MAYERTHORPE RCMP INVESTIGATE FATAL STRUCTURE FIRE IN THE COMMUNITY OF ROCHFORT BRIDGE

On Dec. 5, 2019, at approximately 4:00 p.m., Mayerthorpe RCMP responded to a residential fire along with Lac Ste. Anne County Fire Services. Despite extensive efforts by Fire Services, the residence was destroyed by the fire.

On Dec. 6, 2019, at approximately 1:30 a.m., Mayerthorpe RCMP were informed by fire personnel that one occupant was located deceased within the residence. A more extensive search of the residence was delayed until 9:00 a.m. when the fire was completely extinguished. Four more occupants were located de-

ceased. The occupants are believed to be two adults and three children.

Investigation into this incident remains ongoing by the Office of the Fire Commissioner and the RCMP.

Out of respect for the privacy of the family involved in this incident, no further information will be provided by the RCMP.

LAC STE. ANNE COUNTY FIRE CREWS RESPOND TO FATAL HOUSE FIRE IN COMMUNITY OF ROCHFORT BRIDGE

Reeve Blakeman issues an initial statement on behalf of Lac Ste. Anne County.

On Dec. 5, 2019, at approximately 4:00 pm, Lac Ste. Anne County Fire Services responded to a residential fire in the Hamlet of Rochfort Bridge. Despite extensive efforts by Fire Services, the residence was destroyed. No other homes were affected by the fire.

At around 1:30 am on Friday, Lac Ste. Anne County

Fire Services discovered one person deceased inside the home. Upon extinguishing the fire around 9:00 am, a more extensive search of the home revealed four more deceased. It is believed that two adults and three children perished in the blaze.

“Loss of life in any situation is horrible for everyone in the community,” stated Joe Blakeman, Reeve of Lac Ste. Anne County. “When children are involved, it is

just devastating.”

Investigation into this incident remains ongoing by the Office of the Fire Commissioner and the RCMP.

“We are shaken by this tragedy,” added Reeve Blakeman. “From the Firefighters and RCMP officers on scene to our rural community at large, this event affects us all. As we deal with the aftermath of this tragedy, we will do so together.”

RCMP TRAFFIC SERVICES SIGNIFICANT SEIZURES TAKE OVER 233,000 AVERAGE DRUG DOSAGES OFF ALBERTA ROADS

Edmonton – Traffic stops on Alberta’s highways can lead to significant seizures of illicit drugs, firearms, stolen goods and other contraband materials.

From July to November 2019, Alberta RCMP made nine significant drug and cash seizures near Banff, Canmore, Lake Louise and Stony Plain. RCMP members stopped vehicles for various offences and not-

ed numerous indicators of drug trafficking.

The subsequent vehicle searches resulted in the combined seizures of 11 kg of cocaine, 1.675 kg of fentanyl, 30 g of meth, 2 kg of MDMA, 90.5 lb. of illegal cannabis, 250 l of GHB, over \$37,500 in Canadian currency and one .32 caliber pistol.

The drugs seized in the stops roughly equate to 33,000 average cocaine dosages, 16,800 average fentanyl dosages, 300 av-

erage methamphetamine dosages, 10,000 average MDMA dosages, 50,000 average GHB dosages and over 123,300 average-sized joints.

“These drug seizures are evidence that traffickers can be caught – our officers are skilled, professional members trained in the detection of illicit commodities which includes drug trafficking,” said Supt. Gary Graham, Alberta RCMP Traffic Services. “The increased presence of illicit synthetic opi-

oids poses a grave threat to Albertans. Traffic enforcement, because of its very nature, plays a key role in identifying and disrupting organized criminal groups fueling this public health epidemic.”

The RCMP will continue to work very closely with our law enforcement and safety partners to keep traveling criminals and illegal activities off Alberta roads and to further reduce crime in Alberta.

HISTORIC INVESTMENT IN RURAL POLICING

Alberta is adding more than 500 RCMP positions in rural communities across the province and fostering new public safety partnership with municipalities.

The Government of Alberta's new police funding model will inject more than \$286 million over five years into frontline law enforcement for these additional RCMP officer and

civilian positions. This new cost-sharing partnership will see small and rural communities begin to pay a portion of frontline policing costs, bringing them into line with larger communities and cities.

