DEVON GENERAL HOSPITAL REOPENS EMERGENCY DEPT

Phase 1 reopening patient access from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily

Effective Aug. 18, the Devon General Hospital emergency department (ED) will begin a phased reopening, accepting patients from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily.

The ED was temporarily closed on April 20 as part of Alberta Health Services' COVID-19 response. The closure was implemented to help protect 14 longterm-care residents at the hospital, who are at heightened risk for severe illness if exposed to COVID-19.

To help protect these residents, a temporary barrier has been built to allow ED patients to access services separate from inpatient areas of the hospital. As well, staff will be designated to one area of the hospital and will not transition between the ED and inpatient units.

AHS will monitor patient volumes and acuity regularly to determine when the hospital's ED can resume 24-hour service. Until then, local residents seeking after-hours emergency care are advised to visit the Leduc Community Hospital or the Westview Health Centre in Stony Plain.

All patients requiring immediate medical care should phone 911.

Individuals requiring non-emergency medical care continue to be encouraged to call their family physician. To speak to a nurse and receive telephone advice and health information, families can also contact Health Link 24/7 by dialing 811.

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, would like to inform constituents that the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) is extending the payment deadline and applying relief to interest on existing debt. The payment due date for current year individual, corporate, and trust income tax returns, including instalment payments, from September 1, 2020, to September 30, 2020. Penalties and interest will not be charged if payments are made by the extended deadline of September 30, 2020. This includes the late-filing penalty if the return is filed by September 30, 2020.

Interest on existing tax debts related to individual, corporate, and trust income tax returns from April 1, 2020, to September 30, 2020 and from April 1, 2020, to June 30, 2020, for goods and services tax/ harmonized sales tax (GST/ HST) returns will also be waived. While this measure for existing tax debts does not cancel penalties and interest already assessed on a taxpayer's account prior to this period, it ensures that a taxpayer's existing tax debt does not continue to grow through interest charges during this difficult time. This measure provides immediate relief to impacted taxpayers.

The previously extended filing due dates for individual, corporate, and trust income tax returns remain unchanged. However, the CRA will not impose late-filing penalties where a current year individual, corporation, or trust return is filed late if it is filed by September 30, 2020.

Remember to file your individual, corporate and trust returns as soon as possible, even though payment deadlines are being extended. This is particularly important for individuals receiving credits and benefits, such as the Canada Child Benefit.



Life is full of challenges and therefore choices. Sometimes it is difficult to address the challenges in life. This is true for every individual on a personal level, it is true for the private business man or woman and it is also true for the Government of Alberta.

This past legislative session the government continued down the path to address some of these challenges. It has been a very busy spring at the Alberta Legislature. I am proud to share that this session, Alberta's government introduced and passed 34 bills through the Legislature. The COVID-19 pandemic and the unprecedented economic collapse faced this year disrupted the normal legislative session, but Alberta's government was still able to deliver on 93 more platform commitments while taking concrete measures to save lives and livelihoods. This means Alberta's government has already kept or is well underway on 68 per cent of platform commitments made. I am also pleased to say that our Legislature met more times than any other legislature in Canada, including the federal Parliament.

Between 2008 and 2020 the Alberta energy industry contributed \$359 billion in revenue to the Federal and provincial budgets. Creating a favourable tax environment for business, including the energy industry not only pays for the public services Albertans need but stimulates business across Alberta and Canada. In order to stimulate business and create jobs the Alberta Government once again dropped the corporate tax rate, this time going from 10% to 8%. This sends the message to business both inside and outside of Alberta that we are the most competitive province in North America in which to do business. This will encourage growth, jobs and the investment of foreign capital into Alberta.

