WILDFIRE SEASON TRIGGERS IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM LEDUC FIRE

With more than 1,100 wildfires

that burned across the province in 2017, City of Leduc Fire Services looks to share vital information to support citizens in proactive measures to prevent wildfire in the Leduc region.

“We’re fanning the flame of public education to let people know the risks and the importance of being prepared when faced with a wildfire in our region,” says Deputy Fire Chief

Gerry Kelly with Leduc Fire Services. “March 1 is the official launch of wildfire season in Alberta and there no better time than now to learn how to protect your property.”

Through the Alberta fire commissioner’s office, here are a few actions that will help reduce the risk of wildfire:

- Dispose of yard debris and lawn clippings. They act as a fuel for any ground fire.
- Clear leaves and other vegetative debris from roofs, gutters, porches and decks. This will prevent embers from igniting your home.
- Remove dead vegetation and other items from under your deck/porch and within 10 ft. of your home.
- Residents near parks and treed areas need to be diligent with combustible materials in and around their yards close to their dwellings.
- Remove flammable materials within 10 ft. (urban) or 30 ft. (rural) of your home’s foundation and outbuildings, including garages and sheds. Things like wood piles and propane tanks can catch fire and easily spread.
- Prune trees so the lowest branches are 6 – 10 ft. from the ground.

“Wildfire prevention is everyone’s duty as it requires a community approach and our goal this year is to reach as many people as possible to raise awareness,” says Kelly.

2018 TAX RELIEF FOR LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to advise that Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada has indicated the need to expand the list of designated regions for 2018, with new regions identified for Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and Ontario.

The livestock tax deferral provision allows producers in prescribed drought or excess moisture regions to defer a portion

of their 2018 sale proceeds of breeding livestock until 2019 to help replenish their herd. The cost of replacing the animals in 2019 will offset the deferred income, thereby reducing the tax burden associated with the original sale.

Eligibility for the tax deferral is limited to those producers located inside the prescribed areas. Producers in those regions can request the tax deferral when filing their 2018 income tax returns.

“Those in the Yellowhead riding who have experienced forage

shortages for their livestock in 2018, please check out the link below. The tax deferral will help our farmers manage the impacts of drought and be able to focus on rebuilding their herds and businesses,” concluded MP Eglinski.

RCMP – INTERIM MANAGEMENT ADVISORY BOARD

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise constituents that the Department of Public Safety is taking immediate steps to establish a new Interim Management Advisory Board for the RCMP, to provide advice on the administration and management of the RCMP, and strategies to achieve its objective, by:

- transformation and modernization plans;
- the effective and efficient use of RCMP resources;
- corporate risk and responses to address them;
- policies and management controls that support RCMP operations;
- human resources and labour relations;
- corporate and strategic direction, and implementation plans including, financial and human resources strategies and multi-year plans;

- operating and capital budgets;
- performance measurement and departmental results.

The Governor in Council will appoint up to 13 part-time members to the initial Board by April 1, 2019. Legislative changes will be introduced this spring to the RCMP Act to make the Board permanent.

The mandate of the Board will initially focus on key priorities of RCMP transformation, including supporting the development of a "People First Strategy," RCMP business modernization and employee health and well-being.

"As a former RCMP Officer for 35 years, I welcome the creation of an Interim Management Advisory Board to assist in modernizing the RCMP," concluded MP Eglinski.

4 REASONS TO SKIP TOPPING OFF

The familiar click of the nozzle when filling up at the gas station is recognizable to anyone with a few miles of driving under their belt. Once that nozzle clicks, just about every driver faces the decision of whether or not to squeeze a few extra cents' worth of gas into their vehicles or remove the nozzle from their vehicles, place it back where it belongs and head off on their way.

Such scenes play out every day across the globe, and it's likely that the majority of drivers try to squeeze a few extra drops into their tank. While topping off can seem like a financially savvy way to delay your next trip to the filling station, doing so may only cost drivers and the planet they call home. The following are four great reasons to skip topping off the next time you pull into a filling station.

1. Topping off costs you mon-

ey. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, drivers who top off at the pump are likely paying for gas they're not getting. That's because gas station pumps have vapor recovery systems that feed gas vapors back into their tanks in an effort to decrease air pollution. So any gas that drivers try to pump into their tanks after the nozzle has clicked may only be drawn into the vapor line and fed back into the gas station's tanks and not your vehicle's fuel tank.

2. Topping off may damage your car. Topping off won't just hurt your pocketbook; it can potentially damage your vehicle as well. Fuel tanks need extra room inside them so gas can expand while the car is being operated. Without room to expand, gas may evaporate into the vehicle's vapor collection system, which can damage the system and produce

greater gas emissions, thereby harming the planet.

3. Topping off can affect the air you breathe. If you had a choice, would you pay extra for more air pollution? Likely not. But the EPA notes that this is precisely what many people are doing when they top off their gas tanks. When vehicles' fuel tanks are overfilled, gas vapors can escape into the air and produce toxic air pollutants. That adversely affects air quality, which ultimately affects your health as well.

4. Topping off can cost the gas station money. Many drivers may wonder why gas stations, who would seemingly benefit fi-

nancially from topping off, post signs that forbid topping off. But the EPA notes that gas stations are likely to lose money due to drivers squeezing an extra few cents' worth of gas into their vehicles. That's because topping off can damage the station's vapor recovery systems, causing them to operate improperly and requiring potentially costly maintenance.

Topping off at the filling station may seem like a savvy move. But drivers, their vehicles and the planet are best served by taking the pump handle out of the tanks at the familiar sound of the nozzle's click.

