STRUCTURE FIRE IN THE TOWN OF ONOWAY

At 1923 hrs on the evening of April 3, 2020, North West Fire Rescue - Onoway was paged to a structure fire located at 5159 47 Ave, Onoway. Units were rolling within one-minute of the call and on scene with the

first attack pumper arriving in under two. Upon arrival, crews found a working structure fire involving a detached garage.

Immediately after a 360-degree size-up and hazard assessment, crews hit the fire hard with a charged hose line. By 1931 hrs the fire had been darkened down and members began overhaul including



search for any remaining fire extension.

The modification or shut down of many services or recreational activities that we are all used to is rather surreal. Again, things that we are all giving up right now to make sure that the spread does not get out of control here, and that we are all accountable and responsible for our own actions as they won't just cause harm to us, but potentially hundreds of other people around us.

Working the phone lines and the internet here at home I have heard some great stories of community support and acknowledgement for those that often times do not get the cred-

it for the jobs they do. These people are often overlooked, and unfortunately it is sometimes taken for granted that things just happen.

The Town of Whitecourt continues to monitor the COVID-19 pandemic across Alberta, and has been adjusting operations to meet the changing needs of our community.

Public Transit – Reminder about service change

Public Transit users are reminded that as of Wednesday, April 1, 2020, peak transit service will be suspended until further notice. Hourly service during the week will continue to operate as scheduled, as well as weekend service. Updates on the status of the transit service will continue to

be posted on TransLoc as well as the Town of Whitecourt's Facebook page and at website at www.whitecourt.ca.

Passes and ticket books can be purchased at IGA and also in person on the bus from a Transit Driver (exact cash is required as change cannot be provided).

Relief Measures

Account credits will be provided to those affected by registered program postponements due to the closure of the Allan & Jean Millar Centre and other public facilities. Prorated credits have been given to individuals registered in programs that were already underway when closures took effect the week of March 16, 2020. Annual and continuous monthly memberships at the Allan & Jean Millar Centre have been placed on hold and will remain on hold until the facility reopens (scheduled EFT payments have been suspended until further notice).

In efforts to support res-

idents and businesses of Whitecourt, Town Council will be discussing utility payment penalty deferrals and an adjustment to extend the property tax due date for 2020 as a way to lessen the impact of COVID-19 on the community.

Clarification from Government of Alberta on Mandatory Self-Isolation

The Government of Alberta has clarified restrictions for Albertans under mandatory self-isolation. To align with new federal rules under the Quarantine Act, Albertans under mandatory self-isolation are now required to remain inside and can only go for walks on their own property, such as their backyard, for the duration of their self-isolation. This applies to everyone in mandatory self-isolation – those who are feeling well and those who have symptoms of COVID-19 including cough, fever, shortness of breath or a runny nose.

If you are required to self-isolate:

- You can no longer go for walks in your neighbourhood or through parks until the self-isolation period ends.

- Those who live in apartment buildings or high-rises must stay inside and cannot use the elevators or stairwells to go outside.

Albertans are legally required to self-isolate for 14 days if they:

- Returned from travel outside of Canada after March 12;
- Are a close contact of a person who tested positive for COVID-19 (provides care, lives with or has close physical contact, or comes into direct contact with infectious body fluids)

If you become sick during this time, you must self-isolate for an additional 10 days from the beginning of symptoms or until you are feeling well, whichever takes longer. Read more about how to www.alberta.ca/self-isolation.aspx.

Effective immediately, the "Take It or Leave It" program at all County Transfer Stations will cease. Due to COVID-19 and related data about the lifespan of the virus on surfaces, the "Take It or Leave It" program must

be discontinued. The County lacks the resources to ensure required disinfecting of materials in the "Take It or Leave It" sheds, and is taking an abundance of precaution for the sake of staff and residents.

CANADIANS CAN NOW APPLY FOR THE CANADA EMERGENCY RESPONSE BENEFIT

GATINEAU, QC, April 6, 2020 /CNW/ - The Government of Canada continues to take action to support Canadians and their families impacted by the global COVID-19 pandemic.

Canadians looking to get more information about the CERB or, who are unable to apply online, can call the toll-free telephone line at 1-833-966-2099.

