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
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



Looking for a new activity to get outside with your family this winter? Give ice fishing a try at Wabamun Lake Kids Can Catch. With pre-drilled holes, loaner fishing rods, and no fishing licenses required on Alberta's Family Fishing Weekend, there's never a better opportunity to check it out.

Step 1: Register at albertakidscancatch.com. Registration opens at 10am on February 4. Step 2: Read the Frequently Asked Questions at albertakidscancatch.com to help you come prepared for a day on the ice. Step 3: Park at Waterfront Park located at the end of 50th Street in the Village of Wabamun. Load up your toboggan with folding chairs and snacks and walk to the event site on the ice. Step 4: Sign in at the Kids Can Catch registration tent. For a quicker check-in, bring a signed copy of the Participant Waiver and Photo Consent form. Step 5: Borrow an ice fishing rod from the Cabela's tent on the ice. There are over 350 loaner rods for families to borrow, but if you have your own gear, please bring it. Step 6: Find a pre-drilled hole and drop a line. Fishing mentors are on the ice with fishing tips and to help you safely catch and release fish.

Notice of Motion: Transfer of Junior High Program at Wildwood School

A public meeting have been scheduled on February 25, 2019, to discuss the viability of the junior high program at 7 p.m. at Wildwood School as per the Closure of Schools Regulation, Section 1.1(2):

Where a board plans to transfer an education program pursuant to subsection (1)(c)(iii), the board shall organize and convene an information meeting for the purpose of informing the parents of the students affected by the transfer of the transfer and the alternative arrangements for continuing the education program at another school.

An operational review over the last few months has recommended to the board that the junior high program (Grades 7-9) at Wildwood School may no longer be financially viable to sustain due to declining student enrolment, and program equity issues. Affected students could transfer to Grand Trunk High School effective September 3, 2019. Wildwood School would continue to provide education for students in kindergarten to Grade 6.

The division's first priority is always to make decisions that are in the best interest of students. Over the last several years, the enrolment at Wildwood School has continued to decline; for the current school year, there are twenty-four junior high students enrolled in Grades 7-9. It is the board's policy that the minimum critical enrolment number for a program to be sustainable is thirty students in any three consecutive grades (Policy 15, Sec.1.1.2.2). Wildwood School has also posted a deficit budget

over the last few years, indicating that its budget cannot support the identified percentage of the combined teacher and support staff budget for operations. (Policy 15, Sec.1.1.3.3) With the transfer of Wildwood's junior high program to Grand Trunk High School, it is projected that Wildwood School will erase its deficit and be able to operate with a balanced budget to deliver an elementary program.

The final decision on whether to transfer the junior high program effective for the 2019-20 school year will be made by the board at the Public Board Meeting on April 3, 2019. If a member of the public would like an opportunity to speak at the meeting in April, please review Board Policy 7 - Board Operations, Appendix A - Public Comments and Delegation Protocol - section 3 for the protocol for public comments in a public board meeting.

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THE 2019 CAMP DOWN IS ON

Alberta Parks' online campsite reservations open Feb. 4.

Starting at 9 a.m., campers can log on to reserve.albertaparks.ca to book their group camping areas. Comfort camping reservations open Feb. 11 at 9 a.m., while individual campsite reservations for the May long weekend start Feb.

New this year is Kananaskis backcountry camping reservations which open Feb. 25 at 9 a.m. Combined with additional individual, group and comfort camping options, Alberta Parks is offering more than 650 new online booking options.

"Albertans continue to flock to our online reservation system with their sights set on connecting with the great outdoors and evenings relaxing around the campfire. This year, we're pleased to expand our reservation offering to include Alberta's magnificent backcountry." - Shannon Phillips, Minister of Environment and Parks

Staggered reservation times by

region for individual campsites on Feb. 19 are:

- South region at 9 a.m.
- Kananaskis Country at 11 a.m.
- Central region at 1 p.m.
- Northwest/east regions at 3 p.m. Reservations made for individual campsites are 90 days out from the booking date.

In 2018, the reservation system processed 164,101 individual campsites, 3,251 group camping areas and 3,638 comfort camping units. The 2018 total exceeded the previous year's online reservation

tally of 163,780 and set a new record for annual bookings.

In the fiscal 2018-19 year, government is investing \$38 million in provincial park upgrades, expansions and modernizations as part of its \$239-million, five-year commitment under Budget 2016. Improvements to the provincial parks system include access for persons with disabilities, new and improved boat launches, facility upgrades and maintenance to popular amenities like picnic tables, fire pits and washrooms.

