

LEDUC RCMP RESPOND TO A **FATAL TRAFFIC COLLISION**





A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH

Submitted by MLA Mark Smith | Drayton Valley – Devon Constituency

This last week Minister Shandro announced a highly anticipated and welcome review of Alberta's Healthcare System. The report, conducted by Ernst & Young LLP (EY), will look to maintain current healthcare spending while searching for greater efficiencies and more effective services for Albertans.

The review is the first in 10 years, since Alberta Health Services was formed. The report contains 57 recommendations and 72 savings opportunities to improve the quality and long-term sustainability of health services.

"The AHS review is a key commitment to Albertans, and I'm very excited about moving forward with implementation. Every dollar we save will be put right back into the health system to deliver on our promise to improve access and make the system work better for patients. It's about freeing up administrative resources so we can spend more directly on Albertans' health care." - Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health

The recommendations address four key areas: people, clinical services, non-clinical services and governance. The government accepts the report, with two important exceptions: there will be no hospital closures or consolidation of urban trauma centres.

Internal savings will allow more money to be directed to patients and frontline care, and will help free up funds for more surgeries while diminishing wait times.

The report identifies a range of long-term savings initiatives with the potential to save between \$1.5 billion to \$1.9 billion annually.

Stakeholder input into the

review process far exceeded any similar projects that Ernst & Young LLP (EY) has conducted across Canada. Staff engagement included feedback from about 1,200 physicians, 27,000 front-line staff and 4,200 AHS leaders.

Over the next 100 days, AHS will engage staff and clinical leaders as it develops a long-term implementation plan. The successful completion of this AHS review will fulfill an important platform committed to cut administrative costs while increasing patient care.

I am also excited to tell you about an incredible opportunity to honour and recognize those who help keep our communities safe. The Alberta Community Justice Awards acknowledge the people and organizations involved with crime prevention and community safety initiatives. This includes youth justice, restorative justice and other community-based justice efforts that

improve safety and well-being.

Nominations close February 28 and the 29th Annual Alberta Community Justice Awards ceremony will take place in Edmonton in June.

Finally, in regards to our oil and gas sector, we have been receiving some great news and even better numbers. Since being elected, our government has focused on attracting investment and sending a strong message that Alberta is open for business.

I am happy to report that the Canadian Association of Petroleum Producers expects total investment in oil and gas will be \$37 billion this year – up \$2 billion from \$35.1 billion in 2019. This investment will support approximately 8,100 jobs here in Alberta and 3,700 jobs in the rest of Canada. This is in addition to the 533,000 jobs that Alberta's energy industry provides across the country.

DEDICATED HEALTH CARE PROVIDER SECURED FOR THORSBY & WARBURG

The answer to providing health care needs in the under-serviced communities of Thorsby and Warburg has been found. A Nurse Practitioner (NP) has been hired by the Leduc Beaumont Devon Primary Care Network (LBD PCN) to deliver primary care support to those living in Thorsby, Warburg and surrounding areas.

Michelle Williams is trained as a family/all ages Nurse Practitioner and has been practicing as a Registered Nurse for 20 years prior to obtaining her Nurse Practitioner graduate degree. She has spent most of her career in rural healthcare in the community of Whitecourt and surrounding areas working in the emergency department, acute care, labour and delivery, and public health settings. Michelle previously worked at the McLeod River Primary Care Network where she developed a palliative care program. Some of you may have already met Michelle through her most recent experience as a Palliative Nurse Consultant seeing patients in the communities of Thorsby, Warburg, Calmar, Devon, Leduc and Beaumont, as well as in the local rural

hospitals.

A Nurse Practitioner is a registered nurse with additional graduate education and training in advanced practice. clinical conduct comprehensive health assessment, diagnose health conditions and treat and manage acute and chronic illness within a holistic model of care. NPs order and interpret screening and diagnostic tests, perform procedures, and prescribe medications (no restrictions) and therapeutic interventions and can refer to specialists.

Nurse practitioners act as primary care providers within their stream of practice. They work independently across the spectrum of health services, such as acute care, primary care, community health, longterm care, specialty areas of health and emergency care. They work collaboratively with physicians and other health care professionals to provide high-quality, patient-centred care. Nurse practitioners use a holistic approach to health care, focusing not only on medical issues or problems, but also on patient/family-centred care including the psychosocial and functional aspects of life.


