The feathers, Inukshuk and maple leaf were cut in the metal shop. The wood shop cut out the backing and prepared a blank plaque for the acknowledgement. Cst. Marshall 962-9228 designed the plaque and 962-1021 laser engraved it in the Com Tech lab. The Metis sash was provided by the Indigenous student grad coach. In all, approximately 20 hours of design and labour went into its

creation.

The display is now hanging in the front lobby of the Parkland RCMP Detachment. Inspector Mike Lokken, Cpl. Kandis Hiscock, Cpl. Cuneyt Zanbak, Elder Elsie Paul, and several other Parkland RCMP members were present for the official unveiling ceremony. Parkland RCMP were honoured that Elsie Paul smudged the plaque for the event and offered opening remarks.

Parkland RCMP would like to thank all who contributed to this project, and hope that this Land Acknowledgement will leave a lasting impact on all who come through the detachment doors.

...increases oxygen levels in the blood but triggers the release of "happy" hormones such as oxytocin, which is thought to help lower stress levels and blood pressure. One choir member agrees. "Singing is a wonderful way to improve fitness from the inside out. It stimulates the brain."

Director Debbie Rosen chooses music that challenges choir members' abilities, and provides each member with a CD of his or her own part to reinforce the weekly rehearsals. Singers don't need to be able to read music but it certainly helps.

One member commented "I enjoy the diverse mix of choir members, and also like the musical materials that Debbie continues to challenge us with." Another stressed the sense of community. "Like many others, I work in Edmonton. The choir is a way for me to remain connected to my home community. It also provides artistic expression for members and enjoyment for concert attendees."

The next season of the Lac Ste. Anne Community Choir begins Wednesday, September 7. Registration begins at 6:15 p.m. at the Heritage Centre in Alberta Beach (5012 – 49 Avenue). Opt-in program facilitates rapid first-response premises entry

As part of a collaborative regional initiative, Lac Ste. Anne County Fire Services has adopted the Knox Box program — and with it, a system that allows first responders to gain access to a home within seconds in a lifethreatening or critical situation.

Some of the primary benefits include:

- An optional tamper switch that can be connected to an intrusion alarm
- Fewer operational issues, such as keys jamming in the lock mechanism
- Audited trail of when the key lock box is accessed

On Aug. 7, 2022, Saddle Lake RCMP received a report of a domestic disturbance between two unknown individuals. After an investigation, RCMP were able to identify the possible involved parties who were also persons of interest in recent criminal investigations.

SCAM ALERT: ENERGY REBATE SCAMS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Albertans should use caution if they receive a text offering an energy rebate.

The Government of Alberta has received reports of Albertans receiving texts falsely claiming to be from the provincial government. In these phishing scams, recipients of the text are invited to apply for an energy rebate by clicking on a URL that appears to link to a provincial or federal government agency or program.

Neither the Government of Alberta nor the Government of Canada has sent emails or texts to Albertans about the electricity rebate program or any other energy rebates. Never click on links or provide personal or banking information in response to text messages or emails that you didn't ask for, or if you don't know the sender.

The Government of Alberta's forthcoming electricity rebate program will be applied directly to Albertans' bills in the coming months – there will be no need to apply for the rebate. More information will be released in the near future.

NATURAL GAS REBATE TO SUPPORT ALBERTANS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

The upcoming natural gas rebate will support more than 1.6 million homes, farms and businesses facing high heating bills next winter.

In Budget 2022, Alberta's government committed to ensuring natural gas consumers are protected from European-style price spikes next fall and winter. Now, the government is providing additional information on the rebates, including clarity for natural gas customers who are not connected to the distribution system and customers who use other heating fuels, such as propane, kerosene or heating oils, all of which will also be eligible for rebates.

The rebates will provide critical support and cost certainty to at least 1.6 million homes, farms and businesses, including those in rural and remote areas, from Oct. 1, 2022, through March 31, 2023.

