# STEP 2019 READY TO HELP EMPLOYERS AND STUDENTS

Applications for the Summer Temporary Employment Program (STEP) are now being accepted online.

The Alberta government re-introduced STEP to create work opportunities for high school and post-secondary students between May and August, by providing a \$7-per-hour wage subsidy to employers.

"Alberta students deserve good jobs and the best possible training, and Alberta businesses deserve the labour resources they need to thrive. Since we brought STEP back in 2016, the program has provided nearly 9,000 jobs for students across the province. Employers who hire students improve job prospects for young Albertans and can hire additional resources to sustain and build their business." - Christina Gray, Minister of Labour

Last year, STEP helped almost 1,400 employers hire 3,050 students for summer positions. The program is available to small businesses, non-profit organizations, public libraries, school boards, publicly funded post-secondary institutions, municipalities, First

Quick facts

• STEP is a four- to 16-week

wage subsidy program that provides funding to employers to hire high school or post-secondary students for summer jobs from May to August.

• Employers are offered a \$7-per-hour subsidy for a maximum of 37.5 hours per week.

• STEP was reintroduced in 2016, receiving \$10 million annually.

• The program will accept applications through the online portal alberta.ca/step from Jan. 3 to Feb. 8, 2019.

# ANOTHER RECORD YEAR FOR ALBERTA CAMPGROUNDS

### Submitted by Government of Alberta

With nearly 171,000 reservations, the provincial reservation system exceeded all nine previous annual totals. Introduced in 2009, Reserve. AlbertaParks.ca (RAP) helps bolster tourism and helps Albertans connect with nature and experience the provincial parks system.

From the quiet tranquility of lake-front comfort cabins to large family-style group camping to full-amenity park settings, RAP helps visitors explore a wide range of opportunities, many of which have been bolstered by the government's ongoing investment to improve and upgrade campgrounds.

The province is investing \$38 million this year in Alberta's provincial park upgrades, expansions and modernizations throughout the system.

In 2018, the RAP system processed 164,101 regular campsites, 3,251 group sites and 3,638 comfort camping units. The 2018 total exceeded last year's online reservation tally of 163,780.

Although the system is only in place between February and November, Albertans can still winter camp at a number of provincial parks listed at Albertaparks.ca. Ouick facts

• The RAP system allows online booking for 88 provincial campgrounds (the remaining provincial campgrounds are first come, first served), 162 group campsites and 64 comfort camping units.

• To make an online reservation, set up an account or update your existing account in advance of the reservation days, visit Reserve.AlbertaParks.ca.

• Reserve.AlbertaParks.ca campsite opening dates for 2019 are:

- Feb. 4 group camping
- Feb. 11 comfort camping
- Feb. 19 regular camping
- Feb. 25 backcountry camping

• Revenues generated from camping fees are invested back into Alberta Parks.

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# KEY MESSAGES FROM GYPSD'S PUBLIC BOARD MEETING

New Year Highlights

Grande Yellowhead Public School Division (GYPSD) held its first Public Board meeting of the New Year on January 16, 2019. The meeting began with a moment of silence and condolences were extended to the Edson family who lost their young son, who attended École Westhaven School, in a tragic accident.

Trustees welcomed incoming local A.T.A. Evergreen Local 11 President, Jessica Smeal, and Vice-President, Matthew Everitt. The Board also recognized local C.U.P.E. representative, Mrs. Mary Auriat, who retired after twenty years of service to GYPSD. Chair Rosadiuk presented Mary with a bouquet of flowers and noted, "Mrs. Auriat has been the union's representative at public board meetings over the last several years, and on behalf of the board, we wish her all the best."

The trustees shared highlights from their December school visits, which included attendance at Christmas concerts and school council meetings. Trustees voiced appreciation for the extensive community support and family involvement in the multitude of activities taking place in GYPSD schools.

Secretary Treasurer, Ms. Cindy Wang, presented the Board with the Quarterly Financial Report and answered questions about projected revenues and expenses for the first quarter. Transportation Director, Mr. Corey Halabi, reported that for the 2018/19 school year over 2,700 students are being transported, on a daily basis, across the division. In addition, Mr. Halabi answered questions regarding ride times, the effectiveness and efficiency of routes, and potential costs to the division in regards to the new provincial Mandatory Entry Level Training (MELT) program.

Trustees rejected a recommen-

dation to apply for the recently announced grant by the Minister of Education to install solar photovoltaic systems on existing school facilities. After a detailed review by Facility Services Director, Ken Baluch, it was determined that the program would have significant negative cost implications for the division. Based on estimates for the eligible school facilities within the division, it was calculated that it would take ten years to pay back the \$300,000 the board would have to invest. Chair Rosadiuk expressed her disappointment on behalf of the Board. "Originally, the board was very excited to hear about the new grant, but once the costs for the investment were considered, we could not in good conscience move forward. The division's budget is in a deficit position so the board is focused on making decisions that are financially viable. The board will voice its disappointment and concerns to the Minister and local MLAs, about the actual financial cost to school boards to support the program in its

current structure."

Superintendent of Schools, Carolyn Lewis, provided her bi-monthly report addressing how her work incorporates Alberta Education's Superintendent's Quality Standard. In particular, she shared highlights of her instructional walkthroughs in schools and her participation at both government and community stakeholder meetings; all of which support the board's priorities of student learning, teacher and leadership excellence, and community engagement. Superintendent Lewis identified that her December 13, 2018 meeting, with the twenty-five high school students who compose the Superintendent's Youth Council (SYC), was an outstanding opportunity for her to hear student perspective about their educational experiences in GYPSD schools. Superintendent Lewis was also excited to note that members of the SYC will help facilitate upcoming community engagement sessions, which will target feedback on the development of the GYPSD Three Year Education Plan.

