

SNOW CLEARING AND SEASONAL MAINTENANCE SERVICES

The WILD Water Commission operates a potable water transmission line and truck fill network in the greater Lac Ste. Anne County – Parkland County service area. The service network includes several stations (truck fills and booster stations) spanning from the Stony Plain area west along Highway 16 and north along Highway 43, with ultimate reach to the communities of Entwistle in the west, and as far north as Rich Valley. The Commission is organized as a regional services commission with a Board of Directors derived from our member municipalities and partners, and an independent internal Administration.

As part of our ongoing system operation, the Commission requires a contractor to undertake the regular (and required) snow removal and seasonal site maintenance of the existing truck fill and booster locations throughout the network. Interested parties are invited to submit proposals considerate of the following:

I. Service shall be inclusive of all system stations (12 locations, full list provided on request);
II. Service shall be inclusive of the core services:

a. Snow clearing within 24 hours of any single or cumulative 7.5cm (3") of accumulation,

 Sanding of locations following each snow clearing, or as otherwise required/requested at the direction of the Commission,

c. Filling local sandboxes at each station, as required/requested by the Commission;

III. Service shall be performed by a fully licenced and insured contractor (proof of same to be submitted with proposals);

IV. Service shall be proposed as seasonal (October through April, annually) and may be offered as a multiyear engagement, subject to annual review by the parties;

V. Service shall be proposed based on an expectation of 12 – 15 hours per occurrence (snow clearing event), with an hourly rate for additional required or requested works;

VI.The proposed start date for this service is January 1st, 2022 but could be earlier on agreement of the parties;

VII. Payment arrangements are to be as invoiced, paid by cheque and due payable not less than 30 days from date of invoice.

PARKLAND RCMP INVESTIGATE **ROBBERY IN STONY PLAIN**

On Nov. 7 at approximately 11:00 AM Parkland RCMP were dispatched to a report of an armed robbery at the North Central Co-Op Pharmacy in Stony Plain. Parkland RCMP members responded to the area very quickly however, the suspect had already fled. The female suspect in this case passed a hand written note to the pharmacist indicating that she had a gun and demanded OxyContin pills. Although a gun was not displayed, the suspect appeared to have something in her pocket that looked like a gun.

While investigating the first robbery, the suspect vehicle was found in a nearby shopping mall parking lot. Parkland RCMP then received a dispatch to another robbery at the Rexall Drugs in Stony Plain at approximately 11:20 AM. As Police were in the parking lot, they quickly located the female suspect as she exited the store. The female suspect appeared to be the same person from the robbery at the Co-Op Pharmacy. She was taken into custody without incident and no one was injured. In this robbery, the female had also indicated she had a gun and demanded Oxycodone.

PARKLAND RCMP INVESTIGATE ROBBERY IN PARKLAND COUNTY

On Nov. 7 at approximately 1:50 AM, Parkland RCMP received a report from a male who had been robbed at gun point in the area of Township Road 270 and Range Road 515. The sus-

pects had pointed a gun at the caller, took his wallet, cell phone, and a small amount of marijuana before fleeing.

RCMP Capital West Traffic members responded to the area with Parkland Detachment members and the suspect vehicle was located. RCMP attempted to stop the vehicle, but it fled and a pursuit was initiated. As the vehicle travelled into Edmonton, Alta., the pursuit was taken over by Edmonton City Police helicopter, Air 1.

Edmonton Police were able to arrest the suspects a short time later at a car wash on 162 St and 118 Ave without incident. Parkland RCMP recovered a sawed-off shotgun, an air-soft pistol, and other items involved in the incident.

Four people were arrested in connection with the robbery with only two being charged as follows:

Caleb Marks(30) - Robbery x1 and Fail to Comply with Court ordered conditions x 4

Keegan Power(20) - Rob-

bery x 1, Operation (of Conveyance) While Prohibited x 1, Fail to Comply with a Probation Order x 2 and Flight from Police x 1

Marks and Power were remanded into custody. Both are set to appear in Stony Plain Provincial Court on Nov. 10, 2021. The other two suspects were released without charges and the investigation is ongoing.