I am happy to share that the Invest Alberta Corporation (IAC) is ready to hit the ground running and attract job-creating investment back to Alberta. The IAC's mandate is to attract high-impact, job-creating investment to Alberta and promote the province as a preferred investment destination to national and international investors. The IAC will coordinate the work of Alberta's 11 trade promotion offices, with a renewed focus of attracting foreign direct investment in Alberta. The board will hold its inaugural meeting in August, and their perspectives and expertise will help the agency bring in job-creating investment from around the world. Clearly Albertan's face daily challenges, as does the Government of Alberta. The Alberta Government is going to have to continue to address the economic problems of overspending, a drop in revenue and rising debt but it is also true that the Government is working hard to address these challenges and to grow the economy.



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Page 8 Community VOICE August 11, 2020 MASKS FOR SCHOOLS PROCUREMENT: MINISTER LAGRANGE

Minister of Education Adriana LaGrange issued the following statement on the procurement of reusable masks for students and staff for the 2020-21 school year:

"Some have recently questioned the ability of Alberta's government to purchase the requisite 1.6 million reusable masks in time for the start of K-12 classes this fall. Orders totalling 1.7 million masks have been placed \rightarrow one to IFR, an Alberta-based company, and the other to Old Navy. The total value of the mask contracts is \$4.2 million.

"When the school re-entry plan was announced on June 10 and a decision on how students would return to school was announced on July 21, it was indicated that the decision on masks in schools was still pending, as Chief Medical Officer of Health Dr. Deena Hinshaw was still considering emerging scientific evidence from other jurisdictions. Despite this pending decision, Alberta Education, in conjunction with the Provincial Operations Centre (POC), began preparing for the contingency should Dr. Hinshaw decide to recommend masking in schools.

"Given the expediency required, the POC has directly approached experienced, established vendors to fulfil personal protective equipment (PPE) needs for school reopenings. Government of Alberta contracting policies allow for this expedited process in urgent situations, as a standard request for proposal tendering process would not allow the government to fulfil our schools' needs in the timely manner required.

"Alberta has excelled at the urgent need to purchase PPE. Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, the POC has successfully procured more than six million masks, and the Pandemic Response Planning Team has also procured more than six million masks. This does not include the 185 million clinical masks purchased directly by Alberta Health Services. Forty million masks were also distributed directly to Albertans.

"Both Alberta Education

and the POC are confident that masks, sanitizer, thermometers and face shields will be distributed to school divisions prior to the resumption of classes. Students, schools and staff will receive their PPE for the beginning of the school year.

"We understand the eagerness of some local businesses to help with the effort. Often, these are businesses that manufactured non-PPE products prior to the pandemic and/or have more limited production capacity. We sincerely appreciate the enthusiasm of those wanting to help. That said, our primary objective is ensuring the large volume of reusable masks can be obtained and distributed in time for the start of the school year."



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FOUR VEHICLE COLLISION **ON HIGHWAY 625**

RCMP LAY FRAUD CHARGES

Drayton Valley, Alta. - The RCMP have laid charges following an almost two-



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year investigation into fraudulent activity at a notfor-profit organization.

In September 2018, the RCMP launched an investigation following a complaint from a local organization that they alleged to have been defrauded of more than \$200,000 by their Treasurer over a fouryear period. The ensuing investigation by the RCMP was thorough and complex.

Eric Paul Butz (35) of Drayton Valley has been arrested and charged with fraud over \$5,000, forgery

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and uttering forged documents. He has been released to appear in Drayton Valley Provincial Court on September 15, 2020 at 10:00 a m

At the time of this offence. Eric Butz worked as a Certified Chartered Accountant in the town. RCMP are asking members of the public to report any suspicious financial activity in any accounts handled by Mr. Butz. 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Page 14 Community VOICE August 11, 2020 SCHOOL HEALTH MEASURES NOW INCLUDE MANDATORY MASKS

As part of a number of new school safety measures to combat COVID-19, mask use for Grade 4 to 12 students, and all school staff, will be mandatory when school returns for the 2020-21 year.

