# UNDERUSED HOUSING TAX PENALTIES AND INTEREST WAIVED

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead wishes to advise that the application of penalties and interest under the UHTA for the 2022 calendar year will be waived for any late-filed underused housing tax (UHT) return and for any late-paid UHT payable, provided the return is filed or the UHT is paid by October 31, 2023.

# OUR UNITED CONSERVATIVE GOVERNMENT IS COMMITTED TO MAKING LIFE MORE AFFORDABLE FOR ALBERTANS

With inflation on the top of so many minds right now, I am pleased to report that our government's Affordability Action Plan is working. At 3.6 per cent, Alberta has the lowest inflation rate in the country, according to recently released numbers from Statistics Canada. The next closest province is Ontario, where inflation currently sits at 5.1 per cent, followed by Newfoundland and Labrador, where inflation currently sits at 5.4 per cent.

The measures we've introduced, including the fuel tax cut, natural gas price protection, and electricity rebates are helping Alberta families pay their bills and invest in the future. Unfortunately, the Trudeau-NDP alliance still doesn't get it. On April 1, they hiked the carbon tax again on Albertan and Canadian families by another 30 per cent, and they have plans to more than triple the carbon tax between now and 2030.

According to the independent Parliamentary Budget Officer, the average family will pay \$1,500 more for the carbon tax than they will get back in rebates. At a time when governments like ours are working to make life more affordable and when families are struggling to cope with inflation, the Trudeau-NDP Alliance is working to make life even harder and more expensive. This is disappointing, but not surprising.

The good news is we won't be deterred. We are going to continue working to make life more affordable for Albertans and grow and diversify the economy. We will also continue working to reduce emissions, as we understand the unique needs of our province and economy much better than Ottawa does.

At the core of our plan to reduce emissions is the Technology Innovation and Emissions Reduction (TIER) system, which is working to manage emissions by supporting investment in innovative technology that cuts emissions, keeps industry competitive, attracts investment, and creates jobs. The TIER system is funded by heavy emitters who are largest source of GHG emissions in our province - not by everyday Albertans. To date, more than \$1 billion from the TIER fund has been used to support innovative technologies that diversify Alberta's economy and cut emissions, with another \$800 million being invested over the next three years, and an additional \$387 million over four years reserved in the TIER fund for investments in future carbon capture, utilization, and storage projects.

The majority of Albertans are opposed to the carbon tax. Our United Conservative team will continue to fight this carbon tax, which will only make it harder for ordinary families to pay their hockey fees, gas their trucks, take vacations, and invest in the futures.

We will also continue to work to make life more affordable for Albertans. I encourage you to read more about our Affordability Action Plan at Alberta. ca/Affordability. We are standing with Albertans to help them get through this inflation crisis that has been largely driven by outof-control federal spending policies.

We won't leave any Albertan behind.

Notable projects designated for this summer include:


• 65 Avenue and OEII Interchange project;

Candidates are required to


submit an essay detailing the reasons why occupational health and safety is their chosen field of study, their motivation and inspiration, and how they will contribute to safe work in the future.

# **RENOGUDE** PREPARE COOLING SYSTEMS FOR WARM WEATHER

One springtime task on homeowners' to-do lists is checking cooling systems to ensure they are ready for summer. Proper maintenance of cooling systems is essential to saving energy and keeping utility costs down. Fortunately, homeowners need not be certified HVAC technicians to maintain their cooling units.

· Clean filters. Whether a home is kept cool by a whole-house central air conditioning system or window units, clean filters are necessary to keep the units working efficiently. Routinely replacing or cleaning filters is one of the most important maintenance tasks to improve airflow and increase efficiency. The U.S. Office of Energy Efficiency & Renewable Energy says replacing a dirty, clogged filter with a clean one can lower an air conditioner's energy consumption by anywhere from 5 to 15 percent.

• Know the square footage. When replacing a cooling system, have an understanding of the size of your home (or room if installing an window unit). Determine the area of the home so you buy a unit that suits your needs. Air conditioners use BTUs (British Thermal Units) to define cooling power. The more BTUs, the larger the space that can be cooled. However, homeowners do not want to exceed the necessary cooling power. This leads to energy waste. EnergyStar.gov can help homeowners find the right cooling system for their needs.

• Inspect system coils. The evaporator and condenser coils on air conditioners can collect dirt, even when filters are maintained. Dirty coils are less efficient at absorbing heat, so periodically remove the dirt. Outdoor coils can be kept cleaner by cutting back foliage from the unit to allow better air flow.

• Inspect condensate drains. Energy.gov also suggests making sure condensate drains, which take moisture pulled from the air away, are functioning properly. If they're clogged, they may not be effective at reducing humidity in a home, and they may even leak.

· Clear debris. Remove fallen leaves or other plant material from condenser units and fan blades. Obstructed components can cause the system to retain heat, compromising its ability to work effectively. Some homeowners prefer to cover their condensers at the end of the cooling season to keep leaves and dirt out of the unit.

· Check window unit seals. When installing window units, make sure all seals around the air conditioner are in place to prevent cool-air loss.

· Hire a technician. Air technicians conditioner can be very helpful and will know how to prepare a system for hot weather. Technicians typically conduct multipoint inspections and measure such things as refrigerant levels and duct leakage. Airflow through the evaporator coil also may be checked. If a homeowner suspects the thermostat is not working properly, a technician can verify if that is

true and even install a new one if necessary.

As summer approaches, homeowners should prepare their air conditioning units for the busy months ahead.







Outdoor entertaining areas are popular among homeowners, and firepits are one of the most sought-after additions to such spaces. • Wood firepit: As their name suggests, wood firepits burn wood, which may

appeal to homeowners who already have wood-burning fireplaces inside their homes. Because they don't require homeowners to tap into gas lines, wood firepits are generally easy to set up and install, and many homeowners prefer the aesthetic appeal of crackling wood and flames that's synonymous with wood firepits.

• Gas firepit: Gas firepits are touted for their convenience, as they don't require homeowners to carry wood and build fires. Upon being connected to a gas source, gas firepits provide fire at the click of a switch. Gas firepits are also appreciated for their safety, as there is little or no risk that flames from gas firepits will grow too large and become difficult to control.

• Gas fire tables: Gas fire tables might be ideal for those homeowners whose sense of decor favors more modern looks. Gas fire tables come in a variety of shapes and sizes and, like gas firepits, there's no need to struggle with lighting a fire or carrying firewood.

• Tabletop firepits: Homeowners, condominium or apartment dwellers with limited backyard space may want to consider the convenience of tabletop firepits. Restaurants may use tabletop firepits in their outdoor seating areas because they provide warmth and ambiance without taking up much space. Tabletop firepits fueled by gas will not need to be connected to a gas source, which may appeal to consumers who want something that's simple as well as small.

• Fire urns: While they might not technically qualify as firepits, fire urns provide a similar effect as firepits. Fire urns are typically gas-powered and may be an ideal choice for homeowners who are looking for a unique, awe-inspiring feature for their outdoor entertaining areas


