INVESTIGATION INTO RCMP OFFICER-INVOLVED SHOOTING NEAR ENTWISTLE

Submitted by Government of Alberta

On Aug. 30, the Alberta Serious Incident Response Team (ASIRT) was directed to investigate the circumstances surrounding an officer-involved shooting that occurred that same day on Highway 16 near Entwistle, and which resulted in the death of a 32-year-old man. On that date at about 4:30

p.m., RCMP received information regarding a domestic aggravated assault that had occurred earlier that day in Saskatchewan. The bulletin provided, among other things, a description of the vehicle and information regarding the possible presence of a firearm.

At about 8:30 p.m., RCMP located the vehicle in question, and a marked police vehicle attempted to conduct a traffic stop. The vehicle failed to stop, and the officers initiated a pursuit.

RCMP GIVES BUSINESSES TIPS FOR ATM SECURITY

This month, Alberta RCMP is providing businesses with tips for preventing Break and Enters with a focus on ATM thefts. Although there has not been a significant increase or decrease of ATM thefts, the Alberta RCMP would like to see the numbers decrease by next year.

Quick Facts (2019 Alberta

RCMP jurisdiction):

• There were over 5,500 Break and Enters to businesses last year.

• The three highest months for Break and Enters to businesses were:

- August (over 600)
- September (almost 550)
- July (over 500)

• There were close to 40 ATM thefts and over 40 ATM theft attempts last year.

· Last September there

were 6 ATM thefts and 6 ATM theft attempts.

• The three highest months for ATM thefts occurred between September and November.

So far in 2020, from January to July, there have been over 2,800 Break and Enters to businesses.

• Install bollards in front of business to prevent vehicle ramming.

One of the mandates that Albertans, and especially my constituents, called for prior to the 2019 Provincial Election was the need for greater choice in our children's education systems and further protection for the current schooling options available in Alberta. Bill 15, which comes into force on Sept. 1, will ensure our province maintains its status as a world leader in high quality education and has already been acknowledged and praised by members of the Association of Independent Schools and Colleges in Alberta and The Association of Alberta Public Charter Schools.

Proposed Bylaw 2020-11: Wellness Centre Related Amendments to the Land Use Bylaw

In recent years, there has been an increased industry interest in developing holistic health and wellness type retreats in rural areas of the County. Bylaw 2020-11 proposes to amend the County's Land Use Bylaw to include a new land use class, definition, and regulations for "Wellness Centre" developments, such as spas, mediation and yoga retreats, outdoor and indoor pools, and other related accessory uses.

Hearing Procedure

This is a formal Public Hearing and Council is prepared to hear and receive formal submissions and presentations (verbal or written) from those who wish to speak to the proposed Bylaw. Written submissions or presentations may either be submitted in advance to Planning & Development by 4:00 p.m. on Sept 10, 2020, or submitted at the commencement of the Public Hearing on Sept 22, 2020.

Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation to Council must notify Planning & Development Services in advance of the Public Hearing by 4:00 p.m., on Sept 10, 2020. Verbal presentations at the Public Hearing will be limited to a maximum of 10 minutes. Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation who has not made prior arrangements may be allocated a time at the commencement of the Public Hearing. Council advises that this is your last opportunity to comment on the proposed Bylaw as Council is unable to receive further submissions after the Public Hearing is closed.

9 WAYS TO IMPROVE YOUR GOLF GAME

Warmer weather sends scores of golfers to their favorite courses each and every day. Golf is a challenging pastime, but a few pointers can help golfers hone their short games, long games and everything in between.

• Choose the right clubs. There is more to selecting clubs than pulling any old iron out of your golf bag and whacking away. Wind, hazards and obstructions in landing areas should influence your

decision of which club to use. Novice golfers may want to rely on their caddies to make club recommendations, and as they become more confident in their abilities they can start to make their own choices.

• Anchor your feet. Anchor your foot behind the ball to drive the ball further. Right-handed players will keep the right foot anchored, and lefties will do the opposite. Do not lift your foot prematurely; otherwise, you can lose power and distance. • Identify your

weaknesses. As with any hobby, identifying those areas that need the most work can help you become a better golfer. Keep track of each shot you take, and then look at the results to see which areas of your game need the most work. Fix your align-

ment. Align your shots by assessing the target from behind the ball. Then set the clubface behind the golf ball and align it with the target before you enter your stance.

