June 16, 2020 Community VOICE Page 3 THREE CHARGED IN AN INTERNATIONAL LUXURY VEHICLE EXPORT FRAUD

Alberta RCMP's Federal Serious and Organized Crime (FSOC) section have charged three individuals in a multimillion-dollar luxury vehicle export scheme where several Canadians were defrauded in the purchase amount of the vehicles as a result of an investigation.

Those charged are Duy (pronounced "U-we") Hung Nguyen (38), Quyen Hong Tran (61) and Thi Kim Hoang Quan (29).

On June 9, 2020, Duy Hung Nguyen was arrested in Burnaby, B.C. and charged with the following Criminal Code offences:

- Fraud over \$5,000
- Make forged documents
- Utter forged documents

• Cause forged documents to be used

Money Laundering

• Trafficking in proceeds of crime, and

• Utter threats to cause death or bodily harm.

On June 9, 2020, Quyen Hong Tran was arrested in Edmonton and charged with the following Criminal Code offences:

- Fraud Over \$5,000
- Money laundering, and

• Trafficking in proceeds of crime.

On June 11, 2020, Thi Kim Hoang Quan was arrested in Leduc County and charged for the following Criminal Code offences:

- Fraud over \$5,000
- Make forged documents
- Utter forged documents
- Money laundering, and

• Trafficking in proceeds of crime.

This investigation was supported by The Financial Transactions and Reports Analysis Centre of Canada, Alberta Gaming Liquor & Cannabis, Canada Revenue Agency, Alberta Motor Vehicle Industry Council, Canada Border Services Agency, Insurance Bureau of Canada, Edmonton Police Service, Ontario Provincial Police, Saskatoon Police Service in addition to numerous Financial Institutions, Vehicle Dealerships, Vehicle Crating Companies and freight forwarding companies.

After analyzing data obtained through these partnerships and various investigative techniques, the Alberta RCMP FSOC investigation determined that in a period of a year, Nguyen was using multiple Straw Buyers and associates in order to fraudulently purchase vehicles and export them to Vietnam for their resale.

This investigation linked Nguyen to the purchase and exportation of 43 luxury vehicles. Those funds were then filtered back to Nguyen in Canada, and not the Straw Buyers. The financing associated to the vehicles defaulted, resulting in the loss of over \$2.6 million to various financial institutions and ruined the credit of the Straw Buyers for defaulting on their loans. The approximate value of the 43 vehicles sold in Vietnam would be \$10 Million Canadian.

"The victims of this scheme have suffered considerable loss, including bankruptcy, financial ruin and mental and emotional stress," said Cst. Phil Pinon, FSOC. "If you do not need to purchase a vehicle for yourself, do not purchase a vehicle at all. You will be held solely responsible for the payments and the effect it will have on your financial status."

It is believed that that Nguyen has conducted the same fraud in other jurisdictions across Canada and has used the following aliases: Ken, Mike, Hung, Tomy and Ryan. If you have been victimized by Nguyen, you are asked to contact Edmonton FSOC at 780-412-5530 or KSOCEdmonton@rcmp-grc.gc.ca.

ONLINE CONSULTATIONS LAUNCHED ON PMPRB REGULATORY CHANGES

"These delays will allow us to gather additional feedback from patients, stakeholder groups, and concerned Canadians. Many constituents reached out to me expressing concern that their regulatory changes would limit access to life-saving medications for Canadian patients."

Conservatives have launched online consultations to gather feedback from Canadians on the government's Patented Medicine Prices Review Board (PMPRB) regulatory changes.

"This is an opportunity to ensure that the PMPRB regulatory changes accurately reflect patients' needs and will not deter new medications from being introduced to the Canadian market."

ALBERTA RECEIVES \$244 MILLION TO FUND PRESSING INFRASTRUCTURE NEEDS

LEDUC RCMP ARREST MALE FOR TWO INCIDENTS WITHIN A WEEK

Leduc RCMP arrested an 18-year-old male twice over the last week.