Under the cost-sharing terms in the Provincial Police Ser-

vice Agreement (PPSA), Alberta pays 70 per cent of policing costs and the federal government covers the remaining 30 per cent. With the additional investment from municipalities, the federal share of the PPSA will increase as well. This partnership will constitute a

total increase in rural police funding of more than \$286 million over five years with every dollar of the additional funds invested in frontline policing.

The province is creating a new Alberta Police Advisory Board, where municipal leadership will have a seat at the table, working in collaboration with law enforcement to ensure local needs are heard and implemented. This new governance mechanism will ensure that policing is in line with the priorities of those they are protecting.

"Ensuring Albertans are safe, secure, and protected in their communities goes to the heart of who we are as a government. We want to ensure we fund law enforcement in an equitable and sustainable way that will ensure we have more police in our communities. With this new police funding model, we are making the single largest investment in rural policing since the March West and delivering on our promise to enhance public safety." - Doug Schweitzer, Minister of Justice and Solicitor General

backyards and your farmyards, pushing back crime in a sophisticated and focused manner.” - Curtis Zablocki, Deputy Commissioner, RCMP

“Rural Municipalities of Alberta appreciates the Government of Alberta’s willingness to consult on this issue, and as a result of input from RMA and rural municipalities, implement a phased-in police costing model. Rural crime has been an ongoing issue in Alberta in recent years, and rural municipalities recognize they need to share in the costs of the solutions to support safer communities. Absorbing additional policing costs will be a significant challenge for rural municipalities given the current economic environment and RMA continues to be concerned about the use of equalized assessment in the calculations of amounts paid, however a reduction in the weighting of equalized assessment based on consultation is appreciated. RMA is looking forward to participating on the

Alberta Police Advisory Board to inform how additional funding will be reinvested to improve service standards to the rural and remote municipalities and how municipalities can have increased local input into monitoring the service deliverables as compared to cost increases.” - Al Kemmere, president, Rural Municipalities of Alberta

“AUMA has long advocated for a more equitable police-funding model to address RCMP vacancies and the rising costs of policing while improving community safety. This partnership places priority on adding uniformed patrol officers in rural RCMP detachments, increasing the total number from under 1,600 to about 1,900, and will also add members to specialized RCMP units that dismantle organized crime and drug trafficking and investigate auto and scrap metal theft.

Furthermore, the new civilian positions will assist with administrative tasks and investigative support to increase response times and help ensure officers have the support network they need to protect Albertans by spending more time on roads and in communities.

Quick facts

- Small and rural communities, with some exceptions, will begin contributing a portion of their frontline policing costs in 2020. To give communities time to adjust, the new funding model is being phased in: communities will contribute 10 per cent of policing costs in 2020, followed

by 15 per cent in 2021, 20 per cent in 2022 and 30 per cent in 2023.

• Policing costs for each community will be determined by municipal tax base (as measured by equalized assessment) and population to calculate a base cost. Communities will also be eligible for other subsidies that consider other factors that may affect local policing costs.

- Current annual PPSA amount, 2019-20 (prior to new police funding partnership): \$374.8 million

- Government of Alberta contribution: \$262.4 million

- Government of Canada contribution: \$112.4 million

- Additional investments to current PPSA to April 1, 2024 will be: \$286,605,021

- o Government of Alberta contribution: \$200,623,515

- o Government of Canada contribution: \$85,981,506

- All additional investments will go towards more frontline resources.

JOINT MEDIA RELEASE IN RESPONSE TO PROVINCIAL ANNOUNCEMENT OF NEW POLICE FUNDING MODEL

Municipal leaders not briefed on fast-track of program; concerned over resultant impacts to rural ratepayers.

Sangudo, Alberta, Thursday, December 5, 2019 – The Councils of Lac Ste. Anne County and adjacent municipalities have today issued a joint response to the United Conservative Party's December 4th announcement regarding its intent to download policing costs onto rural Albertans. Municipal leaders had not been briefed by the Province prior to this decision, and are now focused on determining the resultant bottom line for regional ratepayers.

"We were not part of the announcement," stated Joe Blakeman, Reeve of Lac Ste. Anne County. "We heard about it the same way everyone else did: in the news. In fact, it feels like we weren't even part of the Province's consultation process. Numerous concerns were voiced by rural municipalities over the past year; none of which are reflected in their media spin as 'a brand new day for rural Alberta.'"