• Use your torso for power. The torso is essential to a solid swing. Practice rotating from your core to control your backswing and then maintain the same spine angle and posture on the downswing.

• Use the wind. Not every golf game will be played in perfect weather. A good player knows how to make adjustments for the wind depending on the shot. Use the wind to your advantage when you can, and adjust your swing when hitting into the wind.

• Become a better chipper. Many players put so much emphasis on their backswings and putt shots that they fail to devote any practice to chips. All shots are important for golfers trying to shed strokes off of their scores.

• Keep fit. Maintaining or improving your physical strength and overall health can help your golf game. Exercise and eat right, and you will have more endurance on the links.

YELLOWHEAD COUNTY COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

August 25, 2020

All-Saints Anglican Church Historical Designation - Council passed Bylaw 17.20 that named the All-Saints Anglican Church in Hattonford as a Municipal Historic Resource. The bylaw includes a description of the historic building and its heritage value and a listing of the building's character-defining elements protected through the designation.

Evansburg Cemetery Bylaw – Council passed Bylaw No. 14.20 for the Evansburg Cemetery. The new bylaw changes include new rules and guidelines for maintaining and decorating individual gravesites, specific regulations for cremation urns, and clarifying Yellowhead County's ability to manage and control the cause of maintenance issues.

River Ridge Area Structure Plan – Council passed Bylaw 16.20 amending the River Ridge Area Structure Plan (ASP). The changes allow for an additional lot, increasing the number of lots in the subdivision to 48. Septic system and water well requirements for the new lot were all stipulated in the ASP.

Robb Area Structure Plan – Council adopted the new Robb Area Structure Plan (ASP) that provides longterm planning for the hamlet and its residents. During the development of the new Robb ASP, public engagement included stakeholder meetings, community workshops, open houses, and surveys that all contributed to the development of the final ASP. Feedback from residents and other stakeholders was received during the Public Hearing and was included in the final Robb ASP.

Tax Payment Agreement Request – Council denied a request that they received from Notine Holdings asking for a 12-month tax payment agreement. As this year's tax payment deadline has already been extended to October 15, 2020, Council voted not to approve the company's request.

Investigation Into RCMP Officer-Involved Shooting Near Entwistle

During the pursuit, a tire deflation device was successfully deployed, but was not effective in immediately stopping the vehicle. As this was occurring, the RCMP made contact with the driver by phone, and attempted to de-escalate the situation. However, the driver refused to surrender, and made several threats regarding the use of a firearm. Ultimately, just east of the Hamlet of Entwistle, police were able to bring the vehicle to a stop by way of intentional contact from a police vehicle.

Once the vehicle had confrontastopped, а tion occurred between the 32-year-old driver of the vehicle and members of the RCMP Emergency Response Team (ERT). During that confrontation, three members of ERT discharged their service firearms, striking the man.

An RCMP tactical medic provided first aid to the man, who was pronounced dead upon the arrival of Emergency Medical Services (EMS). A loaded .22-calibre rifle was recovered from the scene, and was seized by ASIRT investigators.

This .22-calibre rifle was recovered from the incident scene.

ASIRT investigators are asking anyone who was in the area of Highway 16 and Range Road 73 near Entwistle on Aug. 30 and witnessed the incident, or who has any information or video related to this incident, to contact ASIRT at 780-644-1483.

As ASIRT's investigation is underway, no further information will be released at this time.

ASIRT's mandate is to effectively, independently and objectively investigate incidents involving Alberta's police that have resulted in serious injury or death to any person, as well as serious or sensitive allegations of police misconduct.

HOW TO REMOVE MILDEW FROM YOUR HOME'S EXTERIOR

Homeowners want their residences to look inviting inside and out. Part of keeping an attractive property involves addressing issues that can compromise not only the appearance of a home, but even its integrity. People who live in regions with high humidity may find their homes are vulnerable to exterior mildew growth. Mildew is a kind of mold. Molds include all species of microscopic fungi that grow in the form of hyphae, which are multicellular filaments, according to the Environmental Protection Agency. Mildew also can grow on home siding as well as fences and other exterior structures. While typically gray or white, mildew can be various colors.

