Is the COVID-19 vaccine safe during pregnancy?

• The COVID-19 vaccine is safe for pregnant individuals and their babies.

• It is much safer to get the vaccine than to get COVID-19 disease.

• You can get the vaccine at any time (any trimester) during pregnancy.

• The mRNA vaccines are the safest type of COVID-19 vaccine to get during your pregnancy.

· The COVID-19 vaccine is also safe, and recommended, for those who are trying to get pregnant.

 The National Advisory Committee on Immunization and the Society of Obstetricians and Gynecologists of Canada recommend that those who are pregnant get a complete series of vaccine.

What are the benefits of getting the COVID-19 vaccine?

· The vaccine prevents illness and lowers your chance of becoming seriously ill from COVID-19.

· Vaccines also lower your chance of you having complications of severe illness, which could result in delivering your baby prematurely if you become very sick.

• Immunization can reduce the spread of the virus to others, including your baby.

Does the vaccine protect my baby from COVID-19?

· Vaccines make your immune system stronger by building antibodies to help prevent disease.

· Vaccination allows immunity to be passed from mother to infant, helping to protect your baby for the first few months of life.

What are the risks of being infected with COVID-19 if I'm pregnant?

• If you're pregnant and have COVID-19:

You're at higher risk of being admitted to hospital and developing complications that need intensive care.

You're more likely to have a premature birth and this may

Fire Prevention Tips To Follow Every Day.

- Keep volatile chemicals, such as fertilizers and turpentine, in labeled containers within a locked storage area separate from your home.
 - Store gasoline in an approved container outside of your home.
- Store matches and lighters in a locked cabinet.
- Keep things that can burn away from your fireplace and always keep a glass or metal screen in front of your fireplace.
- Never leave the kitchen unattended while cooking.

MAKE LIGHTS SPARKLE

As days get shorter and natural light is less abundant, interior lighting becomes ever more important. Chandeliers, pendant lamps, recessed lighting, and tableside lamps are most effective when they are clean. HGTV experts say dirty lights can give off up to 20 percent less light than clean ones. Dirty fixtures also waste energy.

Lighting fixtures that are within reach are easy to tack-



le, but what about those fixtures that hang or have multiple crystals, globes or bulbs? These tips can cut down on the time needed to give lights a thorough cleaning.

Stock up on the right cleaning supplies. Microfiber dusting cloths are smart choices because they can help trap grime and tend to be machine-washable and reusable. Extendable static-charged dusters are another handy item to have around, particularly for fixtures that are hard to reach.

Dust regularly. Dusting regularly can prevent the buildup of grime that's difficult to wash off. Try to dust light fixtures weekly or biweekly. The more frequent the fixtures are dusted, the less time each cleaning session will take. Soft cloths can remove the dust from most bulbs and exterior surfaces. Lamp shades may need more attention. Use a lamb's-wool duster to attract dirt so it doesn't leave a residue on the lampshade.

Deep-clean at table level. Deep-cleaning at table level is more manageable. Remove any glass accents and set them out on a cushioned surface so they do not break. Soft cloths dampened with a vinegar solution should remove most of the dirt on chandelier crystals and the globes or outer glass coverings of other types of fixtures.

Take a photo of the lighting fixture prior to cleaning so you'll know how to replace removed parts correctly once everything is clean and dry.

If you cannot remove a fix-

ture for cleaning, use a sturdy stool, a spray bottle with your cleaning mixture and a soft cloth to wipe away the dirt. Remember to place something absorbent beneath the light to catch any drips. Do not spray liquids directly onto light bulbs; otherwise, you can damage the bulb and the electrical components.

It's best to exercise caution when cleaning lighting fixtures. Turn off the light itself and shut off the circuit breaker to avoid the risk of shock or burns from hot bulbs.

PREPARE

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, as well as inside and outside every sleeping area.

Test smoke alarms monthly, and replace the batteries if needed.

Purchase and learn how to safely use a fire extinguisher.

Create a fire escape plan with your family, reviewing and practicing it twice a year.

Your fire escape plan should include two exit points from every room, as well as a designated outdoor meeting spot.

Make sure everyone in your family knows when and how to call 911 or the fire department.

PREVENT

Turn off portable heaters whenever you leave a room or go to sleep.

Keep matches and lighters out of reach from children, and make sure they know never to play with these items.

Replace or repair loose plugs, exposed wiring or frayed extension cords, and avoid overloading outlets and extension cords.

Keep any items that can catch fire at least three feet away from cooking and heating devices.

Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Always turn off the stove if you leave the kitchen even for a brief period of time.

STAY ALIVE

In the event of a fire, yell "Fire" repeatedly and evacuate immediately. Once outside, call 911 and never reenter a burning building for any reason.

If a door or door handle feels warm to the touch, do not open it. Use an alternate escape route.

If you must walk through smoke, get as close to the ground as possible to escape under the smoke, closing doors behind you.

If your clothing catches fire, always remember to stop, drop and roll, covering your face with your hands.

If you can't escape a room, close the door and cover vents and door cracks with a towel or cloth to keep out smoke. Signal for help at the window with a piece of cloth or a flashlight.

"Stay Fire Smart! Don't Get Burned®"

Make sure you are aware of potential fire hazards in your home and take measures to reduce risks in these areas. Installing adequate smoke alarms is a necessary precaution. Check smoke alarms often. Practice a fire escape plan with your family and practice it regularly.

AS FIRE PREVENTION WEEK APPROACHES, THE SPRUCE GROVE FIRE DEPARTMENT REMINDS RESIDENTS TO "LEARN THE SOUNDS OF FIRE SAFETY"

September 23, 2021 - The Spruce Grove Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®-the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years-to promote this year's Fire Prevention WeekTM campaign, "Learn the Sounds of Fire SafetyTM." This year's campaign, October 3rd - 9th, works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe.

The Spruce Grove Fire Department encourages all residents to embrace the 2021 Fire Prevention Week theme.

"It's important to learn the different sounds of smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. When an alarm makes noise–a beeping sound or a chirping sound–you must take action!" said Jeffrey Francis, Fire Prevention Officer. "Make sure everyone in the home understands the sounds of the alarms and knows how to respond. To learn the sounds of your specific smoke and carbon monoxide alarms, check the manufacturer's instructions that came in the box, or search the brand and model online."

The Spruce Grove Fire Department wants to share safety tips to help you "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety"

• A continuous set of three loud beeps-beep, beep, beep, beep-means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.

• A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.

• All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.

 Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.
 Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.
