restricted firearm

• Possession of a loaded prohibited firearm.

• Possession of a restricted firearm with a defaced serial number.

• Possession of GHB for the purpose of trafficking.

• Possession of meth for the purpose of trafficking.

• Possession of cocaine for the purpose of trafficking.

RUSSELL was remanded into custody and will attend court May 2, 2018 in Stony Plain.

MILES has been charged with:

possession of a prohibited device

• possession of property obtained



by crime over \$5000

MILES was released from custody with conditions to attend court on May 2, 2018 in Stony Plain.

"These are not hunting rifles. In the hands of criminals, these weapons serve no legitimate purpose in our society. I'm pleased that my officers have got them off the streets." -Staff Sergeant Mike Lokken, Acting Officer in Charge of Stony Plain/ Spruce Grove/Enoch RCMP.

"This is just the most recent example of how a coordinated and intelligence-led Crime Reduction Strategy can impact our communities.
