LEDUC MALE ARRESTED FOR TRAFFICKING HEROIN

On July 12, 2019 the Leduc RCMP drug unit conducted a drug investigation into the trafficking of Heroin in Leduc.

As a result of the investigation Warren Frederick Young a 43year old resident of Leduc was arrested without incident with the assistance of the Edmonton Police Service and charged with the following Criminal Code offences:

• Trafficking in heroin

• Possession for the purpose of trafficking Heroin.

Mr. Young was also charged with 4 counts of breaching a recognizance that he had previously been released on for unrelated charges.

Mr. Young is currently in custody and his next court date is set for July 18, 2019 at the Leduc Provincial Court.

WARNING - SCAMS USING CBSA CREDENTIALS

Submitted by Canada Border Services Agency

The Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) is warning the public about ongoing email, text messages or telephone scams in which people posing as officials from the CBSA are asking for personal information, including Social Insurance Number (SIN). The methods used by the scammers to communicate with the public, and the rational provided to justify being in contact with the victim, are varied, ever changing, but always designed to lure the public into providing personal information.

In some cases, these scams use false CBSA information. Telephone calls may display numbers and employee names that appear to be from the CBSA. Emails may contain CBSA logos, email addresses or employee names and titles to mislead the readers.

It is important to note that the

CBSA never initiates a request for social insurance number and credit card number by telephone or email. If an individual receives a telephone call or an email asking for this information, or requesting payments from the CBSA, it is a scam.

It is important to be vigilant. These calls or emails should be ignored and reported to appropriate authorities. If you have received this type of call, please report it to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre.

• Ensuring basic safety standards.

• Recognizing that a farm is unlike other businesses, and that farmers and ranchers require flexibility in meeting workplace standards.

• Minimizing red tape and the regulatory burden on farmers and ranchers.

• Requiring employers to have workplace insurance, but allow-

ing a choice of market insurance or the Workers' Compensation Board (WCB) as long as basic standards of coverage are met.

• Exempting small farms from employment standards legislation.

We are committed to restoring balance, fairness and common sense to the regulation of Alberta's agriculture sector. Farm and ranch operations have unique needs that are unlike other industries. We need legislation that balances the unique economic pressures of farming with the need for common sense, flexible farm safety and employment legislation.

Alberta Agriculture and Forestry is leading a range of stakeholder consultation opportunities throughout the summer. Watch for Agriculture and Forestry Minister Devin Dreeshen at events in our community, and take that opportunity to connect with him and share your opinion.



911 CALL ATTENDED IN **RESIDENTIAL AREA OF** LEDUC

On July 29, 2019 at approximately 11:15pm Leduc RCMP attended the residential area of Caledonia for a 911 call. Once members arrived on scene they were confronted by a 43-year-old male who was in possession of two handguns. After a brief stand off and negotiation the suspect was successful 6.5mm Creedmore

arrested.

While being booked into police cells, the suspect assaulted the arresting officer causing the member to attend the hospital with non life threatening injuries.

The suspect is being charged with numerous firearms related offences and assaulting a Peace Officer offences. There are no public safety concerns at this time, and this appears to be an isolated event.

The suspect is being held in custody awaiting a bail hearing.





A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH: A BUSY SUMMER

It has been a busy summer, I've been meeting with constituents and trying to ensure that the Government of Alberta is actually working for the people of Alberta in the Drayton Valley-Devon constituency.

On August 7, 2019 the Minister of Agriculture and myself met with farmers from across the constituency as we worked through providing feedback for the Farm Freedom and Safety Act that will be tabled in the Legislature in the fall. Approximately 60+ people attended the consultation providing feedback on how to best address farm safety and OHS legislation etc. that were creating problems for farmers as a result of the passage of Bill 6 by the previous government. It was a productive morning and I think most people that attended were happy to meet the Minister and see that his farming

background brings a great deal of common sense to the issues that farmers are facing.

Recently, the Ministry of Health announced that they are beginning a review of Alberta Health Services. The goal is simple: to strengthen the health system and deliver better access and better results overall. With the government fast approaching a \$60 Billion dollar debt and having campaigned on fiscal responsibility this review will include:

 An examination of AHS' structure and organization.
 Evaluation of AHS programs, services and policies to identify potential areas to reduce costs and improve perfor-

Identification of opportunities to make AHS operation more responsive to the front-lines and Albertans.

• Compare Alberta to other provinces and their best practices.

It is hoped that this review will

find efficiencies to save money and it is the intention of the government that these savings will be reinvested into the health care system. You can become involved by visiting: https://www. alberta.ca/alberta-health-services-review.aspx where you can provide any comments that vou think would be helpful as part of this review. Ernst and Young have been hired to gather the perspectives of front line workers and this too will be built into the report. The final report will be sent to the government by Dec. 31, 2019 and the results will be shared in early 2020.

The Bureau also received comments from more than 42,000 Canadians through an online survey, and 20 written submissions from a variety of Internet service providers.

Of the 2,005 households surveyed: • 90% report being generally satisfied with their current home Internet provider, while customers of independent providers are more likely to be very satisfied;

• 1 in 3 households that considered switching providers in the past two years actually made a switch; and

• 66% of households bundle their internet with at least one other service, but only 17% of those bundles include wireless phone services.

"More choice between providers will allow many Canadians, especially in rural areas of the Yellowhead, to choose a plan that meets their needs related to cost, network speeds and quality of service," concluded MP Eglinski.


