LEDUC COUNTY DECLARES MUNICIPAL STATE OF AGRICULTURAL DISASTER

Submitted by Leduc County

Leduc County council declared a Local State of Agricultural Disaster at its regular council yesterday afternoon, in response to excessive moisture and weather conditions negatively impacting local producers.

"Leduc County council recognizes the issues that our local producers are facing, and the impact that these adverse conditions are having on their livelihoods. By making this declaration, we want to draw attention to the issue and encourage other levels of government to provide support where possible," says Mayor Tanni Doblanko.

Near-daily rainfall throughout the growing season has made haying extremely difficult, and many producers will not have the quality or quantity of hay needed by the end of the season. The cool, wet weather has also been a significant challenge for annual crops; crop immaturity and wet fields have delayed harvest, leaving most major crops unharvested at this time.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Submitted by Alberta Health Services

Fire Prevention Week will take place October 6 to 12, 2019. It's a good time of year to check your smoke alarms to ensure they're working.

Install at least one smoke alarm on every level of your home, including the basement (but not in unfinished attics).

• Put smoke alarms in the hallways that lead to each bedroom.

• On floors without bedrooms, install the smoke

alarm in or near each living area such as dens, living and family rooms.

• Put a smoke alarm on the ceiling at the bottom of any staircase leading to upper floors.

• Mount the smoke alarm high on walls or ceilings (remember– smoke and hot gases rise). Wall-mounted alarms work best when placed at least 10 to 30 cm down from the ceiling. Ceiling-mounted alarms are ideally placed at least 10 cm away from the nearest wall. If ceilings are pitched, install the alarm near the ceiling's highest point.

How do I care for a smoke alarm?

Smoke alarms must be kept clean, as dust and grime may affect how they work.

• Replace the batteries at least once a year

• Replace a smoke alarm every 10 years, soon- er if it isn't working.

• Regularly dust or vacuum the unit.

• Keep each smoke alarm free of paint, stickers,

or other decorations that may prevent it from working properly.

Plan an escape route

• It is important for families and people living alone to practice a fire escape route out of the home. Make two exit plans for each room of the house.

• To reduce the risk of a fall, keep fire escape routes clear of household items and clutter. That will help ensure you have safe and accessible exits.

FIRE PREVENTION

Follow these 9 tips to help protect yourself, your family and your property against fire hazards.

1. Install a fire alarm in every sleeping area and on every level of your home, and be sure to test alarms every month. Working smoke alarms reduce the risk of death in a home fire in half.

2. Check the manufacture date on the back of your home's smoke alarms. Smoke alarms should be replaced at least every 10 years! Batteries should be replaced every year.

3. Never leave burning candles unattended, and always keep matches and lighters out of reach from children. Make a fire action plan, so every member of your household knows how to escape and where to meet outdoors.

5. Over half of home heating fire deaths are caused by equipment being placed too close to things that can burn. Make sure furniture, clothing, mattresses and bedding are at least three feet from heating sources.

6. Always turn off space heaters when you leave the room or go to sleep. Space heaters are the cause of about 79 percent of fatal home heating fires. 7. Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Turn off the stove whenever you leave the kitchen, and never leave home while food is cooking.

8. Inspect electrical cords regularly, and replace cords that are cracked or damaged or have broken plugs or loose connections.

9. In the event of a fire, crawl to safety. Use the back of your hand to see if a door is hot before opening it. If it feels hot, try to use another exit.

CANADA REVENUE AGENCY -- ACTION PLAN FOR SMALL & MEDIUM SIZED BUSINESSES

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to inform small and medium sized businesses in the Yellowhead, that the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA), after consultations with businesses, accountants, industry associations, and CRA employees, has released a report outlining an action plan to deliver service and program improvements for small and medium sized businesses through 2021.

Some improvements include:

• Businesses will be able to sign up to receive an email confirmation when the CRA receives a document or a payment.

• Businesses will be able to upload up to ten documents at once in the Submit documents online service.

• A new "Pay" button in the

online portals will allow businesses to pay outstanding balances with the click of a button.

• The Liaison Officer Service is being expanded to include incorporated businesses.

• The Dedicated Telephone Service for tax preparers is becoming a permanent program.

• More CRA correspondence will be available in the online portals.

The CRA is also working to

ensure that businesses and accountants know when these improvements are available.

Businesses can receive a CRA security code by email, request a Liaison Officer visit, and provide their employees T4 slips in electronic format.

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FIRE PREVENTION WEEK: STATEMENT FROM MINISTER MADU

Municipal Affairs Minister Kaycee Madu issued the following statement to mark Fire Prevention Week:

"It is important to be prepared at all times, and that includes having an emergency escape plan for your home that you practise regularly with all members of your household.

"We are grateful for the heroic acts of our first responders. Yet it is up to all of us to take measures that can protect our homes and our loved ones.

"This week is a critical reminder and alerts us to the dangers of fire.

RCMP OFFICER CHARGED WITH OFF-DUTY SEXUAL ASSAULT

On July 24, 2017, the Alberta Serious Incident Response Team (ASIRT) was directed to investigate an alleged sexual assault involving a member of the RCMP.

It is alleged that during the early morning hours of July 6, 2017, while in Leduc, Alberta, the officer sexually assaulted an adult woman. The officer was off duty at the time.

The evidence gathered during ASIRT's investigation provided reasonable grounds to believe that an offence had been committed and, as is required by the Police Act, the investigation was forwarded to the Alberta Crown Prosecution Service (ACPS) to determine whether the evidence met the standard for prosecution.

Following a review of the investigation and having received the ACPS opinion, ASIRT executive director Susan Hughson, QC, made the determination that the officer should be charged. On Sept. 27, 2019, Const. Kelly Brown was charged with one count of sexual assault. The case is scheduled for first appearance on Oct. 17, 2019 in Leduc Provincial Court.

Questions regarding the officer's duty status should be addressed to the RCMP.

As this matter is now before the courts, no further information will be released.

4:30 a.m. on Sunday, October 6th, 2019, Thorsby RCMP were dispatched to an alarm at the Village Supermarket, 5101 50th Ave, Thorsby. A short time later, a resident reported that they had heard a loud noise and looked outside and saw that the Thorsby Esso gas station looked like someone had just broken in.

RCMP officers attended the gas station first. CCTV cameras show a silver F-350 with aluminum rims backed up the glass door of the business. A male wearing a black hoody then broke the glass and entered the store where he attached a sling to the ATM. The truck then drove forward, removing the ATM and causing significant damage in the process.

Investigators also discovered that the Village Supermarket had been broken into in a similar fashion and the thieves attempted to steal the ATM from that business as well but were unsuccessful.

Images from CCTV cameras are attached. It is believed that the F-350 may have broken a tail light during the crime and there is pre-existing damage noticeable on the drivers door.
