MASS GRAVE IN KAMLOOPS BC CONTAINING REMAINS OF 215 SCHOOL CHILDREN

Just days ago, the discovery of a mass grave in Kamloops, British Columbia, containing the remains of 215 school children, was a heartbreaking reminder of the pain indigenous children, their families and their communities were subjected to through residential schools. This is a dark reminder of the horrendous reality that was faced by many Indigenous Canadians. My thoughts and prayers are with all indigenous families as they mourn. It is our burden to carry, and we must start to ease the heavy load that has been carried by indigenous people for far too long. While communities and families grapple with this unthinkable revelation, it is time

for all of us to come together and aid in the healing process.

For many indigenous people, although the discovery opened tremendously deep wounds, it was not a surprise. According to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, at least 3,200 children died while attending residential schools. We owe it to each and every one of them to redouble our efforts toward reconciliation and healing. In the face of this tragedy, words are not enough, and concrete action is needed.

Canada's Conservatives have called on the Prime Minister to immediately implement the TRC's recommendations #71-76, which deal with missing children. We have also called for the following additional measures to be taken: *Funding the investigation at all former residential schools in Canada where unmarked graves may exist, including the site where 215 children have already been discovered.

*Ensuring that proper resources are allocated for communities to reinter, commemorate, and honour any individuals discovered through the investigation, according to the wishes of their next of kin; and

*Developing a detailed and thorough set of resources to educate Canadians of all ages on the tragic history of residential schools in Canada.

My sincere condolences to all of those who had to endure these residential schools. It is time to act NOW for the sake of all the children we lost. Words are not enough. Action must be taken.

The winner will be drawn when Stage 3 of Alberta's Open for Summer Plan begins.

"This lottery will help us cross that 70 per cent threshold so we can reopen and stay open. Albertans have already responded in such a big way to our vaccine program and we've been able to lift many health restrictions because of their efforts. We just need one final push so we can lift them all and get back to normal. If you've been waiting to book or you've been looking for a reason to get the shot, here it is." - Jason Kenney, Premier

More than 68.5 per cent of eligible Albertans have received their first dose, including 19.2 per cent who are fully vaccinated with two doses.

As of June 12, there are 64,535 appointments booked over the next seven days for first doses. Currently, Alberta is projected to hit the 70 per cent milestone and start the twoweek countdown to Stage 3 of Alberta's Open for Summer Plan on June 18.

"The arrival and uptake of the COVID-19 vaccines in our province have accomplished extraordinary things. It's only fitting that we respond in kind with a once-in-a-lifetime event in Alberta. This lottery is an investment in Albertans and our province's economic future. I am confident that we will see that final upswing in vaccinations to take us across that finish line to widespread immunity." - Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health

To be eligible for the lottery, you must:

Reside in Alberta at the time of the draw.

Be 18 years of age and older.

Be able to provide proof of receiving your dose of an approved vaccine for the draw.

Anyone who has already received one dose is eligible to enter the lottery. Any Albertan 18

or older who received vaccines out of province is also eligible, provided they have submitted proof of vaccination to AHS and meet all other eligibility criteria.

AIR CANADA EXTENDS DEADLINE OF ITS COVID-19 REFUND POLICY

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise that Air Canada has extended its deadline of its COVID-19 Refund Policy by 30 Days. Eligible customers have until July 12, 2021 to submit a refund request.

The policy allows eligible customers who purchased a non-refundable ticket before

April 13, 2021 for travel on or after February 1, 2020, but who did not fly for any reason, to submit their request for a refund online or with their travel agent.

The policy also applies to Air Canada Vacations packages. Customers who booked through a travel agency must contact their agent directly. In support of its travel agency partners, Air Canada is not recalling agency sales commissions on refunded tickets that they process.

• Should a three-digit number be deployed across Canada at the same time or phased in?

• Should the caller's location information be captured automatically when dialing the three-digit number?

• Should Canadians be able to send text messages directly to the three-digit number?

