Compliance with Alberta Health Services directives is critical to protecting our community and halting the spread of COVID-19. The Town of Mayerthorpe strongly encourages its citizens to comply with the directives outlined in the following link: https://www. alberta.ca/coronavirus-info-for-albertans.aspx

At the time this press release was issued, the Province reports ZERO confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Mayerthorpe and surrounding area. With the number of confirmed cases in the Province increasing every day and two deaths reported to date, it is imperative that our citizens stay vigilant.

As a small, rural community, Mayerthorpe may seem

insulated from the health impacts of COVID-19. However, the number of people from outlying communities visiting our town has dramatically increased. They come in search of supplies, medicines and essentials. And, they come from larger communities where confirmed cases of COVID-19 are more prevalent, therefore potentially exposing our citizens to the virus.

The Town of Mayerthorpe has NOT declared a State of Local Emergency. Our local situation is under constant review by Town Officials. Should it become necessary. the Town will not hesitate to make such a declaration.

Presently, the Town of Mayerthorpe is focused on the continuity of essential public services such as water and sewer. At the same time, the health and safety of our Town Staff is of paramount importance. To that end, all Town Facilities have

been or will soon be closed to the public including the Town Office. Our Community Services Building has remained open to facilitate Playgroup refunds but will close effective March 26. Town Staff are still hard at work and will continue to be available by telephone and email and will respond to enquiries via social media during regular business

Effective March 25, all Town playgrounds will be closed to the public to mitigate the risk of exposing our children to COVID-19. Elmer Elson Elementary School has closed its playground, as well. Parents are asked to ensure their children are not accessing these facilities.

Town Council is assessing measures to reduce the financial burden created by these uncertain times. The impacts on citizens, local businesses and service agencies cannot yet be fully measured or understood.

Monday's Council Meeting, a motion was passed to waive utility bill penalties for the month of March 2020. Additional measures are also being considered.

Town Council and I encourage you to remain vigilant in the protection of your families and your community. If you can, stay home and stay safe. Help a neighbor if you're able. Support local businesses and each other.

Covid-19 is a Pandemic. Statements like, "Yeah, but more people die from the flu in a year than have died from this" and the complacency those statements feed must end.

THERE IS NO VACCINE FOR COVID-19! Period, full stop! That's the difference and that's what makes our current reality so serious. Ignoring the precautions currently recommended puts our families, friends and neighbors at risk. People will die if we don't follow the guidelines given to us by Alberta Health Services (AHS) because THERE IS NO CURE! I'm pleading with you; take heed and be diligent in following the recommended safety protocols.

We are exposed to germs and viruses daily, most of the time with negligible effects because we've all built some immunity to these things. Unless you've contracted and recovered from COVID-19, you have no such immunity. By going about your daily life and ignoring AHS guidelines, you needlessly put yourself, your loved ones and your neighbors at risk.

On March 28, 2020, Ministerial Orders were enacted by the Provincial government granting those with Community Peace Officer 1 designation (CPO 1) additional authorities to enforce provisions of the Public Health Act. Those orders can be viewed at: https://open.alberta.ca/dataset?q=&sort=meta-data_created+desc&pubtype=Orders+and+Directives&tags=COVID-19

These Ministerial Orders will enable a CPO 1 to assist Alberta Health Authorities and RCMP in investigating and laying charges under the Public Health Act. The goal of enforcement agencies is to educate and work with those who do not understand and/or appreciate the gravity of

the COVID-19 pandemic. Laying charges will always be a last resort. During the course of an investigation, the decision to lay any charge rests solely at the discretion of the investigating Officer.

All complaints will be thoroughly investigated. Fines under the Public Health Act start at \$1,150 for the first offence, increasing to \$1,200 on April 1 for an individual. Businesses or companies found in violation could face a fine of \$100,000. For complete details, please visit: https://www.alberta.ca/coronavirus-info-for-albertans.aspx

Our Provincial government has taken necessary actions. All barber shops, hairdressers, massage, physiotherapy, and chiropractic businesses considered non-essential and are ordered closed, effective immediately. to close their dining rooms but may remain open to provide takeout service. Grocery stores, pharmacies, retail liquor & cannabis stores, mechanic/auto repair shops and gas stations have been classified essential services and will remain open to the public.

