### EVANSBURG RCMP RESPOND TO FATAL COLLISION WITH A MOOSE

On Aug 10, 2021, shortly before 6 a.m., Evansburg RCMP, AHS ground ambulance, Parkland County Fire Services and STARS air ambulance, all responded to report of a collision on Highway 16 West, at Range Road 55. Preliminary investigation supports the vehicle collided with a moose.

The 21-year-old male driver and sole occupant of the vehicle, sustained life threatening injuries in the collision. He was transported via STARS to an Edmonton-area hospital. The driver succumbed to the injuries and died in hospital. A moose was found deceased a few hundred metres away from the collision.

We are working to gather Albertans' thoughts about coal development. These views will help shape and inform the province's longterm approach to the subject.

Since our appointment in March, mindful of past COVID restrictions, we have been meeting virtually with interested parties and technical experts from across the province. The committee is continuing to meet with individuals and groups that we hope will include expanded engagements with Indigenous interests. We recently undertook informative tours of communities in southwest and central Alberta.

The conversations we've had are wide-ranging. The topics span the ecological impacts of coal mining, responsible resource development, effective regulatory regimes, water quality, fish and wildlife conservation, jobs, economic activity and specific concerns from municipalities, towns and cities.

To date, we have completed 48 engagement sessions and have received approximately 575 individual submissions. As part of our commitment to the process, we hope to hear from as many Albertans as are interested and we reiterate our wish to hear from you. Your views will form valuable input to the committee's recommendations in our final report to the Minister of Energy.

## HELP KIDS LEARN THE GAME OF GOLF

Adults who play golf know just how fun and frustrating the game can be. Whether you're a veteran golfer or someone just learning the links, golf can be challenging.

When your child finds a set of clubs that suits him or her, teach the proper way to swing and consider signing up your son or daughter for lessons. Those first few lessons can prove invaluable, turning a pastime into a passion kids will carry with them throughout their lives.

The governments of Canada and Alberta, through the Canadian Agricultural Partnership, are adjusting the crop insurance program.

Low Yield Allowance is a standard part of the production insurance program, and is meant for situations of extreme heat and severe drought. Alberta is doubling the low yield threshold to allow for additional cereal or pulse crops to be salvaged for livestock feed. For example, the barley crop threshold will be increased from 150 to 300 kg per acre.

Since mid-June, there has been a significant deterioration of crops across the province. Current weather conditions are not improving, and industry expects to see further deterioration in crops. Together with the federal government, Alberta is making an adjustment to crop insurance that will allow farmers to put more poor quality crops towards livestock feed, helping ease feed shortages for livestock during the current drought.

This adjustment encourages producers to act swiftly to salvage crops for livestock feed rather than watch their fields deteriorate further, and risk harvesting nothing. As these crops would otherwise be covered by crop insurance, there will likely be minimal additional payments resulting from this decision.

Under the federal-provincial cost-shared Canadian Agricultural Partnership, there are a number of business risk management programs available through Agriculture Financial Services Corporation (AFSC)

to help Alberta producers manage significant risks that threaten the viability of their farms, including crop insurance.

Alberta's AFSC has a total of 119 active adjustment team members following the addition of 21 new members in December 2020 and April 2021. The government has advised crop adjusters to be flexible and complete early assessments with affected crop and hay land; for example, offering alternative use of crops to address forecasted feed shortages in our livestock industry.

Last week, Alberta, along with Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Ontario, received verbal commitment from the federal government that a joint AgriRecovery program will be initiated to support producers affected by drought conditions prior to a federal election. Assessments are currently underway in these provinces.

Alberta announced a 20 per cent reduction in premium costs for crop, pasture and forage insurance earlier this year which protects against weather-related production loss. As a result:

•Almost 400 additional farmers and ranchers enrolled in crop, pasture and forage insurance.

•Almost 1,400 farmers and ranchers increased their

level of crop, pasture and forage insurance coverage.

•Almost 230 clients re-enrolled in crop, pasture and forage insurance after canceling their subscriptions in 2020 or prior years.

The adjustments to crop insurance add to the steps already taken by the government of Alberta to ensure farmers are supported during this difficult time. Other steps include:

•Formally requesting the federal government initiate an AgriRecovery assessment.

•Asking the federal government to ensure all significantly affected municipalities are included as eligible in the designation for the federal Livestock Tax Deferral provision. This would allow farmers who sell part of their breeding herd due to drought in a prescribed drought region to defer a portion of sale proceeds to the following year.