RCMP REQUEST ASSISTANCE TO IDENTIFY ROBBERY SUSPECT

On June 13th, 2021 at approximately 8:30 a.m., Leduc RCMP responded to a complaint of an Armed Robbery that occurred at the Super Car and RV Wash in Leduc, Alberta.

Leduc RCMP attended the area with the assistance of RCMP Police Dog Services

and RCMP Forensic Identification Services and determined that a lone male entered the store, approached the clerk, brandished a firearm and demanded money. The clerk was not physically injured.

The suspect male left the scene on foot with an undisclosed amount of money.

Extensive patrols were made by Leduc RCMP, but

the suspect was not located. The suspect is described as:

RCMP officers notified Fire services and upon gaining entry to the yard and residence, were told that there were two children trapped inside. RCMP officers attempted to rescue the children; however, due to the extent of the fire re-entry to the residence was not possible.

Breton and Thorsby RCMP attended the scene along with multiple volunteer Fire Services who worked to extinguish the fire.

A search of the structure once the fire was extinguished resulted in locating the two missing children, a 1-year-old male and 4-yearold female–both from Drayton Valley, Alta.

Alberta RCMP Major Crimes Unit, Alberta RCMP General Investigation Section from Alberta RCMP Serious Crimes Branch, RCMP Forensic Identification Section, along with a Fire Investigator attended the scene to assist with this investigation. The RCMP continue to wait for an official report from the fire investigator from the Alberta Office of the Fire Commission.

Breton RCMP's investigation into this fatal fire continues.

For decades, Albertans have watched as their hard-earned tax dollars were seized by Ottawa and redistributed among other provinces under a system of Equalization that has siphoned wealth from our job creators and our provincial treasury. In 2019, Albertans elected a United Conservative government to put an end to the Trudeau-Notley alliance and fight for a fair deal for Alberta. Over the course of the government's mandate legislation the Alberta Parole Board has replaced a federally controlled parole board. Once the details of an agreement are finished Alberta, not Ottawa, will appoint a Chief Firearms Officer and Albertans will soon have the opportunity to start addressing the issue of equalization.

Canada's system of Equalization is fundamentally unfair to Alberta, pulling billions of dollars out of our province even during times of economic recession - and funneling that money into provinces with strong, even booming economies. This includes provinces run by anti-oil politicians who benefit from Alberta's generosity while attacking our economic interests and implementing policies detrimental to our province and our people.

This is why Premier Jason Kenney recently introduced a motion in the Alberta Legislature seeking approval to hold a referendum on whether Albertans think the principle of making Equalization payments should be removed from Canada's Constitution. The motion was debated and passed and areferendum will be held along with the municipal and Senate elections this upcoming fall.

The question facing Albertans in the proposed referendum will be: should section 36(2) of the Constitution Act, 1982–Parliament and the government of Canada's commitment to the principle of making Equalization payments-be removed from the constitution?

If the majority of responses support removing equalization payments, the Alberta government will move forward with pursuing renewed negotiations with the federal government to get a fairer deal for Albertans. In order to make a change to the Constitution, the proposed change must be approved by the federal House of Commons and Senate, and by the legislative assemblies of at least seven provinces, representing at least 50 per cent of the population of all provinces.

Quebec's ability to monopolize the national spotlight and command attention from Ottawa after they held contentious referendums in 1980 and 1995 has demonstrated what can be achieved when people, not politicians, are given the power to decide their future. A referendum on Equalization will be an opportunity for Albertans to be heard and to make a strong statement to Ottawa that Equalization does not work for Alberta.

Albertans are proud of the role our province has played within confederation. With an energy industry that forms the bedrock of our national economy and a competitive business environment unmatched by any other province, we have served as our county's economic engine and a beacon of hope for ambitious Canadians from every region.

Between 2014 and 2019, Albertans made a net contribution of more than \$100 billion to the federal government through transfers to the rest of Canada. Over the past 25 years, Albertans contributed more than \$400 billion. This is hundreds of billions of dollars from Albertans that is filling the treasuries of hostile governments instead of supporting healthcare, education and families right here in Alberta.

Enough is enough. Albertans are demanding a fair deal in confederation and that is what we will secure with a referendum on Equalization.