MAYERTHORPE RCMP ARREST THREE IN ARMED ROBBERY

Sangudo, Alta. - On March 21, 2020, at approximately 8:40 p.m., Mayerthorpe RCMP responded to an armed robbery at the Liquor Stop in Sangudo.

Two males wearing masks entered the store, producing a bat and a firearm. Once inside, one of the males sprayed several employees with pepper spray, while the other male removed the cash register. Both males then departed the store also taking several bottles of liquor. The two males got into a waiting vehicle with a third person as the driver and fled the scene.

Mayerthorpe RCMP located the vehicle shortly after receiving the call. A pursuit of the fleeing vehicle ensued, as it travelled towards Barrhead on a rural road. Barrhead RCMP assisted in the pursuit and deployed a tire deflation device to incapacitate the vehicle. All three were taken into custody without further incident.

Darwin Wolf Hallock (24) of Grande Cache, Norman Billy Wanyandie (37) of Grande Cache and Annie Moberly (36) of Spruce Grove were charge with multiple offences, some of which include:

- Armed robbery
- Assault
- Pointing a firearm

- Wearing a disguise in the commission of an offence
- Flight from police

 Provincial Court on June 11,
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


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
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AFFORDABLE FEATURES TO CONSIDER WHEN REVAMPING YOUR KITCHEN

• Glass-free shower: Soap scum and water deposits can form on shower doors, even for homeowners who are diligent with cleaning. A sizable shower prevents water spray and affords the ability to forgo glass doors or curtains, thereby cutting down on cleaning and making the room feel more modern.

· Multihead shower: When redoing the shower, account for various shower heads so that the water can cascade across the body more completely. This provides a spa experience at home.

· Touchless faucets and soap dispensers: These

aren't just for public bathrooms anymore. Touchless faucets and dispensers are more sanitary and convenient.

· Separate toilet room: A shared bath almost necessitates this type of setup. The toilet is housed inside its own small space and closed away from the rest of the bathroom. It's more private and convenient this way.

· Heated flooring: You need not worry about stepping out of a warm shower onto a cold floor when heated flooring is part of the equation. This option is available in various flooring materials as well.

DIY PROJECTS THAT CAN CONSERVE ENERGY AROUND THE HOUSE

Home renovation projects can pay numerous dividends. Renovations can have a positive effect on resale value, make homes more livable for residents and, in some ways, make homes more affordable.

Renovation projects that aim to conserve energy can save homeowners substantial amounts of money. Such projects don't often require considerable effort or even sizable financial investments, which can make homeowners skeptical as to just how much they can save after completing the project. But the scale of a project may have little to do with how much homeowners will save. For example, the U.S. Department of Energy notes that a relatively effortless task like turning back a thermostat between 7° and 10° F for eight hours per day can save homeowners as much as \$83 per year. A more labor-intensive task like planting shade trees saves homeowners an average of between \$35 and \$119 per year.

When looking for ways to conserve energy around the house and save money, homeowners need not necessarily commit to expensive projects. The DOE notes that the following are some energy-saving projects and details what homeowners can expect to save after completing them. While each individual project may not result in jaw-dropping savings, homeowners who follow many of these recommendations may end up saving more than \$1,000 per year.

Project: Install exterior low-e storm windows. What is it? Low-e windows reflect infrared heat back into a home. Such windows are coated with an ultra-thin layer of metal that improves the window's insulation ability. How much can I save?

Homeowners who install low-e windows can save between 12 and 33 percent on their annual heating and cooling costs.

Project: Seal uncontrolled air leaks. What is it? Air leaks let cool air in during winter and warm air in during summer. Caulking, sealing and weather stripping all cracks and large openings can cut back on air leaks that are costing you money. The DOE recommends hiring a contractor to seal any leaks on heating and cooling ducts. How much can I save? Homeowners who seal uncontrolled air leaks can save between 10 and 20 percent on their annual heating and cooling bills.