In short, a nurse practitioner can provide the same level of care that a family physician can.

Thorsby/Warburg "The Doctor Attraction/Retention committee is very grateful to have partnered with the Leduc Beaumont Devon Primary Care Network and many other community partners to bring a Nurse Practitioner to our communities," said Shawna Ofstie, committee chair and Black Gold School Division Trustee - County West. "Thorsby has been without a family physician since January 1971 and Warburg's last doctor closed his practice in the 1960's, leaving our communities to travel to nearby towns or cities to receive care. This has left many unattached patients in the area for several reasons including transportation issues."

The LBD PCN is working to secure suitable space for the NP to open clinics in both Thorsby and Warburg and anticipates that Michelle will be able to start seeing patients by late February.

Miscellaneous support for the two clinics will be funded by the communities while funding for the nurse practitioner position was secured through a grant provided by the Government of Alberta through the Nurse Practitioner Support Program.

"A Nurse Practitioner in Thorsby & Warburg is a long-awaited solution to provide continuity of care to our families who need it most by eliminating barriers," says Ofstie. "After learning more about the role of Nurse Practitioners, it is apparent that this is the best solution to serving the healthcare needs and providing the care the residents of our rural communities deserve."

WHAT IS THE LEDUC BEAUMONT DEVON PRIMARY CARE NETWORK?

The Leduc Beaumont Devon Primary Care Network (LBD PCN) provides services for patients in the cities of Leduc and Beaumont, town of Devon and all communities in Leduc County. A group of 56 family physicians in 13 clinics along with additional healthcare professionals (nurses, dietitians, an exercise specialist, be-

havioural health consultants and mental health clinicians) work together to improve primary care for our patients. The LBD PCN offers support to our patients through the following services:

- Health promotion and disease prevention
- Diabetes management
- · Weight management
- Nutrition concerns
- Exercise and activity support
- · Mental health support

- Tobacco reduction and cessation
- Health education classes and workshops
- · Senior care
- Specialty clinics
- Referral coordination
- After-hours clinics in Leduc and Beaumont

Primary Care Networks (PCNs) use a collaborative team approach to provide care for patients and to coordinate primary health care services provided by family physicians,

Alberta Health Services and other health care professionals


PCNs are a way to provide team support for family doctors by bringing teams of health professionals together; doctors, nurses, dietitians, social workers, mental health professionals, pharmacists, occupational and respiratory therapists and others. PCNs also manage 24-hour patient access to appropriate primary care services.

What are Primary Care Networks?

PCNs are a made-in-Alberta approach to improving access to and better coordination of care for patients across the province. În a PCN, a group of family doctors working with a multidisciplinary team and Alberta Health Services coordinate health services for patients. A PCN is not necessarily a bricks and mortar building it is a network of doctors and other health providers such as nurses, dietitians, mental health professionals, therapists, pharmacists and others working together to provide primary health care to patients.

A PCN can be comprised of one clinic with many physicians and support staff, or several doctors in several clinics in a geographic area. Each network has the flexibility to develop programs and to provide services in a way that works locally to meet the specific needs of patients. This is done within the provincial Primary Care Initiative framework. The flexibility to develop local solutions to local health issues makes each PCN unique and encourages the PCN team to focus on the needs of the local patient population.

There are 41 PCNs operating throughout Alberta with more than 3800 family physicians and 1400 healthcare professionals are working in PCNs. Approximately 85% of Albertans receive care through a Primary Care Network.

Last year, there were almost 10,000 thefts of motor vehicles in Alberta RCMP jurisdiction. Over 6,500 of those thefts were trucks, SUVs, or vans. Cars made up a smaller portion of thefts accounting for just over 1,200. There was a 5% decrease in vehicle thefts from 2018 to 2019, but there is still room for improvement. In February 2019,

there were almost 700 vehicles stolen from Alberta RCMP jurisdiction.

One of the most important tips is to lock your vehicle and remove the keys. If you plan to start your car to warm it up, you need a remote starter or plan to stay with your vehicle.

Here are some easy steps to keep your vehicle safe:

- · Lock the doors
- Remove all valuables
- Use a steering wheel lock

- Lock your garage
- Remove garage door opener from vehicle
- Use a vehicle tracking system
- Park in a well-lit area