To help manage the volume of applications through the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) and Service Canada, applicants will be asked to apply over four days depending on their month of birth. In addition, Shared Services Canada has also increased the bandwidth capacity of the network infrastructure supporting the CRA, including the My Account secure online portal.

Canadians who have already applied for EI do not need to reapply. To date, over 1.2 million of the EI applications received since March 15, 2020 have been processed through the new CERB.

The Government of Canada remains fully committed to supporting all Canadians during this global pandemic. The Government will continue to carefully consider any additional steps it can take to do just that.


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
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ADDRESS INSECTS BEFORE ENTERTAINING SEASON

Barbecues in the backyard or cocktails on the patio provide some fun ways to enjoy the great outdoors from the comforts of home. While friends and family flock to such entertaining opportunities, some unwanted guests may want to crash the festivities.

It's impossible to ensure a completely bug-free outdoor environment, but there are steps homeowners can take to reduce the amount of pests who want to join the party.

Western Exterminator Supply suggests first identifying which kind of insect infiltrations are most common where you live. House flies, fruit flies, mosquitoes, wasps, and bees tend to be abundant in spring and summer. Ants, termites and other bugs also can be prevalent. These insects, however pesky

they may seem, often can be kept away without the use of pesticides and other chemicals.

- Lure away pests. Many insects will be happy to snack on a treat and leave you alone. Put out a dish of sugar water or slices of fruit for insects that feed on sweets and nectar, or a slice of sandwich meat for wasps and yellow jackets. Place these items a fair distance from your gathering.

- Install fans. A patio ceiling fan can blow away mosquitoes and flies relatively easily. And you and your guests will likely enjoy a nice breeze on sultry days.

- Use mulch wisely. Mulch will add to curb appeal, but having it too close to the house, according to the National Pest Management Association, can present an ideal environment for roach-

es and ants to nest and find their way into a home. As mulch decomposes, it generates heat and a cozy spot for pests, including mice. Keep mulch 12 inches away from the home's foundation and entertaining spaces, or use inorganic mulch.

- Keep patios clean. Sweep up and clean away any spilled foods and beverages promptly. Even a tiny nugget of food can attract ants and other insects.

- Use natural pest deterrents. Citronella oils can drive away some insects, as can garlic and rosemary. Lavender, eucalyptus, marigolds, and other pungent aromas will naturally keep mosquitoes and other flying insects at bay. Some people also have luck with mint-flavored mouthwash misted on patios and furniture.

- Address standing water.

Mosquitoes and some other insects lay their eggs in standing water. Routinely drain areas where water collects, including gutters and downspouts

- Use light colors. According to HouseLogic, studies show that bugs see dark and bright colors more easily than light colors. Choose lighter shades of paint for outdoor areas and it may make these spaces less attractive to some bugs.

- Leave those spider webs. Many people yell "eek" at the sight of spiders and spider webs. But those arachnids and their sticky webs can do a fine job of capturing many unwanted insects. Resist the temptation to tear down webs and shoo spiders away.

Addressing insects means employing various natural strategies to make outdoor entertaining more pleasant.

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HOME REPAIRS THAT CAN SINK BUDGETS FAST

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WHAT IS SWEATING A PIPE?

Copper plumbing long has been a standard in home construction. Anyone who has a home with copper pipes should have an understanding of how to make repairs in the case of a leak or if modifications need to be made. "Sweating pipes" is one term homeowners may hear when maintaining their pipes.

Sweating a pipe refers to soldering a pipe or the joint. Sweating seals a new joint or mends a fault. When sweating a pipe, it is important to do the job correctly so that a soldered pipe can last for years and years.

PlanItDIY, a source for

how-to advice, says that sweating pipes involves some key steps.

- Cut the pipes to the right length using a copper tube cutter or hacksaw.
- Use a file or wire brush to remove burs and smooth down the ends.
- Clean the end of the copper pipe with a cleaning brush until the surface is bright all around. In addition, clean the inside of all fittings.
- Brush plumbing flux on the brushed surfaces and assemble the joint. The how-to resource Hunter says flux is an acidic paste applied to all of the pieces of copper that you

want to connect together. The flux paste will draw in the solder after the pipe is heated using a blow torch. The acid in the flux attracts the solder into the seam between the two copper pieces and fills the gap while creating a semi-permanent bond between the pieces.