Project: Plant shade trees. What is it? If you plant a deciduous tree between six and eight feel tall near your home, it will begin to shade your windows within a year of being planted. Depending on the species of the tree and the home, the shade

tree will begin shading the roof within five to 10 years. The DOE notes that shading is the most cost-effective way to reduce air conditioning costs. How much can I save? Properly planted shade trees can reduce air conditioning costs by anywhere from 15 to 50 percent.

Project: Insulate the water heater tank. What is it? New water tanks are likely already insulated. But homeowners with older hot water tanks can insulate their tanks with a water heater insulating blanket kit. How much can I save? Insulating a water heater tank can save homeowners as much as 16 percent on their annual water heating bills.

SIGNS YOUR TOOLS MAY NEED SOME TLC

A do-it-yourselfer is only as good as his or her tools. Without the proper tools, even the handiest men and women may struggle to complete jobs well within their abilities.

It doesn't take a seasoned doit-yourselfer to recognize when hammers and screwdrivers need to be replaced. And such tools are generally so affordable that replacing them, even when they still have some utility, won't affect too many DI-Yers' budgets. However, power tools are considerable investments that do not necessarily need to be discarded when the first signs of trouble pop up. In fact, sometimes power tools just need some TLC to become useful once again. The following are some common symptoms of power tool problems, and what may be behind those problems.

Difficulty starting

A power tool that won't start can delay a project. But a tool

that won't start should not be immediately written off, especially not before DIYers employ a multimeter. The cost of digital multimeters varies widely, with some retailing for less than \$20 while others sell for hundreds and hundreds of dollars. Serious DIYers who spend every weekend working on one project or another may find the more expensive multimeters more to their liking, but many weekend warriors can get by with less expensive alternatives. Multimeters are useful because they can measure voltage on a power tool to determine if power is effectively moving through the tool.

Dust and dirt also can compromise power tools. This may be especially likely in spring, a time synonymous with home renovations, when many homeowners pick up their tools for the first time in months. Inspect a power tool that's not starting to see if dust

or dirt is the culprit. If so, clean the tool and then try to start it again.

Loss of power

Some power tools may start but still lack the extra muscle that make power tools more beneficial than manual tools. In such instances, the carbon brushes might need to be replaced. The online resource ereplacement.parts.com notes that heat damage to brushes can reduce the overall conductivity of the brush, resulting in less power reaching the tool's motor. In such instances, replace the carbon brushes. In addition, chipped or damaged brushes can result in inconsistent power output. Replacing the brushes in such instances may be all that's necessary to restore a tool to its powerful self.

Burning smell

Many a DIYer has dealt with a power tool that emits an odor of burning. The power tool experts at Grainger notes that tools like sanders contain drive belts, and these belts should be the first place to look when tools produce a burning smell. When the drive belt is to blame, the tool will typically stop working even when the motor is running. Capacitors may be behind the burning smell when using tools with-out drive belts. Sometimes tools have simply overheated. Whenever DIYers get a whiff of that burning smell, turn off the tool immediately and let it sit for 30 minutes before trying to diagnose the problem. Replacing these parts can restore them to full usefulness and get rid of that unwelcome aroma.

Replacing worn or damaged power tool parts as opposed to the tools themselves is often the most budget-friendly way to get these must-have DIY accessories back on track.

IMPROVE STORAGE AT HOME

Utilize track storage systems

Closets may be plentiful, but if not efficiently utilized, space may still seem lacking. Track closet storage systems often make greater use of closet space than traditional shelf and hanging rod systems. Customizing closets using track systems or other modifications can improve utility of all closets in the

Invest in storage beds

Storage beds typically feature cubbies or drawers within a platform-style bed frame. It's a practical home storage solution, and does not require any building.

Think vertically

Maximize spaces by looking up and down for storage possibilities. Items that are not used frequently, such as seasonal decorations or travel suitcases, can be stored in high spaces. Shelving on walls can go as high as necessary and be put to use in awkward wall areas, such as in corners or under eaves.