"We are stepping up to provide more and more relief for Albertans as prices remain high. This rebate will provide price protection for millions of Albertans using natural gas, kerosene, propane and other fuels next winter. It will help families, farms and businesses manage high heating costs in the upcoming winter to keep life affordable in Alberta."

Natural gas rebate program Starting Oct. 1, all consumers connected to the natural gas distribution system and paying a bill directly to a natural gas retailer with less than 2,500 gigajoules (GJ) of annual natural gas consumption will be eligible for government-provided rebates, which will appear directly on bills. No application will be necessary to receive the rebates if you are connected to the natural gas distribution system.

Under this rebate program, if the monthly default natural gas rate from the regulated utility providers (ATCO Gas North, ATCO Gas South and Apex Utilities) goes above \$6.50 per GJ, the government will provide rebates to all consumers covering the difference between \$6.50 and the regulated rate, on a consumption basis. For example, if any of the regulated rates go to \$7.50 per GJ for the month of November, then all consumers would receive a rebate on their bill covering \$1 for every GJ used during the month of November.

These rebates will appear directly on eligible bills – protecting consumers on both regulated and competitive plans like fixed rate contracts. Other heating fuels also qualify for rebates

Eligible consumers not on the natural gas distribution system or consumers using the annual equivalent of 2,500 GJ or less in other heating fuels (such as propane, kerosene and heating oil), will also be eligible and can apply directly for their rebates through a separate application system.

For example, if one of the default regulated rates goes to \$7.50 for the month of November and an eligible consumer with a natural gas storage tank on their property purchases the equivalent of 200 GJ, that consumer can apply for a \$1 per GJ rebate for that amount of fuel. Specific eligibility limits for each fuel type are listed on alberta.ca.

The rebate for these heating fuels will be calculated in the same method, using a stan-

dardized equation to determine the consumption equivalency for the alternative fuel. Information on how to apply will be released before the Oct. 1 start date.

To keep Albertans informed about when they can expect rebates to be paid, regular updates on the default rate will be posted on alberta.ca for the duration of the rebate program. In Alberta, the default

regulated rates are set for the entire month and do not fluctuate throughout the month. If a regulated rate in Alberta is set above \$6.50 per GJ, the rebates will go into effect for all eligible consumers.

Delivering relief for Albertans This rebate is another component of the Alberta government's work to help support consumers dealing with high costs of living. It follows an

electricity rebate program implemented this summer and a gas tax repeal that will be in place until at least September.

With the electricity rebate reaching bills in July, August and September, and the natural gas rebate starting in October, the Government of Alberta will provide continuous monthly relief for millions of Albertans until March 31, 2023.

Clare's Law continues to be a valuable resource for Albertans at risk of domestic violence, with more than 400 applications for disclosure since the law came into effect.

Through Clare's Law, Albertans have the right to know and ask about an intimate partner's past and whether they have a history of violence. People who feel they may be at risk can submit an online application through the Clare's Law website at no cost.

The government has improved the Clare's Law process to make it more efficient, easier to navigate and more responsive. This includes adjusting the risk analysis process to decrease turnaround times so applicants are provided information as quickly as possible while also making sure applicants receive comprehensive information in a more accessible format.

As a result, the backlog of risk assessments caused by the large number of applications received has been addressed.

To date, more than 300 information disclosures have been made available to Albertans, helping them make informed choices about their safety and relationships. Many more disclosures are currently being completed by police.

In addition, police forms were consolidated to simplify the process and the application form was amended to make it easier to understand. These improvements were based on feedback from applicants.

