Government of Alberta, Education Minister, Not Responding As Alberta School Bus Contractors Are Forced To Shut Down Operations

Keeping buses on the road for safe delivery of children should be a high priority across Alberta, but repeated attempts to contact the Alberta government and, in particular, Minister of Education Adriana LaGrange, have resulted in little to no action.

“Alberta School Bus Contractors are facing a major crisis,” said Mark Critch, President of the Alberta School Bus Contractors’ Association, “There are immediate and urgent issues that must be addressed for school bus contractors to continue with their mandate of carrying students to their schools. Without the

continued flow of adequate funding, carriers will have no choice but to lay off drivers, maintenance staff and administrative staff and in turn shut their operations down.”

At issue is a 358% increase in insurance rates for small contracted bus operators, which was implemented in November 2020. The increase in rates is out of the bus contractors’ control, as it occurred mid-year in the contracts. The cost of the insurance jumped from \$1,300 per bus to \$4,300 per bus. Obviously, a high percentage of contractors conducting this highly important but low-paid work do not have the funds to cover this increase.

An increase of this magni-

tude is affecting all contractors in the province, especially the small to medium size operators. They are in dire need of a solution to this issue, immediately. Without support, children will not have reliable transportation to and from school.

Other issues at hand exacerbate the crisis:

- School divisions do not cover all pandemic-related costs. Drivers required to be in isolation due to close contact with a COVID-19-pos-

itive student must have their immediate wages covered. Otherwise, it is unlikely that they will return to the job.

- Due to the pandemic, there are no field or charter trips as an additional revenue source, which previously helped offset indirect costs.

Up to this point, nothing has been done to assist the bus contractors. This must change immediately in order to preserve this vital transportation service for Alberta’s children.

Keep An Eye Out For County Roadside Crews

Safety is a priority for all County employees. A few close calls due to speed or carelessness have been reported. The County asks that motorists slow down and drive respectfully when encountering tractor mowers near the

shoulder of busy roadways.

Winter Transfer Station Hours

Switchover occurs November 1 at all facilities.

The County provides eight waste transfer sites and one regional landfill for use by County residents. These facilities will switch over to winter hours beginning November 1.

Winter hours will remain in effect until March 31, 2022. To view both winter and summer schedules, please visit LSAC.ca/landfill.

Please note that during statutory holidays, the

eight transfer sites will observe regular hours, but the main landfill will be closed.

Snowplow Flag Program To Begin

Get the County to clear your driveway this winter.

The County's Public Works department helps property owners clear snow from their private driveways through its annual Snowplow Flag Program.

To take advantage of this service, snowplow flags must be purchased in advance. The cost of \$25 per flag/per clearing covers plowing

from the road to the residence only. One flag will be used each time snow removal is requested.

COVID-19 SUPPORT MEASURES

Gerald Soroka Member of Parliament for Yellowhead wishes to advise that the Government of Canada has announced the Canada Recovery Benefit (CRB) will end on October 23, 2021. It will be replaced by a Canadian Worker Lockdown Benefit that will provide \$300 per week to workers whose work interruption is caused by a government-imposed public health lockdown.

Also, the Emergency Wage Subsidy and the Canada Emergency Rent Subsidy will be modified and renamed into new programs, the Tourism and Hospitality Recovery Program and the Hardest-Hit Business Recovery Program, under existing authority until November 20, 2021. The government will introduce legislation to extend those programs until May 7, 2022.

NEW AREA CODE 368 IN ALBERTA

Starting April 23, 2022, an additional area code will be introduced in Alberta currently served by area codes 403, 587, 780 and 825. The introduction of the new area code 368 is the result of a decision by the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) and is intended to meet the continuously growing demand for new telephone numbers.

“The introduction of a new area code creates millions of addition-

al telephone numbers without affecting the existing numbers,” said Kelly T. Walsh, Program Manager of the Canadian Numbering Administrator. “The new area code 368 will be added to the current area codes already in use in Alberta.”

The new area code will be introduced gradually across the province starting on April 23, 2022. After this date, consumers and businesses requesting a new phone number may receive one with the new area code. Numbers with the new 368 area code will only be assigned to custom-

ers once there is no longer a sufficient supply of numbers with the existing area codes – 403, 587, 780 and 825.

The introduction of a new area code in a region does not affect the geographic boundaries for local calling areas or the way long distance calls are dialed. Special numbers such as 211, 311, 411, 611 and 911 will not be affected and will still be dialed using only three digits.

Background information

The first area code in Alberta, 403, was introduced in 1947. In 1999,

the additional area code 780 was introduced to serve the Northern Alberta (Edmonton), while 403 code was retained for Southern Alberta (Calgary). Over the years, increasing demand for telephone number – particularly for wireless services – created a need for additional numbers to serve customers in the province. In response to this increasing demand, the area code 587 was added in 2008 and the area code 825 was introduced in 2016.



HOW TO HANDLE CAR TROUBLE WHILE DRIVING

Sudden car trouble is something no driver wants to experience, but many a driver has been driving down the highway only to feel his or her vehicle start to sputter. Such sputtering might indicate a car is running low on fuel, or it could be a sign of something more serious that requires motorists to think as quickly and safely as possible.

Always keep a jack and spare tire in your car, even if the spare is a donut you can temporarily use to replace a flat tire until you make it to a filling station or automotive supply store. As an added safety measure, keep a fully stocked first aid kit in your vehicle in case you cut yourself while changing the tire or need to address another med-

ical situation. Visit www.redcross.org for a list of items to include in your automotive emergency kit. Keep a blanket in the trunk as well so your passengers can stay warm should you experience car trouble on a cold day or night.