DID YOU KNOW?



Sedan owners who suspect they might be part of a dying breed are not wrong to harbor such suspicions, as auto industry insiders note that the production of sedans has been in decline for about a decade. According to LMC Automotive, which tracks the auto industry, many auto manufacturers are responding to consumer demand for taller vehicles by producing more trucks, SUVs and crossovers at the expense of sedans. In fact, LMC Automotive estimates that, by 2022, 84 percent of the vehicles sold by General Motors in the United States will be SUVs or trucks. And GM won't even be leading the pack in that regard, as LMC estimates Ford (90 percent) and Fiat Chrysler (97 percent) will be almost exclusively manufacturing some type of truck or SUV. While trucks and SUVs might first have taken hold of the U.S. automotive market, other countries are now following suit. According to the

automotive research firm JATO Dynamics, SUVs, including crossovers, accounted for more than one in three cars sold across the globe in 2017.

Entanglements

° The average farm is full of machinery and device that can grab, cut, smash and entangle fingers, hands, toes, and feet causing injury to the extremities and even death. The sad truth is that most of these injuries can be avoided.

°Some of the key entanglement prevention measures to implement when working with or near machinery are:

- Before operating any machine or equipment, ensure that all guards are in place and in good condition.
- Wear tight fitting clothing, such as overalls. Avoid wearing any items that could become entangled, such as long coats or scarves.
- Never step over a PTO shaft or conveyer belt while it is still running.

°Ensure that anyone working with augers, PTOs, and other extremely hazardous machinery receives appropriate safety instruction and adequate supervision.

°Keep young children out of the farm or ranch work site, especially areas where there is moving machinery.



Farm Safety Tips

When farming please follow these precautions in order to keep yourself, your family and your workers safe:

- Decrease your risk of being crushed by using lockout procedures before beginning any maintenance or repair work. Lockout means to physically neutralize all energies in a piece of equipment. Machines, devices or power transmission lines can be de-energized by applying blocks to all parts under tension or pressure, bleeding the hydraulic pressure from the lines or by releasing pressure from a coil or spring.
- Provide a safe, fenced play area for all children and supervise closely. The working area of the farm is not a playground any more than a construction site or other industrial area would be a play area. Review the safety rules on your farm with your family often. Fence off all manure, retaining ponds and dugouts, and lock buildings containing hazardous goods.





Preventing Crushes

- From rolling machinery to falling front-end loaders there are countless crush hazards on a farm. While farm operators and workers can't prevent every hazard on a farm, they should prevent every hazard they can by taking simple preventative measures while working.
- Failure to block-up equipment safely can result in a fatal crushing injury. A jack may slip, a hose or overhead support may break, or the equipment may roll. Always take the precaution of placing support blocks under the equipment prior to working with raised machinery for any reason.



TRUDEAU MUST RESIGN AMID SNC-LAVALIN AFFAIR: MP JIM EGLINSKI

Jim Eglinski, Member of Member for Yellowhead, today reiterated Conservative Leader Andrew Scheer's demand that Justin Trudeau resign amid the SNC-Lavalin affair.

"Canadians were shocked to hear the explosive testimony of former Attorney General Jody Wilson-Raybould on the SNC-Lavalin affair. It's clear there was inappropriate – and potentially illegal – pressure brought on her

by the highest officials in Justin Trudeau's government, all in a bid to let a Liberal-connected corporation off the hook on corruption charges," said MP Eglinski.

Media began reporting in early February that the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) pressured Justice Minister and Attorney General, Jody Wilson-Raybould, to intervene in the criminal prosecution of Montreal engineering and construction giant SNC-Lavalin Group Inc.

At the Justice Committee, Ms. Wilson-Raybould said, "...I experienced a consistent and sustained

effort by many people within the government to seek to politically interfere in the exercise of prosecutorial discretion in my role as the Attorney General of Canada in an inappropriate effort to secure a deferred prosecution agreement with SNC-Lavalin."

Ms. Wilson-Raybould's testimony tells the story of a Prime Minister who has lost the moral authority to govern. A Prime Minister who allows his partisan political motivations to overrule his duty to uphold the law. A Prime Minister who has allowed a systemic culture of corruption to

take root in his office.

"Canada's Conservatives are calling on Justin Trudeau to resign and the RCMP must immediately open an investigation into the numerous examples of obstruction of justice that was detailed in the testimony," concluded MP Eglinski.

Canada should be a country where we are all equal under the law. Where nobody – regardless of wealth, status or political connections – is above the law. Canada's Conservatives believe we can be that country again.

The app is currently available on iOS and Android devices. The download is free.

In Canada, search and rescue is a responsibility shared by governments, the military, volunteers, and industry groups. There are approximately 15,000 Search and Rescue volunteers across Canada, representing ground, air and maritime domains. Canada's search and rescue area of responsibility is 18 million square kilometres of

land and water and includes the longest coastline in the world.

One of the app's features is to produce a #TripPlan, that can be left with a responsible person when heading out on an outdoor adventure. A plan can help first responders and search and rescue volunteers find a lost or injured person.

The AdventureSmart program, delivered by SARVAC with support from Public Safety Canada, is a national program dedicated to encouraging Canadians and visitors to Canada to get informed and go outdoors.

The three main tenets of the AdventureSmart program are Trip Planning, Training and Taking the Essentials (the three Ts).

"This app will keep you safe. I encourage my constituents who are planning an outdoor adventure to download this app. This will definitely increase the success of a rescue if required," concluded MP Eglinski.


