PARKLAND RCMP INVESTIGATE **POSSIBLE HATE CRIME**

Submitted by Parkland RCMP

On Oct. 16, 2022, at approximately 10 a.m., Parkland RCMP received a report of a severed pig's head that had been left on the rainbow Pride crosswalk painted at Graminia School in Parkland County.

The pig is believed to be a domesticated pig. Its head was severed with a bladed instrument. Its placement in the center of the crosswalk appears to have been intentional and designed to disturb students, staff and parents. Due to these circumstances, investigators are treating this incident as a possible hate crime targeted at the school, which has a Gay-Straight Alliance. "An unsophisticated per-

son might think this was a prank. An objective viewer would see it as highly intolerant and provocative," says Staff Sergeant Ian Gillan of Parkland RCMP.

Parkland RCMP are seeking any information that may assist the investigation. In particular, police are seeking the following information:

On Saturday, October 15th, the Yellowhead County Fire Department (YCFD) held an open house at the County's Station 12 in Edson as part of


Approximately 85 people attended, with both children and adults enjoying the event.

Alberta's economy continued to charge full steam ahead in the third quarter of 2022.

This week's third quarter economic update showed that our economy is not only strong and resilient, but that it is rapidly diversifying and attracting new investment across a variety of economic sectors, from renewable energy to aviation to manufacturing to technology. Companies are choosing Alberta again, including major international firms such as TC Energy, De Havilland Aircraft, Condor Airlines, CGC Inc., Orbia's Dura-Line, Infosys, and Level 42 AI. This is a very good sign that our government's policies and tax structures are working to attract new investment and

diversify the economy.

This boon in investment has led to our province leading the nation in job growth, year to date. Over the past three months, our province gained 4,600 jobs while the rest of Canada lost 49,200 jobs. Alberta is a province that leads, and we are once again setting a positive example of what can be achieved through common-sense conservative policies.

Alberta's remarkable job growth has been fueled, in part, by an uptick in net migration, as families and businesses flock to Alberta in search of economic freedom and opportunity. In the second quarter of 2022, Alberta saw the highest net inflow of interprovincial migrants in the country, with 9,857 people travelling to our province to participate in the new Alberta Advantage. This is good news for our economy as businesses and industries continue to grapple with a shortage of skilled labour.

Another positive in the third quarter economic update was that our tourism, hospitality, and retail sectors are continuing to rebound and recover. Hotel occupancy rates in Alberta have almost returned to pre-pandemic levels, reaching 68.1 per cent, and July saw record sales for Alberta's restaurant industry, reaching \$913.8 million an increase of 16.1 per cent compared with July 2021. Retail sales also increased to \$8.1 billion, a 9.9 per cent increase from the same month a year before, second only to May 2022.


Despite this good economic news, we know inflation continues to be a major concern for Alberta

PROTECT YOUR VEHICLE FROM SNOW, ICE AND DAMAGE FROM THE COLD

Winter can be an unforgiving season. Freezing temperatures coupled with snow and ice can take its toll on people who live in climates where cold weather is a fact of winter life.

While winter can test people's patience, it also can be harsh on cars and trucks. Understanding what components of a vehicle can be compromised by dropping temperatures and snowy roads can help drivers take action to safeguard their automotive investments.

While the Canadian Automobile Association notes that winter can wreak havoc on just about every part of a vehicle, there are some parts that seem to bear the brunt of Old Man Winter's abuse. Properly servicing and caring for a car or truck can help.

Drivers should take their vehicles for a tuneup and inspection before wintry weather arrives. A mechanic will examine the car battery and check antifreeze levels and make sure that the thermostat, defroster, brakes, and even wiper blades are working effectively. Have the tires inspected for adequate tread, which can make navigating roads safer. If the treads are worn, replace the tires.

In addition to visiting their mechanics, drivers can perform some inspections and fixes themselves.

• Check that all of the vehicle's lights

are operational so your car can be easily seen during inclement weather. Exchange your existing windshield washer fluid with one that will not freeze in cold conditions. Check the nozzles on the windshield-washer system routinely and clear out any blockages of ice or debris. While addressing windshield washer fluid, also replace worn out windshield wiper blades with ones that can withstand snow

and icy weather.

• A new coating of wax can serve as a shield against road salt, snow, sleet, and rain. Try a polymer wax to protect the paint. Whenever possible, rinse off salt and grime so it does not dry on the car and gradually wear away at the paint. Some drivers mistakenly believe that salt stops being a problem once it dries simply because moisture is the active ingredient for a corrosive reaction. But humidity in the air is enough to keep the salt eating away at the car's paint, and that can contribute to rust. Be sure to rinse off the undercarriage of the vehicle as well.

• Have your tires' alignment checked toward the end of winter or early spring. A season of traveling over pothole-ridden roads or hitting curbs buried under snow drifts can affect the alignment. Get everything back on track. Similarly, inspect tires routinely, as weather changes can affect tire pressure and strength.

• Use a soft snow brush or a foam brush to clear snow off of the car. Avoid hard plastic scrapers you might use on your windshield, as they can scratch painted surfaces.

• Try to park the vehicle in a garage or under a car port, each of which can protect cars and trucks from the often harsh elements of winter.

Vehicles can be affected by the cold weather. Keep

them running efficiently to prevent damage this winter.




