SANGUDO HORTICULTURAL CLUB SUMMARY OF EVENTS

Roxanne Lewchuck A WALK IN MY GARDEN Jan 21/2019 -Roxanne gave the Sangudo Horticultural Club an informative presentation relating to her rural property. She felt Structure and Balance are the most important aspects for eye appeal. She was a fan of using wood chips, and said if you have gravel you will have weeds. The grade called "Hog" chips are scaly and don't blow away in the wind. She likes to have the wood chips 5-6 feet thick; except for the areas where you want your plants to grow up through in the spring. Then 2 inches deep over that area is ideal. She doesn't put landscape fabric under the wood chips, as she felt the weed seeds stick to the fabric. Plants that like to have their roots hot don't grow well in wood chips. She also talked about swells for capturing rain water. Trees that grow in swells don't need to be watered. Plant your plants thickly, so they can act as a ground cover. Moisture is retained, and weeds can't grow through them.

GARDENERS DAY Jan 26/2019--Again we were overjoved to see the tremendous support our club gets from the people who come out to our Gardeners Day event. Our first presenter of the day was Kevin Napora. He talked about creating an enjoyable outdoor space that will be used. To have a destination area planned out, with something to see when you get there. And how to extend the season by using heaters and lights. He also spoke about the different activities to perform in a month to month system. And he gave a couple of tips about keeping insect pests down. During his talk, he talked about trees.

Here is some information about them:

• Trees: Train your tree as soon as you buy it, but don't prune before 5 years time.

- Get a good quality pruner.
- All trees grow up or out.

• For shrub training; pinch 1 inch off the top branches, to create side branches. Repeat the next year with 1 inch off all top branches, to create thicker shrubs.

• Do this in the trees dormant period. For older shrubs pinch 4-6 inches off the tops.

• Trees that drip sap like Birch or Maple; you don't prune in April or May. Can prune after June.

• Follow this for less insect trouble in your yard, as ants and aphids are attracted to the juicy sap.

• Prune fruit trees and shrubs in April.

• You can prune to get rid of suckers, but it is a yearly choir. The amount of suckers a tree puts out will lessen over time with this interference.

• For spring flowering trees like lilacs, don't prune or pinch the buds after June 15th, as they are making the buds now for next year.

etter to the EDITOR BERTA OMBUDSMAN INVESTIGATING LAC STE ANNE COUNT

A complaint filed against Lac Ste Anne County (LSAC) is being investigated by the Alberta Ombudsman's Office. The complaint stems from LSAC Planning and Development's last-minute switch from fully supportive to aggressively opposed to a proposed campground development, and then refusing to communicate with the developer. The Ombudsman's Office is investigating

1. why Planning and Development changed their position on the proposal.

2. why LSAC refused to provide an explanation for rejecting the proposal.

3. why Planning and Development and the Chief Administrative Officer failed to respond to inquiries on how to get the proposed development back on track.

4. bias by LSAC, and collusion

between LSAC and their consultant. The proposal is for a back-to-nature campground on Nakamun Lake.

Independent technical and scientific studies found the land suitable for the campground. The proposal received accolades for its innovative design and received the support of Alberta Tourism, of Alberta Environment and Parks, of camping associations, and of camping and RV enthusiasts. Some residents did raise NIMBY concerns, but the technical reports and/or changes to the proposal addressed their concerns. Details on the proposal, the concerns raised and how they were address, and LSAC's support-then-rejection of the proposal are available at www.NakamunOasis.ca

Before being rejected, the developer and LSAC had been working on this project for over a year.

"My relationship with the County was generally positive. The County wanted every technical report possible, which I thought was excessive for a back-to-nature campground, but I obtained the reports. All of the reports supported the campground proposal - no red flags. The County acknowledges this in correspondence and in their Briefing Notes.

Both the rezoning and campground development proposal were submitted at the same time. The County rezoned the land in September, but then rejected the development proposal in November. Now they won't explain why or how to get it back on track."

At the time the proposal was rejected, the only outstanding concern was from a last-minute study commissioned by LSAC using their preferred consultant. The conclusions of that study went against every other scientific study of Nakamun Lake, including another study by the same consultant! However, the developer was prepared to adjust the proposal, obtain approval, and then addressed the questionable study - but LSAC suddenly rejected the proposal. Since then, further investigation has resulted in a Professional Misconduct complaint against the consultant, civil action against the consultant, and the Ombudsman's Office investigating LSAC's involvement in obtaining and using this study to reject the proposal.

