MP SOROKA CALLS FOR UNITY

On December 9, 2019 in the House, Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, asked the Enviornment Minister to unite the country by amending Bill C-69 to allow for the construction of more LNG facilities.

He said:

"Mr. Speaker, Premiers are united behind promoting our natural resources in a responsible manner. The export of more liquefied natural gas by Canadian producers will lower global emissions and create good, high-paying jobs.

With 71,200 jobs lost last month, this could not come

at a more important time. Will the environment minister commit to amending Bill C-69 to allow for the construction of more LNG facilities?"

SIGNIFICANT SEIZURES TAKE OVER 233,000 AVERAGE DRUG DOSAGES OFF ALBERTA ROADS

Traffic stops on Alberta's highways can lead to significant seizures of illicit drugs, firearms, stolen goods and other contraband materials.

From July to November 2019, Alberta RCMP made nine significant drug and cash seizures near Banff, Canmore, Lake Louise and Stony Plain. RCMP members stopped vehicles for various offences and not-

ed numerous indicators of drug trafficking.

The subsequent vehicle searches resulted in the combined seizures of 11 kg of cocaine, 1.675 kg of fentanyl, 30 g of meth, 2 kg of MDMA, 90.5 lb. of illegal cannabis, 250 l of GHB, over \$37,500 in Canadian currency and one .32 caliber pistol.

The drugs seized in the stops roughly equate to 33,000 average cocaine dosages, 16,800 average fentanyl dosages, 300 av-

erage methamphetamine dosages, 10,000 average MDMA dosages, 50,000 average GHB dosages and over 123,300 average-sized joints.

"These drug seizures are evidence that traffickers can be caught – our officers are skilled, professional members trained in the detection of illicit commodities which includes drug trafficking," said Supt. Gary Graham, Alberta RCMP Traffic Services. "The increased presence of illicit synthetic opi-

oids poses a grave threat to Albertans. Traffic enforcement, because of its very nature, plays a key role in identifying and disrupting organized criminal groups fueling this public health epidemic."

The RCMP will continue to work very closely with our law enforcement and safety partners to keep traveling criminals and illegal activities off Alberta roads and to further reduce crime in Alberta.

MP SOROKA MAKES FIRST STATEMENT IN THE HOUSE

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, made his first statement in the House of Commons on December 9, 2019. MP Soroka recommended "...we eliminate the use of foreign oil. The majority of countries we are importing from have low environmental standards and a record of violating human rights."

He went on to state that "Instead, we should be relying solely on Canadian oil to fulfill our energy needs. We need to produce more direct consumer products from all our industries, particularly Agricultural and

Forestry."

Only when we come together and support each other at home can we build a strong economy that can compete globally, concluded MP Soroka.

CANADA LAUNCHES STRATEGIC ASSESMENT OF THERMAL COAL MINING – COALSPUR VISTA COAL MINE PHASE II PROJECT IN HINTON NOT DESIGNATED FOR FEDERAL REVIEW

CANADIANS WILL HAVE MORE PROTECTION AGAINST NUISANCE CALLS

These systems must be

implemented within their networks by December 19, 2019. The implementation of this system will mean that calls that do not come from a number that can be dialled or exceed 15 digits will be blocked before reaching the subscriber.

ENBRIDGE LINE 3 UPDATE: MINISTER SAVAGE

Energy Minister Sonya Savage issued the following statement regarding the Canadian segment of Enbridge's Line 3 replacement project coming into service on Dec. 1:

"This is an important milestone for our province. Along with other enhancements to the Enbridge Mainline system, Line 3 will increase Alberta's takeaway capacity by about 100,000 barrels per day.

"This pipeline replacement checks a lot of boxes: it enhances safety, has created thousands of jobs on both sides of the border, and will continue to provide critical tax revenues over its lifespan in both Canada and the U.S. But we still need more –

much more.

"We will continue to fight for market access; but in the meantime, we need to find ways to maximize and optimize our existing pipelines.

"These kinds of capacity increases are extremely important as they will deliver more of Alberta's energy to market while major projects – such as Trans Mountain, Keystone XL and the remainder

of Line 3 in the United States – are still in development.

