CITY OF LEDUC HOSTING NEW FAMILY VIOLENCE FUNDRAISER

BREAKFAST WITH THE MAYOR EVENT TO EDUCATE COMMUNITY ON IMPACTS OF FAMILY VIOLENCE

On Nov. 6, the City of Leduc will host the inaugural 'Breakfast with the Mayor' event to raise awareness and funds to help end family violence in the Leduc region. The fundraiser will build on the success of 'Breakfast with the Guys', which the city previously hosted between 2015 and 2017. That event raised a total

of more than \$48,000 in support of local family violence support agencies.

"Family violence is a complex issue that requires compassion, understanding and support from every corner of our community to address," says City of Leduc Mayor Bob Young. "Its effects are more far-reaching than many people realize, and we wanted to create a 'Made in Leduc' solution to let people in our community know that we are here to help them in any way we can."

The theme for this year's event is 'It's Not that Easy: Understanding the Complexities of Family Violence.' Guest speaker Namrata (Mona) Gill, a member of Edmonton Police Service (EPS), will speak about her firsthand experience with family violence and the lessons she's learned through her 18-year career with EPS.

"Family violence is a human rights issue. We all have a duty to speak up and work towards ending this," says Gill. "We also have a duty to support both women and men who are living with family violence as until you are in this situation, you don't understand why they don't just leave."

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CHARGES DOWN DURING LABOUR DAY LONG WEEKEND TRAFFIC PATROL

LEDUC COUNTY PEACE OFFICERS ISSUE 44 CHARGES, 16 WARNINGS

While people across Leduc County celebrated the Labour Day long weekend, Leduc County peace officers were on patrol to keep our residents and visitors safe on the roads.

Over the four-day period from Aug. 31 to Sept. 3, peace officers travelled a total of 4,653 kilome-

tres and issued 44 charges and 16 warnings for speeding, intersection safety, liquor, documents and more.

In 2017, peace officers issued 93 charges and 42 warnings over the same four-day period.

"We are pleased to see a reduction in the overall number of charges laid over this Labour Day long weekend in comparison to last year. While the numbers are encouraging, our

dedicated peace officers will continue to proactively patrol roadways in the area to make sure everyone gets where they are going safely." - Clarence Nelson, director of Enforcement Services

During a traffic stop on Range Road 271, a 14-year-old male dirt bike operator was charged for speeding and failing to stop for a peace officer after he fled from authorities. In addition to patrolling the roads, peace officers assisted Leduc County Fire Services and RCMP with a vehicle fire on Highway 2 in the southbound lanes near Highway 19 during the afternoon rush hour. They also conducted a boat check at Wizard Lake, where a motorist was restricted from accessing the water without a required pleasure craft licence and safety equipment.

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BLUE-GREEN ALGAE (CYANOBACTERIA) BLOOM ADVISORY ISSUED FOR BUCK LAKE

RED DEER – A blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) bloom has been identified in areas of Buck Lake, located southeast of Drayton Valley. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

• Avoid all contact with blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible

- Do not swim or wade (or allow your pets to swim or wade) in any areas where bluegreen algae (cyanobacteria) is visible.
- Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.
- Consider limiting human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from

this lake).

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Buck Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by blue-green algae. An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock, while this advisory is active.

Blue-green algae is naturally occurring, and often becomes

visible when weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz or globs on the surface of water, blue-green algae can be blue-green, green-ish-brown, brown, and/or pink-ish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible blue-green algae or who ingest water containing blue-green algae may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Buck Lake, until further notice.

Please note that areas of Buck Lake in which the blue-green algae bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this blue-green algae Health Advisory is in place.

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

PROTECT YOUR HOME (AND MORE) FROM WINTER'S FREEZE

Freezing temperatures may be good for ice skating or building snowmen, but sub-freezing temperatures can be dangerous for the average person and his or her home.

Cold weather often leaves people scurrying to do whatever is necessary to safeguard themselves from the big chill. But it's important homeowners also protect their homes in cold weather.

Plumbing

Plumbing and pipes may be vulnerable to cold weather. Frozen pipes may burst and cause substantial damage to a home, potentially causing flooding and structural damage.

Homeowners should disconnect and drain garden hoses before winter arrives. Water to outdoor hose bibs should be turned off, though

the valves on these outdoor faucets should be left open to drain. Also, outdoor faucets can be covered with insulating foam covers.

The Red Cross says pipes that freeze most frequently include pipes in unheated areas, such as basements, attics, garages, and crawl spaces. Close vents to the outside in areas like attics and basements to limit the amount of cold air that gets indoors. Think about insulating unheated areas, as well as using pipe sleeves, heat tape or wraps on exposed pipes.

By opening kitchen and bathroom cabinet doors, homeowners can allow warm air from a home to reach pipes under the sink. During extreme freezes, keep cold water dripping from a sink to prevent pipes from freezing.