Invest in storage benches/ ottomans

A stopping area inside the front door replete with a storage bench can house shoes, umbrellas, hats, backpacks, and other items, keeping them tidy and out of sight. In living rooms, look for chests or ottomans that

At the time this press release was issued, the Province reports ONE confirmed case of COVID-19 in the Mayerthorpe region. With the number of confirmed cases in the Province increasing daily, two deaths, and fifty-seven recovered from the virus, it was only a matter of time before COVID-19 reached our region. Town Officials are reviewing the Continuity Plan in a Pandemic to consider further measures to safeguard key essential services, thus enabling authorities to exercise safeguards for the community.

The Province has put in place new provisions to protect Albertans. Additional authorities have been given to Community Peace Officer 1's to assist in enforcement of:

- · Restrictions for mass gatherings is reduced from 50 to no more than 15 people.
- Non-essential businesses, including retail and dine-in restaurant services are suspended.
- · Non-essential retail services including gift and specialty stores, non-essential health and beauty care, men's, ladies and children's wear, etc. A complete list of essential services can be viewed at: https://www. alberta.ca/essential-services. aspx.
 - Public Health Orders.

Alberta Municipal Affairs enacted new provisions as follows:

- · The Meeting Procedures (COVID-19 Suppression) Regulation enabling municipalities to conduct meetings and hearings in a manner that protects participants and observers.
- · Extension of many legislative deadlines within the Municipal Government Act to October 1, 2020.
- · Extending the deadline to complete Intermunicipal Collaboration Framework's and Intermunicipal Development Plans to April 1, 2021.

Effective April 1, the Prov-

ince mandated that there will be no evictions due to failure to pay rent and rent increases are suspended. Education funding not utilized to be re-allocated to support the COVID-19 response. Transport Canada enacted new restrictions for domestic travelers. Travelers displaying signs and symptoms of COVID-19 will not be allowed to board trains or planes for domestic travel within Canada effective Monday, March 30, 2020 at noon.

Federal and provincial governments implemented relief for businesses including:

- · Increased subsidies for small/medium sized business to cover 75% of wages, rather than the previously announced 10%, backdated to March 15, 2020.
- · Canada Emergency Business Account announced banks offering \$40,000 loans to businesses (interest free for

1 year), \$10,000 forgivable under certain conditions.

• GST/HST payments deferred to June 2020.

These are difficult times. Please do your part to "flatten the curve" of this pandemic. Adhere to Alberta Health Service directives. Stay safe, stay home and stay vigilant. We'll see this through together. There is a light at the end of the tunnel and it's not a freight

ADDITIONAL FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR ALBERTANS AND EMPLOYERS

More relief is on the way for Albertans and Alberta employers.

The government has made three significant decisions that will give Albertans and Alberta employers additional supports as they deal with the impacts of the COVID-19 crisis.

"Our priority is to keep our province strong while we get through these difficult times together. We're doing everything we can to support Albertans and Alberta employers through this crisis. That's why we're focused on creating tangible savings for households and freeing up necessary cash for businesses to help them through these unprecedented times." - Jason Kenney, Premier

Education property tax

During a pandemic, Alberta households should not need to worry about paying additional property taxes.

- The government will immediately cancel the decision made in Budget 2020 and will freeze education property taxes at last year's level.
- Reversing the 3.4 per cent population and inflation adjustment will save Alberta households and businesses about \$87 million in 2020-21, which means \$55 million for households and \$32 million for employers.
- The government expects that Albertans and Alberta businesses will fully realize these savings and that mu-

nicipal property tax levels will not be increased as a result of the lower provincial education property tax levels.

Education property tax deferral for business

When Alberta businesses are operating, they employ Albertans who can support themselves, their families and help keep the economy running. Effective immediately, the government will defer education property tax for businesses for six months.

- In the next six months, \$458 million in cash will remain with employers to help them pay employees and continue operations.
- The government expects municipalities to set education property tax rates as they normally would, but defer collection. Deferred amounts will be repaid in future tax years.
- The government encourages commercial landlords to pass on these savings to their tenants through reduced or deferred payments. This will help employers continue to manage their debts, pay their employees and stay in business.
- Businesses capable of paying their taxes in full are strongly encouraged to do so. This will assist the province in being able to support Albertans through this pandemic.