Secrecy and Sparse Detail Precede Provincial Announcement

At the end of the Province's consultation process in October, and during the Rural Municipalities of Alberta (RMA) Fall Convention in November, Alberta's Minister of Justice and Solicitor General (JSG) Doug Schweitzer reassured municipal leaders that the police funding model was still in its consultation stage, and that further conversations would occur to determine how the model might look if it were to go ahead. At the time, it was

stated that:

- Consultations are ongoing and no decisions have been made yet on a new police-costing model

- The model has not been finalized and the province is only at the beginning of the consultation process

"The County feels blindsided by the news, and disappointed in how it was disseminated," continued Reeve Blakeman. "We had been told repeatedly by Minister Schweitzer and his team that they are still consulting, contemplating, and playing with formulas. Now all of a sudden the trigger is pulled and it's out in the public domain without any prior notice to those impacted most by the plan. It's interesting to note how critical it was to Justice Minister Schweitzer that municipal leaders took part in the consultation piece; yet apparently we had no business knowing about its outcome."

"There is little doubt in my mind that the engagement process was a mere formality," shared Reeve Blakeman. "In the final analysis, none of our concerns were addressed, and none of the Province's reassurances rang true. Now we're left holding the bag, and our ratepayers are stuck with the bill."

It is the position of Lac Ste. Anne County Council that the policing initiative places yet another financial burden on resource-strapped rural municipalities. The County seeks to remind the Province – and taxpayers in rural Alberta – that the new police funding model will result in increased municipal tax rates, reduced service levels, re-evaluation of intermunicipal agreements,

and closer scrutiny of policing efficiencies.

Reeve Blakeman voiced a common sentiment among municipal leaders regarding the cold, hard reality of the Province's decision. "Let's be clear: this is a tax expense, and it is going to cost rural Albertans an additional \$200 million," stated Blakeman. Our job on Council is to now determine how we are going to shoulder this new tax hit, and what value we are receiving as a result. Fewer sanders on the road next winter? A property tax increase? This is another sucker punch to rural Albertans who are already dealing with job loss, failed crops and numerous other setbacks. These are the same rural Albertans who, may I remind Premier Kenney, form the bedrock of the United Conservative Party."

Storm Clouds of Regional Dissent

Neighbouring municipalities are joining ranks with the County to determine outcomes of the police costing model, and to communicate these impacts to residents and business owners who will ultimately pay the price. Mayerthorpe Administration voiced concern about the impact of this new program, in addition to other increases outside of the Town's control. Administration expressed that this is the worst possible time to implement this tax with the downturn in the economy and people struggling to make ends meet. Mayerthorpe will be separating policing costs on our tax notices similar to third party requisitions so that ratepayers can see that this is a tax being paid directly for RCMP policing.

Janet Jabush, Mayor of the Town of Mayerthorpe, welcomes a stronger police presence in rural Alberta and understands that the costs for this presence should be shared. However, she questions the logic of laying such a heavy burden on battle-fatigued Albertans on the heels of drastic budget cuts from Premier Kenney's recent omnibus bill. "We are not opposed to municipalities chipping in for policing costs," she states, "but you cannot cut, cut, cut and then just download a tax hit onto rural Alberta. If the general idea is to cripple small municipalities and the businesses and industries within, then by all means carry on."

In addition to the tax implications of the Province's new program, Reeve Blakeman questioned the likelihood of adding an additional 300 RCMP officers when present staffing levels are already woefully inadequate. "The Province is spinning this drastic move as good news," he added. "We're being told (via media sound bites) that it gives Rural Alberta a true seat at the table. If it's the same seat we had during their perfunctory consultation process, we'd like another table."

Known Program Details to Date

In the coming weeks, municipal leaders expect to receive more detail from the Province regarding how costs and policing resources are aggregated to each municipality. As it becomes available, this information will be posted on the Lac Ste. Anne County website at LSAC.ca/police-funding. At time of publication, the follow-

and co-owner of a corporate family cattle ranching operation and an oil field environmental company. With a CPA, CMA accounting designation and extensive public practice, Toews was sworn in as President of Treasury Board and Minister of Finance on April 30, 2019.

West Yellowhead MLA, Martin Long was voted Alberta’s Most Collegial MLA. Prior to being elected in April, Long worked in the newsprint industry and served his community as board chair of the Tinnille’s Hope Community Soup Kitchen in Whitecourt and as a youth leader with the Whitecourt Baptist church.

