TRUDEAU PROROGUES PARLIAMENT AMID WE SCANDAL

Justin Trudeau and the Liberal government are wrapped up in a scandal once again; this time they needed to prorogue Parliament. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau is under investigation by the Conflict of Interest and Ethics Commissioner for the third time since 2015. First, he was under investigation for illegally accepting a vacation to the Aga Khan's private island in 2016. Last year he was under investigation for the SNC Lavalin scandal. Now, Trudeau is dealing with his latest ethical lapse, the WE scandal

Back in April, Trudeau announced the Canada Student

Service Grant (CSSG). This was one of many programs the government had announced to help Canadians get through the COVID-19 pandemic. The stated objective of the program was to deliver financial compensation to students volunteering over the summer. These funds would have helped many youths finance their education upon returning to school in the fall. Instead, the money for this program ended up in the hands of Trudeau's friends at WE Charity. The government repeatedly claimed that WE was the only organization capable of running this program despite the fact that WE Charity had no experience running a program of this

size ever before. When the \$900,000,000 contract was awarded it did not even go to WE Charity, it was sent to a shell corporation setup by WE with no financial history.

In July, WE Charity backed out of the deal after Con-servatives discovered that Trudeau did not recuse himself from the decision to award WE this contract. Additionally, it was discovered that Trudeau's family had received \$500,000 in compensation from WE since he had been elected Prime Minister. Conservatives have been using the tools at our disposal and working hard to get answers for Canadians. Since the news initially broke, the Finance Committee and the Ethics Committee have been tirelessly attempting to get to the bottom of all of this. Conservatives have made huge headway on this fact-finding mission. In fact, within 24 hours of MP Pierre Poilievre receiving 5000 pages of redacted documents regarding the WE scandal, Minister of Finance Bill Morneau resigned, and Trudeau asked the Governor General to prorogue parliament.

What does it really mean to prorogue Parliament? Many people have reached out asking questions as to what this means and why Trudeau can prorogue Parliament without holding a vote on it. The answer is that a sitting Prime Minister reserves the right to request that the Governor General prorogue the House of Commons. Trudeau requested a prorogation and his handpicked Governor General Julie Payette complied. Proroguing the House of Commons effectively resets it to a post-election state without having an election. This means there is now no business on the docket and no committees formed. Already, during the COVID Committee, our ability to hold the Liberals to account was limited. Now, it is non-existent. A new throne speech will be delivered on September 23rd and following that there will be a vote of no confidence and if passed, would trigger an election.

If Trudeau wanted to introduce a throne speech and test the confidence of the House, he could have simply allowed these important committees to continue their work and then prorogue Parliament in the days before his proposed date for a Speech from the Throne (September 23rd). Instead he chose to shut down the Opposition's last avenue for accountability so that he can avoid the tough questients.









LEDUC CITY COUNCIL BALANCES CITIZEN FEEDBACK AND WELL-BEING

At August 17th's meeting of Leduc City Council, following a debate on mandatory masking as a preventative measure against COVID-19, Mayor Young and members of Council passed a bylaw that will make face coverings mandatory should Leduc reach a threshold of 10 confirmed active COVID cases.

The decision follows a public survey conducted by the City, which received more than 5,500 responses. Of the 4,199 Leduc residents who completed the survey, when asked whether they were in favour of face masks being made mandatory in Leduc, 2,039 residents (49%) indicated they were in favour, while 2,159 (51%) said they were opposed.

A second survey that was conducted for local businesses received responses from 183 Leduc business owners/operators or managers. Of those, 63 (34%) indicated they were in favour, while 120 (66%) were opposed to mandatory masking.

"I want to thank the more than 5,000 people who participated in our public survey on mandatory masking," says Leduc Mayor Bob Young. "The bylaw that Council has passed recognizes citizen feedback while keeping community well-being top of mind. I am confident that this balanced and responsible approach will keep our community as healthy as possible."