# UPDATE FROM THE JANUARY 7 RALLY IN DRAYTON VALLEY

This is an update and follow through on the media coverage of our rally in Drayton Valley last night. We would like to provide the following information to ensure everyone is aware of what happened, and the facts involved:

- 650-750 peaceful, respectful attendees (confirmed from sign in sheets) braved -22C temperatures to show their solidarity to insure Albertans are aware of what is happening with this process.

- There were no confirmed threats communicated to the RCMP, Town of Drayton Valley or County of Brazeau Administration.

- Sunchild First Nations Band Councillor Joey Pete stood with us and stated that his First Nation is supportive of the energy industry, and HAVE NOT been consulted by the government in any respect towards the proposed Bighorn Park/ PLUZ land use changes.

- The Counties of Ponoka, Westaskiwin, and Parkland are now supporting Brazeau County's measures to spread awareness of the lack of consultation, and the poorly managed process to date.

- The Town of Drayton Valley water treatment plant manager is quoted as stating that: "The quality of the water upstream of Drayton Valley is excellent, and that it could be drank right out of the river, although he would never recommend it." Additionally, through previous experience, he stated that the water quality downstream of the major centers is much more of a concern.

Rally Canada has the following requests to the Government in Power:

• The government announce that this process is postponed until after the next election, at which time it can be restarted and conducted both thoroughly and properly.

• If they are unwilling to do so then the current minister needs to be removed from this process as the successive series of abysmal failures has eroded all public confidence that the outcome could be achieved properly and take into account, the volumes of people who have not been consulted.

The net result of the Government in Power's efforts to date is public and industry uncertainty, and that is unacceptable considering the already unstable economic situation that exists within our Province today

# YELLOWHEAD COUNTY COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

### January 22, 2019

Public Notification Bylaw – Council gave first hearing to Bylaw 7.18, which would allow administration to advertise bylaws, resolutions, meetings, etc. by one or more methods, including electronic advertising. Administration intends to continue with the current advertising scheme as well, which includes mailouts and newspapers ads.

EQUS REA Ltd. Presentation – Brian Hennings, of EQUS REA Ltd, presented to county council. Mr. Hennings imparted the following information to council: The Alberta Utilities Commission approved an application by FortisAlberta to request that the service areas of certain Rural Electrification Associations (REAs) be altered to align with Municipal Franchise Agreements (MFAs) between FortisAlberta and various municipalities in circumstances where the corporate boundaries of the municipality have expanded through annexation and now overlap with an existing REA service area Integrated Operations Agreement (IOU).

Award of Sprinkler Protection Trailer Tender – County council awared a tender for two Sprinkler Protection Trailers in the amount of \$410,000.00 to A.S. Roach Fire Services LTD.

Closure of Cadomin and Marlboro Fire Stations – County council moved to close the Cadomin and Marlboro Fire Stations. Currently, the fire station coverage area in Cadomin is provided by Yellowhead County Station 4 out of Robb and Hinton Fire Department out of Hinton. Coverage for the Marlboro Fire Station comes from Yellowhead County Station 12 in Edson.

Cannabis Land Use Bylaw Amendment – County council gave first reading to Bylaw 01.19 amending Land Use Bylaw 16.13. This bylaw amendment will incorporate definitions for cannabis-related uses and add cannabis-related uses as discretionary in some districts. The amendment has been drafted to align with the requirements set forth by provincial legislation and regulations. A Public Hearing will be held on February 26, 2019.

2019 Server System Upgrade – County council moved to accept a bid (\$1.1 million) from Optrix Engineering to upgrade the county's server and associated peripheral technologies.

Legal Access Road Use Agreement – Council moved to support the use of a road use agreement and crossing agreement for legal access between the property owners and CN for lands in and around the SE 6-53-18-W5M. This would allow the landowners to develop their lands without any restrictions typical of a non-conforming building with a Restrictive Covenant subject to no future subdivisions and no road maintenance by Yellowhead County.

The next Council Meeting is on February 12, 2019. The next Governance & Priorities Committee Meeting is on February 19, 2019. All meetings start at 9:30 a.m. in the Council Chambers.

# **TYPES OF WEDDING OFFICIANTS**

Many people play a role in a wedding. The bride and groom, bridesmaids, groomsmen, ring bearers, and flower girls are front and center on the day a couple ties the knot.

Civil officiant

Civil officiants are officers of the court, such as a judge or justice of the peace. Many couples who are planning destination weddings abroad still choose to have a civil officiant perform a wedding ceremony at home. This is because some overseas officiants may not be authorized to marry couples in their home countries, meaning their marriages won't be recognized once they return home. Civil officiants make sure marriages are legal, and they also make great options for couples who just want to get hitched without a grand ceremony. Professional officiant

Professional officiants are not affiliated with a particular religious organization. That makes them great choices for couples who aren't religious as well as those who come from different religious backgrounds and won't be converting to the same faith. Professional officiants typically meet with a couple once or twice to get to know them before writing the speech they will give during the ceremony. Many will share the speech with the couple in advance of the big day, and some even allow couples to write the speech.