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise that on

June 9th the Minister of Innovation, Science and Industry, the Premier of Alberta, and the Mayor of Edmonton, announced their governments are working closely with Air Products Canada Ltd. to advance clean energy in Canada and jointly pursue a transformative \$1.3 billion net-zero hydrogen production investment. The clean hydrogen facility would be operational by 2024, a first-mover anchor to secure Canada's early foothold in the global hydrogen market, pending further discussions and a final scope decision from the company.

The Government of Canada and Invest Alberta have each signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the company on potentially supporting the expansion of its hydrogen network and the transition to clean energy. This would involve the company building a new world-scale facility in the Edmonton region to produce clean hydrogen. This project would enable Air Products Canada Ltd. to produce hydrogen-fuelled electricity and provide liquid hydrogen for the growing transportation market, as well as other key industrial sectors.

FIRST NEW TREATMENT FOR ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE APPROVED IN NEARLY TWO DECADES OFFERS HOPE FOR PEOPLE LIVING WITH DEMENTIA

The Alzheimer Society of Canada is hopeful about the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) approval of aducanumab, a new treatment for Alzheimer's disease. This news represents an important step forward for people living with Alzheimer's disease. The FDA requires that Biogen complete an additional clinical trial to verify the drug's benefit. If the trial fails to verify the clinical benefit, the FDA may initiate proceedings to withdraw approval. For aducanumab to be available in Canada, the drug will require regulatory approval by Health Canada to ensure its safety and efficacy. The Alzheimer Society of Canada is urging Health Canada to complete its required reviews swiftly, while maintaining the highest safety standards, so that aducanumab can be made available as quickly as possible to people living with dementia in Canada.

While this approval is encouraging, aducanumab is not suitable for all people at all stages of dementia. The drug may slow the decline in cognitive skills and functional ability in people living with Mild Cognitive Impairment (MCI) or in the early stages of Alzheimer's disease. Aducanumab is reported to work by clearing harmful amyloid beta that builds up in the brain, which is thought to result in Alzheimer's disease.

"Over the next 10 years, we anticipate that more than one million people in Canada will be living with dementia. The approval of aducanumab underscores how investing in research can lead to better treatment options, but the drug is just one treatment," says Dr. Saskia Sivananthan, Chief Science Officer, Alzheimer Society of Canada. "Research for Alzheimer's disease and other dementias is significantly under-funded when compared to other diseases. There is an urgent need to invest in dementia research to provide people living with the disease new and better treatments. Most importantly, research investment is crucial to finding cures for Alzheimer's disease and other dementias."

CANADA GREENER HOMES GRANT

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise the launch of the Canada Greener Homes Grant. This grant will help homeowners in the area make their homes more energy-efficient and lower their energy bills. This will reduce energy waste, create good jobs and foster a green economic recovery.

Up to 700,000 Canadian homeowners are eligible for grants of up to \$5,000 to make energy-efficient upgrades to their homes and up to \$600 to pay for an EnerGuide home energy evaluation, before and after retrofits. Eligible home upgrades include replacing windows and doors, adding insulation, sealing air leaks, improving heating and cooling systems (e.g., heat

pumps), installing smart thermostats and solar panels.

TAKING A STAND AGAINST HATE CRIMES

Alberta's government is targeting hate-motivated crimes and racism with new law enforcement resources and a fresh approach to working with affected communities to ensure Albertans of racialized backgrounds are protected and heard.

A new community liaison on hate crimes will connect directly with ethnic and religious groups and sexual minority communities most targeted by hate-motivated crimes. Working with these groups, the liaison will provide government with a range of perspectives and expertise on how we can tackle hate-motivated crimes and incidents across the prov-ince.

Alberta will also set up a provincial Hate Crimes Coordination Unit. This unit will work with law enforcement to improve and harmonize hate crime mitigation efforts across the province and facilitate training opportunities, intelligence gathering and investigative supports. This includes strengthening the approach to successfully prosecuting individuals charged with hate-motivated crimes.

Both the new liaison position and coordination unit are in the early stages of development. More details will be shared in the coming weeks.
