.... and \$90,820,000, not including administrative costs for the municipalities. Unfortunately, supply issues, commodity prices, labour shortages and other international factors hampered the proponents' efforts to remain within the firm \$58 million construction budget target.

Both municipal Councils, as well as the project Steering Committee, plan to meet in the coming weeks to determine alternative paths forward to ensure an equivalent facility is developed for the community.



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One-Time Grant Payment This Week For Guaranteed Income Supplement Recipients Who Received Pandemic Benefits

... or the Canada Recovery Benefit in 2020. This measure was announced in the 2021 Economic and Fiscal Update.

The one-time grant payments will alleviate the financial hardship of seniors who qualified and received pandemic benefits in 2020, and who faced a reduction or loss of GIS benefits in July 2021. The one-time grant payment compensates eligible seniors for the full loss of their GIS or Allowance benefits. The amount is equal to the annualized amount of their reduced payment. For example, if an individual's monthly GIS was reduced by \$100. the individual will receive a \$1,200 one-time grant payment.

Seniors do not need to take any action to receive the one-time grant payment; they will automatically receive it in the same way they receive their GIS payments. These one-time grant payments will be issued by direct deposit on April 19, 2022; clients who have not signed up for direct deposit will receive a cheque by mail by no later than the end of April 2022.

Government has The taken action to prevent future reductions in GIS or Allowance benefits for seniors who received pandemic benefits in 2021 by introducing Bill C-12. Bill C-12, which received Royal Assent on March 3, 2022, amends the Old Age Security Act to exclude any income received under the Canada Emergency Response Benefit, the Canada Recovery Benefit, the Canada Recovery Caregiving Benefit, the Canada **Recovery Sickness Benefit** and the Canada Worker Lockdown Benefit for the purposes of calculating the amount of GIS and Allowance payable beginning in July 2022.

Fighting the federal firearm ban

Alberta chief firearms officer Teri Bryant is raising concerns with the federal firearm ban. The federal measure prohibits more than 1,500 models of firearms and other related firearm components. It also calls for an amnesty period and a federal program to acquire and destroy the firearms. The banning of an arbitrary selection of firearms and unfair imposing costs

and controls on law-abiding gun owners reflects a main concern of Albertans: firearms policies and regulations should be evidence-based instead of ineffective measures that target law-abiding citizens rather than criminals.

Welcoming West Virginia Senator Joe Manchin

United States Senator Joe Manchin of West Virginia visited Alberta to discuss being partners in energy security.

Premier Jason Kenney and Senator Manchin spoke to media about the need to for Canada and the United States to be better partners in energy security. Manchin, who sits on the U.S. Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources, said the U.S. now wishes it didn't kill the Keystone XL pipeline and that he will ask Premier Kenney to testify before the committee on the need for better energy cooperation between Canada and the U.S. on pipelines and energy issues.

Terminating relationships with Russian regions

In response to the unprovoked Russian invasion of Ukraine, the Government of Alberta has terminated its relationship with three Russian regions.

Premier Jason Kenney stated that despite the decades-long relationships, Alberta denounces Russia's invasion of Ukraine and is terminating its relationship with these regions. The relationships between Alberta and Tyumen Oblast, Khanty-Mansi Autonomous Okrug and Yamalo-Nenets Autonomous Okrug began in 1992, 1995 and 1997, respectively. This is the first time the Government of Alberta has terminated relationships with sister regions.

Acting to better support children and youth

Minister of Children's Services Rebecca Schulz has accepted and is implementing all six action items outlined in the Review of Deaths of Children and Youth Receiving Child Intervention Services.

The past two years have been challenging for children, youth, and young adults because of the COVID-19 pandemic and related restrictions. Young adults struggling with addiction have also been particularly hard hit by these events. Alberta's government is responding by making significant investments to improve mental health and addiction care and help youth and young adults recover from the challenges they face. Alberta's government is also enhancing safety planning, oversight and reporting to improve the safety of children and youth receiving intervention services.

Supporting well-being for Indigenous women

Three grants will help provide Indigenous women in Alberta with the skills and support they need to find careers and improve their livelihoods.

Funding to the Institute for the Advancement Aboriginal Women of (IAAW) will support programs to help Indigenous women find jobs, security and success in Alberta's rapidly recovering economy. With a focus on job readiness, retention and improved access to vital services, these programs will help participants

build skills and confidence by offering customized plans to help develop career paths, from pre-employment training and education to longterm achievements in the workplace. The IAAW will also provide advocacy, referrals and strategies for mental health, housing, transportation, childcare, and assistance navigating the justice system.

The Government of Canada continues to take a risk-based and measured approach to adjusting and easing Canada's border measures. Today, the Government of Canada announced further changes to Canada's border measures for certain eligible travellers.

Effective April 25, 2022, at 00:01:00 EDT, the following easing of border measures will come into effect:

Unvaccinated or partially vaccinated children aged 5-11 who are accompanied by a fully vaccinated parent, step-parent, guardian or tutor will no longer be required to complete a pre-entry COVID-19 test for entry to Canada. Pre-entry tests will still be required for partially vaccinated or unvaccinated travellers 12 and older who are currently eligible to travel to Canada. Children under 5 years of age are not required to provide a COVID-19 test result.

Additionally, all fully vaccinated travellers will no longer be required to provide a quarantine plan upon entry. This requirement will also be removed for children aged 5-11 who are accompanied by a fully vaccinated parent, step-parent, guardian, or tutor and travellers with a medical contraindication to a COVID-19 vaccine.

Furthermore, fully vaccinated travellers arriving to Canada on or after April 25, 2022, will no longer be federally required to do the following for 14 days after arriving:

• mask while in public spaces;

monitor and re-

port if they develop signs or symptoms;

• quarantine if another traveller in the same travel group exhibits signs or symptoms or tests positive; and

• maintain a list of close contacts and loca-tions visited.

As a reminder, all travellers are still required to use ArriveCAN (free mobile app or website) to provide mandatory travel information within 72 hours of their arrival to Canada and/or before boarding a plane or cruise ship destined for Canada, including:

• contact and travel information, and

• vaccination information and proof of vaccination (if applicable).

Fully vaccinated travellers who do not submit their information into ArriveCAN: • won't be eligible for the fully vaccinated traveller exemption (i.e., they may have to submit a pre-entry test result and suitable quarantine plan, quarantine and undergo testing in Canada);

• may face additional delays at the border for public health questioning; and

• may be subject to fines or other enforcement action.

All travellers, regardless of vaccination status, must also continue to wear a mask throughout their entire travel journey.

While some federal requirements are being lifted for certain eligible travellers, all travellers entering Canada by air, land or water must adhere to the federal requirements along with those outlined by their province or territory.