On May 28, 2020 at 4:20 a.m., Leduc RCMP responded to an armed robbery at the 7-11 Gas Station in the Suntree area of Leduc. Police arrived on scene and learned that a male entered the store wearing a mask and stole candy. When confronted by staff, the male brandished what was believed to be a firearm and left. Nobody was injured.

À short time later, RCMP members with the assistance of the RCMP Police Service Dog, located and arrested the male who refused to identify himself. A search of the male resulted in locating an imitation handgun. A judicial hearing was held and the male was released from custody.

Two days later, the accused

is alleged to have stolen a woman's empty purse after she gave him a ride. A few hours later, Leduc RCMP received a complaint of a suspicious male at a residence. RCMP members attended the residence and located the male leaving the area. The male was arrested and the stolen purse was located in his possession.

Eti Idemudia (18) of Leduc been charged with ten offences relating to these incidents:

- Using firearm in commission of offence
- Disguise with intent
- Obstruct peace officer
- Possession of stolen property under \$5000. (x3)
- Possession of break-in instruments

• Fail to comply with release order condition (x3)

He was held for a judicial hearing and was released to appear in Leduc Provincial Court on July 9, 2020.

CAD CRU EXECUTE ARREST WARRANT AND LAY TRAFFICKING CHARGES

Breton, Alta. – The Central Alberta District Crime Reduction Unit (CAD CRU) arrested four subjects following the execution of a search warrant which netted them a tactical shotgun and ammunition.

Since August 2019, the CAD CRU have been investigating the trafficking of methamphetamine, heroin and fentanyl in the counties of Brazeau, Leduc, Ponoka and Red Deer. As a result of ongoing investigations, on May 20, 2020 the CAD CRU, with the assistance of Thorsby/Breton RCMP and Police Dog Services (PDS) executed a search warrant at a residence in Breton.

The search led to the seizure of a Benelli Tactical Shotgun and miscellaneous ammunition. Also seized was what is believed to be Methamphetamine, Heroin and Fentanyl along with drug trafficking paraphernalia and cash. All the drugs were packaged for distribution.

Four persons were arrested at the residence without incident.

Shawn Allan Burt (52) is facing three charges under the Controlled Drugs & Substances Act, and two Criminal Code charges including unsafe storage of a firearm.

Irvin Ray Lachance (58) and Alicia Janine Pastuck (51) are both charged under the Controlled Drugs & Substances Act. Harold Robert Potts (62) is facing 16 criminal charges including unauthorized possession of a firearm, careless use of a firearm, fail to comply with an undertaking et al, as well as two charges under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act.

Burt, Lachance and Pastuck have been released to appear in Breton Provincial Court on August 12, 2020. Potts had a release hearing and is being held in custody to appear in Leduc Provincial Court on May 27, 2020.

I hope that you have all been able to enjoy the warmer weather and spend some time outdoors. At long last, playgrounds and parks across our community are reopening. I encourage you to explore these local places – while maintaining physical distancing, of course!

This week, our government continued its work to make life better for Albertans. New pieces of legislation were introduced to help tackle the issues that matter to our community, including creating an Alberta Parole Board, addressing the health harms of smoking and vaping in youth, and freeing up police and courts to make Alberta safer. All of these proposed laws live up to our promises to Albertans.

I am happy to share that our government is reducing red tape for Alberta businesses. These businesses can now incorporate and get their federal business number and federal tax program account number in one easy step, and it will be easier to access services at different levels of government. In addition to streamlining the incorporation application process, the federal business number enables Alberta businesses and non-profits to identify themselves by using a single identifier, instead of different registration numbers. By reducing red tape, our government is saving businesses and non-profit organizations valuable time and resources that have previously been spent on needless bureaucracy.


This week, our government introduced new legislation to help restore capacity in the justice system and make our roads safer. Bill 21, or the Provincial Administrative Penalties Act, proposes a simplified, accessible and swift system for resolving matters involving impaired driving, traffic tickets and other traffic safety offences. By removing these matters from the court system, our province will save thousands of hours of police and court time per year, ensuring Alberta's prosecutors and courts are able to focus on the most serious justice matters. The bill would also introduce a new Immediate Roadside Sanction program in late 2020, which would keep our roads safer by providing serious, immediate and escalating consequences for all impaired drivers. This new legislation will help take pressure off the legal system and ensure that impaired driving is taken seriously in our province.