•Increasing the percentage paid on interim payments under AgriStability.

Making a claim

It is extremely important that before clients put a crop to an alternative use, they talk to their AFSC branch office.

Priority will be given to clients who want to use crops for immediate pasture or clients who want to silage or bale crops.

With the on going hot temperatures and the easing of health restrictions in Alberta, many people are taking to lakes and rivers to cool off and enjoy the outdoors. The Parkland RCMP conducted patrols and boat inspections over this August long weekend in Wabamun Lake, Nakamun Lake, and Lac Ste Anne.

Approximately 175 boats were checked for proper safety equipment, operator cards and to ensure there was no alcohol on board. The following is a break down of what police encountered:

20 warnings were issued for safety equipment violations

10 warnings were issued for persons not have a Pleasure Craft Operator's Card

5 Warnings were given for alcohol on board a pleasure craft and the liquor was seized

5 persons under the age of 16 were warned for operating Personal Water Craft (Seadoo / Waverunner)

2 groups of rafters / boaters were ordered off the lake for numerous safety violations

In addition, the Parkland RCMP performed three rescues consisting of one broken down boater, and two groups of people on floaties and paddle boards who were caught in the wind and unable to get back to shore.

No charges were laid as this was an educational approach to ensure people correct their behaviour on the water, given the high number of drownings in the Province this year. Parkland RCMP are reminding the public that a Pleasure Craft Operators Card is mandatory for operating water craft in Canada, and alcohol is prohibited on pleasure craft. Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta will take additional time to implement its plan to bring the province's COVID-19 response in line with other respiratory viruses.

After closely monitoring COVID-19 in Alberta for the previous two weeks and reviewing emerging evidence from other jurisdictions, the following will continue until Sept.27:

• Mandatory masking orders in publicly accessible transit, taxis and ride-shares.

• Mandatory isolation for 10 days for those with COVID-19 symptoms or a positive test result.

• Testing at assessment centres for any symptomatic individual.

These measures were scheduled to be eased on Aug. 16, however this sixweek pause will provide additional time to monitor severe outcomes of COVID-19 and increase immunization rates.

"It's important that we move forward with decisions based on the best evidence and appropriate caution. I appreciate Dr. Hinshaw's advice to allow more time for us to monitor the situation and help ensure a safe reopening, including a safe return to school. This extra time will help us make a safe transition to living with COVID-19 as we get our communities, our economy, and our health system back to normal." Tyler Shandro,

"Through the pandemic, we have monitored the situation closely and adapted our response as necessary. Reviewing data from Alberta and across the globe in the past few weeks has led me to a point where I feel that a pause on the next changes is the best way forward. I deeply care about, and am committed to, the overall health of all in Alberta. This is why I base my decisions on science and my professional assessment of an ever-changing situation." Recent evidence

Recent data from here in Alberta and other jurisdictions including the U.K. and U.S. shows a wide range of acute care impacts at similar level of vaccination to Alberta's. The uncertainty and potential for larger impacts warrants further caution, although a peak in admissions that would disrupt the health system at provincial level remains extremely unlikely. Health officials will continue to closely monitor hospitalizations and other severe outcomes due to COVID-19 in the province.

Get fully vaccinated

Albertans are encouraged to continue booking appointments for first and second doses to ensure full effectiveness and long-lasting protection. Being fully immunized is the best way to protect yourself and those around you.

Anyone who has not yet booked their vaccine can do so by visiting www.alberta. ca/vaccine to find available appointments with AHS or participating pharmacies across the province. Select locations are offering walkin clinics for first doses.

Alberta is providing an extra incentive to Albertans who are vaccinated through its Open for Summer Lottery. To register and for complete details, visit www. alberta.ca/lottery.

Quick facts

• Changes that took affect on July 29 will continue to be in place. They are:

o Quarantine for close contacts is recommended (previously mandatory).

o Contact tracers are no longer notifying close contacts about exposure to COVID-19. Individuals are asked to tell their close contacts when informed of their positive result. All positive cases will continue to be notified. Contact tracers will continue to investigate cases that are in high-risk settings such as acute and continuing care facilities.

o Outbreak management and identification will focus on high-risk locations, including continuing care and acute care facilities. Community outbreaks with a surge in cases leading to severe outcomes will also be addressed as needed.

o Asymptomatic testing is no longer recommended.
