The driver and lone occupant of the Buick, a 27-yearold male from Edmonton was pronounced deceased at the scene. The driver of the ambulance, a 51-yearold female was also pronounced deceased. A male passenger in the ambulance suffered serious injuries and was transported to an Edmonton hospital. There were no patients on-board the ambulance at the time of the collision.

An RCMP Collision Analyst attended the scene and preliminary investigation shows that the Buick was travelling westbound on Highway 39 and crossed the center line where it collided with the eastbound ambulance. Alcohol and/or drugs appear to be a factor in the collision. Emergency crews have cleared from the scene and there is no further traffic disruption

PREPARING YOUR FIREPLACE OR STOVE FOR THE SEASON

Fireplaces and wood-burning stoves not only can be beautiful focal points within a home, but they also provide an additional source of heat and can be used to keep rooms or entire homes comfortable without the need for additional and potentially costly heating sources.

Just like more modern home heating systems, stoves and fireplaces need to be maintained, and that maintenance includes readying them before winter when they are used more heavily. Ensuring a fireplace or stove is in good working order helps to guarantee efficiency of use and safety during the winter months.

Open-flame heating sources carry with them certain risks. The National Fire Protection Association states that, between 2009-2013, American fire departments responded to 56,000 home structure fires that involved heating equipment. The NFPA notes that the leading factor contributing to home-heating fires is a failure to keep things clean, principally from solid-fueled heating equipment. The following are a handful of ways to stay safe as you get ready for another cozy season around the fire.

• Start with the chimney. Begin by having your chimney thoroughly cleaned and inspected. Creosote can build up inside of the chimney. Creosote is highly flammable and becomes more

difficult and expensive to clean the longer it builds up inside your flue lining. In addition, animals may have created nest inside of the chimney since the last time the fireplace was used. A professional chimney sweep should be hired in this situation. He or she will be able to effectively clean the chimney in a manner that is the least messy and disruptive to residents.

monoxide detectors. Operational alarms are essential to preventing injury or death resulting from smoke or carbon monoxide inhalation. Such detectors are inexpensive safeguards that should be installed on every floor of the house. Batteries should be replaced every six months, and the alarms themselves should be changed every five to 10 years.

• Inspect the chimney from outdoors as

well. Inspect the mortar around any bricks in the chimney and surrounding areas for cracks. If left unaddressed, these can cause dangerous fires. If there are serious cracks, a professional may need to make repairs or the chimney may need to be replaced. You also can have the chimney capped with a screen to keep animals and debris from entering. Inspect the damper. A damper is a valve or plate that stops or regulates the flow of

air inside a chimney. It should be checked prior to the first use of a stove or fireplace so homeowners can be certain it opens and closes smoothly.

• Clear out flammable items. Move flammable items away from the front of a fireplace or stove. Be sure curtains or other home furnishings are far enough away that they will not catch fire from any errant sparks or flames.

• Order wood now. Be sure there is plenty of wood for the season. Ask a wood supplier to estimate just how much will be needed, and double-check that the wood will arrive in time for the start of the season.

By preparing for fireplace and wood stove use now, homeowners can ensure their winters are comfortable and safe.

Expanding contracts with chartered surgical facilities in central and southern Alberta will reduce wait times and deliver about 2,600 more surgeries closer to home.

As part of the Alberta Surgical Initiative, Alberta Health Services (AHS) aims to schedule an additional 1,350 surgeries in the central zone and about 1,250 more procedures in the south zone, ranging from hip and knee to general surgeries, by inviting chartered surgical facilities to submit proposals.

These procedures are expected to boost publicly funded surgeries in central zone communities such as Red Deer and in communities in the south zone like Lethbridge and Medicine Hat by five per cent. Moving more orthopedic and other general surgeries into chartered surgical facilities also frees up operating room space in hospitals to provide more complex surgeries.

"Albertans are waiting too long for hip and knee replacements and other types of surgeries. That's why we are moving forward with our plan to deliver more surgeries for Albertans closer to their home and within the clinically appropriate period. Alberta's government remains committed to expanding health-care system capacity and making sure Albertans get much better value for their health-care dollars."

Alberta Health and AHS have been increasing surgical capacity in hospitals and the number of surgeries at chartered surgical facilities as part of the Alberta Surgical Initiative. Main operating room surgical suite hours have been increased at hospitals, which is steadily reducing the surgical waitlist. Budget 2022 provides \$133 million over three years to expand and build new operating rooms in hospitals across the province, including in Calgary, Edmonton, Edson, Grande Prairie, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat and Rocky Mountain House.

Through requests for proposals issued last year for chartered surgical facilities in Calgary and Edmonton, AHS is targeting about 30,000 ophthalmology surgeries in these facilities this fiscal year. In addition, AHS is targeting about 6,000 orthopedic surgeries in chartered surgical facilities per year, and contracts are being finalized.

Chartered surgical facilities have been offering publicly funded surgeries to Albertans since the 1990s. Prior to launching the Alberta Surgical Initiative in 2019, about 39,000 procedures were performed at chartered surgical facilities - 13 per cent of surgeries in Alberta. In 2021-22, about 55,000 surgeries were performed in these facilities, or 20 per cent of surgeries.