Our government has also announced that it is investing \$5 million to help build school playgrounds across the province. This funding will support 18 school divisions to build playgrounds, supplementing their fundraising efforts that are already taking place. Funding for playgrounds will address playgrounds at schools that were replaced on the same site as their original building, as well as new school projects announced between April and December 2013 where the playground has not been built. Playgrounds are a fundamental part of any school community, and our government is helping ensure that these important spaces are open to children across Alberta.



MP SOROKA CO-HOSTS VIRTUAL TOWN HALL ON FIREARMS BAN

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka. Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, would like to thank everyone who responded to his post on Facebook and participated in the virtual town hall he co-hosted with Dane Lloyd, MP on the government's firearms ban.

Many constituents raised concerns over the new gun regulations, which in many cases arbitrarily ban certain firearms and noted that this does little to combat illegal guns, most of which are smuggled in from the US.

MP Soroka stated, "Many police chiefs are coming out and saying that this ban is

not going to do anything to combat gun crime. Unfortunately, the Liberals don't want to listen to anyone whose views don't fit their narrative."

"The fact of the matter is that the vast majority of illegal guns are smuggled in from the US. These changes do nothing to address that. Once again, we have a case of the Liberals punishing honest, hard-working Canadians to make a symbolic gesture that does nothing to affect the underlying issue."

"The money the government is spending on this, which could be up to a few billion dollars, would be better spent keeping guns out of the hands of criminals".

The Government of Alberta announced stage two of their relaunch strategy yesterday with the notable lifting of restrictions on more businesses, sport and recreation services and gathering capacities starting June 12. With the announcement, the City of Leduc is assessing and determining feasible timelines and conditions for the reopening of city-owned facilities such as the Leduc Recreation Centre. Alexandra Outdoor Pool, Maclab Centre for the Performing Arts and Leduc Spray Park. Additional details and opening dates for these facilities will be announced as soon as plans are finalized to ensure public safety in each space. The city will continue to work with business owners to help meet provincial requirements for reopening.

"There is light at the end of

the tunnel with stage two of Alberta's relaunch strategy moving forward, says Leduc Mayor Bob Young. "There are still a lot of complexities to the reopening of these facilities and we appreciate the continued patience and understanding of our residents as we work to bring these amenities back to you."

As permitted by the provincial government, the following can open with restrictions:



Recognizing these unprecedented times under a global pandemic, Leduc City Council and administration have identified financial strategies to help alleviate pressures felt by taxpayers,

which include:

• No tax revenue increase to both residential and non-residential ratepavers

• Moving the tax deadline from June 30 to Aug. 31

• Allowing businesses to defer, upon request, the payment of taxes until Dec. 31,2020

· Waiving penalties on taxes for the remainder of the vear

"Our current state is unparalleled and something many of us never thought we'd see in our lifetime, yet our role as community leaders is to not only acknowledge these unique hard-

taxpayers," says Leduc Mayor Bob Young. "We know city administration has placed a concerted effort to identify savings to cover forecasted revenue loss through a number of areas, including staffing savings, reductions in contracted services, and materials and supplies; knowing we're not looking to increase taxes on residential and non-residential property owners." Since the start of the

ships, but do all that we can

COVID-19 pandemic, the City of Leduc has also tapped into its emergency fund, Mill Rate Stabilization Fund, to help alleviate operating pressures and continues to explore other means to help find cost savings while maintaining service levels.

What's proposed overall would see an annual tax decrease of an average of \$260 per household (based on an assessment of \$325,000), and \$1,050 for non-residential ratepayers (for every \$1 million in assessed value). This was achieved through no tax revenue increase and up to a 2.75 per cent reduction relating to the Provincial Education Tax for 2020. In 2019, the city made an estimate relating to the education tax in anticipation of the provincial budget, which was released after the city's fiscal budget year. As a result, there is a small savings in 2020 due to the city's conservative estimate.