Shane Getson, MLA for Lac Ste. Anne-Parkland, was recognized as the Best Debater. As a father of four Getson likely had a lot of practice debating before he was first elected in April. Prior to beginning his career in public service, Getson spent 15 years in the construction industry and as a senior manager in the energy sector.

Recognized for Best Community Outreach was MLA Janis Irwin. Before being elected in April as the Member representing Edmonton-Highlands-Norwood, Irwin had devoted over a decade to the education field.

She has served as a board member for several non-profit associations, including the Somali Canadian Women and Children Association, the Highlands Historical Society

Edmonton, and Arts on the Ave. She has also volunteered with a number of organizations, including the Boyle McCauley News, Homeward Trust and the Edmonton Mennonite Centre for Newcomers.

Named Alberta’s Most Knowledgeable Parliamentarian was Deputy Speaker and Chair of Committees, Angela Pitt. Pitt is currently serving her second term as the MLA representing Airdrie-East. She has served on many Legislative Assembly committees during her time as an elected official. Before that, she was a small business owner in Airdrie and an active community volunteer.

Nate Horner received top marks with his colleagues as Alberta’s Best Representative of Constituents. Before he was elected to represent the people of Drumheller-Stettler, Horner was a rancher with a cow-calf mixed farm operation. He was also an active community volunteer serving as an emergency medical responder for Dryland Emergency Medical Services Association, president of the Highway 9 Feeder Co-op Association and co-chair of the Hardgrass Bronc Match.

Members voted Tracy Allard as Alberta’s Hardest Working MLA. Allard was elected in April as the representative for Grande Prairie. Prior to becoming an MLA Allard was a franchise business owner and active community member. She served as a director with the Tim Hortons Children’s

Foundation. She was board president of the Grande Prairie Boys’ Choir and sat on the Grande Prairie Regional Hospital Foundation Capital Cabinet.

Recognized by her peers as the Most Promising Newcomer was the Honourable Rajan Sawhney, Minister of Community and Social Services. Before she was elected as Member for Calgary-North East in April, Sawhney held senior positions in the oil and gas industry. As well, Sawhney served as the senior vice-president of the Sikh Society of Calgary and director of its Guru Nanak Punjabi School. She is a recipient of the Canada 150 award bestowed by YW Calgary in 2007.

Alberta’s MLA Lifetime Achievement Award went to David Eggen. Eggen first served as the Member for Edmonton-Calder from 2004 to 2008. He was re-elected in 2012 and 2015. In April of 2019, Eggen was again elected to represent the constituency of Edmonton-North West. Over the years he has served as Minister of Education and as Minister of Culture and Tourism and has been an active member of numerous committees of the Legislative Assembly. In addition to his many contributions as an MLA and in the education and health industries, Eggen is a trustee with the Forum for Young Albertans and a chair leader of the Spinal Cord Injury Association of Alberta.

- Municipal allocations are based on a formula that uses 50% equalized assessment and 50% population
- Modifiers are included to reduce costs based on crime severity, distance from detachment, shadow population, and existing enhanced policing po-

sitions

- The overall amount collected will be 10% of the overall costs of frontline police officers under the PPSA. This will increase to 15% in 2021, 20% in 2022, and 30% in 2023. At this time, there is no indication the costs will increase above 30%.
- The new model is intended to be implemented on April 1,

2020, with annual increases on April 1 of each subsequent year

- A provincial police advisory board will be formed, which will include municipal representatives from each of the four RCMP districts in Alberta. No details on the function or scope of this board are known.

Fall is the time of year Albertans start to close up their cabins and recreational properties for the season. Alberta RCMP urge citizens to consider crime prevention while winterizing.

In 2017 and 2018, October was the highest month for break and enters to seasonal residences. This is due, in part, to residents closing up their cabins for the winter season. In October 2018, there were 70 break and enters to seasonal properties and over 550 for the year.

The second highest month for break and enters to seasonal properties was May with 56 reports. Many break and enters occur over the winter season, but are not reported until cabins are opened in the spring.

Here are some simple tips for protecting your seasonal property:

- Trim shrubs and trees to create clear sight lines
- Install timers on interior lights
- Bring home expensive tools and toys
- Post signage stating all valuables removed
- Install motion sensor lights outside
- Check on your property periodically
- Put away outdoor furniture that can be used to get to the second floor
- Install solid-core doors
- Lock doors, windows and the shed




