August 31, 2018 – FarmCash, a new cash advance option led by the Alberta Wheat Commission (AWC) under the Federal Government's Advance Payments Program (APP), is now live and ready to accept applications on September 1 for the Fall Advance at farmcashadvance. com. Farmers who use the online application will be guided through a step-by-step process that is simple, efficient, and saves time on paperwork.

FarmCash offers advances on 45 commodities of up to \$400,000 per program year with \$100,000 interest-free and \$300,000 at a low interest rate.

"One of our goals in developing FarmCash is to improve the user experience," said Kevin Bender, AWC Chair. "Our webbased platform slims down the application process so applicants are only navigating through information that's relevant to what they're applying for. Our ultimate goal is to deliver something really simple that saves time. Farmers can also apply the traditional way if they prefer."

CALMAR DISTRICT FIRE STATION NOW OPEN

Construction is now complete and operations have begun at the new \$3.5-million fire station, which will serve Leduc County Fire Services' Calmar Fire District for the next 40-plus years.

"The Calmar District Fire Station is a valuable infrastructure investment for our county, which will allow Leduc County Fire Services to serve the Calmar Fire District today, tomorrow and in the future. We are pleased that the station was completed on time and on budget, and are excited for the enhancements to the community that this building will bring." - Mayor Tanni Doblanko The new station features five double-depth bays -- roughly double the size of the former station -- and is home to firefighters and apparatus responding in the Calmar Fire District and beyond.

"The new Calmar station is in the most centralized district in Leduc County, making it the ideal location to house specialized equipment. This will benefit all residents and businesses throughout the county." - Fire Chief Keven Lefebvre, Leduc County Fire Services

The mobile command unit, which acts as a command centre for response, and the investigation support unit, which provides supplies and relief to firefighters as they respond to emergencies, will be relocated to the Calmar District Fire Station from the Nisku District Fire Station. In addition, Leduc County maintains an agreement with Alberta Health Services to ensure an ambulance remains in the community on a part-time basis, responding from the new fire station.

Leduc County began managing and operating fire and disaster services in the Calmar Fire District -- which includes all property east of Range Road 275 and west of Range Road 262, including the Town of Calmar -on Jan. 1, 2017.

Leduc County also manages and operates the fire service in the Nisku, New Sarepta and Thorsby fire districts and has mutual-aid partnerships in place with the other districts in the county.

MP JIM EGLINSKI NAMED TO NEW COMMITTEES

OTTAWA: MP Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, has officially been named to two new committees: the Standing Committee on Public Safety and National Security (SECU) and the Standing Joint Committee on the Library of Parliament (BILI).

SECU reviews the policies, programs and expenditure plans

of government departments and agencies responsible for public safety and national security, policing and law enforcement, corrections and conditional release of federal offenders, emergency management, crime prevention and the protection of Canada's borders.

BILI consists of Members from both the House of Commons and Senate, and it assists the Speakers of both Chambers in reviewing the effectiveness, management, and operation of the Library. The Speakers of both chambers, assisted by the Joint Committee, direct the dayto-day functioning of the Library, and, with the approval of both Houses, may make orders and regulations to govern how the Library is managed and how moneys are expended. The Joint Committee, under this arrangement, plays a role in the direction of the Library of Parliament by supporting the Speakers as they provide direction to the Library.

"Given my 35 years of experience as an RCMP member, I am excited to bring my practical knowledge to the table. The Liberals have been failing Canada on matters of national security, including border security and increased crime and gang activity. I look forward to playing an active role in keeping this Liberal Government to account for their failures," concluded MP Eglinski.



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Page 4 Community Voice September 25, 2018 CONSULTATION – TAXATION OF CANNABIS

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, would like to inform residents that the Department of Finance has launched a consultation on a set of technical draft regulatory and legislative proposals under the Excise Act, 2001 that would provide for the additional excise duty rates for each province or territory that has signed a CCTA with the Government of Canada. These rates would come into effect when cannabis for non-medical purposes becomes available for legal retail sale.

In keeping with the agreement reached by Finance Ministers, under the CCTAs, revenues from the excise duties on cannabis products will be shared on the following basis: 75 per cent to provincial and territorial governments, and 25 per cent to the federal government. Provinces and territories will work with municipalities according to shared responsibilities towards legalization.

In addition, federal revenues

from the excise duty on cannabis will be capped at \$100 million per year for the 24 months that follow the legalization of non-medical cannabis. Excess federal revenues over the \$100 million cap will be provided to provinces and territories that have concluded a CCTA with the federal government.

This consultation seeks comments on additional regulatory proposals that would provide:

• exemptions for certain entities to allow the possession of cannabis products stamped for multiple jurisdictions, under certain conditions;

• the ability for third parties to possess cannabis excise stamps for specific purposes; and

• exemptions from the proposed excise duty for certain cannabis-based products that are not intended for human consumption.