The victim in this case was known to the offenders and is believed to be an isolated incident. The victim sustained minor injuries during the altercation.



COVID-19 UPDATE FOR WHITECOURT

Submitted by Town of Whitecourt

Effective today throughout Alberta, only vaccine records that include a QR code will be accepted at businesses and venues that have implemented the Restrictions Exemption Program. Previous provincial immunization records without a QR code will no longer be accepted as proof of vaccination.

Individuals can download or print their secure QR code proof of vaccination at alberta.ca/COVIDRecords.

Businesses and venues participating in the Restrictions Exemption Program can download the Alberta Covid Records Verifier app from Apple and Google App stores.

Allan & Jean Millar Centre
• As the Allan & Jean Millar Centre has implemented the Restrictions Exemption

Program, users and sport spectators at the facility that are 18 years and older are required to provide:

- QR Code Vaccination Record, or
- Documentation of medical exemption for those with a vaccine exemption,
- Proof of a recent (within the previous 72 hours) privately paid for negative COVID-19 test.
- For those 17 years old and younger, proof of vaccination is not required when participating in recreational organized sports or school activities (i.e. minor soccer).
- Those 11 and under will not need to provide proof of immunization or a negative test to enter the facility.
- · Individuals 12 years and

older that are attending the facility as spectators will be required to show proof of vaccination or provide proof of a recent negative COVID-19 test.

Scott Safety Centre

• Spectator attendance is restricted to 1/3 fire code capacity. Attendees are limited to a single household or two close contacts if living along, and must be masked and maintain 2 me-

tres physical distancing.

• For those 18 years and over participating in hockey, shinney and public skating, the Restrictions Exemption Program applies.

Other Public Facilities

• The Forest Interpretive Centre and Whitecourt Public Library remain open at 1/3 capacity. Masks and 2 metres physical distancing are required.

Vaccination Program ex-

panded to include Johnson & Johnson Vaccine

Albertans 18 years and older can now book appointments to receive the Janssen (Johnson & Johnson) COVID-19 vaccine by calling 811. Due to limited supply, the Janssen vaccine will only be administered at Alberta Health Services (AHS) clinics in select locations across the province.

GET FULLY PROTECTED.

YOU NEED BOTH INFLUENZA AND COVID-19 VACCINES.

Children under five years of age and their households can get their influenza vaccine at an AHS clinic. Appointments are required.

All other Albertans can get their flu shot from a participating pharmacy or doctor's office.

CHILDREN AGED 5-11 NOW ELIGIBLE FOR COVID-19 VACCINE

Children aged five to 11 years old will soon have the opportunity to get protected from COVID-19.

Alberta's government welcomes the news that Health Canada has approved the Pfizer vaccine for children aged five to 11. Vaccines are expected to arrive in the province the week of Nov. 22.

Provided supply is delivered as expected, Alberta plans to begin adminis-

tration by late next week. More information regarding bookings and appointments will be shared once they are available.

Currently, parents and guardians can pre-register their children in the Alberta parents Vaccine Booking system to be ready when appointments

open.
"While children are at a significantly lower risk of severe outcomes from COVID-19, they can still get infected with the virus and transmit it to others. This is

especially important as we head into the winter season and are largely gathering indoors. As parents consider this choice for their children, please consult reliable information sources and consider the benefits not just for our children but for those around them as well."

Restrictions Exemption Program

Children under 12 will continue to have access to businesses and venues participating in the Restrictions Exemption Program, regardless of their vaccination sta-


The Restrictions Exemption Program has been working well with these younger children being able to access facilities with their parents or guardians who are able to meet the program requirements, or participating in youth activities while following current public health measures.

