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### LEDUC COUNTY SENDING ADDITIONAL FIREFIGHTERS, EQUIPMENT TO HIGH LEVEL FIRES

Leduc County Fire Services deployed additional firefighters and equipment this morning to help fight the wildfires near High Level.

In response to the Provincial Operations Centre request for additional assistance, five paid, oncall firefighters and a spare pumper truck were dispatched at 10:30 a.m. today to provide assistance for as long as required.

A fire restriction remains in effect for Leduc County until further notice.




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# GOLFER'S GUIDE

### TIPS FOR NEWCOMERS TO THE GAME OF GOLF

Few hobbies can be as enjoyable one moment and as frustrating the next as golf. Golfers know a great putt can be quickly followed by a bad tee shot, and maintaining their composure through the highs and lows of the game is a key to success on the links.

Maintaining that composure isn't always easy, even for the professionals. It's even more difficult for beginners, who quickly learn the game of golf involves more than just spending sunny weekend afternoons on pristine golf courses. In fact, golf can be quite demanding, and beginners would be wise to heed a few tips before hitting the course.

\* Don't commit to an expensive set of clubs right off the bat. Golf clubs can be very expensive, so beginners should buy an affordable secondhand set of clubs so they can get the hang of what they like before spending a lot of money. Visit a pro shop and explain that you are just a beginner. The shop will likely make some valuable suggestions and might even let you try out a pair of clubs. In addition, many driving ranges allow customers to rent clubs, and this can be a great and inexpensive way to find the right clubs for you.

\* Take lessons. Even the very best at self-teaching might find it

extremely difficult to become a self-taught golfer. When first trying your hand at golf, take some lessons and don't expect to be playing 18 holes any time soon. Before hitting the course, where you might be discouraged and you might frustrate those golfing behind you, learn the fundamentals by taking a few lessons at the driving range. Learn from a professional, who won't offer you any hidden secrets to golfing glory (there aren't any) but will offer sound advice on the game's fundamentals.

\* Take the game home with you. Beginners can even take

advantage of golf's vast popularity by taking the game home with them. This doesn't mean building a putting green in your backyard. Rather, purchase some instructional DVDs to learn the game during your down time throughout the week. Many golfers don't have time to hit the links during the week, but they do have time to watch some DVDs when they get home from work. Such instructional DVDs can help you master your grip and stance, which you can then take with you to the course over the weekend.

\* Have fun. Golf is a fun game;

it just takes time to hone your skills. But even if you aren't ready for the professional tour after your first few rounds, you can still have fun. Don't let some beginner's frustration, which every golfer experiences, ruin the fun of the game. Take note of your surroundings when you hit the links, and appreciate the time you're spending with your group. If the game becomes more a source of frustration than fun, then take a break and put in some more work away from the course, be it at the driving range or studying at home.

On Monday, in the Standing Committee on Public Safety and National Security (SECU), we heard from witnesses on the Annual Report of the National Security and Intelligence Committee of Parliamentarians and later, witnesses briefed us on the 2018 Public Report on the Terrorist Threat to Canada.

On Tuesday, I presented a petition requesting that the third day in May of each year be designated as Vyshyvanka Day throughout Canada. Later that day, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to study the Main Estimates for the Department of Justice with Minister Lametti.

On Wednesday, in the SECU Committee, we heard from witnesses on the Cybersecurity in the Financial Sector as a National Economic Security Issue. Later that day, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to study the Estimates for the Department of National Defence with Minister Sajjan.

On Thursday, with some of my Conservative colleagues, we met with Mayor Shaigec, Deputy Mayor Phillis Kobasiuk and CAO Mike Heck from Parkland County who were in Ottawa to discuss the report from the Task Force on Just Transition for Canadian Coal Power Workers and Communities and the findings as they relate to their community. We also discussed infrastructure, trade corridors, Parkland Airport and rail safety. Later that afternoon, I met with Mayor Shaigec and a CN representative to discuss the CN Rail project in Carvel.

On Friday, I will be in the south-east part of the riding and will be attending the Big Horn Rodeo Parade on Saturday, and hopefully later that day, if time permits, be able to make it to the Thorsby Parade.

This week, I attended nine meetings, four events and did two recordings. Thursday evening, I flew back to the riding as the House will be down next week. During my week in the riding I will be attending meetings and events.







### A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH: PROMISE MADE – PROMISE KEPT

The election is over and the new government has now been sworn into office, the Speech from the Throne has been delivered by the Honourable Lieutenant-Governor Lois Mitchel and we are now just into the very early days of the Legislature. The various ministry offices are now up and running and legislation is starting to be introduced into the Legislature.

The United Conservative Party ran on a platform of killing the Carbon Tax and Bill 1: An Act to Repeal the Carbon Tax was introduced into the Legislature. This act will repeal the Climate Leadership Act eliminating the Alberta carbon tax effective 12:01 on May 30th, 2019.

Bill 2: The Open for Business Act will address some of the policies passed by the previous NDP government that have had the effect of killing jobs in Alberta. It will maintain new rules for compassionate leave and restore mandatory secret ballots for union certification votes. It will also end the practice of forcing employers to pay holiday pay to employees who are not working and give employees more freedom and flexibility to bank overtime hours.

One of the problems identified by businesses across Alberta has been the raising of the minimum wage law. I have met with local employers who are very concerned with the impacts that the minimum wage has had on their business. Across Alberta we have seen the average number of employees in the restaurant industry drop from 13 to 11.7 employees between 2015-2018. We have record high youth unemployment at 11.6%. It is critical that youth have the opportunity to gather the needed experience and knowledge that a first job creates. At \$15 dollars/hour businesses had to adjust by laying off youth who did not have the necessary skill and experience of an older worker. Bill 2 will create more opportunities for young people to gain necessary skills and experience by encouraging businesses to hire youth at a lower hourly rate.

During the election the United Conservative Party campaigned on rebuilding the economy. Jobs, pipelines and the economy would be the priority of this government. Bill 3: The Job Creation Tax Cut will move Alberta forward on this promise by lowering corporate tax rates over a period of years from 12% to 8%. This will entice capital back in to Alberta and will, according to economist Jack Mintz, create 55,000 jobs over the next few years. By 2022 Alberta's combined federal-provincial business tax rate will lower

than that of 44 U.S. states and will be one piece of the economic puzzle that will result in a competitive Alberta economy capable of affording the social programs that all Albertans desire.

These are just the first three bills before the Legislature, they all address key 2019 platform promises made to the people of Alberta. Promise made – promise kept.

### NEW AIR PASSENGER PROTECTION REGULATIONS

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to inform constituents that the Department of Transport has proposed new rules requiring airlines to provide status updates every 30 minutes if flights are late or cancelled.

Starting on July 15, airlines will be required to pay up to \$2,400 for anyone who is denied boarding for situations within the airline's control, such as over-booking, and up to \$2,100 for lost or damaged luggage.

Beginning on December 15,

airlines will be required to seat parents beside or near their children at no extra cost, as well as compensation for flight delays and cancellations within an airline's control.

Having all trees properly trimmed each year, but especially those that can fall on your home and your neighbors' homes, may prevent future damage and legal issues.

Tree services can ensure trees maintain their awe-inspiring beauty and help homeowners protect their homes and their belongings.





Look for my update next Friday on the happenings of Parliament.