- Make note of your surroundings. Some car troubles can only be fixed by the professionals, so pay careful attention to your surroundings in case an issue arises and forces you to pull over and call for help.

Always pay attention to mile markers and any landmarks that might help you describe where you are. Car troubles can strike at any time and anywhere, so be sure to pay special attention to your surroundings when driving in unfamiliar areas.

- Pull over. Don't panic if an issue arises suddenly. Remain calm and pull over onto the shoulder. The right shoulder is the area for pulling

over on most roads, but you may also use the left shoulder on multilane highways with medians. Try to get as far away from traffic as possible without driving off of level ground, and always use your signals when pulling onto the shoulder. If the vehicle can't make it to the median, put your emergency flashers on and get out of the car, moving away from both the vehicle and traffic. Immediately call for emergency roadside assistance, alerting the authorities if need be.

- Use flares or tri-

angles to alert other drivers. So long as you are not risking your well-being, you can place flares and/or warning triangles behind your vehicle so oncoming traffic knows to drive around it. The popular not-for-profit motor club AAA recommends placing the first flare or triangle 10 feet directly behind the side of the vehicle that is closest to the road. The second should be placed between 30 and 60 feet (increase the distances as the posted speed limit increases) behind the middle of the

bumper, while the third flare or triangle should be placed between 120 and 360 feet behind the vehicle's right side.

- Stay with the vehicle. Once you have called for help and set up flares or triangles, stay with the vehicle, though do so at a safe enough distance so you are not in harm's way.

- Sudden car troubles can be scary, but drivers who approach such issues calmly and quickly can reduce their risk for accident or injury.

ALBERTA'S GOVERNMENT IS STRENGTHENING HEALTH MEASURES FOR CONTINUING CARE FACILITIES TO HELP PROTECT VULNERABLE ALBERTANS FROM COVID-19

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Thanks to vaccines, COVID-19 outbreaks in continuing care facilities have been smaller and fewer COVID-related deaths have been reported than in previous waves. However, residents in these facilities remain uniquely vulnerable to severe outcomes, including hospitalization and death.

Effective Oct. 25, masking will be required for visitors at continuing care facilities at all times and residents will be required to quarantine after being admitted to the facility or returning from hospital until they test negative for COVID-19.

Health officials are strongly encouraging unvaccinated family and friends to not visit residents in person at this time. Facility operators are also able to implement

additional rules, such as requiring proof of vaccination, as appropriate.

"Protecting vulnerable Albertans is always our top priority. Even with remarkably effective vaccines, residents in these facilities remain at risk, which is why we are increasing the protection around them. We will continue doing whatever it takes to protect vulnerable Albertans and slow the spread of COVID-19." Jason Kenney, Premier

"By protecting continuing care facilities, we are protecting our health-care system and our entire community. These measures will make residents safer while still supporting their quality of life during this difficult time. I continue to call on all Albertans to get fully vaccinated as soon as possible to protect our most vulnerable friends and neighbours." Jason Copping, Minister of

Health

"These changes are necessary as we closely monitor the spread of COVID-19 in our province. We continue to balance the need to protect residents and staff from COVID-19 with ensuring that these residents enjoy a meaningful quality of life. We will continue watching closely and adapt these measures as needed in the months ahead." Dr. Deena Hinshaw, chief medical officer of health

Starting Oct. 25, all visitors must wear masks in all indoor areas of all continuing care facilities, including while in residents' rooms. Masking is mandatory for all visitors regardless of vaccination status. Residents are not required to be masked at this time.

The only exception to this mandatory masking measure will be in cases where there are communication

challenges with residents who may be hard of hearing or have dementia. Any exceptions will be determined by the facility staff.

In addition, all residents who are transferring to a continuing care facility from hospital or returning from a hospital stay longer than 24 hours must stay in quarantine until they test negative for COVID-19. A PCR test must be used, with testing conducted by Alberta Health Services.

Facility operators have the authority to implement additional COVID-19 measures in their facilities, after consulting with residents and their families. This includes actions such as requiring visitors to show proof of vaccination or undergo rapid testing.

CENTRAL ALBERTA DISTRICT CRIME REDUCTION UNIT MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL INVESTIGATION RESULTS IN 6 PERSONS FACING OVER 90 CHARGES

Central Alberta District Crime Reduction Unit (CAD CRU) successfully completed a complex multi-jurisdictional investigation that targeted repeat offenders throughout central Alberta.

In September 2021, CAD CRU initiated an investigation into a steady increase of theft of motor vehicles, break and enters, other property related crimes, as well as a high number of

flight from police incidents throughout the rural areas of Rocky Mountain House, Rimbey, Breton, Thorsby and Drayton Valley RCMP Detachment areas.

Through investigation, a small group of individuals were identified to be responsible for a significant number of these offences. In partnership with Alberta RCMP Air Services; Alberta RCMP Police Dog Service; Alberta RCMP Auto Theft Unit; Western Alberta District Rural Crime Reduction

Unit; Rimbey, Breton and Thorsby Detachments; CAD CRU arrested 5 individuals who face a combined total of 98 charges.

- Fraudulent concealment
- Possession of a prohibited weapon
- Careless use of a firearm
- Possession of a controlled substance

Trevor McKay was brought before a Justice of the Peace who released him to appear in Breton Provincial Court on Nov. 10, 2021.

Shannon McKay, Terry McKay, Bradley McKay and Burgundy Reeves were released from police custody on an Undertaking to attend Breton Provincial Court on Nov. 10, 2021.