- To create the seal, move the flame around the joint to heat it evenly. The copper will get shiny, and the flux will melt. When the pipe begins to dull and the flux sizzles and smokes, it is time to apply solder. Touch lead-free plumbing solder to the joint and apply more heat.

finished when the solder bubbles out of the end of the seam. Let cool and the joint should now be water-tight.

Sweating pipes gets easier with practice. DIYers who are nervous about plumbing projects that involve sweating can be reassured there are connection products available that are used in lieu of flux and solder. These push-to-connect fittings seal joints as well.

Individuals can speak with experts at hardware and home improvement stores to find the best products for their needs and skill levels.

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5 OUTDOOR PROJECTS THAT ADD VALUE

Exterior renovations can enhance the appearance of a property and make it more enjoyable for homeowners. However, in other areas where outdoor time is limited, a pool or water feature can actually lower the value of a home. Speaking with a real estate professional can give homeowners an idea of how a pool will fare in a given neighborhood.

Outdoor improvements can improve the marketability of a home, as well as enhance its appearance and function.



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SAFETY A VITAL COMPONENT OF DIY PROJECTS

Many homeowners enjoy DIY projects around the house. Weekend warriors should recognize that having the right tools and using them in a correct manner is essential to successful, safe projects.

Tools are vital for projects, but without proper understanding and usage, they

can cause grave injuries. Studies published by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Consumer Product Safety Commission found that certain tools are more likely to cause injuries than others. Power nailers, for example,

are among the most dangerous tools DIYers can use. Chain saws, table saws, circular saws, and riding mowers are some additional tools that have very high injury rates.

The following are some safety guidelines all DIYers should heed when using power tools.

- Use tools that are the right size and right type for the job. If you are uncertain about which tools to use, watch online tutorials, contact tool manufacturers or seek advice at home supply stores.

- Always wear eye protection and the right safety equipment when manufacturers recommend doing so. Gloves, sturdy work boots, hearing protection, and hard hats can protect DIYers from injury.

- Keep cutting tools sharp and in good condition to reduce kick back and potential injuries.

- Regularly inspect tools to make sure they are in working order.

- Never carry tools up a ladder by hand; use a bucket or bag to hoist tools.

- Never leave tools lying out in any area where they can present a hazard. Unplug power tools when not in use.

- Secure work with a clamp or vice grip when appropriate to keep things from slipping.

- Ensure that the handles of tools like hammers and axes fit tightly into the head of the tool.

- Keep work environments tidy to avoid clutter, as cluttered workspaces can contribute to accidents.

- Read the manual and operate the power tool as instructed.

- Do not force open a safety on a power tool or modify a tool to override safety features.

- Cut away from yourself when using chisels and other edged tools.

Let common sense prevail when using tools. If it doesn't seem like a good idea, it probably isn't. Safety is important to avoid injuries and help prevent delays on the job.

Quick Facts

- The CERB is available from March 15, 2020, to October 3, 2020. Eligible workers can apply no later than December 2, 2020.

- Direct deposit payments will be delivered into accounts within 3 business days of applicants being eligible to receive it, and cheques within 10 days. To ensure timely delivery of their payments

and avoid any potential payment disruptions, Canadians should sign up for direct deposit.

- The CERB will support Canadians who have stopped working because of COVID-19 by providing \$500 a week for up to 16 weeks. Some examples of support to workers provided by the CERB include:

- workers, including those who are self-employed, who must stop working due to COVID-19 and do not have access to paid leave or other income support;

- workers who have lost their employment, as well as workers who are sick, quarantined or taking care of someone who is sick with COVID-19;

- working parents who must stay home without pay to care for children who are sick or need additional care because of school and daycare closures; and

- workers who are still employed, but are not being paid because there is currently not sufficient work and their employer has asked them not to come to work.

THE PROVINCIAL COURT OF ALBERTA COVID-19 PANDEMIC PLANNING FOR THE SCHEDULING OF MATTERS

Submitted by The Provincial Court of Alberta

Alberta Health Services has recommended that measures be taken to reduce the amount of time individuals spend in large crowds or in crowded spaces to help reduce the transmission of COVID-19 in the community.

