PROVIDING RELIEF FOR FUEL AND UTILITY COSTS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Albertans will see lower fuel and utility bills through action to address rising costs.

Alberta's government will stop the collection of the provincial fuel tax to offer Albertans relief from current high fuel prices. Currently, Albertans pay 13 cents per litre in fuel tax. This change will come into effect April 1. The federal carbon tax rate on gasoline is set to increase again on April 1, from just under nine cents per litre to just over 11 cents per litre.

"We've heard Albertans' concerns about the rising cost of living loud and clear. While the federal government is set to increase the carbon tax April 1, Alberta's government is taking the opposite approach and stepping up to offer relief. Stopping the provincial fuel tax puts money back in the pockets of Albertans when they need it most."

Jason Kenney, Premier "Many Albertans expressed

concerns about increasing prices on everyday goods when I consulted with them ahead of this year's budget. The best thing government can do during inflationary times is to spend less,

.... borrow less and tax less. That's why today we are introducing new measures to help with the cost of fuel by reducing the provincial fuel tax, providing much-needed relief to everyday Albertans."

Travis Toews, President of Treasury Board and Minister of Finance

Alberta's government will

also provide \$150 electricity rebates to help Albertans pay for the high bills they faced this winter. More than one million homes, farms and businesses are expected to receive a \$50 monthly rebate for three months. These retroactive rebates will help defray the high costs that many families and businesses paid in recent months.

Alberta's government will

work with utilities and regulators to determine exact details, including rebate timing. This includes working to have the rebates applied directly to consumers' bills.

This rebate will combine with the Natural Gas Rebate program announced in Budget 2022 to provide real relief for Albertans.

and in part due to punishing policies from the former provincial government and the federal government. As our government works hard to responsibly manage system costs, we are also working tirelessly to increase generation investments to bring new supply on to the market. As this long-term work continues, a rebate to help offset these costs for Alberta families and small businesses will help provide support when they need it most."

Collection of the fuel tax will be paused for:

• gasoline – \$0.13 per litre

• diesel – \$0.13 per litre

• marked gasoline and marked diesel – \$0.04

Because the GST also applies to provincial fuel taxes, the 13-cent reduction will also reduce the GST by 0.65 cents per litre, for total tax savings of about 13.6 cents per litre of gasoline and diesel.

The government will review the collection of the fuel tax on a quarterly basis and, if required, consider reinstating collection in stages, based on the average price of West Texas Intermediate (WTI) over a number of weeks. The government will not start to reinstate collection before July 1.

Alberta's fuel tax is reported and remitted by refiners and large wholesalers and included in the price Albertans pay at the pump. The government will provide information for stakeholders, including fuel retailers, on the fuel tax pause.

PURSUANT TO SECTION 692 OF THE MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT ACT, BEING CHAPTER M 26 R.S.A. 2000 AND AMENDMENTS THERETO:

Notice is hereby given that all Public Hearings will begin at 9:30 a.m. on March 8, 2022, in the Council Chambers of the Yellowhead County Administration Building located at 2716 1st Avenue, Edson, Alberta.

The purpose of this hearing is to allow persons to make known their views with respect to the proposed Administrative Amendment to Bylaw 03.17 being a document entitled "Edson Intermunicipal Development Plan" dated August 2017.

As per the following:

The suggested amendments are as follows: 1. Due to the condensing of a number of Land Use Districts, the six land use districts mentioned on page 11 Section 3.5, have been amalgamated into a new district. This new district has been mentioned in general terms consistent with best management practices for relating Statutory Plans (IDPs) to Lands Use Bylaws. 2. On page 12 Section 3.8, there is a specific reference to a district which existed in Yellowhead County's previous Land Use Bylaw. As per the above approach, the new intended land use is being referenced generally. 3. The opening sentence of Section 3.10 includes a reference to the "Rural Land Use District" of the former Yellowhead County Land Use Bylaw. Due to the comprehensiveness of the current second paragraph of the section, it is recommended the initial sentence simply be removed. 4. Page 15 Section 4.4.1 makes specific reference to a district contained within the form Land Use Bylaw, that being the "Rural Industrial District". The proposed amendment's intent is to refer generally to land designated as "Industrial" on Map 8.

All written submissions will become public information upon receipt by the Yellowhead County Council. Copies of Bylaw No. 03.17 are available for public inspection during regular office hours from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday at the Yellowhead County office located at 2716 1st Avenue, Edson, Alberta. There is an old saving that many have heard over the vears, "Use it or lose it". Now, I have to admit, when I hear that saying what initially comes to my mind in the past was regarding physical activity, and mental acuity. If you don't work the brain, pushing it, learning something new, then we start to lose the ability to rapidly absorb information and develop new skills. Physical exercise is similar, weight training and my nemesis, cardio.

I had never really considered the dangers that "Democratic Atrophy" could have on our province, or our country until the last several months, with February 14 being the crescendo. When the emergency act (war measures) was so easily invoked, and then later passed in the house of commons, it made me shudder. How could such a heavy piece of legislation suspending rights and freedoms so easily be used, for which it was so obviously never intended.

I find it ironic that we fight for the rights and democratic freedoms of others abroad to have this happen at home because we really don't use the system that we have in place. We are suffering from Democratic Atrophy, caused by Democratic Complacency.