Experts recommend various cleansers to help combat the issue of mildew on a home. One of the first products that homeowners tend to reach for is sodium hypochlorite, which is a standard bleach used in laundry and pool sanitation. While sodium hypochlorite seems to make mildew vanish, those at This Old House say that chlorine evaporates too quickly to get to mildew's roots on porous surfaces, such as wood or vinyl siding. Bleach also can stain clothing and damage foliage around the house. Hydrogen peroxide, or oxygen bleach, is less volatile, will not affect foliage and can clean mildew, algae and dirt on and below the surface.

Trisodium phosphate is another effective cleanser. Commonly known as TSP, it often succeeds where other solutions fail in regard to stubborn stains and mildew. TSP also works well on various exterior surfaces. TSP needs to be used with extreme caution. When using TSP, wear long sleeves, gloves, goggles, and a respiratory mask, says Today's Homeowner. The product also requires adequate ventilation. There also are some environmental concerns, as TSP can damage foliage. In addition, if the product ends up in lakes and streams, it can trigger an overgrowth of algae that results in the depletion of oxygen levels in the water. Eco-conscious homeowners may want to try oxy cleansers before TSP.

KEY MESSAGES FROM GYPSD'S PUBLIC BOARD MEETING

August 26, 2020

District Priority 1: Student Learning

 Board Chair Rosadiuk spoke to the new Ministerial Order on Student Learning, appreciating the focus on literacy and numeracy, as well as the alignment of the order's student learning outcomes to GYPSD's three (3) board priorities.

 GYPSD's Learn at Home option provides families the opportunity for students to learn from home for the 2020 21 school year. After informing the school principal, the school will ensure families have the resources, materials and teacher support they need

to have a successful learner at home.

· School principals released their school's re-entry plans on August 24th. Teachers will begin the school year by assessing students' needs and developing learning plans to address any gaps. Schools have health and safety protocols in place to minimize the risk of spreading the virus. Each school's plan is posted to their website.

• In addition to providing the learn at home option (that offers print and/or online access and in person supports), principals agreed that students could return to in school learning if needed. Families will give the school one week's notice and work with their school principal to re-enter the classroom.

District Priority 2: Teaching and Leadership Excellence

• Superintendent Lewis and the Board of Trustees praised the work of Division principals and central services leadership for their work over the summer to implement the 2020 21 School Re Entry directive from Alberta Education. In particular, school principals were applauded for their response to parents wanting a learn at home option.

• On August 21st, Principals and Senior Leadership participated in a full day Division Leadership Team (DLT) meeting to share best practices, school re-entry plans, and discuss leadership development within their

schools.

 The Board of Trustees approved an adjustment to the in person aspect of the retirement celebration plan for the 2019 2020 retiree cohort, praising the retirees for their dedication and commitment to GYPSD while acknowledging AHS mandates, and putting the health and safety of staff, students, families, and communities at the forefront.

• Kick Off 2020, set for September 2nd, will see a total of 61 sessions offered by 42 presenters. The Division encourages and provides professional development that is focused, systemic, and contributes significantly to staff's professional on-going growth and engagement in career long learning.

INFRASTRUCTURE CANADA GRANT AWARDED TO NEW AQUATIC FACILITY PROJECT IN DRAYTON VALLEY

EDSON, AB: Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, Gerald Soroka is pleased to inform constituents that he attended a federal funding announcement to build a new Aquatic Facility in Drayton Valley. Minister of Infrastructure, the Honourable Catherine McKenna was virtually in attendance. Physically present were: His Worship Michael Doerksen, Mayor of the Town of Drayton Valley, Alberta Minister of Infrastructure Prasad Panda, Mark Smith, MLA for Drayton Valley-Devon and Reeve Bart Guyon of Brazeau County. Member of Parliament Gerald Soroka thanks all representatives that were in attendance for this announcement.

Just over \$7.5 million in federal funding will be used to build a new Net-Zero Aquatic Facility, including a six-lane pool, 25-metre lap pool, leisure pool, and lazy river. It will also have a steam room, hot tub, multi-purpose room, and change rooms. In addition to providing residents with a new hub for fun and fitness, the facility will be heated with waste heat recovered from a nearby hockey arena, giving it a net-zero energy balance. This use of renewable energy will cause no harmful emissions while also significantly reducing long-term operating costs.