It's important to ensure that heating systems are working properly prior to the cold-weather season. It may only take hours for the interior of a home to reach dangerously low temperatures without adequate heat. Homeowners should schedule annual checkups of furnaces and hot water heaters. Inspect the heat exchanger for cracks, install a clean air filter and make sure all thermostats are working properly.

Have fuel ready

Homeowners who heat their homes with oil, wood or coal should make sure they have plenty of fuel on hand in advance of winter. Shortages can occur, and it may take some time for new fuel to arrive in the midst of a cold snap.

As a precaution, homeowners can rely on portable space heaters to fill

in the heating gaps during freezing temperatures. Exercise extreme caution with these devices, turning them off when leaving the room and remembering to avoid overloading outlets.

Protect outside

Drain birdbaths, clean out downspouts and remove water from other items where water can freeze and cause damage. Inspect roofing prior to the snowy season, but stay off roofs during freezing weather.

Remove snow shovels and other winter gear from storage and make sure the items are easily accessible during snowstorms.

Winter's bite can be severe. Homeowners can protect themselves and their properties when the freeze sets

SIGNS IT IS TIME FOR NEW WINDOWS


- Comfortable seat: A bench or chair nestled by a bath-room window is the perfect spot for pedicures or catching up on some light reading.

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PROJECT ENTRY IMPLICATES OUTLAW BIKERS IN DRUG TRAFFICKING

A joint investigation between ALERT and RCMP's Federal Serious and Organized Crime has dismantled an extensive cocaine distribution network linked to a member of the Hells Angels and support club members.

Project Entry was a year-long investigation that resulted in 10 people charged with 45 criminal offences. Those accused allegedly fulfilled various roles within a cocaine distribution network that impacted the communities of Edmonton. Spruce

Grove, Cold Lake, Whitecourt, and Grande Prairie.

Project Entry resulted in the seizure of five kilograms of cocaine, half a kilogram of the buffing agent Phenacetin, cannabis resin, and a handgun. Multiple vehicles and motorcycles were seized, along with \$13,000 cash proceeds of crime.

The project concluded with multiple arrests made between July 25 and 30, 2018

Project Entry has resulted in extensive criminal charges being laid, including: instructing a criminal organization; participating in a criminal organization; conspiracy to traffic cocaine; and other drug-, firearms-, and property-related offences.

At the centre of the investigation was Hells Angels Westridge (Edmonton) member William McCabe. The 47-year-old man from Spruce Grove allegedly oversaw cocaine trafficking operations and facilitated distribution through various communities. McCabe has been charged with instructing a criminal organization.

Project Entry also implicated two support club members, Shane Daly and Pascal Jacques, who are members of the Dirty Few Lakeland chapter. Support clubs are typically utilized to carry out lower-level dirty work for the Hells Angels, such as drug trafficking and expanding territory to secondary markets.

- Anton Petrowitz, a 36-year-old man from Calgary;
- Clinton Thomas, a 33-year-old man from Parkland County;
- Nicholas Stovell, a 38-year-old man from Cold Lake;
- Nicholas Delibasic, a 46-year-old man from Cold Lake; and
- Larissa Ausmus, a 31-year-old woman from Spruce Grove.

Project Entry began in March 2017 after information was received about the role of outlaw bikers in drug trafficking.



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DRAYTON VALLEY RCMP WARNS PUBLIC ABOUT TELEPHONE FRAUD SCAMS

Drayton Valley, Alberta - Drayton Valley RCMP are warning the public about several different telephone scams that have recently been reported.

The first one involves receiving phone calls from someone impersonating Canada Revenue (CRA) Employees. These in-

dividuals will tell the taxpayers that they have a warrant for their arrest and in order to not get arrested, they have to pay money or get gift cards and provide them to the scammers. The CRA would never request someone to pay money over the phone, and would not accept gift cards as payment.

These scammers have been using spoofing mechanism which

will show that the call is coming from an RCMP Detachment in order to convince the victim that they are not scammers.

Another scam involves the scammer advising the person that their ITunes account has been hacked. They request ITunes cards as payment. They tell the victim that if they do not comply, then their account will continue to be hacked and that

any of their personal information will be accessed.

Safety Tips:

No legitimate government agency or business will demand payment in gift cards or prepaid credit cards. These methods are used by criminals in order to hide their activities from police.

If you receive a call from someone claiming you owe money, get as much information from them as possible and tell them you will call them back. Find the government agencies' phone number through a trusted source (phone book or official website) and call the department back. Don't trust the phone number or email from the caller until you have verified that they are who they say the are.

Do not share any personal information with the caller, such as confirming the name, social insurance number, address etc.

The best protection from scammers is to learn how to resist being bullied into a decision regardless of how persuasive or aggressive the scammer may be. Arm yourself and the vulnerable people in your life by learning how to recognize and protect yourself from fraud at Canada's Anti-Fraud Centre website www.antifraudcentre.ca and http://www.cra-arc.gc.ca/scrty/frdprvntn/menueng.html

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

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












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