I decided to jump in 4 years ago now to find out how to be part of the solution, rather than being frustrated by the problems. I found out how the system works and wanted to help by being a voice at the table, rather than shouting outside from across the street. I'll share with you how you can feel less frustrated, have a more powerful voice, and to have a real impact on the direction that the decision makers are making. If this sounds like a bit of a late night infomercial, it's for effect, but instead of having the thigh master laying around, you just may have a membership card in your pocket at the end of this article.

Here are the steps, to get your democratic muscle back.

1. Buy a membership to a political party (one at a provincial and federal level to start)

2. Keep informed of what is going on not only in the media but the party. Constituency / Riding associations. Honestly, they can be fun, and we need to make them that way again. It should be about engaging with the community and helping out where we can.

3. Help pick your candidates to run in the next election. Typically, this is a nomination race. If you want your vote to

really have an impact, this is the place. Most races are low volumes of overall votes...2000 or less. So, 1/2000 is a big deal compared to 1/50,000 for the provincial election. When you do a good job of picking your candidate's, then you have a far better chance for Democratic Representation.

4. Take part in leadership reviews, and leadership races. These are the folks in our Canadian system that end up in the top positions of power and are the ones who pick their cabinet ministers to form government. When you realize how few people vote in the leadership races, or leadership reviews, it's astounding. Small groups of people are choosing who can make the decisions for the province or the country for the next 5 years. Leadership reviews are a big deal, and should be treated as such, but you must play to have a say.

5. Keep engaged, hold your representatives accountable, and offer good advice. When the system is functioning properly, it is with real engagement. It may make you feel better to just cast stones from behind the keyboard, but that only really goes so far. As corny as it sounds, it's a team effort.

When we flex our democratic muscle everyone wins, when we don't, we end up where we are at today. It's awfully hard to make a change when somebody else picked the person driving the bus. There are mechanisms along the way however that do allow you to influence, or swap out the driver, but you must have your ticket, be sitting in the first few rows, to be able to give feedback.

Just imagine if we had picked a different PM as a country, do you really think Stephen Harper as an example would have pulled out the emergency act, rather than talking with the organizers of the convoy, or even had taken us down this path in the first place? What would our energy policy look like, do you think Europe would have been so dependent on Russia right now, or would we as Canada been meeting that need, and have in a peaceful way contributed to mitigating conflict by supplying energy demand.

Your voice and vote matter, you must flex your democratic muscle, and you have to know where and when you can use it to have the most impact. So please, get off the bench, and get into the game, we need each other to make our communities, and our province a better place.





MAKE YOUR VEHICLE LESS VULNERABLE TO THEFT

Vehicle theft is something few people imagine happening to them. Until it does. While many motorists may think technology has done wonders to curb vehicle theft, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration notes that a motor vehicle is stolen every 46 seconds in the United States.

Auto theft is sometimes mistaken as a victimless crime. After all, insured motorists are typically reimbursed for stolen vehicles, and drivers whose cars are returned after being stolen can simply

submit a claim to have any damages paid for by their insurers. But this characterization of auto theft is untrue. as all motorists, whether their car's been stolen or not, pay for auto theft. The Insurance Bureau of Canada notes that each year auto theft costs Canadians roughly \$1 billion. That figure includes the \$542 million insurers pay to fix or replace stolen vehicles each year. Those costs are ultimately passed on to customers, who then indirectly pay for the actions of car thieves.

Curbing auto theft is not necessarily the job of drivers, but there are things motorists can do to reduce the likelihood that their car will be stolen by opportunistic thieves.

Avoid keyless ignition systems. Drivers who live in areas that are vulnerable to auto theft may want the peace of mind that comes with traditional keyed ignition systems instead of the more modern and flashy keyless ignition systems. While vehicles with keyed ignition systems are stolen every day, some thieves may find it easier and quicker to steal cars or trucks with keyless ignition systems. Thieves can copy keys used in traditional ignition systems, but that process may require access to the original key and tends to take longer than it takes for thieves to reprogram keyless ignition systems once they're inside a car. Reprogramming devices are not legal, but they are available and can be used to shut off automobile alarm systems in a matter of seconds.

·Lock your vehicle at all times. One of the simplest ways to protect a vehicle from prospective thieves is to always lock the windows and doors, even when you're inside the vehicle. Auto thieves like things to go quickly and smoothly, and locked doors and rolled up windows only complicate things for thieves. Get in the habit of locking the vehicle when you're driving, as unlocked doors make it easier for carjackers to surprise unsuspecting motorists.

Park smart. Some • motorists like to park far away so their vehicles are not at risk of being dinged or scratched by inattentive drivers and passengers getting into and out of nearby vehicles. Others may simply not have the patience to find parking spots in well-lit areas close to home or storefronts. But thieves may target vehicles parked nowhere near foot or automobile traffic. Always park in parking garages or other well-lit areas, which deter thieves from breaking

in and driving away with your vehicle.

Etch the VIN onto your windows. Car thieves are not in the auto theft business so they can build a fleet of stolen cars. Upon stealing a car, many car thieves head right for a chopshop, which is a place where stolen cars are disassembled and then sold for parts. By etching the VIN, or vehicle identification number, of your car or truck on your vehicle's windshield or windows, you may be making your car less attractive to prospective thieves and the

chop shops they do business with.

Vehicle theft remains a problem even as technology has done much to prevent it. But drivers can take steps to reduce their risk of being victimized by car thieves.