"Intimate partner violence takes a huge toll in our communities, and we are taking action to prevent this from happening. Giving people access to the right information could potentially save their lives, and we continue to improve the program to make sure it is responsive to the complex needs of those who may be at risk of intimate partner violence." Tyler Shandro, Minister of Justice and Solicitor General

"Alberta has long struggled with a high rate of domestic violence, and Alberta's government made a platform commitment to take action. The significant uptake of Clare's Law shows us this tool is a valuable resource for atrisk Albertans and helps them make better decisions about their lives. I urge any Albertan who feels they might be at risk to submit a Clare's Law application today. You have the right to know and ask about your partner's past." "When women and children are safe, we all thrive. We must work together as government, as community and as individuals to break the cycle of violence. Clare's Law is a vital part of the solution. All Clare's Law applicants can access supports and services throughout the entire Clare's Law process. In fact, more than half of all applicants were connected with partner agencies to receive support. These supports include access to services like counselling, safety planning, emergency housing and specialized supports for sexual violence victims.

"Clare's Law has acted as a safe and accessible entry point for hundreds of Albertans to learn more about domestic abuse, many of whom have never connected with the social service sector previously. Since Clare's Law launched last year, Sagesse has completed 295 social service referrals. This means nearly 300 Albertans have had the opportunity to access resources and supports to prevent further abuse and live a safer, healthier life. People may experience fear, domestic abuse and

coercive control at any point in a relationship. Deciding what to do when experiencing abuse is hard, but increased information and support helps. We are thankful for programs such as Clare's Law. By providing resources to Albertans at risk or experiencing domestic abuse, we know we can prevent abuse before it begins." Andrea Silverstone, executive director, Sagesse

PREPARING YOUR FIREPLACE OR STOVE FOR THE SEASON

Fireplaces and wood-burning stoves not only can be beautiful focal points within a home, but they also provide an additional source of heat and can be used to keep rooms or entire homes comfortable without the need for additional and potentially costly heating sources.

Just like more modern home heating systems, stoves and fireplaces need to be maintained, and that maintenance includes readying them before winter when they are used more heavily. Ensur-

ing a fireplace or stove is in good working order helps to guarantee efficiency of use and safety during the winter months.

Open-flame heating sources carry with them certain risks. The National Fire Protection Association states that, between 2009-2013, American fire departments responded to 56,000 home structure fires that involved heating equipment. The NFPA notes that the leading factor contributing to home-heating fires is a failure to keep things clean, principally

from solid-fueled heating equipment. The following are a handful of ways to stay safe as you get ready for another cozy season around the fire.

Start with the chimney. Begin by having your chimney thoroughly cleaned and inspected. Creosote can build up inside of the chimney. Creosote is highly flammable and becomes more difficult and expensive to clean the longer it builds up inside your flue lining. In addition, animals may have created nest inside of the chimney since the

last time the fireplace was used. A professional chimney sweep should be hired in this situation. He or she will be able to effectively clean the chimney in a manner that is the least messy and disruptive to residents.

Install or check . smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Operational alarms are essential to preventing injury or death resulting from smoke or carbon monoxide inhalation. Such detectors are inexpensive safeguards that...

...should be installed on every floor of the house. Batteries should be replaced every six months, and the alarms themselves should be changed every five to 10 years.

Inspect the chimney from outdoors as well. Inspect the mortar around any bricks in the chimney and surrounding areas for cracks. If left unaddressed, these can cause dangerous fires. If there are serious cracks, a professional may need to make repairs or the chimney may need to be replaced. You also can have the chimney capped with a screen to keep animals and debris from entering.

• Inspect the damper. A damper is a valve or plate that stops or regulates the flow of air inside a chimney. It should be checked prior to the first use of a stove or fireplace so homeowners can be certain it opens and closes smoothly.

• Clear out flammable items. Move flammable items away from the front of a fireplace or stove. Be sure curtains or other home furnishings are far enough away that they will not catch fire from any errant sparks or flames.

• Order wood now. Be sure there is plenty of wood for the season. Ask a wood supplier to estimate just how much will be needed, and double-check that the wood will arrive in time for the start of the season.

By preparing for fireplace and wood stove use now, homeowners can ensure their winters are comfortable and safe.