The bylaw will come into force only if the City of Leduc reaches a threshold of 10 confirmed active cases of COVID-19. It will require individuals to wear a face covering in all indoor, publicly accessible spaces. This will include retail stores, entertainment venues, recreation centres, and vehicles for hire, in addition to City facilities, when utilizing transit, and ride for hire vehicles. Business operators can choose whether or not to

deny service to those who do not comply with the bylaw and may also sell or provide face coverings to customers if they choose. A number of exemptions are built into the bylaw to accommodate those who are unable to wear a face covering.

The decision made by Council recognizes that, when combined with measures such as

physical distancing, proper hand hygiene and staying home when sick, face coverings are effective in preventing the transmission of COVID-19 by symptomatic and asymptomatic carriers as well as potentially offering some protection to the wearer.

"With this decision, Leduc is in alignment with other regional leaders and municipalities in the province," adds Mayor Young.

The City will take an education-first approach to enforcement of the bylaw, should it become necessary to enact it.

PARENTS' GUIDE: 2020-21 SCHOOL YEAR

Return to near normal daily in-school classes with health measures

Learning in the new school year

Students will return to school daily at the beginning of the new school year. There are health measures that everyone has to follow to reduce the risk of COVID-19 and help stay safe. While your school will develop a plan to meet the government's health recommendations, everyone will have a role to play.

PARENTS' ROLE IN KEEPING SCHOOLS SAFE

Screen for symptoms every morning

Check every morning to see if your child has any of these symptoms. If yes, they must stay home:

- Fever, cough, shortness of breath/difficulty breathing, sore throat, chills, painful swallowing
- Runny nose/nasal congestion, feeling unwell/fatigued, nausea/vomiting/diarrhea, unexplained loss of appetite
- Loss of sense of taste or smell, muscle/joint aches, headache, Conjunctivitis (Pink Eye)

Use the <u>Self-Assessment tool</u> to check if your child should be tested for COVID-19.

Stay home when sick or if in contact with someone who is sick

Students, parents or family members must not enter school if they:

- Feel sick or have symptoms of COVID-19
- Had close contact with someone who is ill with a cough and/or fever
- Have anyone in the household who has been in close contact in the last 14 days with someone who is being investigated or confirmed to have COVID-19
- Have traveled outside of Canada in the last 14 days
- Had close contact with someone who has travelled outside of Canada in the last 14 days and who is ill

Keep a safe distance

Keep 2 metres between you and others when possible:

- During drop-off and pick-up
- During interactions with a teacher, school staff or other parents and students

Pick up students promptly if they show symptoms at school

You will be asked to pick up your child from school immediately if they show symptoms. Please ensure the school has your most up-to-date contact information so they may reach you if your child needs to be picked up.

Taking your child to school

If your child normally takes the bus, consider taking them directly to school if your personal situation allows for it. This would help with physical distancing on the bus for students who do not have other options besides taking the bus.

WHAT STUDENTS NEED TO KNOW

Cohort

A cohort—or bubble—is a group of students and staff who remain together. The size of the cohort will depend on the physical space of the classroom.

The risk of COVID-19 is reduced by limiting exposure to others. Staying in a cohort also makes contact tracing easier and faster if there is a suspected case of COVID-19.

Talk to your child about some of the new health measures to help them prepare for the first day of school:

- Sanitize hands before entering school and classrooms
- Keep a distance between others and follow marks in hallways
- · Do not share food or personal items
- · Cover coughs and sneezes
- . Tell staff if feeling sick at school

- Lunch and recess time may change to allow for more physical distancing
- Students may be asked to stay in their own cohort to decrease contact with others
- Students who take the bus will have to sit in the same seat every day.

Your child may feel nervous about what school will be like. While there will be changes, the key school experience will be the same as before—they will learn in class with their teacher and see friends.



SIGNS YOUR GUTTERS ARE IN NEED OF REPAIR

Fall is a great time to tackle projects around the house. The weather each fall allows homeowners to make improvements to their homes' exteriors without worrying about extreme heat or cold, while interior projects like painting are made easier because homeowners can open the windows to allow for proper ventilation.