"The world demand for energy will continue to increase in the coming decades and we believe that this demand should be met with Alberta energy. We will continue to unapologetically defend our energy industry, our workers and our high environmental, social and governance standards."

TECHNOLOGY AND DIVERSIFICATION IN DRAYTON VALLEY-DEVON

Can you believe we made it all the way into 2020 already? I hope everyone had the opportunity to rest up this holiday season and enjoy the wonderful new year's celebrations.

As the holidays come to an end, I want to discuss a topic that I have found myself continuously championing over the last few years; technological advancements and resource production in the

constituency of Drayton Valley-Devon.

Ås an MLA in a resource rich constituency, I am asked time and time again what our government is doing to diversify the provincial economy and create future jobs. My answer and the solution to many questions regarding our resource industries is the application of technology.

As we know, Alberta is home to a world class oil and gas sector and as a result, host to some of the most rapidly developing technological industries and products in the world.

Throughout the history of our province, we have seen highly advanced technology continue to grow and adjust in step with the needs of our economy and resources. In just the past 15 years we have witnessed a 25% reduction in carbon produced in Fort McMurray as Alberta engineers continue to make advances in the area of carbon capture. A new development by Safe Seal 360, a company based out of Drayton Valley, has created a valve that self-greases and has a fail-safe leak stopper for use in pipeline production. A second company, Cerulean Carbon Corp., has created a product that could completely change the way we respond to an oil spill.

This product is called HY-DRO-C6H6 and is a combination of Synthetic Rubber and other ingredients that form a powder that absorbs oil. These components are essentially non-toxic, making them a safer and more affordable product for use in nature. Currently, it can cost multiple millions of dollars and an extended amount of time to clean up an oil spill. I visited an oil spill clean-up this past summer which cost over 3 million dollars for a relatively small spill that was discovered shortly after a pipe ruptured. This new technology, could have been applied to spill I visited and absorbed and eliminated the oil spill and its affects almost immediately. The long chain hydrocarbon molecules that make up Hydro-C surround and then encapsulate the undesired oil, making complete removal efficient and effective, even in water.

While many argue that we must immediately shut down natural resource production across our country to prevent damage to ecosystems and climate, I would contest that the changes needed to address many environmental concerns are already very much available or in development. New technologies and advancing science are demonstrating to us every single day that there are often modern solutions for the modern problems we face today. We produce in Alberta world class engineers out of the University of Alberta, who continue to apply their world class engineering skils and knowledge to the problems faced in our 21st Century Alberta economy. Alberta is currently home to hundreds of new and emerging technologies that will only help to advance our economic place in the world. So as we proceed into a new decade this knowledge reassures me that we can and should have hope in the economic future of Alberta.

A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH: 2019 YEAR END CONCLUSION

As the 2019 year comes to a close here are a few important updates to consider as the fall session ends and as we close out what has been a very busy 2019.

On Wednesday night, Dec 4th, the final three government bills on the order paper were passed, bringing the fall sitting of the Legislature to a close. Some interesting numbers were delivered via a news conference the following Thursday, Government House Leader Jason Nixon reported that seven months into the UCP's mandate, the government has delivered on 43 per cent of campaign commitments, an incredible total of 16 government bills were passed during the eight week fall sitting. 375 commitments were made in the UCP platform and, to date, 162 are met or underway. Only 12 per cent of the way through a 4-year mandate in government and the UCP are on track

to reverse many of the backwards and cumbersome policies implemented by the NDP.

PISA Grades Alberta's Education System

We realize that we cannot rely on global rankings when individual test scores are not improving. That is why we will continue to move forward on strengthening our education system so we can see increases in scores, in addition to climbing global ranks, in future years

Premier Kenney Fights for Alberta at the Council of the Federation



Both Russell and Herman were released on appearance notices and will appear in Leduc Provincial Court on February 6, 2020.

When the RCMP became aware of these concerns about the property, Beaumont General Investigative Service with assistance from the Leduc County Crime Reduction Unit worked together in the investigation. Alberta RCMP's Auto Theft North Unit assisted on scene to confirm these items were stolen. "If you see something suspicious, call the police. 

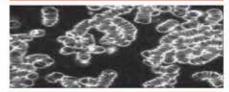
