OUR POCKETS ARE EMPTY

Sir Winston S. Churchill said: "We contend that for a nation to try to tax itself into prosperity is like a man standing in a bucket and trying to lift himself up by the handle." This is a powerful statement and is exactly what the federal Liberal government is doing – taking, taking and taking from those that can no longer give what they do not have. Justin Trudeau is making things more expensive by increasing/ adding taxes.

Trudeau, like Oliver Twist from Charles Dickens novel is saying "... I want some more." How can this Liberal government keep increasing taxes or even plan to impose a Clean Fuel Standard tax on carbon content of fuel in 2022? This new tax would only increase costs at the pump, increase costs for the gas feedstock used by petrochemical companies. Does he not know that there are millions of Canadians still unemployed, and businesses still closed or about to close?

We have a Prime Minister who not only effortlessly and carelessly spends our money but tells us that money is not even a real thing anymore. After many years of continued advocacy I am proud to say we will officially be welcoming a decorticator facility to the Drayton Valley area as early as next month! One of the mandates given to our government by the people of this province was a need to increase resource and job diversification. Since first becoming a MLA in 2015, I have been working hard to create investment opportunities in our constituency. We have always known that the loam filled soil found in Alberta creates great farming opportunities but not many know that one of the crops grown most effectively in and around our constituency is the hemp plant. Hemp has an immense array of uses and can be processed and manufactured into a truly overwhelming amount of different products. Since the legalization of its cousin, cannabis, farmers and regulators have been taking a closer look at the hemp plant and its potential. As of 2017, Alberta was considered the second highest hemp producer in Canada, just behind Saskatchewan, with 325 Albertan producers having obtained their license to grow industrial hemp. A number that has only continued to grow as profits from this incredibly hardy crop are realized.

Unfortunately, while the plant grows exceedingly well in Alberta, it is incredibly tough to harvest. The average logging machine or farming equipment does not have the capacity to break down the sturdy outside of the hemp stalks which is why it calls for specific processing equipment. A decorticator machine is specially designed to cut through the incredibly tough woody exterior of the hemp plant and produce two main components, both with their own uses.

The biggest set back faced by the hemp industry in Alberta has been the lack of decorticator facilities, which is why recent investment in the Drayton Valley area is so exciting. The Bio-Composites Group (BCG) helped to establish the Bio-Mile several years ago, complete with headquarters and a production plant which manufactures wood fibre mats and other organic products. It is here at Bio-Comkposites Group that a new decorticator system is being added. The opening of this new facility signals a whole new type of industry market for the community and will help create work and opportunities for local families. In the past, Bio-Composites Group received hemp fibres all the way from Europe, but with the installation of a decorticator, Drayton Valley will be the first facility in North America able to process and turn local hemp into usable material. The facility has received all the necessary equipment and management is anticipating production to begin taking place within the month! The community has received many benefits from

the establishment of the facility, and this next stage will be no different.

The community of Drayton Valley gladly welcomes the new decorticator facility and we look forward to seeing how green technology can continue to contribute to our town and its future.

"Staying in the kitchen while cooking, using a timer, and avoiding distractions such as electronics or TV are steps everyone can take to keep families safe in their homes."

"The most important step you should take before making a meal is to Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!" said Fire Prevention Officer Ryan Harley. "A cooking fire can grow quickly. I have seen many homes damaged and people injured by fires that could easily have been prevented."

Spruce Grove Fire Services wants to share safety tips to keep you from having a cooking fire.

• Never leave cooking food unattended. Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling or broiling food. If you have to leave, even for a short time, turn off the stove.

• If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly. Remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you're cooking.

· You have to be alert when cooking. You won't be alert if you are sleepy, have taken medicine or drugs, or have consumed alcohol that makes you drowsy.

· Always keep an oven mitt and pan lid nearby when you're cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan to smother the flame. Turn off the burner, and leave the pan covered until it is completely cool.

 Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 1 metre around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

YELLOWHEAD COUNTY COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Big Horn Mine Impact Assessment Letter – The Vista Mine Project (Bighorn Mining), a notable local employer, is considering submitting a permit for surface mining expansion (Phase II). Formerly, the Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency did not find that Phase II would meet criteria for designation under the Impact Assessment Act. (Projects designated under the Impact Assessment Act are considered to have potential for adverse and complex effects in areas of federal jurisdiction related to the environment, and may be mired by federal oversight.) Likewise, the Federal Impact Assessment Agency concluded that the underground mine expansion activities would be addressed through provincial processes rather than federal.

In July of 2020, the Minister of Environment and Climate Change Canada reversed the previous federal decision and decided that the underground mine and Phase II expansion warrant designation under the Impact Assessment Act, leading to worries that the project may come under scrutiny and operations may be hampered. Yellowhead County council endorsed a letter to the Minister of Environment and Climate Change asking to keep the project under provincial oversight due to worries of potential job and regional economic loss.

Municipal Stimulus Program Projects – The province is providing capital infrastructure funding to municipalities meant to sustain and create local jobs, enhance competitiveness and productivity and to reduce red tape. Yellowhead County has submitted three projects for funding consideration under the Municipal Stimulus Program: replacement salt/sand sheds for both Edson and Wildwood (approximately \$600,000 each) and a live-fire training burn room (approximately \$100,000). Council ratified these three projects and entered into a Municipal Stimulus Program agreement with the provincial government.

Family Resource Network Letter - The Ministry of Children's Services developed a new system to provide prevention and early intervention support to children, youth and families, called the Family Resource Network. Following this, the Ministry cancelled all contracts and agreements, including the county's Parent Link, Early Childhood Development, Diversion and Home Visitation programs. Yellowhead County council supported a letter to the Minister of Children's Services detailing

concerns with this significant service reduction in the region, and asking for comment.

Pembina Agricultural & Recreation Society (PARS) Funding Model Update - Council approved the one-time bridging payment to PARS in the amount of \$31,652.67 by a transfer from the Recreation Grant budget. Transitioning PARS from a deficit model of funding to the same budget model used by Yellowhead County with all of its other partners means more budgeting certainty and pre-approval by council and requires the aforementioned one-time bridging payment.

2020 Property Tax Auction and Date – As per MGA Section 419 (a) council must set, for each parcel of land to be offered for sale at a public auction, a reserve bid that is as close as reasonably possible to the market value of the parcel.

Al fresco dining is popular in spring and summer, and that popularity reached new heights in the summer of 2020. With much of the world still grappling with the outbreak of the novel coronavirus COVID-19 and government officials fearing rising case numbers if indoor gatherings were allowed, many restaurants were limited to offering only outdoor dining to patrons. Such restrictions reintroduced many people to the pleasure of outdoor dining.

Outdoor dining may be synonymous with summer, but there's no reason why good meals can't be enjoyed outside year-round. That's especially true when homeowners and hosts take stock of certain factors when planning outdoor dining spaces they intend to use all year long.

Lighting: If you plan to keep outdoor dining going after summer, then some extra lighting may be necessary. The sun sets in late afternoon/early evening in fall and winter, so you won't be able to rely on natural light to keep the dinner table aglow. Lighting also can make outdoor dining in summer more enjoyable. Outdoor string lights can add a relaxing vibe to a deck or patio. If you intend to string the lights up year-round, make sure poles are sturdy enough to withstand winter winds.

Weather: Table cloths can add a touch of class to outdoor dining tables. But those table cloths are only effective if they remain on the table. Summer breezes might not prove too great a challenge in that regard, but fall, winter and spring

weather might make it hard to keep table cloths on the table where they belong. A simple set of table cloth clips can ensure the wind doesn't blow table

cloths around while people are eating or completely off the table when everyone is inside.

TIPS FOR STAINING WOOD

Staining wood can transform the look of everything from fencing to decking. While wood can be beautiful in its natural state, staining can protect the wood and complement landscaping and other home design elements.

Staining can seem like a simple project, and that is often

true. However, certain woods, such as pine, cherry, maple, and birch, can be difficult to stain. Boards with attractive grain patterns also can absorb stain differently, resulting in blotching and uneven tone.