Fall also marks a great time to prepare for upcoming projects that can make winter work that much easier. For example, fall is a great time to take stock of your gutters so you can address any issues before leaves begin to fall or the first snowstorm touches down. Compromised gutters can contribute to water issues in basements and adversely affect a home's foundation if not addressed

immediately, so it behooves homeowners to learn the signs that gutters are in need of repair or replacement.

• Gutters hanging off the home: Gutters were once installed predominantly with spikes. However, many industry professionals now install gutters with hanger brackets. Why the change? Spikes loosen over time, leading to the gutters hanging off the home. That can contribute to serious issues if left untreated. Gutters hanging off the home need not necessarily be replaced, but rather secured to the home, ideally with hanger brackets instead of spikes. Brackets hook into the front of the gutter and are then screwed into the fascia of a home. A professional who specializes in gutter repair can perform this

task relatively quickly, and it's an inexpensive yet highly effective solution.

• Gutter separation: Gutters that are no longer fastened together can leak and contribute to issues that affect the home's foundation, siding and appearance. Clogs and the accumulation of debris can cause gutters to separate because they are not designed to hold too much weight. Replacement of separated gutters may or may not be necessary depending on how big the problem is and the condition of the existing gutters. If replacement is not necessary, separated gutters may be remedied by securing the joints, another relatively simple and inexpensive fix.

• Peeling exterior paint: Paint that appears to be peeling off of your home may indicate that water is seeping over the edge of the gutter closest to your home. When that happens, water is coming down the side of the house, causing the paint to peel. In such instances, replacing the gutters is often necessary.

• Basement flooding: Not all signs of deteriorating gutters are outside a home. Many a homeowner has been flummoxed by flooding in their basements, and such flooding can be caused by aging, ineffective gutters. That's because deteriorating gutters sometimes allow water to leak near the foundation of a home, contributing to basement flooding.

Fall is an ideal time to inspect gutters and have any issues fixed before leaves begin to fall or harsh winter weather

UNDERSTANDING R-VALUES

Insulation recommendations are based on certain factors that coordinate with regional climate zones to increase energy efficiency. These factors are known as R-values. The R in R-value stands for "resistance," and refers to how certain products resist the flow of heat through walls, floors and ceilings. Products should

reduce heat escape so heat is kept on the right side of the wall. In summer this means outdoors, in winter it means indoors. R-values relate not only to insulation, but also to walls, windows and other barriers. R-values also coordinate to the type, thickness and

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density of the material being used. The higher the R-value, the more resistant to heat the product is. The U.S. Department of Energy coordinates R-value to climate zones 1 through 7 (1: Tip of Florida; 7: Canadian border). A higher R-value is needed in Zone 7 and a lower R-value is necessary in Zone 1. Those embarking on home improvement projects that involve choosing between R-values are urged to speak with a professional or to visit the Department of Energy website (www.energy.gov) to determine which R-Value is ideal for their homes.

MISERICORDIA COMMUNITY HOSPITAL BEGINS PHASED REOPENING

The Misericordia Community Hospital will resume Emergency Department (ED) and labour and delivery services this afternoon and begin a phased reopening of scheduled ambulatory appointments and surgical procedures.

The Misericordia was temporarily closed to incoming patients, including the ED, on July 8 as part of Alberta Health Services' COVID-19 response to the site's full facility outbreak. Existing patients within the hospital continued to receive the treatment, care and support they required, while labouring mothers and patients with scheduled day procedures were rebooked or cared for at other Edmonton Zone hospitals.

Since July 17, 2020, there

have been no new COVID-19 cases linked to the Misericordia's outbreak. As of August 14, 2020 the Misericordia outbreak is now considered over and site restrictions have been lifted.

"Early in the outbreak at the Misericordia, we took significant measures to prevent the spread of COVID_19 and ensure the safety of patients, staff, physicians, and volunteers," says Dr. David Zygun, Medical Director, AHS Edmonton Zone.

"With an abundance of caution, and nearly a month without a new case linked to the initial outbreak, we are confident the site is ready to begin accepting incoming patients to a safe environment of care."