Quick facts

- Pfizer-BioNTech's Comirnaty COVID-19 vaccine is the only vaccine approved for use in children aged five to 11 in Canada.
- · Health Canada approved the Pfizer vaccine for children aged five to 11 on Nov. 19. It has also been approved for use in the U.S.
- More than 390,000 Albertans aged five to 11 will be eligible for the COVID-19 vaccine.
- To date in Alberta: o For children aged five to 11, there have been about 30,700 cases of COVID-19 diagnosed since March of 2020, with 78 of those cases ending up in hospital and 20 in intensive care.

COVID-19 in children

- Children under 12 years of age have the highest rate of new cases in Canada.
- · Most cases in children are milder than adults but some kids can get very sick, have long-lasting symptoms or complications such as multisystem inflammatory syndrome in children (MIS-C).
- Children can spread the virus even if they don't have symptoms, potentially exposing vulnerable friends, family or community members.
- Each person infected with COVID-19 provides a chance for the virus to mutate and become more resistant to treatments or vaccines. Fewer infections means less chance of dangerous variants.
- •The Canadian Pediatric Society recommends eligible children be vaccinated. While kids have a lower risk of severe illness, vaccines offer the best protection from getting or spreading COVID-19.

Things said in "Polite Company"

Years ago, my grandma Getson married an air force corporal whom she met at a local dance. Together, they moved from a comfortable home in Pincher Creek up into the middle of nowhere on the west side of Chip Lake – this was around the end of the war. She and Grandpa farmed. They were very engaged in the community and raised 5 kids.

As I reflect on some of the traditions Grandma carried with her, the things she passed onto us farm kids make a lot more sense now, as an adult and especially as an MLA. When we spent time with Grandma, it was often teatime. It had to be with milk and a biscuit or cookie of sorts. We had polite conversation over tea and took the time to enjoy each other's company. A little later in life, when we were nearing our teens, with a few other cousins around at the time, the conversations would start to stray (as teenagers do from time to time) and Grandma always corrected us. In polite and proper company, there were three items we weren't to discuss: sex, religion, and politics. It's a lesson that has come back to served me well over the years, and honestly, I think we could use a bit of that from time to time today in the age of social media.

I have strong ideals regarding personal rights and freedoms, as well as what is polite, proper, and personal. I believe that freedoms come with responsibility to others, so that our personal rights do not trample the rights of others, especially when it comes to the minority. These beliefs I hold to

like a "golden rule" of sorts, and all the more now that I'm part of the process for writing laws. As an example, I greatly appreciate the freedom to ride a motorcycle, fly an airplane, own firearms, travel within the country and to foreign countries, and gather privately with friends and family, or go out to public events. I appreciate the freedom of knowing my personal information was just that - personal and confidential - and that polite people didn't ask things of others personal nature (unless they brought it up first).

In the present state of Alberta, and Canada as a whole, I am challenged with the decisions that I have been part of. These decisions to limit the personal freedoms and choices of Albertans. I never contemplated these suspensions of our normal lives would have been for this long and am doing everything I can to ensure that message of returning to normal is heard loud and clear. To put the Genie back in the bottle as it were. and I was asked to sit on an advisory committee by the Minister of Health, which ensures that your voices are being heard.

In regard to my personal freedoms, they are even more restricted than my constituents, not less. This is the first time in my life I've ever needed to obtain "permission" to travel to another province (for personal or my own private business) and have not left the province in nearly 2 years now, and quite honestly, I'm getting more than a little stir crazy.

I've always believed I'm accountable for my own actions. That's a basic conservative value, and a value long held by most people in this part of the country. Today though, people are being

held accountable for things that others may have said or done in which they had no part. This is the case, for example, I find myself having to defend allegations others have made in social media posts and news reports. Under normal circumstances, in situations where an allegation, slander, or a defamation of character has been made, there is also recourse. As an MLA however, I'm simply expected to endure. "The normal rules do not apply", and "you signed up for this" are many of the replies I received when trying to address these situations. Polite Rules do not apply, nor does many of the standard laws...a grey area apparently is now accepted by the public, when it comes to public figures.

