Local Counties Announced as Finalists in Smart City Challenge

Over 200 communities, large and small, from across Canada submitted their ideas to the Smart Cities Challenge. An independent panel of 13 jury members evaluated these submissions and has selected twenty finalists.

"I was excited to learn that four of our very own counties have been selected to move on to the next step of the challenge," stated MP Eglinski.

Parkland, Brazeau, Lac Ste Anne and Yellowhead Counties all teamed together to submit a proposal that would help their "agricultural

community to revitalize and grow through the connection of people to the land and food while attracting citizens to share in its prosperous, innovative and resilient way of life."

The counties' submission is one of ten in the prize category for up to \$10 million that was open to communities with populations under 500,000 people. Out of the ten finalists in this category, two will be selected.

In the next and final stage, each applicant group will receive a \$250,000 grant to help develop its final proposal that outline all design, planning, privacy, data protection

and project management components of their plans. The grant can be used for activities such as staffing, professional services, feasibility assessments, capacity building, pilot projects, community engagement and communications, data, and relevant training.

The winners are expected to be announced in the spring of 2019.

"Congratulations to our counties on their grant and the best of luck in this final stage of the challenge!" concluded MP Eglinski.


On Thursday evening, I asked a question during the debate on Bill C-47, which attempts to bring Canada into line with the UN Arms Trade Treaty, also known as the ATT. Canada already has a responsible internal system to monitor and control the export of military and security equipment that meets or exceeds the UN Treaty. We do not need more red tape on firearms. Instead, the federal government should be focusing on how to address the issue of rural crime.

This week, I attended 77 716 meetings and -three events, as well as recorded two messages. I will return to Yellowhead over the weekend to attend events in the riding. Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to advise that Social Development Canada has launched the New Horizons for Seniors Program (NHSP) 2018-2019 call for proposals for Community-based Projects.

Programs like NHSP not only encourage seniors to stay involved in their community, but also increase their social participation and inclusion. GREEN FREIGHT ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform transport companies with Heavy-Duty Vehicle (HDV) fleets that Natural Resources Canada has launched the new Green Freight Assessment Program (GFAP).

This program offers contributions of up to \$10,000 for Canadian companies to review the state of their fleets to help make informed decisions to reduce their fuel costs, and their greenhouse gas emissions.

"Industry consultations have identified financial challenges and lack of information as the main barrier for implementing emission-reducing strategies. This program aims to help eliminate these barriers," stated MP Eglinski.

The assessment will determine the company's performance baseline and build scenarios to test strate-

gies to identify solutions for poor performing areas of their fleet and operations. This assessment will not only look at the fleet portrait as a whole, but also identify behavioural and operational opportunities that may be available to optimize business operations.

Successful program applicants who complete an assessment will be considered for participation in a Pilot Implementation Project, providing additional funding to help finance solutions as outlined in the assessment.

"The recommendations that come out of theses assessments will help business owners and operators make informed decisions to ultimately reduce operating costs and increase profits while having a positive impact on the environment," concluded MP Eglinski.

DON'T LET GOLFING PAIN BE PAR FOR THE COURSE

(NC) A little know-how can help golfers avoid unnecessary injury. Considering the number of times a swing is repeated during a game, it's not surprising that the season often ends early for those who are not physically prepared.

Below are a few simple stretching techniques that can help prevent or reduce the impact of injuries:

Side bending stretch

1. Stand with feet shoulder-width apart.

2. Hold the golf club above your head with your arms straight.

 Slowly bend to one side, without rotating, until you feel a stretch in the side of your back.
 Hold for 15 seconds and re-

peat twice for each side. Shoulder stretch

Shoulder stretch

1. Hold the shaft of a golf club vertically behind your back.

2. Gently pull the club up with your top hand until you feel a slight stretch in the shoulder of your lower arm. Hold for 15 seconds. 3. Gently pull the club down with your bottom hand until you feel a stretch in the top shoulder and arm.

Hold for 15 seconds.
 Reverse hand positions and repeat.

FOLLOWING GUN SHOT COMPLAINT

Leduc County, Alberta – On May 23, following complaints of a gun shot fired, the RCMP in Leduc located, pursued, arrested and charged a male suspect.

At 3:22 p.m. a 911 call was received that two males were arguing on a rural road and a gun shot was fired. The unfolding incident began when the suspect male assaulted a female. The female victim ran and sought assistance from an uninvolved motorist. The male driver of the assisting motorist confronted the suspect male who then pointed his gun at this driver, and fired a shot into the air. The male suspect smashed the vehicle's passenger side window and made efforts to remove the female from the vehicle.

The RCMP responded and located the suspect male who fled in his vehicle. A short pursuit ensued into an open field where the suspect was arrested. As a result of a search of the suspect's vehicle, a 9mm handgun was seized.

The 21-year-old female victim was not seriously injured during this incident.

21-year-old Abduarrhman Abuoun has been charged with assault, mischief under \$5,000, pointing a firearm at a person, careless use of a firearm, and three other firearms related offences. He remains in custody, and is scheduled to appear in court in Leduc on Monday May 28, 2018.

On Thursday, I participated in debate on Bill C-57, which was originally passed by our previous Conservative Government and aims to make decision-making related to sustainable development more transparent, more certain and subject to greater accountability. I stated:

"I will stand in this House all day long and wave the fact that I think Canada-the provinces of B.C., Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba, and even a little has been done in Ontario and Quebec-has the greatest, strongest environmental standards in the world, and we produce the cleanest energy, regardless of what it is, whether it is coal, oil, or gas."
