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# CHARGES DOWN THIS CANADA DAY LONG WEEKEND

Over the four-day period from June 28 to July 1, Leduc County peace officers travelled 1,252 kilometres and issued a total of 19 charges and 10 warnings for speeding, improper passing and others.

Over the same four-day period in 2018, a total of 52 charges and 27 warnings were issued. This was down from 2017, when 81 charges and 19 warnings were issued for the same time period.

"We are pleased to see that the majority of residents and visitors celebrated Canada's 152 birthday responsibly. Leduc County

peace officers work hard to keep the public safe and we appreciate the public's cooperation in making our community a safe place for all." - Clarence Nelson, director of Enforcement Services

Proactive patrols are important to enhancing traffic safety in Leduc County. While these patrols sometimes result in fines or warnings for motorists, these patrols also provide an opportunity for peace officers to maintain a presence in the community and educate the public about traffic safety.

Excessive speeders charged

A motorcyclist was charged after speeding more than 70

kilometres per hour over the posted speed limit on Saturday afternoon. The adult male driver from Warburg was caught speeding 161 kilometres per hour in a 90 kilometre-per-hour zone on Highway 622 near Range Road 24.

Two additional motorists were charged with speeding more than 30 kilometres per hour over the speed limit; one driver was travelling 35 kilometres per hour over the speed limit on Township Road 502 near Range Road 24 and another was travelling 37 kilometres per hour over the speed limit on Airport Road near Township Road 242.

Hydrant markers are reflective collars designed to go around the side discharge port, or inside cap, of a hydrant. Starting May 1, citizens may see first responders throughout the city installing these markers during hydrant inspections. All the markers are blue in colour.

"As this is our first year with the new hydrant markers, there are plans to expand this program into 2020 to include all hydrants within the City of Leduc, including those on private property as our way of increasing our service level to the community," says Moore.

Look for my update next Friday on the happenings of Parliament.



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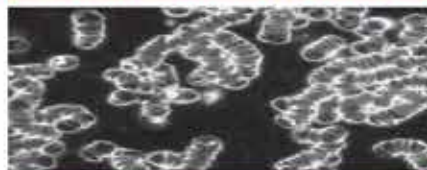
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# CONTRACT AWARDED FOR THE REDEVELOPMENT OF WHISTLERS CAMPGROUND IN JASPER NATIONAL PARK

redevelopment of Whistlers Campground in Jasper National Park. Parks Canada will work with PCL to finalize the construction schedule and will share updates as more information becomes available.

When the campground reopens, visitors will be greeted with a new registration centre, 17 new combined washroom and shower facil-

ities throughout the campground, improved campsites, and wider roads for two-way traffic. Underground services will be replaced to improve water, sewer and electrical systems, as well as upgrade many of the existing electrical campsites to 50 Amp service.

"This is great news for many businesses in Jasper that have con-

tacted me worried about whether their business would survive due to Whistlers Campground being closed. Hopefully, this will bring a sigh of relief for many business owners," concluded MP Eglinski.

## CONSERVATIVE ENVIRONMENT PLAN INCLUDES TAX CREDIT FOR GREEN HOME IMPROVEMENTS

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to inform constituents that under a new Conservative government led by Andrew Scheer, Canadian homeowners will be eligible for the new Green Homes Tax Credit to make energy efficient home improvements affordable.

"For so many Canadians, making our homes energy efficient is too expensive. This makes it difficult for

Canadians to play a meaningful role in the fight against climate change. Under A Real Plan to Protect Our Environment, Andrew Scheer will make it more affordable for Canadians to lower their emissions by making their homes more energy efficient," said MP Eglinski.

- investments in high-efficiency furnaces;
- replacement of doors and windows with more efficient models;
- upgrading of ventilation, heating and cooling systems; and,
- installation of solar panels.

"Green home improvements do not just lower emissions, they can save Canadians money on bills through lower energy costs. The

Green Home Tax Credit will help families install energy-saving products and technologies so that they can realize savings on their bills in the long-term," concluded MP Eglinski.

A Real Plan to Protect Our Environment focuses on green technology, not taxes as the best way to lower emissions at home.

The Green Homes Tax Credit (GHTC) will be a two-year plan to help Canadians adopt green solutions for their homes.



## A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH: TRANS MOUNTAIN PIPELINE ANNOUNCEMENT

Well it finally happened. The Federal government has announced that it is prepared to move forward on the Trans Mountain pipeline expansion. Albertans appreciate the second Federal government approval of this project but clearly this only one more step in a process that has already gone on for way too long. This approval is not construction of the pipeline and Albertans have spoken plainly that they will not be satisfied until this pipeline, and others, are built and the oil is flowing to tidewater and international markets!

The completion of the Trans Mountain pipeline is crucial to the Alberta economy. Completion of Trans Mountain will triple the amount of product we are presently delivering to Pacific tidewater. It is only then that Alberta will see any significant movement towards receiving fair market value for our energy resources. With a \$60 billion dollar debt only a creative and

efficient use of existing tax dollars and the revitalizing of the Alberta economy will the government eventually be able to have the finances to help provide the services to help those who cannot help themselves or provide the education and health care that Albertans both deserve and want.

This is a step forward but we should not celebrate until is oil is flowing through the pipeline. It must also be understood that it is in Alberta's interests and all Canadians interests that more than one pipeline must be completed. Not only must we look towards a northern pipeline to the BC coast but we need a pipeline to Atlantic Canada. This decision will not stop the importation of foreign oil from being shipped half way around the world to markets in Central and Maritime Canada when Alberta oil and natural gas should be meeting the needs of Canadians and Canadian markets.

This is an important step forward but we must temper our enthusiasm with some political reality. This announcement is not going to deter

the US funded, radical environmentalists across this country, but especially in BC, from trying to stop the progress of the Trans Mountain pipeline. This Federal decision is not going to magically change the position of the BC government nor will it stop the ill-advised actions of the Federal government as it looks like it will pass Bills C-48 and C-49.

Bills C-48 and C-69 pose a real threat to Alberta interests and should not proceed as written. The Federal government should accept all amendments to Bill C-69 coming out of the Senate. The Federal government should scrap bill C-48 that would shut down all tanker traffic off the coast of BC but would not address similar traffic on the east coast of Canada.

So the Federal government announcement that the Trans Mountain pipeline will finally proceed is good news and let us hope that it is the first step towards ensuring that Alberta will once again become a partner in prosperity in this country we all love called Canada.

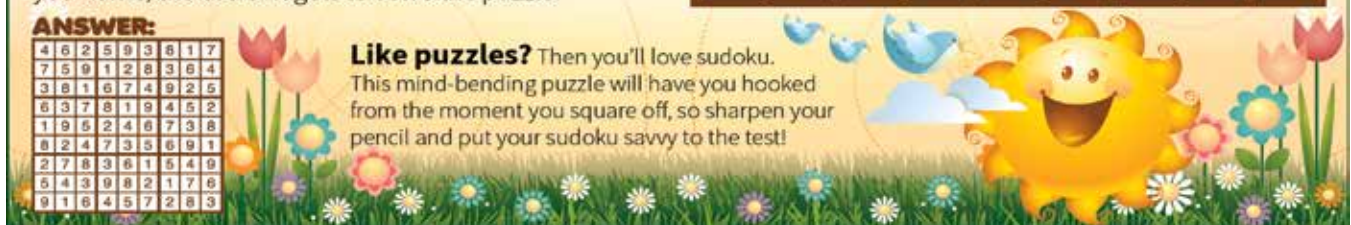