Regarding mandatory vaccinations for Covid 19, you've probably already heard that Bill 66 removed the ability for the provincial government to implement a mandatory policy – something which had been allowed under the Health Emergencies Act for a long time.

Bill 66 or not, we're in a situation now where businesses are discriminating service based on health history. People are being asked to provide their personal health information. This has been a lengthily walk on a very fine line of what is proper in my opinion. It's also calling into question how Canada's constitution was meant to operate in the first place.

Now in special circumstances, such as war, or a health emergency, normal freedoms can sometimes be suspended to meet extraordinary needs.

For someone whom I have never met to ask me for my personal health information - someone who has no reason to ask in the way of providing a service or interface, I will decline to let them know every single time. Polite people do not ask personal information, unless it is brought up by the other party, or unless it is of real consequence, in this case, for public health. Because of this, apparently, I am "sending the wrong messaging to the public as an MLA" and some have said I "should know better".

In our polite society, some people feel compelled, encouraged, and even vindicated when asking others personal health information. In my observation, this has led to some very concerning behaviors, and has only gone to further exacerbate the tense situation we're in, causing further mental and physical stress on our friends, neighbors, and relatives.

I have had constituents tell me the best jurisdiction in the world for covid management policy was China. When asking for clarification (whether or not they're asking me to push for policy like that of a communist country) they became offended. I have had constituents say there needs to be more unity among us, but then state they think unvaccinated people should have to pay their own healthcare costs out of pocket. When I asked if that meant they were in favor of Alberta having a public and a private healthcare system running in tandem, they became offended. When I asked if it were fair if when we looked at the comorbidity items that are posted by AHS, if we should have people with high blood pressure, heart disease, renal issues,

...diabetes, and who were over the age of 70 pay for their service, they figured I was confusing the issue.

I've been challenged for not disclosing my personal health information and categorized because of the stock I put into personal freedoms.

The fact is I have maintained all along that, based on readily available statistics from AHS, on risk factors, on dialogue with your personal doctor, and on your beliefs, your decision about what is right by your conscience and for your family belongs to you. I support your decision. I will not prejudice your decision.

I still believe in the rights and freedoms of individuals. I believe in minimal interference from governments in the way people live their lives. In special circumstances, the suspension of some freedoms can be warranted. However, that needs to be in context of the event, especially the duration of the event. Life has to be normal again at some point.

When I look over the border to the south, with the limited restrictions in place and the ability to now cross the land border, I have to wonder if we as Canadians got it right. If our freedoms are being held back merely due to a flawed system, we've been too proud to examine of for years. I have to wonder if our scramble to turn on one and other and bicker right now isn't just a distraction from fixing the real issue.

The issue that I see is that in this prolonged state of public emergency (which in no small part is due to hospital capacity for normal needs, plus addiction related items, plus covid) our healthcare system failed to provide the necessary resources to meet demand. This isn't a question of money – Alberta spends more on healthcare than the entire country's defense budget. This isn't a question about the dedication of frontline medical staff like nurses and doctors, who have been on the brink for years. This is a failure in management. AHS leadership failed to identify internal issues and adapt to the current situation - a situation we've been in for nearly two years.

In the meantime, please take a moment to pause, respect each other, and understand that people are not going out of their way to cause you harm, or duress, whatever side of the debate you may be on. People are doing what they think is right. Ultimately, the variant we are experiencing will make its way through the population. We have to protect the most vulnerable from serous health complications at this time, and my concern is will the system be there to manage it? Will the system still be able to function for all the other non-covid related items? Will the people themselves make the right decisions to do what they can to drive down demand by altering their lives and taking reasonable precautions so that when someone really needs that ICU bed, that it is there for them.