Quick facts

- The RAP system added seven campgrounds combining 457 individual sites, five comfort camping units, eight new group camping areas and 17 backcountry campgrounds with 206 (permit) sites this year.
- Backcountry reservations are campground-specific only, not site-specific, meaning people who book into the campgrounds can select a vacant site upon arrival.
- Comfort camping units are shelters that come in a variety of styles, such as a yurt or canvas-wall tent, and include amenities like beds, table and chairs, cookware, utensils and power.
- Alberta's RAP system has nearly 600,000 account users.
- There are about 250 provincial campgrounds with more than 14,000 campsites in the Alberta provincial parks system.
- The RAP system allows online booking for 88 provincial campgrounds (the remaining provincial campgrounds are first come, first served), 162 group camping areas and 64 comfort camping units.
- The online system is mobile-friendly, so people can book campsites on their mobile devices.
- To make an online reservation, set up an account or update your existing account in advance of the reservation days, visit Reserve.AlbertaParks.ca.
- Camping in Alberta remains an affordable family fun option; there are no new camping-related fee increases in 2019. Alberta Parks last introduced minor fee increases in 2016.
- Revenue generated from camping fees is invested back into Alberta Parks.

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KEY MESSAGES FROM GYPSD'S PUBLIC BOARD MEETING

After a detailed discussion on the benefits and possible challenges in the implementation of a division-wide junior kindergarten program, the Board of Trustees approved administration to move forward with the program in all GYPSD elementary schools where viable, effective the 2019-20 school year. The division has been investigating the establishment of a junior kindergarten program over the last few months after inquiries from several communities. With today's approval, administration will begin conversations with local playschools societies across the division to determine where the new programs are needed.

The board put forward a Notice of Motion at today's meeting proposing a transfer of the junior high program (Grades 7-9) from Wildwood School to Grand Trunk High School in Evansburg, effective September 3, 2019. In order to consider the potential transfer of a program, there are a number of legislative requirements that must be met under Section 58 of the School Act and sections 3 and 4 of the Closure of Schools Regulation, as well as steps under Board Policy 15.

Other Key Notes of Interest

- The board reviewed an updated report on the division's Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) Program. The health and well-being of all GYPSD staff, students and visitors is a priority for the board. The division has implemented OHS committees at all school facilities thus trustees receive regular reports on the division's compliance status with all applicable safety and compliance regulations.
- A report was presented to the board on the cleanliness of

schools. All GYPSD schools have formal cleanliness inspections following each school break as well as regular spot inspections. The board appreciates the diligent work of the facilities department ensuring the excellent cleanliness of division schools.

- The board approved an amendment to Policy 7 Board Operations, Appendix A Public Comments and Delegation Protocol to align with the language in Administrative Procedure 151-1 Public Questions and Delegation Protocol. The amendment outlines the procedure to speak at a public board meeting.
- Trustees approved a request for a leave of absence for Trustee Zaporosky effective February 27, 2019, for an undetermined amount of time.
- Information was shared with trustees about the division's new nomination and evaluation process for the 2019 Edwin Parr Teacher Award sponsored

by the Alberta School Boards' Association that recognizes excellence in first year teaching. GYPSD trustees will nominate one of their first year teachers for this annual award by March 15, 2019.

- GYPSD schools are activity hubs in each of the division's communities. The number of community organizations that use GYPSD school facilities was noted in a report at today's meeting. The board fully supports the community use of school facilities for educational and recreational activities and has no desire to implement cost recovery user fees.
- Building collaborative partnerships with local municipal districts in all GYPSD communities is a priority for the board, and appreciates these positive working relationships that support what is best for the students of GYPSD.







Confirm with an officiant that they can oversee the wedding proceedings at your home. Many religious officials are not able to perform ceremonies outside of a place of worship.


Learn if it's legal

CALL FOR COMMENTS -- DRAFT TAX LEGISLATIVE PROPOSALS REGARDING SALARY OVERPAYMENTS, INCLUDING PHOENIX PAY SYSTEM

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to advise constituents that the Department of Finance is releasing draft legislative proposals that would—under certain conditions—permit an affected employee to repay to their employer only the net amount of the overpayment received in a previous year, rather than the gross amount (including taxes, CPP, and EI).

Under the proposed legislation:

*The CRA would be able to refund directly to the employer the income tax, CPP, and EI withheld on an overpayment that occurred through a system, administrative, or clerical error.

*Effectively extend the existing rules for overpayments repaid within the same year to overpayments repaid within three calendar years after that year (or where arrangements have been made within that three-year period to make such a

repayment).

*Public and private sector employers could elect to apply these new rules for any overpayment paid after 2015 due to a system, administrative, or clerical error, as long as they have not previously issued a T4 correcting for this overpayment.

For these new rules to apply, the employee must have repaid their employer (or made arrangements to repay) within three years following the end of the year in which the overpayment took place. Where these

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
