From a broader perspective, camping spaces are desperately needed in Alberta, especially those a few hours of major centers like Edmonton. This project would have created construction jobs, created permanent jobs, supported local businesses, diversified Alberta's economy, provided camping spaces, and brought much needed revenue to a destitute County. All this has been killed, and Lac Ste Anne County won't explain why.

The 2019 New Year is off to a busy and exciting start here in Lac Ste. Anne County. How is this for exciting news? In late December, the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB) released a report which examined 182 municipalities in Alberta, with a focus on the province's most populated regions. Lac Ste. Anne County was among the top 20 of Alberta's best performing municipalities (with populations of 1,000 or larger). The report showed that from 2006 to 2016, the vast majority of Alberta municipalities grew operating spending well above the sustainable benchmark of inflation and population growth. Lac Ste. Anne County was one of only 19 municipalities that have kept real operating spending increases at or below population growth. This recognition is something that we should all be proud of and reinforce that we are on the right track. Keep up the great work!

After a successful 2018 year with Council and Administration bringing awareness and raising funds for certain initiatives, we would like to once again work together to raise awareness and support in 2019. To start the year off, a motion was made at the County Council meeting held on January 25, 2019, for Council and Administration to work at bringing awareness and potential fundraising to the following initiatives:

• Mental Health Awareness -Bell Let's Talk Day: January 30, 2019;

• Heart and Stroke Awareness -February 1, 2019: Wear a red shirt day;

• Anti-Bullying Day - February 27, 2019: Wear a pink shirt day;

• National Agriculture Day -March 19, 2019: Wear a green shirt day; and

• Canadian Cancer Society -April is Daffodil Month: We will be selling and purchasing daffodils.

Based on the recent changes in the Municipal Government Act, municipalities are required to enter into Inter-municipal Collaboration Frameworks (ICF's) and Inter-municipal Development Plans (IDP's) with all adjacent municipalities. The purpose of these inter-municipal relations is to maximize taxpayer resources and minimize duplication of process. At the January 10th, 2019, County Council meeting, Council members were appointed to various ICF Committees which will allow Lac Ste. Anne County to move forward with these important collaboration initiatives.

The Agriculture Services Convention was hosted this past week in Calgary, A.B. by the South Region of the Alberta Association of Agricultural Fieldman (AAAF). In attendance were some members of Council, the Agriculture Services Board and Administration to network with members of all counties throughout the province. Highlights of the convention were some of the many presentations ranging from plant-based proteins and soil health, classroom agriculture and the bright future of beef. Most importantly, considering the province-wide poor harvest conditions and feed shortages, farmers are feeling especially stressed and in need of support. Lac Ste. Anne County sponsored and moved a resolution to the Agriculture Services Boards for the creation of a Mental Health Crisis Line that would be available free of charge, agriculture- specific and operated 24 hours a day. This

resolution was seconded, and the resolution was accepted. It was very well received, and we are hopeful more steps will be taken for implementation.

In closing, I would like to remind everyone of the old saying that with all the hoar-frosts on the trees there will be plenty of rain in six months time, we shall see! If you and yours are kicking around on the long weekend in February, I'd like to remind you to come on down to the SnoMo Days in Alberta Beach, A.B., It is a jampacked, family-friendly event with plenty of things for everyone to do.

The Town of Whitecourt has made a formal application to the Municipal Government Board (MGB) to annex the area between Flats Road and the Athabasca River. This area is currently located in Woodlands County, and the County has provided its endorsement of the annexation. The MGB is currently reviewing the application. To review the

• Water trees heavily in October and protect their bottom bark from mice.

• In all plants, the middle roots are used for storage. So water the outer feeder roots.

The next speaker was Michelle Bourke. Her company's name is Mitch's Makes. Michelle gave us a pictorial tour. She has created special spaces in the large landscape of their family farm. It was a colorful show with many mass flower plantings. Thank-you as well for the poppy seeds that everyone in attendance received.

And our final speaker of the day was Denise O'Reilly. Her company's name is A'Bunadh Seeds. Her presentation was how to start seeds. You need a good potting mix to start plants in. #4 or #7 are good choices. Fungus can snap off young plants at the stem, so good ventilation is important. Sand sprinkled on the dirt surface, once the plant has risen through the soil, works well. Within one week of its emergence, it is time to repot the plant. Straight knitting needles can be used to break apart the tiny seedlings without tearing their roots.

TYPES OF WEDDING OFFICIANTS

Many people play a role in a wedding. The bride and groom, bridesmaids, groomsmen, ring bearers, and flower girls are front and center on the day a couple ties the knot.
