Declarations of eligibility will be required across Canada starting from July 1, 2022 in Eastern Canada and August 1, 2022 in Western Canada. Only grains subject to variety registration will require a declaration. These declarations provide a means to assure the...

Fighting the federal firearm ban

Alberta chief firearms officer Teri Bryant is raising concerns with the federal firearm ban. The federal measure prohibits more than 1,500 models of firearms and other related firearm components. It also calls for an amnesty period and a federal program to acquire and destroy the firearms. The banning of an arbitrary selection of firearms and imposing unfair costs and controls on law-abiding gun owners reflects a...


Make your neighborhood and workplace safer by reporting broken street lights, cleaning up parks and vacant lots, and lobbying local government for better lighting in public places.

....main concern of Albertans: firearms policies and regulations should be evidence-based instead of ineffective measures that target law-abiding citizens rather than criminals.

Welcoming West Virginia Senator Joe Manchin

United States Senator Joe Manchin of West Virginia visited Alberta to discuss being partners in energy security.

Premier Jason Kenney and Senator Manchin spoke to media about the need to for Canada and the United States to be better partners in energy security. Manchin, who sits on the U.S. Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources, said the U.S. now wishes it didn't kill the Keystone XL pipeline and that he will ask Premier Kenney to testify before the committee on the need for better energy cooperation between Canada and the U.S. on pipelines and energy issues.

Terminating relationships with Russian regions

In response to the unprovoked Russian invasion of Ukraine, the Government of Alberta has terminated its relationship with three Russian regions.

Premier Jason Kenney stated that despite the decades-long relationships, Alberta denounces Russia's invasion of Ukraine and is terminating its relationship with these regions. The relationships between Alberta and Tyumen Oblast, Khanty-Mansi Autonomous Okrug and Yamalo-Nenets Autonomous Okrug began in 1992, 1995 and 1997, respectively. This is the first time the Government of Alberta has terminated relationships with sister regions.

Acting to better support children and youth

Minister of Children's Services Rebecca Schulz has accepted and is implementing all six action items outlined in the Review of Deaths of Children and Youth Receiving Child Intervention Services.

The past two years have been challenging for children, youth, and young adults because of the COVID-19 pandemic and related restrictions. Young adults struggling with

addiction have also been particularly hard hit by these events. Alberta's government is responding by making significant investments to improve mental health and addiction care and help youth and young adults recover from the challenges they face. Alberta's government is also enhancing safety planning, oversight and reporting to improve the safety of children and youth receiving intervention services.

Supporting well-being for Indigenous women

Three grants will help provide Indigenous women in Alberta with the skills and support they need to find careers and improve their livelihoods.

Funding to the Institute for the Advancement of Aboriginal Women (IAAW) will support programs to help Indigenous women find jobs, security and success in Alberta's rapidly recovering economy. With a focus on job readiness, retention and improved access to vital services, these programs will help participants build skills and confidence by offering customized plans to help develop career paths, from pre-employment training and education to long-term achievements in the workplace. The IAAW will also provide advocacy, referrals and strategies for mental health, housing, transportation, childcare, and assistance navigating the justice system.

1) Take complaints of bullying seriously. Do not dismiss your child or expect your child to work through the situation alone.


2) Praise your child for reporting bullying situations to you and assure your child you will take action.

4) Work together to address the bullying situation. Don't confront the parents of the bully directly.

5) Ask your child specific questions about how your child is treated by peers, who he or she eats lunch with, and how other children are treated.


6) Teach your child to be assertive. Your child should be able to express feelings and needs clearly, without shouting or other aggressive behavior.



7) Provide opportunities for your child to make friends. Identify some of your child's interests and encourage your child to pursue them through sports, clubs, or other group activities.

8) Teach your child to identify bullying behaviors. These include hitting, damaging possessions, threatening, name calling, & excluding someone



RURAL CRIME AWARENESS

Protect machinery from theft by leaving valuables locked in a shed or storage facility and by marking equipment with your drivers licence and province of issue (an engraver can be borrowed free of charge from most local police detachments).

Protect livestock by checking herds regularly and keeping accurate records of livestock born, sold or purchased.

"Grain Fette" or "Grain Guard" is a unique approach to identifying your crops. Small bits of paper, each one imprinted with your special code number, are mixed with grain as grain is being augered into the storage shed. This is approved by the Canadian Grain Commission. The paper used is also digestable in animal feed. Utilize the Report-A-Poacher Program. Their toll free number is 1-800-642-3800. Rural Crime Watch Members are concerned citizens who are watchful for unusual activity in their community. They record information on suspicious people and vehicles and pass it along to local police. Join together with your neighbours to install a crime watch program in your area.Do not approach suspicious individuals on your own. TIPS TO SPOT AN IMPAIRED DRIVER

Drivers who are impaired by fatigue, drugs, alcohol or other distractions such as cell phones, are a danger not only to themselves, but also to the innocent drivers around them. If you witness any of the behaviors below, call 911 and tell the operator that you are calling to report an impaired driver. Be prepared to describe the make, model, color and license plate number of the vehicle, and provide its exact location.

Signs of impaired driving include:

Failure to turn on headlights at night. • Illegal or sudden turning. • Turning within an unusually wide radius. • Nearly striking other cars or objects. • Sudden or erratic braking. • Drifting, swerving or weaving.
Driving with the face close to the windshield. • Drinking alcohol in the vehicle. •Driving much slower than the posted speed limit. • Rapidly accelerating. • Tailgating. • Driving in the middle of the road, or with the left tires on the center line. • Responding slowly to traffic signals

ARTICLE FROM MLA SMITH

It is clear to all Albertans that inflation is beginning to impact our quality of life.

As a part of Alberta's recovery plan, we are providing \$10.4 million to continuing care operators, on behalf of residents, to offset one-quarter of this year's increase in accommodation charges for Albertans in long-term care and designated supportive living. Operators are permitted by legislation to raise accommodation rates each July 1 by the rate of inflation over the previous year. This year's increase will be 5.5 per cent. The government will pay operators directly for the increase for July 1 to Sept. 30.

Furthermore, as part of Alberta's Recovery Plan, a record number of students will receive the Women in STEM Scholarship this year.

This scholarship supports women studying in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) fields, areas in which women are often under-represented. This year, \$732,500 is being distributed to 293 students. This one-time top-up funding will mean 243 more students are receiving funding than last year. Each will receive \$2,500 to pay for their studies. When women are supported in pursuing careers in which they are often under-represented, they have new opportunities to reach

their full potential, support their families and contribute to Alberta's growing knowledge-based economy. Lastly, new funding for the Civil Society Fund will support 37 projects, helping vulnerable Albertans and contributing to the province's social and economic recovery.

As part of Alberta's Recovery Plan, these projects will help organizations supporting Albertans address a range of social issues such as mental health, homelessness, and domestic violence. A total of \$7 million is being invested into this program, with funding per project ranging from \$35,900 to \$550,000. Organizations will have up to two years to complete their projects. Budget 2022 includes an additional \$6 million for the Civil Society Fund – completing our United Conservative, threeyear \$20-million platform commitment to increase the capacity of civil society to address social issues.

As we move forward in 2022 the Alberta Government will continue to grow the economy through the Alberta Recovery Plan. We will address inflationary pressures on Albertans, provide help to those looking to grow the Alberta economy through a knowledge based economy and fund projects though civil society groups that will help vulnerable Albertans.