Before beginning a staining project, it is important for homeowners to test the stain chosen on a sample piece of wood to see how the color and absorption turn out. This gives homeowners the chance to understand what they're dealing with and time to make any necessary accommodations to achieve a more even look.

Begin by gathering the necessary supplies. A pair of

Drop cloths will catch any drips or spills. Safety goggles and a dust mask provide protection if sanding is required prior to staining. If sanding is necessary, homeowners will need an orbital sander, hand sander and sandpaper. Start with the coarsest grit sandpaper and move to a higher grit for a smooth finish. Wood that is covered in paint may need to be stripped prior to sanding. Follow the directions carefully when using chemical strippers.

Natural bristle paint brushes are handy for oil-based stain applications. Synthetic paint brushes can apply water-based finishes. Many doit-yourselfers find that foam brushes or paint pads are the most handy because they provide a smooth finish and there's no need to clean up the brushes afterward.

Many professionals recommend using wood conditioners or pre-treaters so that the stain will not leave blotches on the wood. This is especially important for homeowners who determined their wood is prone to uneven color absorption. Allow the conditioner to dry according to product directions.

Stain should be applied so that it is evenly coated. Wipe off the excess to get the preferred color. Apply more stain as necessary to get the desired color. Many stains only offer color, so you'll need to apply a finishing coat to protect the wood. Otherwise, look for a product that combines stain color and a finish to save time.

Remember to remove knobs, hinges, and handles from a piece before staining, as the stain may affect the color of any metal hardware and damage it.

Hurricane candle holders also can make it easy to maintain the ambiance candles provide without having to worry about the wind extinguishing the candles in one strong gust.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR DURING **ROOF INSPECTIONS**

Cold weather can be tough on a home, and perhaps no part of a home is more vulnerable to harsh winter weather than its roof.

Fallen snow can equate to several pounds of pressure placed on a residential roof. Roofs do not often collapse under heavy snowfall. But adverse winter weather conditions can compromise roofs in other ways. Water leakage and damage to the roof's interior are just two of the potentially problematic issues that can arise when roofs are battered by cold, blustery weather. That's why many home improvement specialists advise homeowners to conduct roof inspections prior to the start of winter.

Many homeowners can conduct their own cursory roof inspections, but they may not know exactly what to look for.

The National Roofing Contractors Association says that there are certain key areas to inspect that may reveal some telltale signs of roof damage.

· Curled, cracked or missing shingles may prove troublesome. Inclement weather can test the strength of even the most durable roofs. Even though many roofs are designed to last up to 30 years, some may need to be replaced early, particularly when they have been exposed to harsh weather over a period of years. Individual shingles can be replaced as spot treatments, but if the damage is widespread, a new roof may be necessary.

· Attic leaks or water elsewhere might signal issues with the roof. Figure out if water inside the home is coming from the roof. Water stains do not always indicate problems with

the roofing, but it's better to be safe than sorry.

· Look for protective granules wearing off. If gutters are filled with the sandy granular material that coats roofing shingles, that may be a sign of an aging or damaged roof

· Inspect flashing. Professional roofers can recognize properly installed flashing, the material that connects the roof to other parts of the house that adjoin the roof, like skylights or a chimneys. Poorly installed flashing can cause leaks. Stains that appear below chimneys or near attic windows may indicate new flashing, and not new shingles, is needed.

· Gutters and downspouts should be in good condition. A roof is the sum of its parts, and that includes downspouts and gutters. If the gutters are clogged or damaged, they can-

not direct water away from the house properly. Snow, leaves and other debris needs to be cleared from gutters to help them function at optimal capacity.

· Animals and insects can cause damage, too. It's not just poor weather that homeowners need to consider with regard to roof damage. Boring insects and animals may cause problems with roofs as well. A roof inspection may shed light on potential pest problems. Holes or nesting materials may indicate that an animal or animals are using the attic as a shelter from the elements.

Get to the root of issues with your home's roof before they become bigger problems once winter arrives. A thorough inspection can reveal problems that may prove costly if ignored.