CONSULTATION – PROPOSED BAN OF STRYCHNINE

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is informing residents that Health Canada has quietly launched a public consultation on a proposed ban of strychnine. Strychnine is a registered pesticide used by growers to control ground squirrels, which are more commonly known as gophers.

The Pest Management Regulatory Association (PMRA), under Health Canada, is proposing to "cancel the registration of Maxim 2% Liquid Strychnine Concentrate, and to require removal of ground squirrel use from the label of S.A.R.M Gopher Poison R.T.U." The agency sites the effects on non-target animals as the reason for the review.

A previous review was conducted in the early 2000s, but found little-to-no evidence that strychnine harmed non-target animals.

"In the last review, the Conservative Party worked hard for several years to fight for farmers and ranchers, due to the plague of gophers in Western Canada. In the end, the decision was made to allow access to strychnine on an emergency basis," stated MP Eglinski.

The consultation period, which is taking place over the summer, and during harvest season, closes on September 27, 2018.

Conservative MPs are requesting an extension of the consultation period in order to give farmers and ranchers an opportunity to comment following their very busy harvest season. "Gophers do an incredible amount of destruction to crops and their ground tunnels pose a risk to livestock. Preventing the use of strychnine to address the issue, without indication of secondary harm, is unacceptable," concluded MP Eglinski.

RAIL SAFETY IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents of funding being invested in rail safety within Alberta and the riding. This week, the Department of Transportation announced \$3.3 million to support eighteen projects in Alberta.

The funds are part of the Rail Safety Improvement Program, which provides grant and contribution funding to improve rail safety and reduce injuries and fatalities related to rail transporThe announced funds will be used to:

• build fencing and other barriers to discourage trespassing on railway properties;

• install flashing lights, bells, and gates at the crossings;

• install advanced train detection and crossing control system.

In Yellowhead, Canadian National Railway will receive \$163,800 to upgrade a rail crossing on Range Road 73 with gates.

The announcement comes amid ongoing concerns about rail safety in Edson.

"While I welcome the fund-

ing announcement, for years our communities in Yellowhead have experienced safety issues in which trains block crossings for unacceptable amounts of time," stated MP Eglinski.

MP Eglinski took the opportunity to remind residents that the Canadian Transportation Agency (CTA) has launched a consultation on rail-related regulations and is requesting the feedback of Canadians. All those interested are invited to share their views to ensure that the CTA's rail-related regulations and guidance materials are relevant, clear and up to date. Participants can submit comments to ferroviaire-rail@ otc-cta.gc.ca before the September 30, 2018 deadline.

"If residents are being excessively held up by a train at a rail crossing or have a safety concern, I am encouraging them, as well as stakeholders with a vested interest in rail safety, to make their voices heard in this consultation," stated MP Eglinski.

Cellular shades are another option that provide privacy but still let light in. Cellular shades come in hard and fabric variet-

ies and their use depends on the room. Many cellular shades are constructed with a honeycomb design, offers the design resource Houzz, so they can insulate as well as decorate windows.

Blackout shades/shutters

NEW VETERAN'S SERVICE

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform local residents that the Department of National Defence has announced that new Veteran's Service Cards will be distributed to former and releasing Canadian Armed Forces members who completed basic training and have been honourably released. The new cards will provide a tangible symbol of recognition for former members, encourage an enduring affiliation with the Canadian Armed Forces and ensure linkages to Veterans Affairs Canada support programs as





military members transition to post-service life.

CARD

The cards are a response to a call for action by Canadian Armed Forces members, Veterans, and the Veterans Ombudsman's 2012 report.

The 2015 Conservative election platform promised to issue a similar card to reduce red tape for those seeking Veteran services and make it easier for them to receive benefits. However, the Conservatives would have gone a step further to make the card official government identification.

"We thank the government for implementing our 2015 campaign commitment, but Vets wanted this to be official government ID it is not. Let's make that happen!" tweeted MP Phil McColeman, the Conservative Shadow Minister for Veterans Affairs.

The new Veteran's Service Card will be distributed in stages beginning in September 2018. The first stage includes all newly releasing Canadian Armed Forces members.

Interested Veterans who released from the Canadian Armed Forces between February 2016 and September, 2018 can apply for the card during stage two beginning in December 2018.

The third stage will begin Summer 2019, and will see cards produced and issued upon request, to all eligible Veterans released prior to February 2016.

"Canada and its Veterans share a social covenant and the federal government should be committed to providing them the best possible services and benefits. I am pleased to see this development and look forward to working towards official government I.D. for our Veterans," concluded MP Eglinski.