To protect the health and safety of all court users while ensuring respect for the legal rights of accused persons and civil litigants, the Provincial Court of Alberta is limiting all regular operations, effective Tuesday, March 17, 2020, until further notice.

The court will post further information as it becomes available, so please continue to check the Provincial Court website <https://www.albertacourts.ca/pc/home> for updates.

As of Tuesday March 17, 2020, if you have a family, civil, criminal court or a Provincial Offences/traffic court appearance in the Alberta Provincial Court, you do not need to attend unless the matter is an in-custody or urgent criminal matter, or an urgent family or child protection matter.

No members of the public will be permitted in court rooms unless they are required for a court matter (parties, witnesses, media). Legal counsel are permitted access to the Court house for urgent court-related business.

Do not come into a courthouse in person if you have been advised to self-isolate by public health officials, your doctor or the Alberta Health Services website;

or you are self-isolating as a result of travel or contact with individuals with COVID-19.

The Provincial Court will remain open, subject to the following:

CRIMINAL and YOUTH CRIMINAL MATTERS

If you are not in custody and you have a criminal court appearance in the Alberta Provincial Court between Tuesday March 17 and Friday, May 22, 2020 you do not need to attend court. The Court website will be updated regularly to provide information regarding rescheduling, which will be 10 weeks from the date of your scheduled court appearance or the next court date thereafter.

All in-custody matters will proceed including:

- Bail hearings
- Sentencings with a priority given to those facing a time served situation
- Preliminary inquiries and trials
- Youth criminal sentence reviews

The Court will hear urgent out of custody criminal matters with leave of a judge.

The Court will be available to process urgent warrants and judicial authorizations.

CIVIL MATTERS

Civil matters, with the exception of pretrial conferences and case management that are set to proceed before May 22, 2020 will be adjourned indefinitely and parties will be contacted by the local trial coordinator or the Court about rescheduled dates.

Urgent landlord and tenant matters and other urgent matters will proceed

with leave of the Court.

Civil Pre-Trial Conferences and Case Management will be conducted by telephone.

Desk assessments and desk applications will continue.

Parties may contact the Civil Division regarding scheduling by calling their local courthouse, or in Edmonton at 780-644-7638; and in Calgary at 403-608-1505.

FAMILY AND CHILD PROTECTION

Non-urgent family matters set to be heard after March 17, 2020 will be adjourned for ten weeks from the scheduled court date. The Court website will be updated regularly to provide information regarding rescheduling, which will be 10 weeks from the date of your scheduled court appearance or the next court date thereafter.

The following matters are considered urgent and will be heard by the court:

- matters with statutory limitations or deadlines;
- where there is the risk of violence or immediate harm to one of the parties or the child;
- where there is risk of removal of a child;
- apprehension orders;
- Initial Custody Hearings,
- first appearance after apprehension, and
- mandatory reviews or show causes under the Child, Youth and Family Enhancement Act, Protection of Children Abusing Drugs Act, Protection of Sexually Exploited Children Act, Mandatory Drug Testing and Disclosure Act, and Mental Health Act;

- warrants, and
- emergency protection orders.

Family Pre-Trial Conferences, Child Protection Case Management Meetings and Judicial Dispute Resolutions will be conducted by telephone unless adjourned.

Any Child Protection Hearing where the parties have consented to a return, Supervision order, Temporary Guardianship Order or Permanent Guardianship Order will occur on an as-needed basis.

TRAFFIC COURT

Until further notice, all Traffic Courts in Alberta will be closed in the province effective Tuesday, March 17, 2020. If you have a matter scheduled during this time, you do not need to attend court in person, however, you will need to exercise one of the following options:

- Fine payments can be made by mail, through a Registry Office or online at <https://eservices.alberta.ca/fine-payments.html>
- Time to Pay extensions, time to pay requests, adjournment requests and not guilty pleas can be made by contacting the local courthouse by phone, e-mail or fax. Further updates regarding contact information will be provided.

• If you fail to notify the requisite court location of your intention on what you intend to do on the matter by e-mail, fax or phone you will be convicted in absence. Please note that if you fail to contact your local courthouse on any of these matters a conviction in absence may apply.