While mandatory mask use is for students in Grades 4 to 12 and all staff, all students and staff in public, separate, Francophone, charter and independent schools will receive two reusable masks from Alberta's government. More than 1.6 million masks will be distributed to 740,000 students and 90,000 staff. Additional single-use masks will be available at schools, if required.

Mask use will be mandatory for staff and teachers in all settings where physical distancing cannot be maintained. Students will be required to wear them in all shared and common areas such as hallways and on buses. Exemptions will be made for students and staff who are unable to wear a mask due to medical or other needs.

Mask use for kindergarten to Grade 3 students will continue to be optional. Mask use for younger children is a challenge due to difficulties with proper fit and compliance. In addition, evidence shows that children under 10 may be less likely than older children or adults to transmit COVID-19.

"The safety of our staff and students continues to be my number 1 priority. Since cancelling in-person classes in March and developing our school re-entry plan, we have been clear that we would continue to adapt our guidelines as necessary based on current medical advice. These new safety measures will help prevent the spread of COVID-19 in our schools, and we will continue to work with our school authorities to ensure they are equipped for a successful start to the school year." - Adriana La-Grange, Minister of Education

"After reviewing the emerging evidence, it is clear that masks can play an important role in limiting the spread of COVID-19. I am not making this updated recommendation lightly, but acting on the best current evidence available. While masks are important, I want to stress that they are only one of the many public health measures in place to limit the spread of COVID-19 and protect the health of students, staff and families." - Dr. Deena Hinshaw. Chief Medical Officer of Health for Alberta

"CASS' board of directors appreciates the government's commitment to adapting Alberta's health guidelines as new medical information becomes available and for ensuring school divisions are receiving the protective equipment they need for a successful transition back to school. This announcement clearly demonstrates Alberta Education's willingness to take the necessary steps to support the safety of staff and students. We appreciate their continued collaboration and support as we approach the beginning of a new school year." - Bevan Daverne, president, College of Alberta School Superintendents

Alberta's government re-

mains committed to adjusting the school re-entry guidelines based on current medical advice. The chief medical officer of health has been studying the evidence around masking in schools, and this decision is a direct result of evolving medical advice.

Face shields

School staff will receive one reusable face shield for their use in the schools. Shield use is at the discretion of the individual staff member. Plastic face shields can help reduce exposure but are not equivalent to masks. A mask must still be worn while wearing a face shield.

Hand sanitizer

About 466,000 litres of hand sanitizer will be distributed between all school authorities. The specific volume provided to an individual school authority will be based on student population. Thermometers

Each school will receive two contactless thermometers to assist with managing student and staff health. Thermometer use will be at the discretion of the school authority.

Staff testing

Alberta Health and Alberta Health Services are working hard to expand testing capacity and reduce turnaround times for testing, including in-school staff, teachers and students, so that anyone with symptoms or close contacts of cases can be rapidly tested and receive test results promptly.

All supplies will be distributed to school authorities by the beginning of the 2020-21 school year. Authorities will then distribute to individual schools, staff and/or students based on the needs of their own communities.

Provincial health guidance for a safe return to school will continue to evolve as necessary to reflect the latest evidence on the nature of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Individual school authorities are developing returnto-school plans that meet the needs of their own communities. These plans are based on direction provided under the provincial school re-entry plan, and supporting health guidance documents.

Alberta's Recovery Plan is a bold, ambitious long-term strategy to build, diversify, and create tens of thousands of jobs now. By building schools, roads and other core infrastructure we are benefiting our communities. By diversifying our economy and attracting investment with Canada's most competitive tax environment, we are putting Alberta on a path for a generation of growth. Alberta came together to save lives by flattening the curve and now we must do the same to save livelihoods, grow and thrive.

Quick facts

• Alberta's government announced students and staff would return to school under scenario 1 – near-normal daily operations with health measures – on July 21.

• School authorities are required to be prepared to move between the three scenarios outlined in the provincial school re-entry plan. Changes to scenarios will be determined by Alberta Education.
