The preservation and restoration of the important buildings and other historic artifacts on site is done with the help of donations and government grants.

The fence was reconstructed to match the original fence as closely as possible. This project began with

a search for tamarack rails and posts, as they are long lasting and rot resistant. As the old fence was dismantled, the original building techniques were revealed - rails were notched with a chisel to fit the posts and the hand dug post holes were packed with rocks to secure the posts.

New foundations for the

Garden's round grainery and historic outhouse were completed last autumn. The Garden is also planning for the Boys' Shed to receive a new foundation, but it requires special attention. Other plans include repairs to the Machine Shed roof, and window repairs in the log house. All of these projects are funded in part by

Communities must own and control 51 per cent or more of the proposed business or joint venture to be eligible.

ABIF funds also helped to expand the operations of a forage operation that exported timothy hay and alfalfa to international markets in Japan, Korea, the Middle East and China.

PUBLIC NOTICE: July meeting dates rescheduled.

Anne County Council has canceled the July 9 and July 23, 2020 regular scheduled Council meetings, rescheduling them to July 16, 2020 commencing at 9:30 am in the County Council Chambers at 56521 Range Road 65, Lac Ste. Anne County, AB.

COUNTY ADMIN OFFICE REOPENS FOR BUSINESS: Safeguards for ratepayers and staff have been implemented.

The County administration office has resumed its regular business hours of Monday to Friday from 8:30 am and 4:30 pm (including lunch hour) in accordance with its COVID-19 recovery strategy.

The highest priority will continue to be to limit any potential risk of transmission of COVID-19 among staff and members of the public.

What to Expect

When conducting business at the County administration office, please be mindful of the following changes:

Per Ministerial Order No. MAG:016/20, please be advised that the date to file an assessment appeal with Lac Ste. Anne County has been extended to end of business on September 21, 2020 with all applicable fees required to be paid. All other assessment regulations will remain in effect.

CORRECTION: BEAVER BOUNTY PROGRAM

In the June 22 issue of the Lac Ste. Anne Bulletin, the County reported in error that the beaver bounty

had been increased from \$40 per tail to \$80 per tail. Please note that the bounty remains at \$40 per tail. The County apologizes for any confusion this error may have caused.

BLUE-GREEN ALGAE IN REGIONAL LAKES: Avoid exposure and ingestion of algae-impacted water.

In late June, the County began to report blue-green algae conditions in its lakes. Residents and the visiting public are advised to be on the lookout for blooms in Lac Ste. Anne and other area lakes.

Blue-green algae is naturally occurring, and often appears when conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz or globs on the surface of water, blue-green algae can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown, and/or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

swing. Everyone's swing is different, but it is important to work with a swing that benefits our game and body. Consulting with a professional before hitting the links will help develop our game and avoid injury.

The right equipment: Wearing proper golf attire goes beyond simply looking the part. Your playing partners will be intimidated when they see you strut to

the tee box looking like Jordan Spieth; that is until you flub your first drive 20 yards right into the water. Wearing soft spike golf shoes gives you greater shock absorption and cushioning. This helps your back in both the short and long term.


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


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WHITCOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

Whitecourt Town Council is nominating Deputy Mayor Bill McAree for the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association (AUMA) 2020 Distinguished Service Award. Deputy Mayor McAree has served 26 years on Whitecourt Town Council, and throughout his years of service he has been highly regarded by his peers, and he continues to show dedication and admiration for Whitecourt.

Knelson Sand and Gravel has been awarded the contract for Whitecourt's 2020 Street Improvement Program. The program, valued at over \$800,000, is scheduled to begin in July 2020 and will include overlay projects at the following locations:

- Dahl Drive from Highway 43 to 41 Avenue,
- Elko Drive cul-de-sac,
- Sunset Boulevard and Whitecourt Avenue intersection,
- Beaver Drive and Blueberry Drive intersection,
- Sakwatamau Drive and 47 Street (Millar Road) intersection,
- West Whitecourt 53 Avenue and 59 Street intersection - Road Reconstruction,
- West Whitecourt 50 Avenue and West Street - Road Rehabilitation.

Also included are concrete repairs throughout Whitecourt, including the median along Dahl Drive, and drainage repairs at the Scott Safety Centre. Scheduling of work will be finalized in the coming weeks, and information will be posted for the community on www.whitecourt.ca and the Whitecourt Facebook page.

Since March, Whitecourt has been participating in an Economic Supports and Recovery Task Team that was established to leverage resources and provide a coordinated response to supporting businesses in the Whitecourt region throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. As a result of discussions and information gathered by the Team, Whitecourt, Community Futures Yellowhead East, the

Whitecourt & District Chamber of Commerce, Alberta Labour and Immigration and Ballad Group are submitting a proposal to the Labour Market Partnership Program to complete a COVID-19 impact assessment and recovery strategy. The strategy will provide a proactive plan to best meet the needs of the business community and its employees as the COVID-19 pandemic situation evolves. If successful, the project will begin by the end of June 2020.

Whitecourt Town Council has authorized the Chief Administrative Officer to enter into an agreement to sell lands located in the downtown south area to Whitecourt Village Ltd.

Whitecourt will be partnering with regional municipalities to explore the feasibility of creating a Northwest Alberta Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Network. The number of electric vehicles on the road is growing and is expected to reach 30% of the global market share by 2030. The greatest

benefit of installing charging stations is not the revenue that the charging stations bring, but the increase in revenue from new customers that stop to eat while charging their vehicle.

Road Closure Bylaw 1549 has been adopted to close a portion of Road Plan 822-1110, adjacent to Highway 43 in west Whitecourt, to accommodate the future consolidation and sale of two Town owned lots. The road does not physically exist, and does not allow for vehicle access.

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
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
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