CONTINUING STUDENT LEARNING

New guidelines are in place to direct how students will learn while in-school classes are cancelled due to the provincial health emergency.

Government has worked with the Alberta School Boards Association, the College of Alberta School Superintendents, the Alberta Teachers' Association and the Association of Independent Schools & Colleges of Alberta to identify how to continue teacher-directed learning for students across Alberta.

This approach was developed with a focus on the safety of our staff and students, ensuring resources continue to flow to the education system and providing boards with the flexibility required to meet the unique needs of their students.

"I want to thank every Albertan involved in our province's education system. Everyone has come together to chart a path forward as part of our COVID-19 response – teachers, support staff, superintendents, administrators, elected trustees, parents, education associations, the provincial government and many others. It is important that Albertans know that we are all working towards the same goal – to provide the best possible learning situation for our students during this very challenging and unprecedented time." - Adriana LaGrange, Minister of Education

Continuity of student learning and content delivery

For all kindergarten to Grade 12 students, school authorities will offer at-home learning opportunities, either through online means or through other accommodations, such as course packages and telephone check-ins. Government expects that every student, regardless of their geographic location or socioeconomic status, will continue to learn while in-school classes across the province are cancelled. This includes students in public, separate, Francophone, charter and independent schools, and Indigenous students attending provincial schools.

To identify what content needs to be delivered, teachers will evaluate curricular outcomes that have not yet been covered, prioritize remaining outcomes based on what is manageable for students working from home, and will plan specific tasks and projects for students.

Content delivery for each grade is broken down as follows:

Kindergarten – Grade 3

- Education content will focus on language/literacy and math-

ematics/numeracy outcomes of the provincial curriculum.

- Teachers will assign an average of five hours of work per student per week, and will be expected to work with their students and parents on the delivery of these materials.

Grades 4-6

- Education content will continue to focus on language/literacy and mathematics/numeracy outcomes, and there will be opportunity to incorporate science and social studies outcomes through cross-curricular learning.

- Teachers will assign an average of five hours of work per student per week, and will be expected to work with their students and parents on the delivery of these materials.

Grades 7-9

- Education content will focus on core mathematics, language/literacy, science and social studies curriculum outcomes.

- Teachers will assign an average of 10 hours of work per student per week, and will be expected to work with their students and parents on the delivery of these materials.

Grades 10-12

- Education content will focus on specified and core courses required for high school graduation requirements, including language (English, French and French language arts), social studies, mathematics, biology, chemistry and physics.

- Content from other courses will be delivered where possible, and accommodations for students unable to complete courses are in place.

- Teachers will assign an average of 3 hours of work per course per week, and will be expected to work with their students and parents on the delivery of these materials.

Grade progression and report cards

Every student will receive final grades and will receive a report card, appropriate to their grade level. Teachers will be responsible for assessing a student's progress and assigning a final grade. School authorities have committed to ensuring parents are consulted and kept informed of how assessment will be determined in this unique circumstance. All students who were on track to progress to the next grade will.

Where possible, schools will work with high school students to complete their courses to the best of their ability, providing a final mark and awarding credits. If a student is unable to com-

plete a course that would have allowed them to progress to the next grade, principals have the ability to award credits to ensure student progression.

High school diploma criteria

Students on track to receive 100 or more credits will still be eligible to graduate and receive a high school diploma. Principals have the ability to award up to 15 credits to students in Grade 12 whose program has been negatively impacted by class cancellations. For any courses that are started, schools will complete them with the student to the best of their ability, provide a final mark and award credits.

If the student is unable to complete a course that would have led them to achieving a high school diploma, such as a work experience or a career and technology studies course, principals have the ability to award credits to ensure the student graduates.

Provincial assessments

All Grade 6 and 9 provincial achievement tests and Grade 12 diploma exams are cancelled. Under special circumstances, students can request to write a diploma exam. Students wishing to do so should speak to their teacher and school administrator.

Resources for parents

Parents may want to supplement student learning by providing their children with additional resources. The following provincial resources are available to parents:

- Northwest Francophone Education Region: Liens Utiles provides a number of resources to support parents.

Funding continues to flow to school authorities for the remainder of the 2019/20 school year. This will help school authorities deliver at-home learning to their students.

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
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
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