AHS and Covenant Health are grateful to EMS as well as staff and physicians at healthcare facilities, hospitals and in the community throughout the Edmonton Zone who worked tirelessly to accommodate an increase in patient flow due to the temporary closure of the Misericordia.

"The ability of our teams to adapt to the closure of a hospital in the Edmonton Zone is a testament to the depth of our capacity to care for Albertans during a pandemic," says Dr. Zygun. "The hard work and vigilance of our staff and physicians across the system have kept hospital transmission rates low and the environment safe for patients."

Medicine and other hospital inpatient units including the neonatal intensive care unit that continued to care for patients at the Misericordia during the temporary closure will also begin accepting incoming patients. Patients with postponed or upcoming ap-

pointments and surgeries will be contacted to reschedule appointments and procedures.

Covenant Health and Alberta Health Services want to assure Albertans that the facility is safe for new admissions.

"Our focus continues to be on the safety of our patients, staff, physicians and visitors in the facility," said Owen Heisler, Chief Medical Officer, Covenant Health. "We are extremely grateful for our hard-working and dedicated physicians and staff who cared for patients and each other during the outbreak, both at the Misericordia or through redeployment throughout the zone."

AHS and Covenant would like to express gratitude to patients and families for their support and patience throughout this temporary service suspension.

EXPANDING COVID-19 TESTING FOR ASYMPTOMATIC ALBERTANS

More than 50 Shoppers Drug Mart and Loblaw pharmacies in Real Canadian Superstore locations are already offering asymptomatic testing, and by September 1, 2020 all 234 of the company's pharmacies in Alberta (including pharmacies at Independent Foods, Extra Foods, City Market, and No Frills) will offer asymptomatic COVID-19 testing.

This is in addition to provincewide testing offered via AHS assessment centres and about 75 other community pharmacies that already offer tests. Additional community pharmacies are encouraged to register voluntarily to offer asymptomatic testing.

To date, more than 837,649 COVID-19 tests have been completed across the province.

"Since the beginning of this pandemic, Alberta has been a leader in testing. We have consistently had the most open testing approach in Canada, and I am pleased to partner with Shoppers

Drug Mart to further strengthen our capacity." - Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health

"Testing is a powerful tool that helps us limit the spread of COVID-19 and protect people from infection. Expanded testing capacity will support additional testing opportunities for all Albertans, including school teachers and staff. This will provide a baseline for school re-entry and enhance access throughout the school year." - Dr. Deena Hinshaw, Chief Medical Officer of Health

"Expanding a symptomatictesting to more than 230 of our pharmacies across the province will allow more access to these tests and continued peace of mind, particularly as school resumes and businesses continue to open. To support school re-entry,

Albertans without symptoms are asked to delay testing until after the 2020-21 school year starts on Sept.1.

All Albertans are also reminded that continued adherence to public health measures – including physicial distancing, masking and hand hygiene – remain critical to the reduction of spread of COVID-19 in our province.

Asymptomatic testing

Asymptomatic Albertans are still encouraged to complete the AHS self-assessment tool to book a test, or contact a participating community pharmacv.

Each pharmacy adheres to strict protocols and has the specialized skills needed to protect patient safety. The pharmacy test is a throat swab, which is sent to Alberta Precision Labs for analysis.

Testing at pharmacies is particularly encouraged for all teachers and school staff.

Symptomatic testing

covid.

Testing appointments for children with pre-existing medical conditions that have symptoms similar to COVID-19, such as allergies, must also be booked through AHS.

Quick facts

- Alberta has performed 837,649 tests on 677,754 Albertans
- Strong testing data helps government and public health officials understand how our communities are affected by COVID-19 to make public health decisions.
- Only those who have no symptoms and no known exposure to COVID-19 can be tested at participating pharmacies.
- Anyone with COVID-19 symptoms or known exposure must complete the COVID-19 self-assessment or call Health Link 811.
- AHS will directly contact any Albertan who tests positive to discuss the results, begin contact tracing, and protect the public's health.

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
