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# IMPROVED PROCESS TO NOTIFY AIR TRAVELLERS POTENTIALLY EXPOSED TO COVID-19 ON DOMESTIC FLIGHTS

Gerald Soroka Member of Parliament for Yellowhead wishes to advise that Transport Canada, provincial and territorial governments, public health authorities, and Canada's largest air carriers have established a consistent approach for air carriers to collect and

share passenger information necessary to alert Canadians of possible COVID-19 exposure while travelling by air, in compliance with applicable privacy legislation. This would facilitate timely contact tracing and exposure notification for passengers on domestic flights.

The national enhanced notification allows contact tracing to be done in a more consistent

manner across all jurisdictions. If a public health authority deems it necessary to conduct contact tracing by notifying passengers directly of possible COVID-19 exposure, complete and accurate passenger contact information will be readily available from Canada's largest air carriers.

Provincial and territorial public health authorities

maintain authority and decision-making over contact tracing while the Public Health Agency of Canada provides guidance.

As part of the improved process, passengers will be asked to provide contact information when they check-in for their flight with large Canadian air carriers.

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**Proposed Bylaw 2020-11: Wellness Centre Related Amendments to the Land Use Bylaw**

In recent years, there has been an increased industry interest in developing holistic health and wellness type retreats in rural areas of the County. Bylaw 2020-11 proposes to amend the County's Land Use Bylaw to include a new land use class, definition, and regulations for "Wellness Centre" developments, such as spas, meditation and yoga retreats, outdoor and indoor pools, and other related accessory uses.

**Hearing Procedure**

This is a formal Public Hearing and Council is prepared to hear and receive formal submissions and presentations (verbal or written) from those who wish to speak to the proposed Bylaw. ## HOME IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS FOR YOUR FALL TO-DO LIST

Homeowners know that maintaining a home can be a year-round job. No home is immune to wear and tear, and homeowners who want

way inside a home. In addition, clogged gutters make great nesting areas for insects or critters. Always stand on a ladder when cleaning gutters, wearing gloves to remove items by hand and dropping leaves and debris into a trash can below. Standing on the roof and leaning over gutters greatly increases your risk of injury. If the gutters are clear when you first examine them in early fall, you can wait until later in the season to give them a complete and thorough cleaning. Once you have finished clearing the gutters, you can use a hose to run water through them and the downspouts to confirm everything is functioning properly.

**WINDOW AND DOORWAY INSPECTION:** Before temperatures start dropping once again, homeowners will want to inspect their windows and doorways for leaks. Over time,

cracks can develop around windows and doorways, and while such cracks are rarely noticeable when the weather outside is warm, they can be quite obvious and very costly if they remain unsealed come the start of winter. Cold air can enter a home through cracks around windows and doorways, and many homeowners who don't suspect leaks may respond by turning up the thermostats in their homes. That can prove quite expensive over a full winter. Choose a windy autumn day to place a hand by windows and external doorways in your home to see if you can feel drafts. If you can, seal these cracks as soon as possible.

**PATIO CLEANUP:** Patios are popular hangouts during spring and summer, and that can result in a lot of wear and tear. Once you store patio furniture for the winter, inspect your

entire patio to determine if it needs any refurbishing. While certain patio projects may be best left for spring, you can still clean any stained areas around the grill and look for cracks in the sidewalk that need to be addressed.

## IMPROVE INDOOR AIR QUALITY IN ADVANCE OF WINTER

Upon the arrival of winter, people in regions where winter is marked by cold weather tend to spend significantly

more time indoors. Because windows tend to be closed during winter, indoor air quality can suffer, making

conditions inside a home less than desirable.

According to the American Lung Association, poor air circulation in a home can promote the spread of bacteria and viruses. Once such bacteria or viruses are inhaled, coughs, colds and flu can spread. In addition, asthma and allergy sufferers may experience worsening symptoms thanks to the presence of endotoxins, which are substances that come from the broken-down cells of dead bacteria.

Because many people spend significantly more time indoors during winter than other times of the year, it's essential that they take

measures to improve indoor air quality in the months ahead.

- Cut back on chemicals. It's ideal to avoid heavy chemical usage inside a home throughout the year, but it's especially important to do so during winter. Solvent-based cleaners or cleaning products with strong fragrances can negatively affect indoor air quality and potentially trigger allergic reactions. In lieu of chemical-enhanced cleaning products, use natural products that get the job done without sacrificing indoor air quality.

- Stop smoking indoors. Tobacco smoke can affect smokers and non-

smokers alike. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention note that secondhand smoke causes numerous health problems in infants and children. Those include more frequent and severe asthma attacks and respiratory infections. In addition, reports from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services have linked secondhand smoke to an increased risk of sudden infant death syndrome. Adults exposed to secondhand smoke are at greater risk for coronary heart disease, stroke and lung cancer. Tobacco smoke contains thousands of pollutants that can greatly diminish indoor air quality, so make sure smokers limit their smoking to outside the home throughout the year,

but especially during winter.

- Take off your shoes when entering the home. Snowy conditions often require a home's inhabitants and guests to remove their footwear upon entering a home, but it helps to remove footwear in a mudroom or just inside the front door when entering a home even when it's not snowing. Shoes can pick up dirt, dust and a host of other particles during winter, and if tracked inside those unwanted guests can negatively affect indoor air quality.
- Routinely inspect bathrooms for mold. During winter, mold can grow in rooms that are exposed to moisture but not properly ventilated. In many homes, that's the bathroom. Even

if a bathroom has a ventilation fan, routinely inspect the ceiling and shower for mold growth. Exposure to mold can cause a host of negative side effects, including nasal and sinus congestion and

sore throat. Mold also can exacerbate asthma symptoms. Improving and maintaining indoor air quality in winter can help a home's inhabitants stay healthy during the colder months.

# CHARGES LAID IN RELATION TO HOMICIDE AT PAUL BAND FIRST NATIONS

Paul Band First Nation, Alta. – On August 28, 2020 at 9:28 a.m., the Parkland RCMP responded to a request to assist EMS with an unresponsive male. When the RCMP arrived on scene it was determined that the 53-year-old male was confirmed to be deceased, outside a residence.

On Sept. 1, 2020 an autopsy was conducted and the manner of death was determined to be a homicide. The RCMP Major Crimes Unit was deployed to take carriage of the investigation.

An arrest has been made and charges laid in relation to the August 28, 2020 homicide of Rufus Clive Rain (54) of Paul Band First Nation.

On September 3, 2020, RCMP arrested 23-year-old Lynden Aerin Bird from Paul Band First Nation. Lynden Bird has been charged with one count of Manslaughter. A Judicial Interim Release Hearing was held on September 4, 2020 and he was remanded into custody with a first appearance date of September 9, 2020 in Stony Plain Provincial Court.

As this matter is now before the courts, no further updates will be provided.

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

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

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
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