"Eliminating the scheduled adjustment of education property taxes and deferring collection of non-residential property taxes will result in savings to Albertans and improved business cash flow. This measure will help Alberta households and businesses during this time – we want to keep Albertans working while we get through these difficult times together." – Travis Toews, President of Treasury Board and Minister of Finance

WCB premiums deferral for private sector businesses and support for small and medium businesses

Private sector employers can save money on their WCB premium payments at a time when they need it most. These actions ensure the sustainability of the workers' compensation system and that injured workers continue to receive the benefits and supports they need to return to work.

- Private sector employers will have immediate financial relief by deferring WCB premiums until early 2021, effectively for one year.
- Employers who have already paid their WCB premium payment for 2020 are eligible for a rebate or credit.
- For small and medium businesses, the government will cover 50 per cent of the premium when it is due.
- Large employers will also receive a break by having their 2020 WCB premium payments deferred until 2021, at which time their premiums will be due.
- · Paying 50 per cent of

small and medium private sector WCB premiums for 2020 will cost government approximately \$350 million.

Additional measures to help families, students and employers

Previously announced measure taken by the province to protect Albertans and assist businesses include:

- The collection of corporate income tax balances and instalment payments is deferred until Aug. 31, 2020. This gives Alberta businesses access to about \$1.5 billion in funds to help them cope with the COVID-19 crisis.
- \$50 million to support emergency isolation for working adult Albertans who must self-isolate, including persons who are the sole caregiver for a dependent who must self-isolate, and who will not have another source of pay or compensation while they are self-isolated. It is distributed in one payment instalment to bridge the gap until the federal emergency payments begin in April.
- Utility payment deferral for residential, farm, and small commercial customers to defer bill payments for the next 90 days and ensure no one is cut off from electricity and natural gas services during this time of crisis.
- A six-month, interest-free moratorium on Alberta student loan payments for all individuals who are in the process of repaying these loans.





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ADDITIONAL RESTRICTIONS TO STOP SPREAD OF COVID-19

To protect the health and safety of Albertans, mass gatherings will be limited to 15 people and more restrictions will be placed on available services.

As a result of the evolving COVID-19 pandemic, attendance at certain businesses and organizations across the province will be prohibited effective immediately.

Restrictions will be in place for the following classifications of business:

- Close contact businesses including hair salons and barbershops, tattoo and piercing studios, esthetic services, as well as wellness studios and clinics and non-emergency and non-critical health services provided by regulated health professionals or registered professionals including dentistry, physiotherapy, massage, podiatry, chiropractic and optometry services.
 - · Dine-in restaurants will no

longer be able to offer dine-in service. Take-out and delivery services will continue to be available.

• Non-essential retail services that fall into the categories of clothing, computer and gaming stores, and services in shopping malls and shopping centres such as hobby and toys, gift and specialty items and furniture.

A more complete list of affected businesses is available online.

In addition, people are prohibited from attending gatherings of more than 15, and they must observe two metres of social distancing. This includes:

- open spaces such as trails, fields and parks
- public and private gatherings where people are brought together in a single room or space at the same time, in-

cluding funerals, weddings and other formal and informal events

Further details on gathering restrictions are available online.

Workplaces that have not been ordered to close can continue to have more than 15 workers on a worksite as long as those business maintain public health measures, including two metre social distancing, hygiene enforcement and processes that ensure that any person who is ill does not attend these spaces.

Any business or organization not following the public health order will be subject to a fine. Courts have the power to administer fines of up to \$100,000 for a first offence and up to \$500,000 for a subsequent offence for more serious violations. Individuals aware of any businesses violating

these orders should submit a complaint online immediately.

Quick facts

- All Albertans have a responsibility to help prevent the spread. Take steps to protect yourself and others:
 - practise social distancing
- stay home and away from others if sick or in isolation
- practise good hygiene wash hands often for at least 20 seconds, cover coughs and sneezes, and avoid touching your face
- monitor for symptoms, such as cough, fever, fatigue or difficulty breathing
- Anyone who has health concerns or is experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 should complete an online COVID-19 self-assessment.
